



Responsive To You

The federal government, in its insensate might, has frequently ridden roughshod over the wishes of the people. Powerful pressure groups, convincing the politicians of their numerical strength and purpose, have so influenced and prejudiced many of our government masters that they have frequently tended toward a collectivist conclusion and consequent action, despite the fact that the American people themselves wished otherwise.

We had begun to feel that, in its entrenched position of power, the government was incapable of responding to the will of the people. But in recent days we have been given hope and encouragement that things, as yet, are not that bad.

Some time ago the president let it be known that the Butcher of Belgrade, Marshal Tito, was angling for an invitation to lunch at the White House. Ike wanted to ask him. But he sent up a trial balloon through the press to find out first what the reaction would be.

From every corner of the nation letters poured forth to command and beseech the President not to tender invitation. While he was still more than half inclined to send the invitation anyway, King Ibn Saud of Arabia put in an appearance. The king got such a cold reception in New York that the President himself personally met the monarch's plane when it arrived in Washington, in an effort to thaw the emotional freeze.

But in the process, Eisenhower made a discovery. That the feelings of the people after all. Consequently, dethe feelings of the people after all. Consquantly, de-, spite his own wishes, he has decided not to ask Tito to come to America. This decision ranks as a belated victory for the forces of Americanism.

All too well do the people know that Tito's arrival would be the signal for increased economic aid to Yugoslavia. And since Tito is an avowed communist and a murderer of record, there was simply no good reason for any American to want him over here. The decision has been made. Tito will not come.

But the clamor from the American people is growing. Reports have now come in that senators and representatives of both parties are being inundated with letters, telegrams and phone calls for a revision of the \$72 billion budget. And again, lke is giving pause. It may be that, because of widespread civic indignation, the budget may yet be pared down a trifle.

Further, there is strenuous objection being voiced against any further foreign aid. The American people have become incensed over the great piles of bullion being shipped overseas to a lot of improbable friends and undoubted foes. They can find no constitutional basis for such taxation and such expenditures. And they are

But the beauty of it is, that at long last the federal government appears to have had its hearing restored. Altho no positive action has been taken relative to foreign aid or to the budget, the pressure in the right direction has been acknowledged.

We are greatly encouraged. Apparently, despite his wilfulness, President Eisenhower is being checked in his hitherto unbridled rush towards one world and total domination of the American people by one man.

So now is the time for all good men to arouse themselves and multiply that pressure. Let your letters, telegrams and phone calls go forth with vigor and with haste.

Other sensitive points on which to base your protests include further governmental aid to education, and the monstrous highway plan which, if fully implemented, will bleed us white. There is still time to let your views be known. And

NO NEED TO WAIT FOR A TAX AMENDMENT (Chicage Daily Tribune)

Action by the Idaho legislature placed 32 states behind the petition to Congress to call a constitutional convention for the purpose of putting a ceiling on the income tax. That meets the constitutional requirement of a twothirds majority.

Some of the petitions have been questioned, on the ground that subsequent legislatures rescinded them. Two were vetoed by governnors, the the applicability of vetoes to such action is questioned There is no clear constitutional direction as to what Congress shall do when it receives petitions, and no precedent, since the procedure has never been carried thru in the past.

Sen. Dirksen has pointed out however, that Congress is not limited to dealing with the petitions from the states. It can initiate an amendment, by the meth-ed successfully used 22 times in the history of the Republic, and submit it to the states for ratifieation. Mr. Dirksen is among the sponsors of a tax limiting amend-

point, or that it take more than half the profits of incorporated business. Congress can abandon the economic insanity embodied in the present tax rates by the passage of a simple statute.

It would, of course, be equally insane to cut tax rates drastically without also cutting the spending of the money that present rates produce. The spending is just as crazy as the taxation.

If Congress refuses to appropriate the 72 billion dollars that the administration is asking, the administration obviously doesn't need revenue measures that will raise an estimated 74 billions in the next fiscal year. The country recognizes this, even if Congress is coming to the same realization rather reluctantly. Members who have gone back to their districts on speech making tours know what the voters want. They want less spending.

Rep. Pelly (R., Wash.) has nearly 50 signatures to a resolution calling for a 65 billion dollar limit en the coming budget-a 6.8 billion cut below the executive request. Other members of Congress have called for reductions of 3 to 5

Speaker Rayburn is a pessimist. He declares it will be impossible to make a 5 billion cut. It will be impossible if Congress listens to every pressure group in the country which wants economies only at the expense of the other fellow. It will not be impossible if envone who votes for the present swollen requests is going to have a hard time getting himself re-

More Inflation Or Limit

On Prices And Wages President Eisenhower has given the public a hint that he will use price and wage limitations unless labor and management stop infla-

Ike, of course does not know what inflation is when he thinks that labor and owners of capital can keep prices down. In the first place, labor should get as high wages as can be had without causing unemployment. The owners of tools should also make as much profit as they can without causing unemployment by reducing their sales and thus their produc-

High wages and high profits on a free market basis benefit everybody in the world.

There's no danger of wages or profits being too high if the government protects each and every man's right to help establish wages and profits. In other words, if the government, local, state and federal, protects each and every person in his right to compete with anyone he thinks is getting too high, a wage or making too much profit. Then wages and profits will be constantly adjusted so that there will be no long periods of unemployment and our standard of living will rise, to the degree that new tools are accumulated and men are free to sell their services and their product to the world's highest bidder.

Eisenhower's Warning Remember Eisenhower, in his State Of The Union message, urged business men generally to refrain from accepting the verdict of a free market in pricing and production in order to keep prices

He also urged labor to refrain from demanding wage increases faster than their production increased. He urged this in spite of the fact that he wants to keep on the books the Taft-Hartley law that prevents an individual from making an individual bargain when the employer and the employe agree on a collective bargaining agreement. In other words, he seems to think that we can have a monopoly in wages and still have competition establishing the value of labor.

In order to combat the results of class legislation favoring organized labor unions, our government has adopted the policy of cutting real wages by increasing the amount of credit the government issued. In other words, we have used the Federal Reserve System to give the workers more dollars but diluted the purchasing power of these dollars. It is simply a

method of self-defense against labor union monopoly. The Federal Reserve had been

trying to reduce to some degree the amount of extra credit demanded. Which Is Worse? The problem the American people are facing is whether to choose further inflation or to have.

bitrarily establish prices and wages. Either of these will work great hardship on certain people. In fact, it will work a hardship on everyone to a certain degree. The probability is that United States will follow the pattern of other nations and adopt one of these two above courses of action. Instead of doing either one of these methods of expediency, we should return to a limited government and stop taxing one per son for the benefit of another. In other words, we should stop practicing socialism. The only way socialism has of benefiting anybody is by injuring some other person, by taxing one person to benefit another or by giving one laborer the right to prevent another laborer from competing with him and thus enable him to get more for his services than they are actually worth on a free mar-

ket basis. As long, however, as people be lieve that the majority need not obey the laws of Providence or the laws of God and that the majority determines right from in the Declaration of Independence and the Commandments and the Golden Rule.


