

## Hitch Develops In Israel's Leaving Sharm El Sheikh

### Equipment Still Loading On Ships At Makeshift Wharf

Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, commander of the United Nations Emergency Force, indicated today in Cairo a hitch had developed in Israel's withdrawal from Sharm el Sheikh.

Burns said his forces were to take over the Aqaba Gulf shore area from Israeli forces today, but there was a possibility the Israelis may have to remove their equipment Saturday.

As a result, U. N. officials said, it "still is not clear" whether the Israelis actually have begun their withdrawal.

Israeli announcements said Israel would turn the ruined Sharm el Sheikh fortress over to the UNEF today, wiping out the last foothold it won in Egypt during the Sinai campaign of last fall.

Israeli ships have been loading equipment for several days at the pink coral bay at a makeshift wharf, including captured Egyptian equipment. The evacuation by plane and ship was to be finished by sundown.

The withdrawal was so taken for granted in Cairo that Egypt announced opening of the Suez Canal to small ships of 500 tons or under and prepared to announce a speedup in clearance of the waterway for big tankers and freighters.

UNEF said in Cairo the Israeli withdrawal would not be completed before 5 p. m. (10 a. m. EST) Saturday. Apparently the hitch

was a minor one, though, for Burns flew to the Gaza Strip today as a Finnish battalion prepared to move into Sharm el Sheikh.

The Israeli withdrawal from the Gaza Strip was completed almost without incident Thursday.

The takeover of Gaza was not without tragedy, however. Arab refugees who had fled into the Sinai Desert ahead of the Israeli army swarmed back into the strip across unmarked minefields and many were reported killed or injured.

Many Arabs killed  
U. N. surgeons attached to UNEF worked through the night amputating mangled limbs of the victims. "Many" Arabs were reported killed, but there was no immediate count of the casualties.

Israeli evacuation of Sharm el Sheikh also was taken for granted in the United Nations, and Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld was prepared to go before the General Assembly (See HITCH, Page 3)

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### Ike To Sign New Doctrine

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower today prepared to sign his Middle East doctrine and immediately dispatch a special mission to the Middle East to explain it.

Special Ambassador James P. Richards, head of the presidential mission, said he expected to leave Tuesday to visit possibly as many as 18 nations.

At the same time, U. S. officials prepared plans for issuing a declaration that the United States regards the Gulf of Aqaba and the Strait of Tiran as an international waterway open to all nations including Israel.

The United States told Israel troops during talks to get Israeli troops withdrawn from Egypt that the United States would take the lead in declaring the Gulf of Aqaba leading to the Israeli port of Elath an open waterway.

The President was expected to sign the Congress-approved doctrine.

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower probably will go to Florida about the middle of next week for sun and exercise to combat a lingering head cold and cough, the White House said today.

The House gave overwhelming final congressional approval to the doctrine Thursday in a smashing 350-60 roll call vote.

Richards, former Democratic chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said he expected to meet with the President before leaving for the Middle East.

His job will be to explain the purposes of the doctrine to Middle East leaders and sound them out on their need of possible economic and military aid under the doctrine's aid provisions.

Richards will explain to Middle East leaders that the fight-against-Communist aggression would be applied only if a nation attacked asked for U. S. troops.

### Oregon Mayor Denies Bribe

WASHINGTON (UP)—Mayor Terry D. Schruck of Portland, Ore., denied today that he took a \$500 bribe from a gambler and offered to take a lie detector test to prove it.

The 43-year-old former sheriff of Multnomah county (where Portland is located) told the Senate Rackets committee he was not "stupid enough" to accept a bribe in the presence of three witnesses.

Two policemen and a bartender have testified that they saw Schruck pick up an envelope gambler Clifford O. (Jimmy) Davis deposited behind a telephone pole outside a night club he threatened to close down.

Schruck—sheriff at the time—said he had called city police to the scene to pick up a bicycle he had found.

"It's fantastic that I would have called city police officers to watch me take a bribe," Schruck said. "I don't know how silly you can be."

Signs of Lying  
Secret Service Chief U. E. Baughman reported today that Nathan Zusan, a committee witness, displayed signs of "untruthfulness" in his lie detector test.

Zusan, proprietor of a Portland, Ore., night spot, volunteered to take the test to prove he was telling the truth when he denied having offered to help finance a Portland bawdy house or having shared in its profits.

The committee also planned to question two other key figures in an alleged plot by racketeers and officials of the AFL-CIO Teamsters Union to take over Portland's vice and gambling. They were Clyde C. Crosby, Teamster organizer for Oregon, and William M. Langley, Multnomah County district attorney elected in 1954 with Teamster backing. Langley has been accused in testimony before the committee of sharing

### 10-Year-Old Blamed In Fire Death

HOUSTON (UP)—A 10-year-old boy with revenge festering in his mind confessed Thursday night that he set a fire in which a 43-year-old woman lost her life last Friday.

The boy, trapped through the memory of an arson investigator, said he fired the Helton Boat Works to "get even" with Mrs. Maxine Daniels because "she made me lose my job," he said.

Mrs. Daniels died in the fire which destroyed the boat works and a 16-unit apartment accommodations above the boat works. Last November she caught the boy setting fire to mail in her mailbox.

The boy, a sturdy, intelligent youngster with brown hair and snapping eyes, was a newspaper carrier. He was fired from the job after the first fire.

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### Congressmen Warn

## Budget-Cut Talks May Kill Proposals

WASHINGTON (UP)—Congressmen warned President Eisenhower today his budget-cutting talk may kill off some of his own legislative proposals.

Some House members predicted flatly that the administration's \$1.3 billion school construction bill would fall under the congressional economy axe.

Others urged the President to speak out quickly on just where he wants the budget trimmed in order to put a halt to mounting pressure for broad cuts in his \$11.8 billion budget.

Mr. Eisenhower told his news conference Thursday he has ordered a new look at the entire budget to see if cuts can be made.

Budget cutters in both parties hailed the President's remark as support for their views. But a group of House Democrats called the President's stand inconsistent and indefensible.

They said they will hold committee hearings on a resolution directing the President to submit a new economy budget of \$60 billion by April 15. They said this was the sum Mr. Eisenhower promised in his 1952 campaign.

Other congressional news:  
Doctrine—President Eisenhower was expected to sign his Middle East doctrine as soon as possible after it reached the White House. The House gave final congressional approval to the resolution Thursday with an overwhelming 350-60 vote.

Rackets—The Senate Labor Rackets Committee recalled Portland, Ore., Mayor Terry D. Schruck to testify under oath whether he accepted a \$500 bribe from a gambler. Schruck has denied the bribe when he was sheriff. The committee also planned to question other witnesses concerning an alleged tie-up between racketeers and AFL-CIO Teamsters Union officials to take over Portland vice operations.

Farm—The House put off until Tuesday further voting on a bill to extend soil bank subsidies. The House Thursday narrowly defeated a GOP plan to extend the subsidies to Midwest corn growers.

Still pending is a Democratic plan to broaden soil bank coverage to include growers of all feed grains.

Postal—The House appeared likely to give sympathetic consideration to the administration's request for postal rate increases including a boost in the cost of first class mail from three to four cents an ounce. But the bill's chances of passage appeared in doubt in the Senate, which killed a similar bill last year.

Bill To Stop State Funds Introduced

AUSTIN (UP)—A measure which would cut off state or local funds to integrated schools was proposed in the House Thursday as the deadline for routine introduction of bills drew near.

The measure, proposed by Rep. Jerry Sadler of Perilla, would prohibit payment of state or local money, directly or indirectly, for salaries of teachers, employees or officials of a district teaching mixed classes of white and Negro school children.

Any official of a district who "knowingly shall be in any way concerned" with spending state or local funds for an integrated district would be personally liable for the amount paid out.

Also, a governor's proclamation could close any school not eligible for public funds under Sadler's proposal. School children in a district closed by such an order would be eligible to receive an educational grant, equivalent to the amount spent from state and local funds per each individual student.

Parents or guardians of children receiving such grants would be liable to fines of from \$25 to \$250 if they spent any portion of such money for any purpose other than education of the child, and also would be liable to civil suit (See BILL, Page 3)

## Student Body Quits School In Protest

The entire student body of the all-Negro Alcorn A&M State College in southwestern Mississippi quit today in protest against a pen-wielding "Uncle Tom" professor who criticized his own race.

Student President Ernest McEwin announced the 570 students will leave at once, forcing the 86-year-old land-grant institution to close.

McEwin said the students did the "only honorable thing" in view of an ultimatum by the State College Board that they end a half-week classroom boycott or face disciplinary action.

The object of the student protest was history Professor Glenn King, 36-year-old Georgia native who criticized organized integration drives by members of his own race.

King blamed the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People for much of the South's racial unrest. The students accused their professor of adopting the "line" of the White Citizens Councils.

Gov. J. P. Coleman spurred the college board into taking a firm stand by denouncing the students who demonstrated against King, carrying placards and calling him an "Uncle Tom."

Coleman said King had a right to publish his views.  
"Perhaps the NAACP is the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, after all," he wrote in his series of articles, being published in daily installments by the Jackson (Miss.) State Times.

## Tape Recording Is Heard In Probe

AUSTIN (UP)—A half-hour long tape recording, purportedly made during the Feb. 20 hotel room meeting with former Rep. James E. Cox agreed to take a \$5,000 bribe, was played over the House public address system to an investigating committee Thursday.

Most of the recording, which Dr. Howard Harmon said he made on a tape recorder hidden under his bed, was unintelligible over the system and a written transcript was made of the recording Thursday night.

## Investigators Check Ship Wreck Scene

NEW CASTLE, Del. (UP)—Navy and Coast Guard investigators delved today into causes of a collision that sent a Navy-owned gasoline tanker to explosive death on the Delaware River, carrying down 10 men with her.

The 10 men aboard the Mission San Francisco when she was rammed by the Liberian freighter Elna II were missing and presumed dead. Among them were the Mission's captain, William Allen, 54, of Galveston, Tex., and a pilot, Capt. Ralph Smith of New York.

Thirty-five other men on the tanker and the 23-member crew of the freighter were saved.

A team of investigators and a salvage supervisor were sent by the Navy to the scene and the Coast Guard questioned some of the survivors in Philadelphia. The Coast Guard said a three-man Marine board will investigate the collision at a hearing in Philadelphia Monday. Testimony will be taken and recommendations sent to Washington.

While Jeff's mother was up stairs with the baby, he ran into the kitchen for a drink. There was no glass on the table. But there was an empty milk bottle, so he pulled a chair up to the sink and filled the bottle at the faucet. When his mother came downstairs, he was drinking gustily, a steady stream of water cascading down the front of his ski suit.

She slapped him. Then, pulling him out of his sodden jacket, she made him sit on a chair for 30 minutes. Later, at his bedtime, he refused to go to sleep. Over and over he kept finding a new reason for reclaiming his mother's presence in his bedroom. She thought he was expressing remorse for getting his croak wet. He wasn't. He was expressing fear that his angry wish for his mother's destruction might come true.

When a little child becomes angry at us, he usually wishes we'd die or otherwise be removed from his life. Then the anger passes, leaving him with terror that his wish may be fulfilled. When we leave him alone to sleep, the terror will overwhelm him, driving him to demand the reassurance of our presence over and over again.

We don't appreciate the power of this fear until we begin to appreciate the little child's trust in the magical fulfillment of all his wishes.

So let me remind you that he is a person who, flapping his arms up and down, believes that his wish to fly may actually be fulfilled. He imagines that if he wishes hard enough, he can materialize a lost toy. He's almost sure that he has only to wish for a large chocolate egg to have the Easter Bunny produce it.

Why wouldn't he be? Ever since he was born, we've been devoting our energies to making most of his wishes come true.

When he's wished to be dry instead of wet, we've rushed a fresh diaper on to him. When he's wished to be full instead of hungry, we've rushed warm milk into him. Throughout most of his experience, our chief concern has been not only fulfilling his wishes, but anticipating them.

classes the first day the articles appeared. Wednesday the entire student body at Alborn boycotted all classes. They paraded about the campus with "Uncle Tom" placards.

Thursday night, faced with a college board ultimatum to return to class Monday or be dismissed, the students voted to leave en masse unless King is fired today.

**Myths Exploded**

The State Times, in its announcement of King's series, said the articles "exploded... myths about racial conditions in the North and South."

The NAACP was attacked from a different angle meanwhile in a Louisiana state legislative hearing at which testimony linked 105 top officials to now-defunct "Communist front organizations."

One witness, Joseph Z. Kornfeder, 60, of Detroit, Mich., claimed former membership in the Communist Party and said he believes the NAACP is in danger of falling "into the lap" of the Communists.

His list of 10 NAACP officials who once held membership in Communist front organizations included the name of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. He identified Mrs. Roosevelt as an NAACP board member.

The committee, headed by State Sen. W. B. Rainach, one of the state's most outspoken segregationists, is investigating influences responsible for stirring up racial unrest in the South.

Cox said "Now you've said, uh, you want to compensate me for my services if we should work on this thing... Now let's just set down—now let's put the cards on the table now."

**Haggle Over Money**

Harmon said after some discussion "that 274 was instigated by the chiropractors, right? I'll give you \$3,500 if you'll help me to amend my law and withdraw 274 and that's just between us."

"Well, now, you said five G's a while ago," Cox replied.

Harmon was the first to bring up an exact sum in the recording with "I think it's worth five G's."

Harmon answered by saying "Well, now let's cut it down to 35. It usually does cost five G's—let's cut it down."

Later, Harmon brought up the subject of money again. "33,500, how's that?"

"I don't like that \$3,500," Cox replied. "I like that five better," he said.

"Tell you why," Cox said, "because there is some other guy I've got to take care of if I do this..."

"Ordinarily, Mr. Cox," Harmon said later, "to tell you honestly, I wouldn't go to this sort of thing at all..."

"You see," said Cox later, "there's only one way I can pull that deal now. You see, there's three guys I've got to take care of to pull this deal."

**Can't Divulge Secrets**

"Who are they?"

"Well, I can't tell you."

Assembly today to announce Israel's compliance with the withdrawal resolutions.

Later he may fly to Egypt to consult with President Gamal Abdel Nasser on details of the Suez Canal operation. Egypt, in opening the waterway today to tiny coastal vessels and harbor craft, permitted British and French vessels to use it but denied passage to the Israelis.

Israel was still bitter over giving up so easily the areas it had won in the Sinai campaign, and the opposition parties called major demonstrations again today to protest Premier David Ben-Gurion's withdrawal policies.

**Resignation Asked**

A crowd of 10,000 members of the Herut party, led by fiery party leader Menachem Begin, shouted in Tel Aviv for Ben-Gurion's resignation. The General Zionists also were demanding his resignation.

A Jerusalem dispatch today said Ben-Gurion had scheduled countrywide meetings Saturday to explain his pullout. Cabinet members planned to stomp the nation to answer the violent criticism.

United Press dispatches from Sharm el Sheikh said the Egyptians blew up their own four-inch and nine-inch artillery pieces before retreating last November ahead of the invading Israeli army and that the fortress is useless now.

But Israeli military officers feared Egyptian troops could still command the straits with easily portable heavy machineguns and that Egyptian warships could patrol the area once the canal is open.

**Charge Labeled "Fantastic"**

Schrunk, sheriff of Multnomah County (in which Portland is located) for more than six years before becoming Portland's Mayor Jan. 1, told the committee the charge that he took a bribe while sheriff was a "fantastic story" involving "perjury" by the witnesses against him.

During more than two hours of questioning Thursday, however, the committee failed to ask Schrunk directly to confirm or deny the payoff charge.

Schrunk told reporters after the hearing that he meant to deny the charge under oath and thought he had done so. He termed the accusation "strictly a frame."

**Source Of The Charge**

James B. Elkins, self-confessed Portland racketeer, gambler and bootlegger, testified earlier that Clifford O. (Jimmy) Bennett, his partner in the 8212 Club in Portland, told him he paid Sheriff Schrunk \$500 on Sept. 11, 1955. Elkins said Bennett told him he handed over the money to ward off a raid and keep his customers from being arrested as they left his illegal after-hours drinking and gambling club.

Bennett refused to answer any questions about the incident. All he would tell the committee was that he now lives in Great Falls, Mont. The committee immediately moved to cite him for contempt of Congress.

The committee refused to let Schrunk put in the record an affidavit from Bennett because the latter refused to be cross-examined. The mayor later showed the affidavit to newsmen. In it, Bennett declared he would testify that Schrunk "has never asked for money or anything else and at no time ever made any promises that I could have protection to do anything illegally..."

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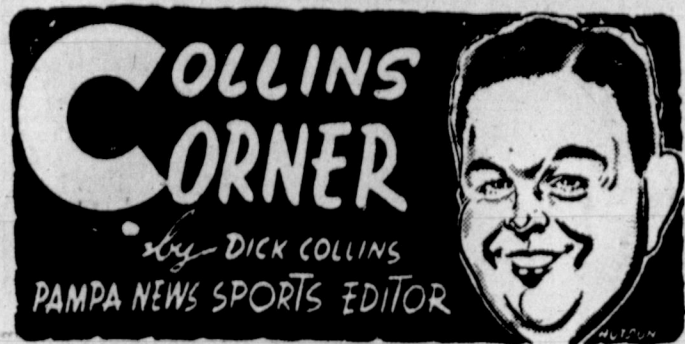












**AUSTIN** — Although Pampa is the only Panhandle team in the state basketball tournament this year, that area has been well-represented in previous years. The Harvesters have been the most frequent Panhandle representatives here, making their sixth appearance this year.

Five other schools from Upper Texas have also won state championships, dating as far back as 1937 when Cary's Cardinals captured the crown by beating Guber. At that time there was only one classification, regardless of school enrollment.

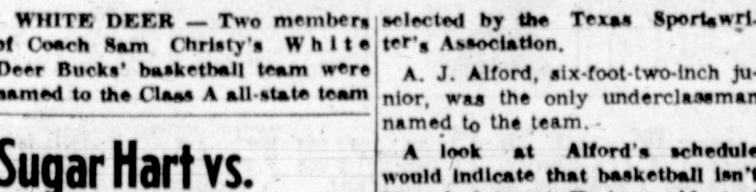
Other championships have gone to Stratford, Memphis, Gruver and Palo Duro. Pampa has won two titles and the others won one each. Pampa won in 1953 and 1954. Stratford's Elks beat Ferrin for the Class B title in 1945. Memphis Cyclones beat French in 1946. Gruver's Greyhounds won over Waelton in 1950 in Class B and Palo Duro took the Class AAA crown last year in its first year.

Estelline was runner-up to Denton in 1930. Sunset beat out Childress in 1944. Dumas lost out in the finals to Bowie in 1953 and Phillips' Blackhawks were runners-up last year in Class AA. Berger placed third in 1951 and 1952 to give the Panhandle more good representation.

Panhandle players also own some of the top individual records of the 37-year-old tournament. Mack Carter of Berger holds the individual scoring mark for one game with 33 in Class AAAA and Carl Mitchell of Phillips set that mark last year in Class AAA with 33 points. Carter, playing here in 1952, also set the three-game individual scoring record with 84 points.

Phillips' Blackhawks hold the record for the highest score in one game with 84 points, the highest aggregate score in beating Webster 84-81 for 165 points and the most points of a loser in the championship game — 68 points against Jacksonville. Mitchell also has the most free throws made — 13.

# This Is It! Harvesters Play Tonight!

## Locals Battle Austin At 9:25 P.M.

AUSTIN, March 7 — The Pampa Harvesters one of the highest scoring teams of a 24-team field, will face Austin High School's Maroons, a team that concentrates on slow-down, ball-control basketball, in the opening-round Class AAAA contest of the 37th Annual State Cage Tournament here Friday night.

The Pampa-Austin game, to begin at 9:25 p.m. in Gregory Gym on the University of Texas campus, is the last of 12 first-round games to be played since the big tournament opened here Thursday morning.

If the Harvesters get past the hometown Maroons Friday night, they will take on the Highland Park-Fort Arthur winner in the Class AAAA finals at 5:45 p.m. Saturday. Losers of the first-round matches will play for third place Saturday morning at 10:10.

Coach Clifton McNeely's Harvesters, the only representative to the state meet from the Panhandle, are being given the favorite's role in the Class AAAA bracket.

Port Arthur is a choice over Highland Park in its first-round battle. Pampa is also seeking its third state basketball title since 1953. The Harvesters beat their first-round opponent, Austin, in the finals of the 1953 tournament and they captured the 1954 crown by rolling over Crozier Tech of Dallas. The Harvesters also came back here in 1955 but lost in the initial round.

Coach Wallace Dockall's Maroons, who go into Friday night's game with a record of 20 victories in 25 games this season, are bent on revenge after their 1953 defeat by the Harvesters. Veteran observers who have seen the Maroons play this year believe the Panhandle team will have an easy time with the local shooters.

The Maroons will be hoping to parlay its pressure playing and its defense into an upset over the high-scoring Harvesters. Two of the last five Austin games have ended in overtime when the Maroons used their ball-control method of play to hold the score down. Austin will not be the first team fustled by the Harvesters that uses the slow-down method of play. The Harvesters beat Plainview

in 25 games. Pampa won the AAAA title and then beat Poly of Fort Worth and Abilene in playoff games to gain their fifth state tournament in the history of the Panhandle school.

The Harvesters, who boast perhaps the finest offensive record of any of the four Class AAAA schools in the meet, will face an Austin defense that has allowed just over 40 points per game. The Maroons have not been a high-scoring outfit, averaging around 55 points per meeting. Their top output was 82 points and they took a 24-22 victory in a District 13-AAAA game with Waco.

Pampa boasts the only all-state Class AAAA player in the tournament. He's 6-1 forward Jerry Pope. At the other forward post is Sam Condo, 6-2 honorable mention all-stater. Tommy Gindorf will again man the center slot. He's 6-6 and is being counted upon to stop Shipley. Pampa guards will be Dickie Mauldin and Bill Brown, both 5-11.

Pampa radio station KPDM will air the two Class AAAA games beginning at 7:45 p.m. They will also carry the Harvesters game if they win Friday night on a special Magnolia network.

Coach Dockall will start three all-district players and a second-team all-district boy against the Harvesters. All-star performers are forwards Bob Dowd and Doug Funk and center Ollie Shipley. Will Knox, a second-team all-district player, will start at guard along with Harvey Ford. Shipley is the tallest of the group at 6-6. Dowd is 6-4, Funk 6-2 and the guards are 5-11.

Coach Dwaine Lyon's Harvester track team was due to leave around noon today to take part in the Canyon Reef Relays in Snyder.

A nine-man team will represent Pampa High School at the relays, the first track meet of the season.

The cinder men are Dick Barrett, who will run both hurdles, broad jump and run either the 880 or in the mile relay; Gene Bratcher, high jump, sprint medley; Denny Carmen, 440, sprint medley and mile relay; Earl Cooper, shot, disc, 880 relay, sprint medley and mile relay; Andy Epps, sprint medley, 440, and mile relay; Walter Heil, mile; Kenneth Keith, low hurdles, 880 relay, mile relay and broad jump; Bill Kirby, shot; and Alton Thygerson, 880 relay, mile relay, broad jump and 100-yard dash.

**Coach Of The Year**

**NEW YORK (UP)** — Frank McGuire, who transferred his big gift and a bevy of talented college basketball players from New York to the University of North Carolina, today was voted United Press Coach of the year.

McGuire's Tar Heels, nine of whom hail from the New York City area, swept 24 games to become the only major college able to finish the regular 1956-57 season with a perfect record. This showing earned McGuire coach of the year honors by a huge margin in a nationwide poll of 267 sports writers and broadcasters.

The 42-year-old coach received 150 votes, 54 per cent of the total cast although 33 coaches were mentioned on the ballots. Adolph Rupp, whose Kentucky Wildcats won the Southeastern Conference title, was a distant second with 22 votes. Bill Strenguin of Iowa State was third with 13.

Branch McCracken of Indiana was next with eight votes and Forrest (Forddy) Anderson of Michigan State was fifth with seven. Donald (Dudey) Moore of Duquesne, a two-time winner of the United Press poll, was next with six. Freddie Schaus of West Virginia, Pete Newell of California, Johnny Wooden of UCLA, Joe Curran of Canisius and Babe McCarthy of Mississippi State each received five votes. John Castellani of Seattle and Doc Hayes of Southern Methodist were next with four apiece.

Must Turnover  
McGuire's Tar Heels finished first in the ACC this season but must win the current conference tournament to assure themselves a berth in the NCAA championships.

McGuire moved to North Carolina after guiding St. John's of New York to 196 victories against 36 defeats in five seasons. No New York school has challenged seriously for the national title since his 1952 St. John's team went to the final of the NCAA Tournament before losing to Kansas.

### Coach Of The Year

**NEW YORK (UP)** — Frank McGuire, who transferred his big gift and a bevy of talented college basketball players from New York to the University of North Carolina, today was voted United Press Coach of the year.

McGuire's Tar Heels, nine of whom hail from the New York City area, swept 24 games to become the only major college able to finish the regular 1956-57 season with a perfect record. This showing earned McGuire coach of the year honors by a huge margin in a nationwide poll of 267 sports writers and broadcasters.

The 42-year-old coach received 150 votes, 54 per cent of the total cast although 33 coaches were mentioned on the ballots. Adolph Rupp, whose Kentucky Wildcats won the Southeastern Conference title, was a distant second with 22 votes. Bill Strenguin of Iowa State was third with 13.

Branch McCracken of Indiana was next with eight votes and Forrest (Forddy) Anderson of Michigan State was fifth with seven. Donald (Dudey) Moore of Duquesne, a two-time winner of the United Press poll, was next with six. Freddie Schaus of West Virginia, Pete Newell of California, Johnny Wooden of UCLA, Joe Curran of Canisius and Babe McCarthy of Mississippi State each received five votes. John Castellani of Seattle and Doc Hayes of Southern Methodist were next with four apiece.

Must Turnover  
McGuire's Tar Heels finished first in the ACC this season but must win the current conference tournament to assure themselves a berth in the NCAA championships.

McGuire moved to North Carolina after guiding St. John's of New York to 196 victories against 36 defeats in five seasons. No New York school has challenged seriously for the national title since his 1952 St. John's team went to the final of the NCAA Tournament before losing to Kansas.

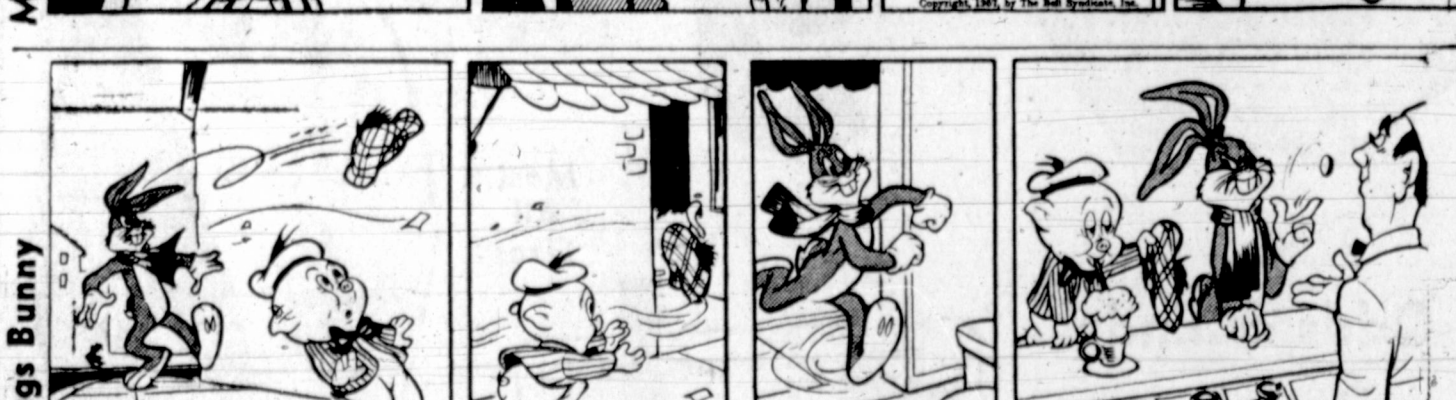
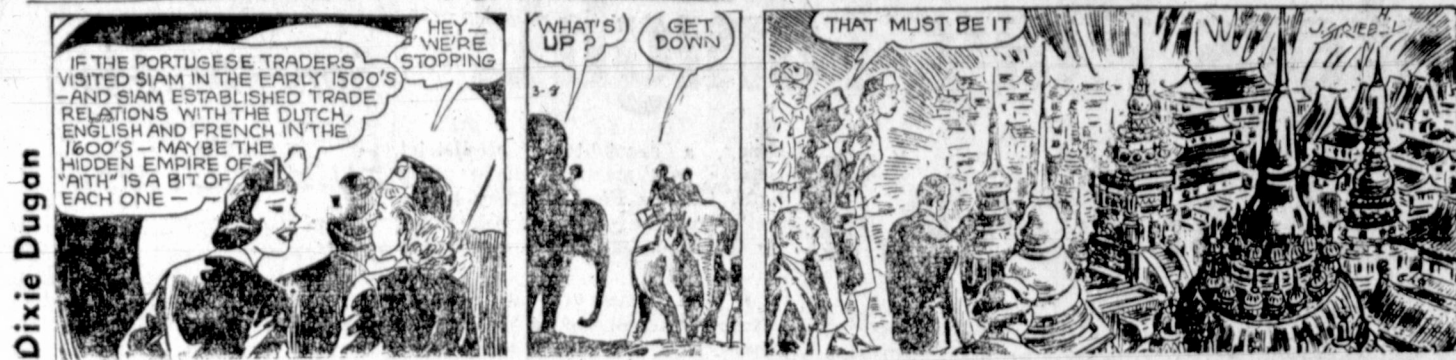
