







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Joseph R. McCarthy

Joseph R. McCarthy, senator from Wisconsin, is dead. He passed from the scene as one of the most controversial figures in American history on the evening of May 2, 1957, following a bout with hepatitis. He was 47.

We are too close to the senator to obtain a totally. objective view. In another hundred years or so, historians will have a better opportunity to evaluate his works. Unquestionably, however, he was loved and hated, trusted and feared as few men in their time ever are.

We can be counted among those who loved him. We did not fear him. Nor did we trust him entirely. Those who hold public office come under a cloak of suspicion from the very beginning, so far as we are concerned.

Yet, we can say this: In the area where he was justly famous, namely, in the business of exposing communists and awakening the American public to the dangers in our very midst, there we trusted him. There he earned his spurs, and were we not so far gone in degeneracy and dependency on government, he would have won immortality in every quarter of the globe beyond a reasonable doubt.

That so many voices were raised against him, is the proof of the decline of the American republic. No man, in so short a time, has ever been so viciously and so continuously smeared. Not that he was necessarily above reproach in all that he did.

But, it can be said, and the record will bear us out, that the calumnious and libelous things which caused a wide public reaction against him, were for the most part twistings of truth and outright lies.

For example, it was often claimed that he injured those he sought to question. The claim is false. The persons under his investigation had already harmed themselves irreparably by red-tinted connections and questionable conduct. And as for his "methods" in his famous Un-American Activities Committee, no man was ever more gentle and considerate, albeit always determined and persevering. If this is still in doubt, we challenge the doubter to check the record.

A man is not only known by the company he keeps but by the enemies he makes. And while it has often been said that McCarthy attacked others on the basis of asso-

Who Does Union Labor Hurt Most?

48th Year

It is time for plain speaking as to the results of union or organized labor.

When I use the words "union labor," I mean the kind of labor unions that insist on the right to bargain for those who want to make an individual bargain; who insist on a monopoly of labor; who try to bring this about by strikes, by misrepresentation, by boycotts, by seniority, by limiting apprentices, by featherbedding.] know of no other kind of union labor. I have never found anybody who will contend that union labor could materially, temporarily help anybody without having a monopoly. That is, without hurting or taking away from some other individual his inalienable rights that he received at

birth or from God. Needy Hurt Most Union labor contends that its purpose is to help the needy, the property-less man, the man whose only income is transitory wages. But these are the very people the union hurts most. The reason is that those with property have returns on their property besides their daily wages. Thus their in-

come is larger than it would be if they had no other income than wages And these needy persons need better tools which will enable them

to produce more and thus earn more. If they could earn more they wouldn't have to do without many things that those with property income or economic foresight can have even when labor unions reduce production.

As this column has repeatedly said, labor unions never produce any wealth but they have prevented billions of dollars worth of wealth from being created, and wealth that is not created cannot be distributed, and wealth that is created has to be distributed in order to benefit its owner. Therefore, anything that retards the accumulation of tools, as do all labor unions, hurts everybody. but it especially hurts the needy or the property-less man who because of labor unions, has to do without a lot of things he could have if labor unions did not interfere with production. In other words, he has to make a bigger sacrifice because of working with poorer tools than does the man with property, imagination, fore-

sight and judgment. **Character** Destroying Besides the material harm that

it does to the property-less man and the needy, it has a tendency to weaken them intellectually and spiritually. This is true because labor unions are based on might

McCarthy was known for his associates, he was also known in every quarter as a man hated by every communist on either side of either ocean. Here was one man on which the turns and twisting of the communist line could unite. The year in which the U.S. Senate censored McCarthy was the same year in which the official communist program had as one of its major objectives the "getting" of McCarthy.

In the McCarthy lexicon there were no neutrals. You were either against communism or in some way you were for communism. There was never a question as to where McCarthy stood. He opposed communism. He exposed communists. He ripped into the sanctified halls of Congress, trodding on toes, kicking up a fuss, whenever he felt that someone in a high position was protecting a person whose loyalty could be questioned. The guilty and the confused and fearful joined ranks against him.

McCarthy didn't fail, although the plotting of the political manipulators saw to it that he didn't get the credit for what he did. Others picked up the battle and carried it forward to such an extent that today there is a widespread movement against communism in this country both within and without the government. McCarthy caused that movement to jell.

He also saw to it that the public came to realize that there were many things going on in the government behind closed doors which should, by all the precepts of representative government, have been made public information. Again, others picked up the pieces and acted on the evidence produced by McCarthy.

Whatever anyone can say of McCarthy's judgment, no one can ever impugn either his loyalty to America, or his courage.

Now he is gone. America has lost one of her truly great men.
