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If Economy Doesn't Rise

Ike Says Tax Cut 'Reserve Weapon'

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower said today that a tax cut might be an administration reserve weapon if an upturn in the economy fails to develop.

The President, speaking hoarsely and showing the results of a cold and sore throat, said, however, that he still expects an economic upturn about the middle of the year, or possibly just a bit later.

Under questioning, he added that a tax cut could be a reserve weapon if the economic bounce-back does not take place as expected.

This was the President's second news conference since late October. He opened today's conference by asking reporters to make their questions long, so he could answer with either a yes or no and thus save his ailing vocal cords.

The President said that aside from his hoarseness, he felt well and had no other symptoms of illness. The White House had reported Tuesday that he had a "slight cold" and a "slight sore throat."

McElroy Control Program
Other highlights of the news conference:

—He agreed that government scientists are mapping a general rough program which might involve sending an American rocket to the moon within 10 years. But he said this was not the primary objective of the government at the moment and that the federal space and satellite program had to be consciously adjusted to the defense needs of the country.

—He said that all outer space development was under the control of Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy. This was in reply to a question whether he might instruct the Air Force to get into the outer space program along with the Army in wake of two Navy failures with the Vanguard rocket.

—He threw cold water on the possibility of a summit meeting with Russia, saying this government has not received any evidence from Moscow that such a meeting would result in any desirable form of agreement.

—He questioned the idea of establishing a demilitarized zone in Western Europe, as the Russians have suggested, on the theory that the United States could not enter into any unilateral agreement which would affect the basic rights of the free nations involved.

—He said that any public statements made by his chief assistant, Sherman Adams, were made only with his approval and that Adams had said nothing inconsistent with the general policy of the administration. He apparently felt some emotions as he discussed Adams because he called the former governor of New York "Sherman."

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Stinnett Prisoners Captured

CLARENDON—Three prisoners who beat a jailer and stole his car and guns while escaping from jail at Stinnett last Sunday, were in custody today after they surrendered meekly to officers who surrounded a barn in which they had holed up.

Sheriff Lonnie Cornell of Clarendon said he traced the men to a barn on an abandoned farm south of Jericho Tuesday afternoon, then took three deputies and surrounded the barn. He said the three surrendered without resistance when he ordered them from the barn.

The fugitives were identified as Charles Screws, 34, of Vernon, Tex.; Jack Lee Trebbe, 23, of Topeka, Kan.; and William Clayton Brown, 29, of Amarillo.

Cornell said the trio, armed with a .38 pistol and rifle they stole when they escaped, had made forages into Oklahoma and Kansas since their escape.

The three fugitives were returned to Hutchinson county Tuesday by Sheriff Hugh Anderson of Borger following the capture.

Unified Government May Plunge Indonesia Into War

TOKYO (UP)—The anti-Communist "young colonels" who control most of Indonesia are ready to form a unified government, a move that could plunge the island nation into bloody civil war, it was reported today.

Indonesian rebels here and in Manila said the army insurgents would proclaim their government unless President Sukarno agrees to throw the Communists out of the present Jakarta regime.

There was some disagreement on timing. Rebel Lt. Col. Ventje Sumual, who has been living here under an alias since Jan. 28, said proclamation of the new government might be broadcast from Bukittinggi, its capital, "today or tomorrow."

Rebel sources in Manila said, however, that Sukarno would be given five days to make up his mind. They said the new government will be proclaimed Monday unless he has given in by then to rebel demands.

No comment could be obtained immediately from Sukarno, who is in Japan on a "vacation tour" of Asia. He spent today in the Osaka-Kobe area, and refused to talk to newsmen.

The visiting president laughed off reports Tuesday that he had been handed a rebel ultimatum by Col. Warouw, the Indonesian military attaché in Peiping, when they conferred here early this week.

Radio reports heard in Jakarta said today the rebels will hold a mass meeting Saturday in Padang to "mobilize additional support" for their cause. The projected speakers' list included Sjafruddin Prawiranegara, a leading prospect for president of the rebel government; two insurgent regional commanders and the heads of three anti-Communist political parties.

Both Padang and Bukittinggi are on Sumatra, Indonesia's biggest island and the source of the oil which is one of the nation's chief forms of natural wealth.

Other Indonesian islands, already controlled by anti-government leaders, that could be expected to line up with the rebel regime include the Celebes, the Moluccas and Bali.

Second Vanguard Try Fails

Rocket Breaks In Half After Brief Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UP)—The Navy's jinxed Vanguard rocket finally struggled into the sky early today but it faltered and broke in two after a one-minute flight and had to be destroyed.

The new Navy failure sent several million dollars worth of cinders tumbling into the Atlantic. It left the freshly launched Army Explorer riding alone among the stars with the second Russian Sputnik.

There was no indication when the Navy might try again to get a vest-pocket satellite into orbit aboard the Vanguard. Another rocket is ready. But the study of what happened to today's will undoubtedly delay it.

Still hopeful, a Navy spokesman in Washington said: "We've got more to do. We're learning all the time."

Broke In Two

It was estimated that the rocket, believed to be carrying a simple form of life in its satellite, rose to between 10,000 and 20,000 feet, less than four miles, before it hung in the sky, broke into two fiery pieces and began falling back. It was then blown up from the ground one minute after launching.

Dr. John Hagen, director of the Vanguard project, exclaimed "Oh, no!" when informed in Washington of the sputtering flight. It was the second actual launching failure of the full rocket assembly.

The Vanguard rose laboriously almost enveloped in its ground exhaust and climbed very slowly into the clear but almost freezing Florida pre-dawn. It seemed to hang for a moment at a modest altitude, broke into two fiery parts and was blasted to bits.

Sources here said it would be impossible to determine what actually happened until telemetry information is studied on the brief flight. This might not be before another day or so, they said.

However, it was believed that the missile broke in two at the joint of the first and second stages well short of the time they were supposed to have separated in the rocket's normal course toward an orbit.

Veered To Right

The missile was seen to veer slightly to the right just before it broke. It was known that the Cape Canaveral range safety officer, Lt. Col. R. D. Stephens in the central control building, pushed the "destruct" button after the missile broke in two.

Two plumes of flames were seen falling into the ocean several miles out from the tip of Cape Canaveral. It was not determined whether these were caused by the impact of the main parts of the missile or smaller fragments.

The Defense Department's announcement of the Vanguard's mishap was brief. It was issued only 15 minutes after the ill-fated rocket had soared from its pad.

Launched at 2:33 a.m.

A three-stage rocket test vehicle in the Project Vanguard program was successfully launched at 2:33.5 a.m. today at the Missile Test Center, Cape Canaveral, Fla., but was destroyed in flight by the range safety officer when it failed to maintain its programmed flight path.

Several minutes later the Pentagon issued another statement.

"The rocket maintained its flight path for one minute, then deviated to the right and broke into two pieces at which time the range safety officer destroyed the rocket."

Jet Airliner Brings Soviet Ambassador

WASHINGTON (UP)—Russia will stage a new display of air prowess Thursday when it flies the new Soviet ambassador here in a jet airliner.

The State Department said the giant Tu-104 carrying Ambassador Mikhail A. Menshikov is scheduled to land at 4 p.m. e.s.t. at Friendship Airport, midway between Washington and Baltimore.

The landing will give the Russians another chance to show off the 500-mile-an-hour plane on which they are staking claim to supremacy in the jet passenger field. The United States has no scheduled commercial jet airline flights.

Friendship Airport was chosen for the landing because it has a runway long enough for the big jet, which requires about 8,000 feet or more to land and take off. Friendship's longest runway is 9,450 feet. The longest runway at Washington's National Airport is 6,740 feet.

Idlewild Airport in New York has barred landings by the Russian and all other jet planes on grounds they are too noisy.

The Tu-104 made its first flight to the United States last September when it brought Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko to this country to attend a session of the United Nations General Assembly. At that time, two of the planes landed at McGuire Air Force Base, N.J.

The Air Force's Military Air Transport Service will assign a radio operator, a navigator and pilot to the Soviet jet to pilot it through American "air space."

The three-man U.S. crew will board the plane at Gander, Newfoundland, officials said.

New Strategy On Soviet Is Planned

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower planned to work on new strategy today to break through Soviet opposition to an early East-West agreement to use outer space for peaceful purposes.

The President called in Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Llewellyn E. Thompson Jr., U.S. ambassador to Moscow, for a look at the outer space deadlock and prospects for a chiefs-of-state "summit" conference with the Russians.

Thompson is returning to Moscow early next week to open talks with the Russians on the summit issue.

The administration is pondering a reply to Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin's latest letter to the President.

The President wrote Bulganin Jan. 12 suggesting outer space cooperation. He also offered to attend a summit parley if initial work through ambassadorial and foreign ministers' talks indicated a top-level meeting would advance peace.

Bulganin on Sunday said the outer space plan would be considered only as part of a broader disarmament accord. The White House said this was a "negative attitude" toward the President's proposals.

One Collision Reported Here

The only collision reported within the city limits yesterday occurred at 2:47 p.m. on Starkweather, 70 feet south of Atchison.

A 1953 Chevrolet, driven by Harold L. Cooke, 429 Pitts, and a 1957 Pontiac, driven by James R. Kennerly, 514 W. Foster, were in collision. Damages to the Chevrolet were estimated at \$65 with no damages reported to the Pontiac.

Scientists Push Techniques To Rocket Man Into Space

WASHINGTON (UP)—American scientists today pushed ahead with two "promising" techniques for rocketing man into space.

One is a nuclear-powered ramjet engine. The other involves obtaining "theoretically unlimited" speed from a chemical-fueled rocket by firing its gases through an electric field.

At the same time Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, told the United States Congress should consider reorganization of the Defense Department in one package. He said he was opposed to "piecemeal" changes in the Pentagon setup.

The congressional Atomic Energy Committee took the secrecy wraps off the nuclear-powered ramjet—called "Project Pluto."

The group's outer space subcommittee in an apparent recent reference to the project called it "very promising."

In a summary of its recent briefings, the committee said while chemical rockets are further advanced now, nuclear propulsion "may be the best long range bet, particularly for large payloads traveling long distances."

It speculated that a combination of relatively short-lived chemical rockets and longer-enduring nuclear-fueled rockets might be the "most practicable approach."

A ramjet engine is an "air breather." Therefore a nuclear ramjet presumably would be designed for use in the earth's atmosphere, possibly for an atomic airplane or to boost a rocket up to space. The committee did not, however, disclose the objective in perfecting such an engine.

Russell's call for a package plan came in face of Republican reports that President Eisenhower probably will start submitting defense reorganization recommendations piecemeal to Congress starting in mid-March.

The program for the performance will be divided into three groups. During the intermission between the groups, the Milliron Trio, composed of Marilyn Myatt, Nancy Stevenson, and Barbara Lunsford from Pampa High School, and a boys quartet from Amarillo High School will present several numbers.

The second group in the program will be a set of French poems known as "Six Chansons" set to music by Hindmith. Area Highway Accident Totals

A total of 22 persons were injured and one person was killed in the 51 accidents investigated during January by the Highway Patrol in the 9½ county area of sub-district 5-B-1, according to E. G. Albers, sergeant in charge.

In making the report, Albers said, a total of 15 accidents during the month resulted in personal injuries, one fatal accident was reported in which one person was killed and one other injured and the remaining 35 accidents resulted only in property damage.

The total amount of property damage in the 51 accidents was estimated at \$33,445 by the investigating officers, he stated.

Counties included in the sub-district are: Gray, Roberts, Lipscomb, Hamphill, Hansford, Hutchinson, Wheeler, Ochiltree, Donley and the eastern half of Carson.

Congressional News:

Russell Claims Defense Department Should Get 'Package' Reorganization

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) of the Senate Armed Services Committee said today Congress should consider reorganization of the Defense Department in one package—not by piecemeal legislation.

Russell told the United Press it would be too unwieldy for Congress to consider separately a series of changes in the Pentagon setup.

The lawmaker's stand came in the face of Republican reports that President Eisenhower plans to submit a series of messages to Congress on defense reorganization starting in the middle of next month.

Agreed on One Change

A House-Senate conference committee has agreed on one department change—giving defense officials authority to carry on space weapons research indefinitely. But the department would be limited to participating in civilian space programs, such as satellites, to one year.

House investigators recalled Chairman John C. Doerster of the Federal Communications Commission in the inquiry into alleged official misconduct on the part of five FCC members.

Chairman Morgan M. Moulder (D. Mo.) of the House commerce subcommittee looking into the charges said opponents of his inquiry are trying to "smear and discredit" him personally. He did not identify the persons who he said made the attack.

Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) said he would push for passage of a presidential disability bill despite a veto threat from Attorney General William F. Rogers.

"These threats of vetoes are about as useless as trying to grow hair on my bald head," he said.

Another Justice Department figure came under the fire of Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr. (D-N.C.). Ervin said W. Wilson White, appointed to head the new civil rights division, gave President Eisenhower "awful bad legal advice" on the Little Rock, Ark., school integration dispute last year.

Ervin said he had not decided yet whether to oppose confirmation of White in the job. The Senate Judiciary Committee has postponed action on the appointment for at least a week.

Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield renewed the opposition attack on the Eisenhower administration's foreign policies.

In a report to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Mansfield said continued "drifting" by the U.S. in the Mideast "can only render us susceptible to diplomatic blackmail and lead straight to disaster."

The Montana Democrat called for an "imaginative policy" to put the nation on the offensive, "instead of being forever in the position of reacting to Soviet dynamics."

Other Congressional news:

Pluto: The Congressional Atomic Energy Committee lifted some secrecy wraps from development of a nuclear-powered ramjet—under Project "Pluto."

Gavin: Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin, quitting as Army research and development chief, told a House government operations subcommittee this country may have to develop some means to keep Russian satellites from traveling over the free world.

Taxes: A bill was introduced by Rep. Robert W. Kean (R-N.J.) to reduce everybody's taxes at least five per cent as an anti-recession step. Some low income taxpayers would get a 10 per cent cut under the bill which Kean said would trim the Treasury of \$2,500,000,000 a year.

Textiles: The AFL-CIO Textile Workers Union of America urged Congress to plug a "tax loophole."

The union said "predatory manipulators" were turning textile communities into ghost towns by buying up firms with past operating losses and shutting them down to take advantage of a tax "carry-over" provision in the law.

Economy: U.S. Chamber of Commerce economist Emerson P. Schmidt said President Eisenhower's appeal for price and wage restraint represents a "negation of a free market philosophy." He said Eisenhower's "pious" request would not solve the problem of mounting labor costs and higher wages.

COOK'S NOOK

Canned Peas Are Abundant, Combine Well With Meats

By GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Food and Markets Editor Canned peas are good food and should be available now at a very reasonable price. The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports there are enormous supplies on hand. So let's help eat down that over-supply, if the canners make the price attractive. PEAS AND PORK CHOPS ORIENTAL (Yield: 4 servings) One can (1 pound) peas, 4 loin pork chops, cut 1 inch thick, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1/2 teaspoon soy sauce, or 1/4 teaspoon salt. Drain liquid from peas; reserve. Trim fat from chops. Heat in skillet until enough fat cooks out to prevent chops from sticking; discard. Sprinkle chops with salt and pepper. Cook until brown on both sides (about 20 minutes). Pour off fat. Add half the reserved pea liquid; cover tightly and simmer until chops are tender (about 50-60 minutes), turning once during cooking. When chops are turned, add onions. About 10 minutes before chops are done, add drained

Actually, our only real problem as parents is our poor opinion of ourselves.

This poor opinion is what makes our self-respect so dependent on Jimmy's conduct that we have to constantly pursue him for politeness, good school marks and other achievements that will reflect credit on us. It's what turns us into self-sacrificing martyrs who only come alive when somebody else tells them how noble they are.

It's what makes us into naggers who must diffuse their demands on Jimmy into vague, indirect complaints lest they offend him by making the demands direct and definite. Because our poor opinion of ourselves makes us uncomfortable with anything but perfect discipline of Jimmy, it makes it difficult to give him any discipline at all.

So when I said that the jealous little brother's spitefulness was despair of his mother's love, I bet you thought I was being sentimental, too.
