

It was a terrific effort to cross as Aug. 3 high but the industrials hade it in the final session of the addition of a year-end rally.

This rally lacked enthusiasm argely because of uncertainty in he steel industry where management and labor are just as far part as ever in arriving at a vage settlement that would pre-lude resumption of the strike when the Taft - Hartley injunction expires on Jan. 26.

Wall Street is convinced there will be a settlement. It expects forced one that will result in a harp wage rise and higher prices or steel. That would mean a new inflation spiral unless something lise intervenes such as a price seflatior, which some economists anticipate.

Industrial production was curtailed again by the short week, although steel operations held high as demand continued for this metal at a rate which warranted record output. Steel capacity rose for the year for the 13th time in a row but the gain was the smallest of the 13.

Money ruled firm right up to the last minute. Business loans rose and gold stock declined by 11 million dollars, bringing the gold loss of 1959 to \$1,078,000,000. In 1958, the gold loss amounted to \$2,247,000,000.

Practically all the indexes and statistical figures on business are higher on the year. Records were set by gross national product, national income, personal income, disposable income and consumer spending. Savings declined on the year as spending increased.

The market declined on Monday when electronics issues were running into trouble. They had some hard sledding later but came back from their lows with a few outstanding strong spots.

Individual strong spots appeared in the electrical equipments, chemicals, rails, motors, aircrafts, steels and metals.

For the week, the industrial average closed at 679.36 up 8.67
points from the previous week;
railroad 154.05 off 0.23 point; utility 87.83 up 0.82; and 65 stocks

For the year 1959, the industrials showed a gain of 95.71 points; rails lost 3.60 points; utilities lost 3.17 points and 65 stocks gained 17.09 points.

From the 1949 lows to the close of 1959 the industrial average showed a gain of 517.76 points or 320 per cent; railroads a gain of 113.92 points or 275 per cent and utilities a gain of 54.47 points or 183 per cent.


Oil shares managed to close the week with gains ranging to more than four points in Standard Oil of Ohio.





But in most cases, the only factors which are taken into account are (1) professional training and (2) experience. Typically, that a teacher with an M.A. degree gets paid more than one with an A.B., and one who has had several years in the classroom draws more than a beginner.

Merit rating plans introduce a third factor into the situation salary differentials based on the teacher's ability and performance. There are two kinds of merit

differentials - negative and posiive. The negative type provides or penalizing unsatisfactory eachers by withholding normal eniority raises or in extreme cases by cutting their pay. A recent survey by the National Education Association (NEA) showed that 13 per cent of urban public school districts have salary plans which theoretically provide for penalizing unsatisfactory teachers. But only three per cent of them reported that this provision was actually used in the past school

The positive type of differential seeks to reward superior teachers, either by accelerating their promotion to maximum salaries or by granting them bonus pay above the normal maximum. 

week. This is because babies and young children have little oil secretion and never develop "body Sponging may be done as

-Use a non-irritating and nondrying detergent or soan -Cleanse diaper area with oil rather than with soap and then, only when needed, using cotton balls and not the diaper

-Grease all hairless skin sur faces once a day. -Change the diaper as often as necessary to keep the infant dry. At night, even if the infant is

sleeping, pick him up at your bedtime, change him, putting on two or three diapers to keep him from being drenched by morning -Use powder freely to act both as a drying and slipping agent The powder acts like tiny ball bearings, decreasing friction.

-Allow only soft cotton cloth contact the skin. Be sure the blankets have cotton covers. If the child rubs his face on the sheet, place a soft flannel cloth inder his head. Be careful of organdy dress

es and hats, and of woolen scarfs, hats and gloves. Many synthetic elothes are potentially irritating to the infant's skin. Rather than using baby lotions and creams, Dr. Hanfling recom-

mends the use of any edible fats to replenish baby's skin oils. 'Some of the best are hydrous lanolin, the various salad oils. and hydrogenated shortenings. The availability of these two groups," he said, "makes them

The Revenue Service representaive added these potent points: A person with income of less than these amounts should file a '59 return to get a refund if tax was withheld . . . A married person with income less than her (his) own personal exemption(s) should file a joint return with husband or wife to get the smaller tax or larger refund for the couple . . . Members of Armed Forces should give name, service serial number, and permanent home address.

Area taxpayers are urged to file their returns for '59 with their IRS District Director as soon after January 1, 1960, as possible.

'Although the filing deadline is April 15, folks who wait until the last minute find it more difficult to get technical help the nearer the final day approaches."

Also," Davis said, "last minute filers make more costly errors in their returns." Checks or money orders for any tax due should be clipped, not stapled, to the return and should







Religious Resurgence Continues

The resurgence of religious activity, which has been one of the most striking phenomena American life since World War II. seemed to continue unabated throughout 199. Government 'reports show that expenditures for new church buildings climbed to an all-time high of nearly one billion dollars.

Statistics on membership growth, Sunday school enrollment and giving are compiled by the churches themselves, and it will be some months yet before the 1959 figures are available. But it appears likely that they also will get new records,

If any churchman is tempted to complacency by all this evidence of institutional prosperity, he may find it a sobering antidote to took shead at some of the formidable problems which confront the churches in 1960.

The inevitable frictions may be major political parties should nominate a Catholic candidate for President or Vice President,

Although Catholic - Protestant relations have improved considerably in recent years, as the recent birth control controversy demonstrated, there still are a number of issues on which they disagree, and on which each side feels conscience-bound to uphold its position vigorously.

Many churchmen feel that this problem cannot be solved by tryto declare a moratorium or public discussion of the real and important questions that divide Christians. They feel the only solution is to air these questions with full remembrance on both sides that Christ's first commandment to his followers was to love one another

Clergymen are increasingly conscious that the postwar revival has brought into their congregations many new members who are sincerely interested in investi-gating th erelevance of religion to their lives, but who are not yet, by any means, committed be-

It was this situation that prompted one minister to say recently that "the biggest task the church faces today is converting

In many cases, conversion must be preceded, or at least accompanied, by an adult deucation program. Surveys indicate that mil ions of church members have extremely vague ideas about the central affirmations of the faith they have embraced on trial. One California pastor for example, was profoundly shocked recently by the discovery that not a single adult member of his congregation could make a passing grade on a test composed of 20 simple questions about the Bible.

Virtually every denomination is suffering from a growing shortage of trained clergymen. The Metho dist Church, for example, needs at least 2,800 new ministers each year to replace those who have died or retired or to take charge of new congregations. But its seminaries are graduating only 900 a year. The National Council Churches estimates the total clergy shortage in all Protestant bodies at more than 2,000

> Why Steel Union Members Gets Higher Wages Than Other Union Members

There is a generally accepted fact that the members of the Steel Workers' union are now getting \$3 or \$4 a week more than most other union men with similar skills.

The same applies to the Teamsters union. The members are getting, undoubtedly, a great deal more for the skill and physical labor that they perform than most any other group of workers.

There's a very simple reasonfor this. The unions that get control of the commodities or services that are virtually monopolies are the ones that are able to get more wages than those labor unions that are not in control of so near a monopoly; When there is no monopoly in a service, people will substitute other things.

Steel Almost A Monopoly But consider how people would live if there were no steel. To begin with, it would be impossible to produce enough food to supply the population. If we had to use wooden plows our products would be so primitive that, of course, very few people could live. And, of course, if we didn't have steel we couldn't have tractors or harvesters or the many, many things that are made of steel that the farmers use to re-

duce their labor in producing. Of course, a house that didn't have steel would be very primitive. It would be very difficult to build a house without nails, and, of course, there could be no plumbing and no washing machines, no carpet sweepers, no refrigerators, no electric lights if

we did not have steel. So, the members of the steel union who have a monopoly can extort most any wage they demand, so long as the public supinely submits to any group of men having an exclusive right to do certain work. When people believe the right to exchange a man's production is not a natural right that belongs equally to all people, then those people who get control of the more essential commodities are in a position to plunder their fellowman whether they are union men or not. Of course, they plunder the retired persons and the man who is not a union man, for a time, more than they do the man who is a union man. Sooner or later more and more people will see the unfairness of striking unions, and the

laws that make such injustice

impossible will be changed. In thinking why certain union men were able to extort such higher wages than others, I remembered reading Oswald Spengler's great book published in 1934 on the decline of the West, I remembered that Spengler pointed out that when the proletariat get control they are not satisfied with being equal to a man with vision and foresight, but they insist on having special privileges that no other men have. That's what Mc-Donald and Hoffa and John Lewis and Harry Bridges and the railroad men are doing. They are exploiting their fellowman. And to the degree that they have a monopoly are they able to plunder mankind for a time. Sooner or later they go so far in their cahoots with the government that


be no long-time contracts with an escalator clause, or even without an escalator clause, because no one can foresee the value of different services. It is presumptious on the part

of the employers, as well as the labor unions, to attempt to bind the buyers of their products to pay what the employers and the labor officials figure their customers should pay. What is needed is a free market that is constantly adjusted to the true value of the different services. And if we had a free market that was constantly adjusted to the true value of services, we would have no long periods of unemployment and real wages would be constantly rising as rapidly as they could, so that there would be full employment and each man would be more nearly getting all he produces.

And justice is certainly based on each and every man getting he produces, and the only known way of arriving at what each man produces is going back to the fundamental principles of the Decalogue and the Declaration of Independence, that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights. And one of these fundamental rights is that he has an equal right to help es-

tablish values. Yes, there is a very definite reason why the steel union is able to extort from the rest of mankind such an unreasonable reward for their services, arrived at by the threat of depriving the rest of mankind of the neces-

We have to pay an awful price to learn that no one should have a monopoly on anything but his own life, and the government shouldn't enter into a conspiracy with any sector of society to give them special privileges over

MORE TRICKS - While the U.S. knows about the credit negotiations with Czechoslovakia, nothing is being done about them. Similarly, no counter measures are yet being taken on two other undercover activities being closely watched:

Preparations to launch a drive to whip up popular Cuban demand that the U.S. give up its long-held naval base at Guantaname Bay. Raul Castro, leftist younger brother of Fidel and army head, is credited with being in charge of this scheme, A million hand-bills have been printed as part of this "evic-

Actions to provoke U.S. military intervention in Cuba for the purose of arousing world sympathy and support, particularly in South America, and to divert the mounting ire and dis-affection of the Cuban people from the increasingly bumbling and dictatorial Castro regime.

In the past several weeks, the State Department has been warned of this by friendly Latin Amercan officials with good ties in Ha vana. These excellently - informed sources have been explicit in their counts of what Castro and the extremist clique around him are ontemplating

His recent hours-long harangue, which he "alerted" Cubans to expect a "foreign invasion" in the future, is credited by these Latin American authorities as being part of this anti-U.S. "plot."

But they won't be able to enjoy it until Congress curbs the massive power of big unionism. The need is to break up the labor trust and end the iron centralization that enables it to throw terror into any community selected for intimidation.

The Congress, when it convenes in January, should remember the terror in Albert Lea, Minnesota, and write a law that will protect citizens who don't want to be unionized with brickbats.

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

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
