Premier Confident Of Two-Fold Plan

By JOSEPH W. GRIGG United Press Staff Correspondent

PARIS (UP)-The threat of civil war lessened today under a two-fold plan by Premier Pierre Pflimlin to settle the French crises without bloodshed. He was reported increasingly confident of success.

First, Pflimlin was moving cautiously to drive a wedge between the army generals in Algeria and the insurgent French colonists who still demand power for Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

Second, he was preparing sweeping constitutional reforms at home to make it difficult to everthrow French governments. The reforms also would throw a stumbling block into de Gaulle's path to power.

Officials here said they were not unduly disturbed by Gen. Raoul Salan's public praise of de Gaulle in Algiers or his dramatic cry Wednesday night to a cheering crowd of young settlers: "We shall march together up the French Planes Champs Elysees."

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


The USDA said farmers in the Blacklands and East Texas rushed planting, replanting and cultivation as soils dried in the second consecutive week of open weather.

The rains came at a critical period of development with low rolling plains wheat in soft dough and high plains crops ranging from boo tto milk stage.

This was made clear Wednesday as UAW president Walter P. Reuther and other union leaders held an all-day closed meeting with seven clergymen on the ethical and moral standards of union demands.

The next step will be to put this minimum bargaining position before the union's national bargaining councils for General Motors, Ford and Chrysler when they meet here Thursday.

Some 600,000 production workers are involved in the bargaining.

It is a giant step by the union away from its sizeable across-theboard demands and profit sharing goal. But the retreat to the three issues should put the union on solid bargaining ground. General Motors vice president Louis G. Seaton has already acknowledged improvements are due in unem ployment benefits.

An industry spokesman told United Press the companies would bargain on improvements in supplemental unemployment benefits (SUB), pensions and job rights. This would break the stalemate that has existed since contract negotiations started eight weeks REO.









The Wounded Animal

It isn't easy for us to throw a word of comfort to Henry Luce, editor and founder of the Time-Life-Fortune publishing axis, but Henry is out over his depth and needs an old and battle-scared hand to help him out.

So long as Henry ran with the pack in being a loud champion of the public school system he had a fine time attacking the hare with the rest of the hounds. The hare being anyone who questioned the operations, expenses, principles or lack thereof, propriety, and so forth of the government school system-particularly the critism voiced from time to time (no pun intended) by Freedom Newspapers.

From his huge editorial chair through the columns of Time Magainze, Henry has pointed a number of stern fingers at Freedom Newspapers and their owners and editors. At one time, with the lack of accuracy all too often seen in Time reporting, Henry announced that Freedom Newspapers were about to run out of the Rio Grande Valley in Texas. That was pretty frightening, you can just bet! Having been obliged to eat some of these banishment words, Henry was a little kinder in regard to his finger pointing at The Lima News when he reported on strike conditions and the start of another newspaper in Lima although he continued to wish us ill.

In general the editorial formula of Henry's publishing house is to skip lightly over the facts-sometimes ignoring them completely-to arrive at a predetermined conclusion. Luce has been called the most influential journalist of the times but we suspect that he is more likely to be an echo of what many millions of people think they think.

During the heyday of "progressive education" - the theory that fun was more important than learning - Henry was a happy boy. He even headed a Presidential commission which found that the answer to all the educational problems of the nation lay in more money for the school industry.

Wage Changes and Jobs The notion prevails that especially in times like these wages would, under free market pricing, fall to levels of starvation leaving untold numbers of persons with out work at any price. It is true that as an economy becomes more and more complex, it is more and more difficult to see how problems would become resolved. And furthermore, an intricate machine is the work of many hands, so that when it fails to sell, it affects many persons. This means that mistakes are more serious than otherwise; more persons should want to avoid market mistakes. Economic complexity does not mean, however, that wages would go to near zero if they were generally to adjust to the free price - even in times of depression.

Some of the best work on this question has been done by Douglas and Pigou. 5/Their studies indicate that employment, instead of responding sluggishly to wage changes, responds by large amounts. Essentially in agreement, their conclusions show that a decline of one per cent in wages will uncover jobs for 3 or 4 per cent more persons.

earlier, we can see how powerful a tool wage rates are for causing and curing unemployment: Wages as per cent above free market point 0 (Free market) none


From these figures we may conclude that the present (March 1958) 5 million unemployed is the result of over - pricing hired labor

by an average of only 2 per cent;

6/Allowing 3 million in the official figures to cover "normal unem-ployment," or persons voluntarily not working for one reason or an-other at the free market level of wages. wages that the excessive unemployment could be cured by dropping wages in the places they are too high by an average of only 2 per cent. From these figures we can esti mate, based on the Douglas-Pigou studies, the levels of unemployment we shall have if we push wages even higher in relation to the free market level. For instance, a wage-rate excess of only 5 per cent would presumably unemploy about 10 million persons; 10 per cent, about 161/2 million. This danger is important in the face of a continuing rise in wages. There is every prospect that they will rise in 1958 at a rate about as fast as they did in 1957. Half the new contracts this year have provided for raises of 10 cents an hour or more. Many workers in major industries are due to get automatic raises; such as the one coming in July that will add 9 cents an hour to the pay for steel workers in an industry even now operating at only half its capacity. We can bring about any level of unemployment we want, through the powerful leverage of

WASHINGTON - Vice President Nixon's violence - spattered trip to South America was a deliberate "calculated risk."



Lenin Was Ardent

'Democratic Socialist' It seems clear that Lenin was an ardent and convinced democrtaic Socialist until he came to power in 1917. According to Bertram De Wolf in Three Who Made A Revolution (Beacon Press, Boston) "his writings are full of such earnest avowals, and there can be no doubt of their sincerity." Again "for Lenin in those days was a convinced Democrat, and the problem of political freedom concerned him deeply."

Lenin wrote that any Socialist who ". . . decided to pronounce the question of political freedom and democracy as of no consequence to him . . . ceases to be a Socialist . . .'

De Wolf declares that Lenin was a full believer in " . . . constitutional democratic government" and looked forward to drafting a constitution along those lines. De Wolf quotes copiously from Lenin's writings to prove it. Among others we find this sentence from Lenin, "But how then could the revolution be kept democratic?" Lenin's answer, according to De Wolf is . a democratic government by the vast majority of the Russian people."

Lenin warned: "Whoever wants to approach socialism by any other path than that of political democracy, will inevitably arrive at the most absurd and reactionary conclusions . . ." Of a general legislative assembly representative of the people, Lenin said, "Someone must guarantee the freedom and fairness of elections. Someone must invest an assembly with full power and force."

But after Lenin and his associates came to power they found that socialism could not be practiced without an authoriatarian government. They therefore set up what they thought would be a temporary minority dictatorship. Of course it soon became permanent and extremely cruel. It directed the activities of the people, controlled the intake of their minds and to

all intents and purposes enslaved

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Now the pendulum of public opinion seems to be coming over to an anti-progressive idea. Most people are not very well pleased with the government schools and, for lack of anything better to blame, they are taking it out on the old progressive kick that Prof. John Dewey invented some years back.

Being sensitive to public opioion, Mr. Luce has taken out after the public school system like the woman on the Old Dutch Cleanser box, stick in hand. Nor does he mention that he and his magazines are doing a sudden about-face.

But, Life Magazine reports, its reports have evoked "cadenced howls of protest" from some educationists. Pouting, Life's editors said they felt "a little like the well-meaning passerby trying to extract a thorn from a wounded animal's paw."

The wounded animal, apparently, is the National Association of Secondary Principals-a captive thing of the National Education Association which Henry used to be in love withwhich not only howled but extended its claws. In a letter to some 20,000 members, the top officials condemned the Life articles and urged a boycott of the Timelifefortune periodicals.

Well, the school educationists have tried that boycott business on Freedom Newspapers more than once-and Henry was among those egging them on. But Henry is embarrassed enough without us jumping on him and we're all for Henry changing his mind if he feels like it. And we resent for him the boycott urged by the school principals. It would have been nice had Henry been equipped with the patriotism and courage to speak out for us when we were in the same boat—but, what the heck.

So we'll end this with a word to the school principals, not from The Pampa News or Freedom Newspapers but a publication which says "we do not consider ourselves enemies of (public) education," The Chicago Tribune, which said:

The organized high school principals of this country identify this critism of their performance with hostility to education — a frightening non sequitur. Their reply to a publisher who prints an article reproaching them is to suggest that all his products be removed from school libraries. The United Auto Workers, in their attempted boycott of Kohler products, at least had more at stake than injured vanity.

Americans who understand our national character and aspirations expect the publication of material they do not like, and discourage imposing vengeful sanctions on it. They can take critism without feeling persecuted. They know that only in a society tolerant of critism can anyone enjoy freedom.

Of all people, school authorities should not have glass lows and short tempers.



wage rates. Inflation's Effect

If and when more inflation money is poured into the money stream, the higher wages will not be what they seem. Inflation robs dollars of a part of their buying power, reducing the worth of the higher wage in terms of what it will buy. It takes some of the excess out of an excessive wage. There are plenty of other reasons to oppose inflation, and it is surely a backhanded way to nullify wage excesses. But it must be admitted, nonetheless, that unless inflation is paralleled by further wage increases, it has the same effect as a wage reduction without inflation; it reduces unemploy-

to that extent. Of course, any of the "cost of living" escolators in wage contracts automatically prevent this adjustment. They prohibt even this one advantage of inflation as a crude way to cure unemployment. The way these escolators work is well illustrated by recent events in the automobile industry. An increase in the basic wage of auto workers last year pushed the prices of cars up to where onethird of a full rate of production was failing to sell. The higher car prices then became the major factor in a new rise in the index of the cost of living, which in turn escolated the wages of auto workers still higher. The circuit was then ready to take another upward turn. Such a process will no more adjust affairs in a depression than would climbing a mountain, higher and higher, take you back down to the station in

the valley. So long as organized labor is empowered to raise wages above

the free market level and cause widespread unemployment as a consequence, only an optimist could assume that they will not use this power to force further wage increases in a futile pursuit of inflated prices. And if that happens, the effect will surely be to perpetuate unemployment and deepen the depression.

WHAT THEY SAID - While declining to comment on the President's troop action, Dulles did tell the senators that he "did not recommend it.'

"Then why did the President do that?" asked Senator Sparkman. "He was worried about the lives of the Vice President and Mrs. Nixon," explained Dulles. "The President made his decision to send troops after receiving information that the Nixons were not being fully protected by Venezuelan authorities. That information came direct from our embassy in Caracas."

"You say you did not recommend the dispatch of troops," said Senator Green. "Did you disapprove of that?"

'Once a decision is made by the President," replied Dulles, "I believe in standing behind it.'

"That isn't what the chairman asked you," declared Senator Morse, "You did not answer his question. Do you or do you not approve of the President's action in sending troops to t heCaribbean area?"

"I will stand on my previous answer," said Dulles.

"How do you stand on handling Latin American dictators?" continued Morse, "Doesn't that go to the heart of this deplorable matter? Hasn't it been this Administration's policy to treat dictators the same, and in some instances. even better than the democratic leaders of South American countries?'

Dulles vigorously denied that. "We have shown no favoritism of any kind," he declared. "We have consistently followed the policy of not intervening in the af-

Secretary Dulles stressed that it is not the intention of the Administration to invoke the Eisenhower Doctrine in the Lebanon crisis. "What about evidence that these

riots are being instigated by the United Arab Republic to overthrow the pro-Western Levanon government?" asked Senator Fulbright,

"There is some evidence that groups of Syrians are entering Lebanon and are participating in the rioting and lawlessness," replied Dulles. "But still there is not sufficient evidence that the UAR is actively endeavoring to destroy President Chamoun's government."

"If it becomes clear that is happening," continued Fulbright, what does the Administration intend to do about it?"

"Take it to the United Nations for concerted action there," said Dulles.

FLASHES - Secretary Dulles and White House assistant Sherman Adams rarely cross swords, but they are doing that over AFL-CIO president George Meany. Dulles and Labor Secretary James Mitchell are urging Meany's reappointment as a member of the U.S. delegation to the United Nations. But Adams is balking at that because of Meany's sharp blasts at the Administration on anti-recession measures . . . The White House has been informed that a secret House poll showed 90 Democrats for the President's reciprocal trade bill and 94 against. The other 53 Democrats were either absent or on the fence. The surprisingly large number of Democrats opposing the measure explains Republican Leader Joe Martin's warning to the White House, 'We need at least 100 Republican votes or the President will be licked on this issue in the House."

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


