began to subsidize "education", and that started about 103 years ago in each community, and it spread from the center outward. This subsidy of "education", instead of helping the child to better know the difference between right and wrong, made it almost impossible for him to recognize right from wrong. This is true because tax-supported schools arebased on the fallacy that two people out of three have a right to do what none of the three would contend he had a right

to do as an individual. In other words, the fallacy is that you can believe in voluntaryism and involuntaryism at the same time; that you can believe it is right to steal and right to live by the sweat of your brow at the same time; that you can believe that a bad tree can produce good fruit; that you can pick figs from thistles; that you can promote goodwill from initiated force.
