HOILES How Protestant Ethical Thought Has Developed A Moral Sanction For Socialism-Communism Frederick Nymeyer, in his magazine "First Principles In Morality And Economics", in his December issue, has an article under the heading of "Present-Day Protestantism Has, Without Realizing It, Laid A 'Moral' Founda-Under Socialism-Communism". Under that heading he introduces the reasoning that caus-

ed him to make that statement. Then he starts out introducing "The Character of Syllogisms' with this paragraph: "In what follows it is shown

how Protestant ethical thought has developed a moral sanction for socialism - communism. Whether it intended that or not does not negate the fact.

"Most people are acquainted with the character of syllogisms. A syllogism is a series of propositions by which men help themselves to reach valid conclusions. A standard, illustrative syllogism is the following:

"Major Premise: All men are mortal (that is, will die). "Minor Premise: Socrates is a "Conclusion: Therefore, Socra-

tes is mortal (will die). "Whether the conclusion is cor-

rect depends on whether the two nises are true, (1) whether all men are mortal, and (2) whether Socrates is a man. If those are true, then the conclusion, that Socrates will die is a reasonable conclusion. In the ordinary course of events, known to human experience, this syllogism describes past events cor-

rectly, or predicts correctly. "Another often-used, illustrative syllogism, is the following: "Major Premise: All swans are white.

"Minor Premise: John's bird is a swan. Conclusion: Therefore, John's

bird is (must.be) white. "Again, the conclusion is valid, if the premises are true. It is reported, however, that some swans are black. In that case, the conclusion in the foregoing syllogism is incorrect, because the major premise is erroneous.

"There are other reasons why conclusions in a syllogism may incorrect, but the foregoing suffices to show how syllogistic reasoning is helpful for reaching conclusions, that is, valid conclusions, if the premises are true and properly related.

They were about as much like their renown and publicity as tin is like gold. In public, on Flo Ziegfeld's glamour - strewn stages, they were haughty, peeled and somehow oddly impersonal. In private, they were young women like almost any other young women, some humorless, some crackling with humor, some giddy, some sombre, but all just good-looking kids with unusually fetching figures. Among these was Kathryn Hamill, and she was no dancer. She was a showgirl. There was then and there still is a difference, only it has reversed itself. In those days showgirls were the queens and the little dancers were, well, just little dancers. Today, when dancing skill has become difficult and demanding, the dancers are the princesses and the showgirls are just big, slow - walking girls who have lost their status.

We had turned away from the rattling, clacking machine in the common cause that we each felt emotion.
