



There are times however, which are the exception and not the rule, when in dealing with personnel problems and with problems concerning specific children that your board feels such matters can be more frankly discussed in executive session. An ill-advised or wholly unjust complaint or statement must not be permitted to embarrass or harm unjustifiably a school child, parent, or employee. We, being your duly elected representatives, feel that you approve of handling such matters in executive session.

The regrettable necessity of holding meetings to discuss delicate human problems without press coverage is recognized by elected and appointed administrative bodies from the President of the United States and his cabinet on down. On all other matters you may rest assured your school board holds sacred "Your Right to Know."





#### **Better Jobs**

Many people are worried about the rate population is increasing. It comes from professors and all kinds of people. It is just a con-tinuation of the Thomas R. Malthus theory that population would increase so fast that evenually the increase would be stopped by malnutrition.

The American Institute for Economic Research pretty well explodes this fallacy. They run it unuer the neading of "Standing Room Only". Then as a subhead they have 'Bad Economics Not Over-Population, Perils Mankind" And this subhead was reprinted from Barron's, Dec. 7, 1959, issue. This is the way the American Institute for Economic Research shows the fallacies of the Malthusian theory of over-popula-

"In a world uncomfortably close to erupting over genuine issues, men unaccountably persist in snatching up the cudgels over spurious ones. Controversy thus has flared in recent weeks on such momentous questions as whether General Eisenhower played a round of golf at Rheims in 1944 (he didn't), and whether Russian or an American invented the sewing machine. Long before convention time, the U.S. heatedly is arguing the respective merits of presidential candidates, most of whom remain coyly unavowed; it also is taking sides in the quarrel between Mickey Rooney and Jack Paar. The tendency to look for skeletons in empty closets reached a new high (or low) last month, in the sudden outburst of public clamor over what has been termed, aptly misleadingly, the 'population explosion'. Unless something drastic is done about it, warned one expert, such as limiting the number of offspring to an average 2.7 per couple, the mounting birth rate will pose 'as ominous a threat to mankind as the

"To those who regard babies as harmless or even appealing members of society, such a figure of speech is, to say the least, peculiar. No less so is the logic which has inspired it. For the theory of over-population rests not on the facts - of life and otherwise - which come readily to hand, but on dubious demographic projections which have gained not one whit in substance since the time of Thomas R. Malthus. Statistically speaking, in short, it is bunk. What is worse, by whipping up a storm of controversy over a fictitious issue, it tends to divert attention from a real

one. Wherever famine and misery or the threat thereof, exist today in the world, the fault lies not with unplanned families, but with misguided economic policy. The cure, in turn, must be sought not in some kind of pseudo-scientific crusade, but in the more efficient and sensible use of natural resources.

"A famous bugaboo for more than a century and a half, the spectre of over - population has been raised once again in recent weeks, in talks before learned societies and in the popular press, by a number of distinguished scholars. The views of the new Malthusians, as we understand them, apparently represent a major advance over those of the original. Unless restrained in other ways, the 'gloomy Dean' once preached, the increase in humankind inevitably will be checked by pestilence, famine and war. Now, however, according to his latter-day disciples, science swiftly is conquering disease, and war has become unthinkable; by and large, the Four Horsemen have been bridled. In their absence, population is apt to grow furiously, to 'explode', until the point is reached in the not-too-distant future, when, in the words of Sir Charles Darwin, a distinguished bearer of a distinguished name. 'there will be standing room only

upon the earth'. "Here is a grim forecast indeed. Happily, however, despite the eminence of the source, there is plenty of reason to question its accuracy. Let us start with the well-known tendency of demographic projections to go. awry. Prior to World War II and for years afterward, it will be recalled, virtually all the duly con-stituted authorities in this country embraced the view that the U. S. had become a 'mature' society, in which further growth, in terms of numbers as well as industrial capacity, would be distressingly small. Today, in ironic contrast, a favorite theme at trade conventions is the imminence of the Golden 'Sixties, a decade which is said to glow with promise because of the fantastic postwar baby boom. The same phenomenon has occurred in France, where the population, stagnant since the birth of the Third Republic, suddenly has gained a new lease on life. Human behavior, it would appear. refuses to follow statistical CULTURE

"Viewed ong-range, then, overpopulation by no means looms as a scientific certainty. On a shortterm basis, the threat has no substance whatever. Far from lagging behind the number of mouths to feed, as the alarmists assert, the world supply of food for years actually has been running well ahead. On this score, figures furnished by the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations (FAO), while subject to the errors which afflict all






