Prochnow, vice president of the First National Bank of Chicago, made an address before the Trust Division of the American Bankers Assn., at Miami Beach, Fla., on the subject "A Time For Critical Decisions". In his speech he pointed out how rapidly our net gold is dimin-

A Striking Statement He made this axiomatic, striking statement: "There are no short cuts through easy money and artificial low interest rates. There are no exceptions. These are economic imperatives. The nation that neglects them does so at the risk of its economic survival".

If we would return to the American way of life, he makes ten suggestions

"First - Balance the budget with a surplus for debt retirement in good times to offset deficits and increasing debt in periods of declining business".

"Second - Remove the ceiling on interest rates on longer-term Federal securities so the major capitalist power of the world can manage its debt properly through the savings of its people and not add to inflationary pressures by financing deficits through shortterm financing in the banks".

It is hard to see how people will make long-term loans unless we first discontinue our welfare state ideas that cannot be financed by taxation. "Third - Free the agricultural

industry from present excessive government controls". "Fourth - Reduce the corporate income tax rate of 52 per cent which at present makes the interest of the Federal govern-

ment in the income of business greater than that of the stock-"Fifth - Eliminate every form of waste and extravagance, both in government and in the private

"Sixth - Sell American goods far more aggressively in foreign markets in order to help end the deficit in our foreign payments and assure the foreign income necessary to pay for the vastly increased foreign raw materials we shall need."

"Seventh - Determine whether there are monopoly powers in labor or business which operate to the detriment of the national economy. We have legislation which deals with possible monopoly in business: However, today we have big labor as well as big business. by WHITNEY BOLTON NEW YORK - It may be that living so long in New York has made me a violent dyspeptic, cruelly in need of bicarbonate of soda for the spirit as well as the mind, but search as I may I cannot find one shred of understanding in the case of Jack Paar, unhappy clown.

Nor do I want to be a road company George M. Cohan snapping the flag and uttering patri-otic cries. But I do think at a time in our history when so much that is ominous is happening we display painful superficfality in becoming hysterical over Mr. Paar and his fates. Perhaps some people in our

country do know exactly what

our security status really is. I

know only that dedicated men, intelligent men, are at odds on a grave issue. Some say bluntly we are in good hands and as safe as can be, others that we are tragically behind and never likely to catch up before disaster is visited upon us. It is enough of a grievous problem to make Mr. Paar's puny troubles seem less than grains of useless sand. At our doorstep, to use a recognized cliche, we have serious trouble in the matter of Cuba and its growing adherence to the Leftist spirit, First Anastas Mikoyan made his visit and his deal, a considerable deal, involving the right by Cuba to bacter sugar for arms. On the heels of that East Germany, which got precious little attention during the more colorful Mikoyan visit, has had a commission in Cuba making commercial proffers and deals, any and all of which could consist of firmer footholds in Cuba by communist elements.

Cuba, so near to us, is not the only growing Red fortress. On March 1, if the news is accurate, elements in Panama will stage a march right to the Canal Zone and you may be certain that if they do there will be disorder, at the least.

Indeed, the whole Caribbean area, with pitifully few exceptions, as well as large areas of South America, are turning against us and not daily but hourly our prestige and; in the foreseeable end, our safety is diminished. These are not unknown truths nor are they stretchings of mild truth. We have pathetic troubles by the hodful.

In the light of just these, and no other problems, the plight of Mr. Paar seems to me both silly. and utterly inconsequential. It is inconceivable that in any other patch of earth on this world there could be a nationwide furore over the petty unhappiness of a hired comedian. This is not said to make Mr.

Paar small and a pest. He has talents and he uses them well His show attracted millions nightly. He had value to NBC and to himself. He still may have and probably has, and no broadcasting system kicks 10 to 15 millions of dollars a year idly away. But the icy fact at bottom is that worth the Page 1 attention it has created. Not in a day and time when much that we cherish is in plain danger.

It was like this when Arthur Godfry fired some talents associated with his shows. You'd have thought someone had pulled the plug out of the entire world. I don't think the communist areas turned a hair, that France's troubles were eased one whit, that Africa's boilings were cooled or even that the Pentagon shook on its foundations because some folk were fired by Godfrey. It was at best a terribly local situation and did nothing whatsoever, the world over, to enhance our standing. The spectacle of this country's going into hysterics every time a TV comedian is disturbed or fired must give the rest of the world something it greatly needs: A hearty laugh,

but at us - not with us. What is sad is that we show no sign of growing up and placing these occasional little storms in their proper perspectives. We grow noisy and hysterical, taking violent sides each time, but never do we face the larger and more menacing issues and shrug our shoulders and say: "Would that that were the greatest of our
