# As Peace Maker After **Arms Cuts**

GENEVA (UPI) - The Inited States called today for establishment of an internaional police force within the United Nations framework to preserve world peace after national arms and armies are slashed

Frederic M. Eaton, U.S. delegation chief, made the proposal at the opening session of a 10 nation disarmament con-

ference. The controlled Soviet press rejected as "dim" and "incomprehensible" a bold, cheat-proof arms plan offered by five West-

The American proposal was designed to supplement this threestage Western plan, earlier to the first East-West meeting in nearly three years to break 15-year-disarmament

deadlock. There must come into being, as national armaments diminish, an international force within the framework of the United Nations preserve the peace," Eaton

He said it must be "a force to

ensure that the seeds of conflict do not mature to the point where small nations less endowed with the elements of national power, or even large nations, would be threatened by a more powerful and more highly organized state " "The establishment of such a force will be fraught with great difficulties, but how much more difficult and unhappy the alterna-

The West has criticized Khrushchev's plan as "unrealistic" and too rapid, lacking in necessary

step-by-step controls. Today's meeting was the first East-West disarmament conference since the Russians stalked out of the United Nations disarmament subcommittee in August 1957. Since then terrible nuclear weapons and potentially dangerous space satellites have become almost commonplace.

The Western arms plan called for gradual scrapping of national armies and conventional weapons and eventually an end to military Forty-one Pampa High School satellites and nuclear rockets. It set no time limit.

The urgency of making the conference succeed where others have failed was keynoted by French disarmament expert Jules Moch

He said the alternative to East-West agreement was the threat of what he called the absolute weapon - a satellite with a nuclear warhead "hanging over our heads like thousands of swords of Damocles.

Five nations from each side comprise the conference, giving the Communists for the first time

The appearance of hair on the female face (hirsutism) is a cause for great embarrassment. As a result, many women subject themselves to painful and,

at times, dangerous measures. To begin with, you must untation of a disturbance in the balance of circulating sex hor-

When the proportion of the male factor exceeds that of the female factor there may be a male type of hair growth in mustache and beard areas

This disproportion may result in hirsutism in young girls who also may be afflicted with acne pimples. It may accompany change of life, and it is quite usual in older women.

Hirsutism also may be an early sign of certain tumors of the ductless glands. And it may be caused by overdoses of male sex hormone (usually given to control certain types of bleeding) or by effective doses of pituitary-like preparations used in the treatment of certain types of arthritis. Because of the important implications of hirsutism, the afflicted woman must place her self in the hands of a qualified orm of corrective treatment.

physician before undertaking any If no correctible underlying cause is discovered, she may have individual stubbles removed by electrolysis, preferably by a qualified skin specialist. Or she may resort to shaving with an electric razor if the growth is more pro-

Contrary to general bellef, shaving does not stimulate hair growth.

Shaving is preferable to X-ray exposures and the use of chemical depilatories, each of which is almost certain to cause difficulties in the long run.

Internal treatments with glandulor products, given by mouth or injection, are ill - advised since they are bound to result in far more undesirable side effects. Wrinkles are another cause of embarrassment to the fastidious

They result from loss of tissue

in the deep layer of the skin. Hence they cannot be prevented or smoothed out by massage or any form of constricting contraption. Neither will they be affected to the slightest degree by any local application whether in the form of a "skin tonic," a scented cream or any of the widely publicized cosmetic preparations that boast of a content of hormones or royal jelly.

The professional woman whose appearance is vital to her career may be greatly improved by skillful plastic surgery. Others are best advised to save money, that might otherwise be wasted.





Since taking over as presiden of Italy in 1955, Giovanni Gronch has been the man in the middle in the Italian government's game of musical chairs.

He has been so because it is the President's job to find a new premier whenever a government falls, which has been occuring in Italy with monotonous regularity for the better part of the last seven years.

So with the fall of Premier An tonio Segni's government on Feb. 24, Gronchi began a familiar round of consultations.

Italy's situation, once compara ble to the unstable governments of the French Fourth Republic now is almost unique among ma jor nations.

Its most powerful party is the Christian Democratic which com. SHIP LANDS SCIENTISTS mands 40 per cent of the votes in Parliament and from which every Italian premier has been drawn since the fall of Mussolini and establishment of the new Italian constitution.

But the party itself is split right, center and left, which helps to explain why governments may NADINE CONNER RETIRES change but faces do not. Depending on the current direction of the political winds, the premiership usually falls to a man who has held the job before - Segni, Amintore Fanfani, Giuseppe Pel-

Individually they may be described in order as moderately

left; left and right. Because they have been unable to obtain a clear parliamentary majority since 1953, the Christian Democrats have been forced to smaller parties from either right to left. When one of these parties Monarchist, Liberal, Republican or Moderate Socialist, withdraws support then the government
