

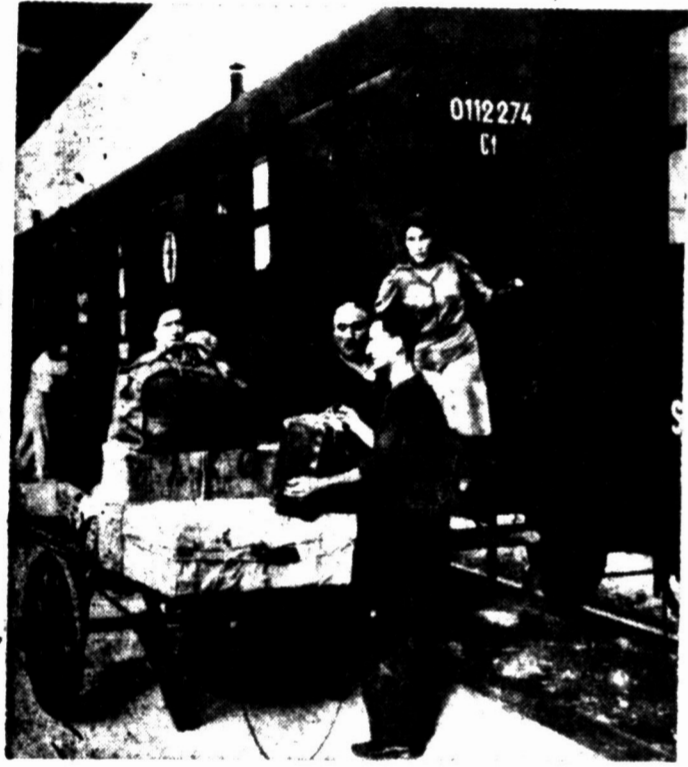

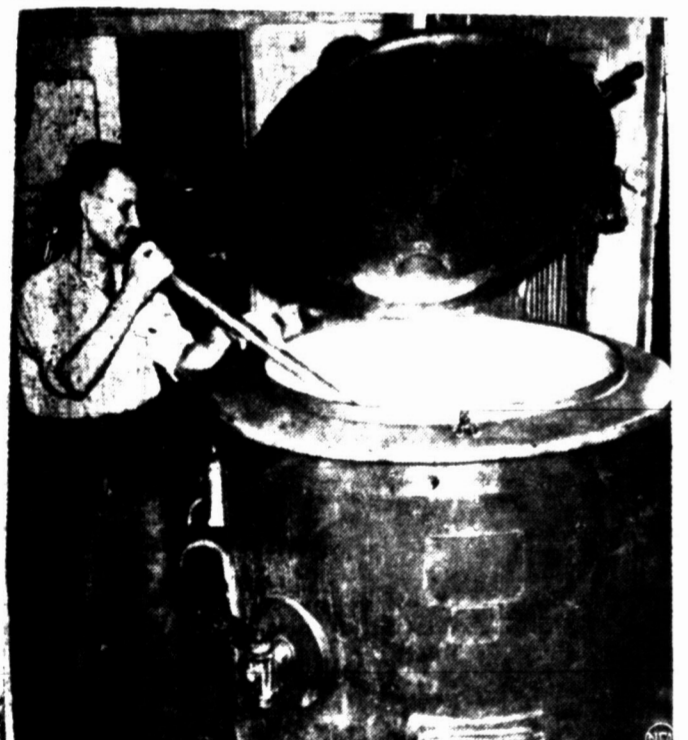
Polish DP's Make Long Trek From Palestine to Homeland

Recovery Boss Sure to Be Free Murray and CIO Indicted By Grand Jury

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A European recovery boss who won't have to take orders from the State Department appears a certainty today.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee agreed unanimously last night to create a \$20,000-a-year independent Marshall Plan administrator.

He would rank equally with the secretary of state and other cabinet members and any dispute would be settled by the President.

The administrator would be advised by a 12-member board of private citizens and would report to a 14-member congressional "watch-dog" committee.

A roving ambassador and special mission abroad would help to keep tabs on how Europe uses the American help.

Chairman Vandenberg (D-Mich) said the administrative plan was agreed to without dissent by the committee. He added that if the State Department has any objections, he hasn't heard them.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A federal grand jury today indicted the CIO and its president, Philip Murray, on charges of violating the Taft-Hartley Act's political expenditures ban.

The law forbids spending of union funds for political purposes. The indictment charges that Murray published an endorsement for a Maryland Congressional candidate last July in the union-financed CIO News.

The CIO has openly invited a court test. It says the Taft-Hartley ban against unions or corporations making political expenditures is unconstitutional.

President Philip Murray wrote a signed editorial in the CIO News last July urging Baltimore voters to support Edward Garmatz, a Democrat, in a special Congressional election. The next day Garmatz won the Congress seat over his Republican opponent.

The CIO News is financed by union funds, so the union made no bones about political spending in this instance.

Its attorneys contend, however, that the Taft-Hartley Act cannot be applied without violating the constitution's guarantee of freedom of the press.

Under the Taft-Hartley Act, a union or corporation found guilty of political spending can be fined up to \$5,000. Its officials can be fined up to \$1,000 and jailed for a year.

Attorney General Tom Clark issued a statement in connection with the indictment recognizing that there is a delicate constitutional question.

He said the political expenditure ban "can present a problem in the accommodation of the constitutional power of the Congress to regulate federal elections with the constitutional freedoms of speech and the press."

But he said the Justice Department "will, of course, enforce the statute as it is written."

The grand jury sent the indictment to U. S. District Judge Richmond B. Keech. A date for hearing the case will be set later.

As Parents, Americans Are Failures

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—America is on the brink of disintegration, a top-ranking psychiatrist said today. Reason: The increase in divorce and juvenile and adult delinquency.

Dr. Edward A. Strecker, chairman of the Psychiatry Division of the National Research Council, warned in an interview today.

As parents, most Americans are failures. They fail to instill self-reliance in their children. Children grow into emotionally immature adults unable to meet responsibility.

"Somewhere along the line," Dr. Strecker declared, "we have lost our spiritual values. Through technological advance we have achieved a highly materialistic civilization, but underneath we are stunted."

Dr. Strecker is here to address a postgraduate assembly of gynecologists and obstetricians. He blamed mothers for the growing tendency to cling to the maternal apron strings long after the child is independent individuals, but he indicted fathers, too.

"Fathers are too inclined to neglect the psychological rearing of their children. After the second child, a father tends to desert his wife emotionally."

Gloomily, the psychiatrist acknowledged that people are basically the same today as they were years ago, but forces outside are at work on them, and in the most materialistic civilization the world has ever known, spiritual values have been swept away.

The divorce rate of one to three marriages, and, in some densely populated areas, one to two marriages, and lax marital relationships, falling birthrate and soaring delinquency of adults and juveniles he classified as "surface symptoms of national decay."

Dr. Strecker held out a ray of hope. "We're pretty far along the road to disintegration," he said, "but we can still turn back with a tremendous effort."

Survey Shows Appreciable Markdowns in Retail Food Costs Across the United States

NEW YORK—(AP)—The housewife is paying less for meats, flour, butter and sugar a week after the first decisive break in rising prices.

An Associated Press survey of retail prices in 25 leading cities shows the consumer today is enjoying appreciable markdowns in grocery stores across the nation. Bacon costs the housewife 10 cents a pound less than a week ago. A ten-pound sack of flour is a dime less. Many meats are down 5 to 6 cents a pound.

Butter is down 4 to 5 cents a pound. Lard is 5 to 6 cents a pound less, and shortening has dropped two cents a pound.

The price declines are not going to spread to many woollen suits. The American Woollen Company has announced an 8 to 12 percent boost on such fabrics for next fall.

Some food retailers say, however, that further reductions are in sight. Most analysts think cheaper food prices are here to stay.

The wholesale meat market at Chicago fell unusually soon and prices fell yesterday as much as \$4 a hundred pounds.

It was part of a general slump that was worse than any day since June.

The nose-dive that started in corn last Wednesday spread with renewed violence to all commodity and security markets yesterday.

Never before have so many issues been traded on the New York Stock Exchange. There was trading in 1,112 issues yesterday and 96 of them declined while only 50 advanced. Stocks fell \$1 to \$5 a share to hit a new low since June.

The commodity slide was led by cotton and grain. Lard, cocoa, cottonseed oil, soybeans, all joined the leaders in dropping to the daily limits.

Cotton experienced the sharpest drop in 16 months with some deliveries down the limit of \$10 a bale.

Wheat, oats, corn all the grains going downward as much as limits would allow. The collapse wiped out Monday's rallies when grain prices pushed ahead on the basis of short covering and milk

Most Schools in Area Are Cancelled

A howling blizzard, described here and at Amarillo as the worst snow storm of an unusually hard winter, whooped into the Texas Panhandle today. Many schools cancelled schedules, as transportation and social activities were practically stopped. By 8:45 this morning the mercury had dropped to three degrees above zero, and the local weather station predicted "snow and colder this afternoon and tonight, with continued strong northerly winds; Thursday cloudy and not quite so cold."

Settlement on Payment for Well Is Made

The original contract on the well called for a purchase price of \$29,000 providing the well would deliver 700 gallons of water per minute. When completed the well produced only 480 gallons per minute and was used by the city free of charge, for approximately three months. In the latter part of October, 1947, MacDonald came back and attempted to redevelop the well in an effort to bring it up to the specified 700 gallons. Through a process of changing motors, working the bottom in an attempt to reduce the sand content of the water, the contractors were able to bring the well up to a safe pumping capacity of 850 gallons per minute. However, City Engineer Dixie Peppin said the well can pull 650 gallons per minute but expressed belief it would not be worked that hard.

The \$14,000 will be paid in three installments. The first \$7,000 will be paid for the pump, column and motor which is the actual market value of the equipment at present. A payment of \$4,000 will be made for the well itself. On Oct. 1, 1948, and providing the well is holding its own at the time of the final payment, the balance of \$3,000 will be paid.

Dad Explains to His Son Story of the Valentine

"Daddy, what's a Valentine?"

The little boy was standing in the bus seat with his chin resting on top of the seat, staring across the aisle at a red, heart-shaped card which a little girl was talking to her mother about.

The bus was just pulling out of Pampa, going west. It was just after dark.

"Sit down, Jimmy," the greying man said, "and I'll tell you about the very first one."

The lights of the Pampa suburbs became a faint glow in the distance. Snow on each side of the highway shone a soft white as the bus settled in its soft hum westward.

"Back in the year 270 a very stern man was ruler of the Roman Empire. The man's name was Claudius, and he had made the people many promises to get in office, just as some men do today. But after he was elected, he became a tyrant and ruled his people with an iron hand.

"He had no compassion, and he was never more delighted than when having some of his subjects beheaded. He wanted to expand his empire to cover larger territories, and he took his people that sentiment and affection were a waste of time and thought, and he banned those things he thought were foolish.

"It wasn't long before he learned that human affection is stronger than any sword or spear. In a temple a man named Valentine, who was a bishop in the Roman Church, continued to perform marriage ceremonies even though Claudius had forbidden them, just as he had before Claudius came to the throne. Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Note Book

NEW YORK (AP)—If college football could be beaten to death with a Phi Beta Kappa key, Robert Maynard Hutchins would have done it long ago.

On the program at Chicago. Just a few days ago "fighting Bob" renewed the attack in a lecture in Buffalo during which he remarked: "Football, fraternities and fun were designed to make a college education palatable for those who shouldn't be there."
In his theory the people "who shouldn't be there" are those who go to college for a vocational or technical education. He believes universities should be reserved for those who seek the intellectual life on a high and ardent level—Aristotle for breakfast, Thomas Aquinas for lunch, Kant for dinner.
His ideal is the medieval university at which students pored over metaphysics and philosophical classics, thereby, Hutchins holds, learning to think so that they could discover the truth for themselves. This system, of course created its share of wandering intellectual bums just as amateur tennis today has produced a number of traveling athletic tramps.
These unemployed career high-brows could argue learnedly on how many angels could sit on the point of a needle—a hot argument in those days—but they weren't much help when somebody had to get in the hay for harvest from the fields.
As a graduate of a state university which had its share of "football, fraternities and fun," I

find it difficult to understand the happy trinity of American education. Plato, one of the intellectual rockets of history, was an able wrestler. Most of the football players I knew did better than fair in their studies, and their only complaint was they weren't being paid enough for the labors in the stadium—which was true at that time. I understand now football players generally are better paid—and that is as it should be... football is work.
College fraternities do make some snobs, but so does Phi Beta Kappa, the honorary fraternity of the learned. The school fraternities also teach shy country boys how to get along with people and to refrain from wiping their noses with their dinner napkins. Phi Beta Kappa doesn't do this; it merely honors a number of high-ranking students who may know nothing they haven't read in a book.
The third thing Dr. Hutchins objects to—fun—keeps all life and learning from becoming sterile nonsense. No greater threat to democracy could exist than a generation educated without a sense of humor, if Hitler was capable of a belly laugh, we might have been spared the second world war.
There is no reason why a boy can't go to college, study for a career, learn to enjoy fun—and the world of ideas—and still find time to watch a football game Saturday afternoon and go to a fraternity dance Saturday night.
A man ought to quit any college he doesn't have fun at—or resign from living altogether, for that matter if it ceases to entertain him to a reasonable degree.
As an admirer of the glacial consistency of Bob Hutchins, A. B., A. M., LL. B., LL. D., I can't quite understand the logic of his wrath against college fraternities. The latest volume of "Who's Who in America" lists him as belonging to eight social and business clubs and two honorary clubs in three cities on two continents.
Why, doctor?

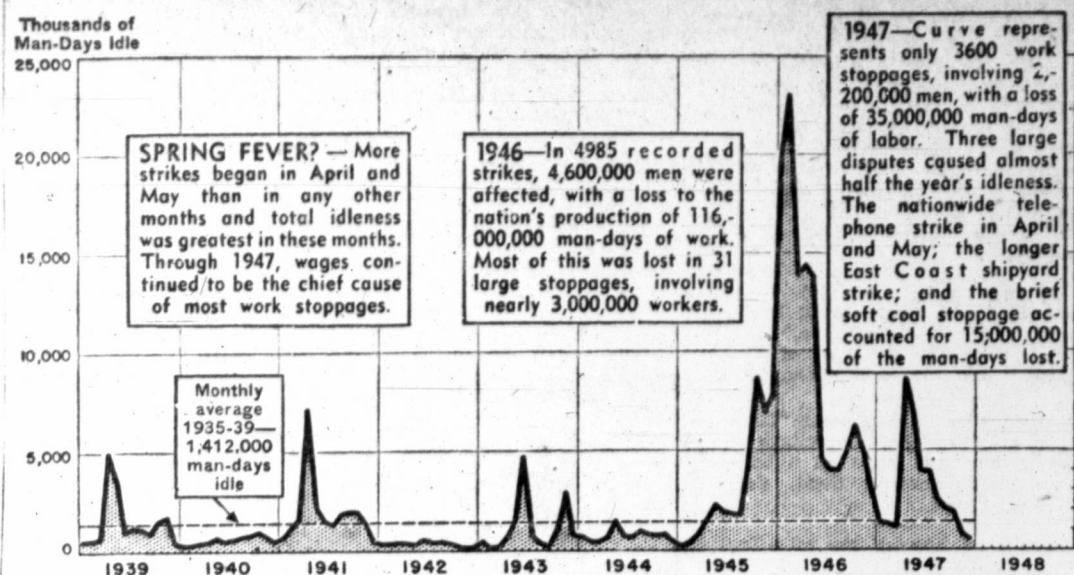

Science Finds Whistle Sound That Destroys Insects, Mice

NEW YORK — Science whistles that kills flies and mosquitoes in ten seconds is described in the Journal of the Acoustical Society of America.

The whistle is hooked to a horn that directs the sound. But don't make one yet. It has to be almost as close to the fly as a swatter. If you started whistling the flies to death, you soon would become dizzy and probably start seeing double.

The human risks of this whistle are new to science. They are reported by Doctors C. H. Allen, H. Frings and I. Rudnick of the Pennsylvania State College. The scientists are hunting for some sort of a loud-speaker to kill crop insects.

The siren makes a noise too high-pitched for human ears to hear. But after a little while a person close to it gets dizzy. He does not have to be in the sound stream in fact, if any part of

him is directly in the beam of sound, close up, that part gets very hot.

If a hand is placed in the stream, with fingers touching, the places where they touch get burned. The temperature at these fresh contact points jumps to more than 150 degrees Fahrenheit.

Workers spending an entire day in the State College whistle room report that they become more than ordinarily tired.

Those who open their mouths while the whistle is blowing, feel a cool tickling sensation in their mouths. Some like this tickle, others don't.

The reasons for these effects are not known, except the burning. The whistle kills the insects because the sound waves overheat their bodies. It heats anything the sound blast touches.

These burns kill cockroaches and caterpillars in three to four minutes. The roaches were about two inches long.

White mice died in one minute from the sound burns. Except one mouse that was shaved. Naked, he lived more than two minutes. The reason was that fur traps the heat faster.

The wings of flies and mosquitoes shriveled and almost disappeared.

Worthwhile Club Has Program on Kitchen Storage

Miss Ann Hastings, home demonstration agent, gave a demonstration on kitchen cabinets and storage, when the Worthwhile H. D. Club met in the home of Mrs. E. E. Stueben Feb. 6. She stated: "For an aid in convenient use and better care, your kitchen should have what you need; where you need it; when you need it. In making plans for a new cabinet, consider the actual needs for your own use, then decide upon the location, dimensions of the cabinet, material best suited for your needs, the type of sink to be used, and the storage for the equipment."
 She continued by saying that to improve the kitchen storage, one should remember the three centers of work in the kitchen: mixing, cooking and cleaning; and articles should be grouped in these centers according to the plan of the kitchen and one's needs. If shelves are too far apart, half shelves (which give half again as much space) may be added for cups, glasses and similar articles. In the same way, narrow shelves may be used for spices, extracts and other small containers. Drawer space may be separated by partitions, which makes equipment more accessible.

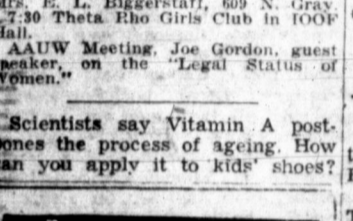

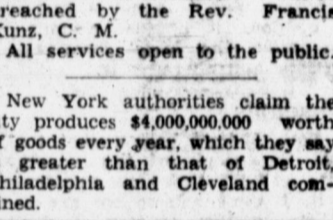

Dealings picked up at intervals and losses of 1 to 2 points or so for pivotal rails and industrials were widespread at the close. Few real recoveries were seen. The continued downward movement of the financial sector was paralleled to about 3:30 p.m. - - - largest since Dec. 31.

In front of the slide were Santa Fe, Illinois Central, Rock Island, Southern Pacific, Texas Co., Standard Oil, Union Pacific, Chesapeake and Ohio, and U. S. Steel. Bethlehem Steel, Chrysler, International Harvester, Kennecott, Allied Chemical, Union Carbide, Eastman Kodak, American Express, International Paper and Paramount Pictures.

Pessimistic professionals, as well as brokerage clients, trimmed accounts at intervals and losses of 1 to 2 points or so for pivotal rails and industrials were widespread at the close. Few real recoveries were seen. The continued downward movement of the financial sector was paralleled to about 3:30 p.m. - - - largest since Dec. 31.

Suit Settled Out of Court

Sunday night, Glass' two companions in the prison break were captured in Colorado City. Glass escaped in a stolen car.

Last night Deputy Sheriff Homer Bradford of Sweetwater said he believed that Glass had been hiding out in Sweetwater.

"He's got his family and a girl friend here," Bradford said.

Best Atomic Defense Called Vulnerability

BRISTOL, England — Prof. N. F. Mott, president of the British Atomic Scientists Association, said in a speech that it would be " futile for Britain to engage in an atomic weapons race. Job Seekers Flood Pampa

Job seekers are flooding Pampa, according to L. P. Fort, local manager of the Texas Employment Commission. In the first few days of February 978 people have contacted the local office, most of them seeking work.

They come from adjoining states, nearby towns and counties, from New York, California and Canada. The condition now parallels the early months of 1946. It would take a metropolis to absorb the unskilled laborers who are trekking to Pampa, Fort says.

The bad weather prevailing has had an adverse effect on employment in the Pampa area. When good weather prevails, the unemployment problem will greatly diminish except for the transient laborers coming in, Fort estimates.

There are few skills among the immigrants, Fort says. A few ask for farm or ranch jobs. A majority of the men want truck driving jobs. Only a small percent have a commercial operator's license. All are seeking permanent jobs, they say.

A usual pattern for the transient worker is that he heard labor is needed here. This information usually comes from a friend or relative now employed in the area.

A 20-mile per hour north-northeast wind kicked up dust at Big Spring, in the South Plains, at 7:30 a. m. Snow had not yet reached there. At the same hour a freezing drizzle and fog were reported at Abilene where the temperature dropped from 33 to 27 in an hour.

Clouds overspread most of the state. Drizzling rains fell in East Texas as far south as Waco.

Brownsville, in the southern tip, had a balmy temperature of 85 at 7:30 a. m., with partly cloudy skies.

The Dallas Weather Bureau said the snowfall was so thick at Amarillo at 7:30 a. m. that visibility was cut to virtually zero. A 29-mile wind was blowing.

Conditions elsewhere at 7:30 included:

The heaviest snowfall this morning was in the northern tier of Panhandle counties.

The State Highway Department stationed crews near four-ways on highway U. S. 287 in the Panhandle to advise motorists not to attempt journeys to the north. Another crew was stationed in the Sunnett area.

James G. Lott, division engineer for the Highway Department at Amarillo, said snow was much heavier in the northern region and that visibility was at zero.

Lott expressed concern over the condition of all east-west highways, particularly U. S. 66.

"We always have more trouble from the east-west highways in a storm of this type," he said, "because drifting is more dangerous."
