The parade will form at S. Cuyler and Cravens streets at 2:30 p.m. Wesley Langham, with the local National Guard unit, will be parade marshal.



DR. HAROLD T. HYMAN A medical condition whose sig-

nificance is too often underestimated is phlebitis (flea-bite-is). In phlebitis, the wall of a vein becomes inflamed. It thus differs from a varicose vein which is merely a vessel that has become enlarged and zigzagy. That does not mean that the two conditions may not coexist. Indeed the varicose vein is more likely to become phlebitic than the nomal vessel.

Now the danger in an attack of phlebitis is in organs far from the site of the inflammatory process. Particularly the lungs! Let me explain how this comes

And the embolized area that depends on this vessel for its nutrition is in serious difficulties unless it can manage to satisfy its needs with blood divorted from surrounding areas (collateral circulation).
