AUSTIN—(AP)—Far West Texas is still dry and not getting any wetter.

The United States Geological Survey's water map for December shows low stream flow and ground water in a belt from the Pecos to Southern California, along the Mexican border.

January reports received thus far indicate no change.

The dry area extends from the upper Big Bend northward to central New Mexico, westward on the Pacific. Light rains in the area have not materially affected ground water reserves, the USGS said.

**WHAT'S AHEAD FOR PALESTINE—5  
JERUSALEM MAY PROVE MAJOR U. N. HEADACHE**

One of the major headaches of the United Nations in implementing the plan to partition Palestine will be the government of Jerusalem, long a chief trouble spot in the Holy Land. Under the partition plan, Jerusalem will be ruled by the U. N. as an international territory entirely independent of the proposed Jewish and Arab countries which are to be carved out of Palestine. While the governments of the projected new countries will be responsible for maintaining internal law and order within their respective territories, the U. N. itself will be solely responsible for preserving order in Jerusalem. The task of setting up a government for Jerusalem and supervising its operation was assigned to the U. N. Trusteeship Council. That body already has begun work on a statute, which will serve as a constitution for the international zone, and expects to have it ready by April 29, the deadline set by the General Assembly. The Council's major problem will be in actually setting up a government and security force which will be ready to take over when the British withdraw on or before Aug. 1. This problem is complicated by several factors. One is the fact that Russia, one of the chief supporters of the partition scheme, is boycotting the Trusteeship Council. This raises the question: will Russia continue to boycott the council or will she abandon her present policy and attend council meetings so she may have a hand in the government of Jerusalem?

Another difficulty is the fact that the international zone will be an enclave in the middle of one part of the projected Arab country. This means that all travel to and from Jerusalem must be across Arab territory. In the face of the present Arab hostility to the entire partition idea, this may prove difficult and hazardous even for U. N. officials. It might be next to impossible for Jews from the proposed Jewish country to visit Jerusalem. A third major difficulty is the divided population of Jerusalem. The U. N. will find the problem of Jewish and Arab residents with constant Arab-Jewish clashes within the city. This will make it essential for the U. N. to maintain a large security force continuously on the alert. Although the Trusteeship Council is responsible for the government of the international zone, the actual administration will be in the hands of a governor, chosen from some country outside Palestine. Five men have the chief responsibility for putting into effect the United Nations plan to partition Palestine. They are members of the U. N. Palestine Commission. They are: Per Federspiel of Denmark—Born in Berlin, 1906, and educated in England and Denmark. London correspondent to the Danish newspaper, Dagens Nyheder and later a member of the Danish delegation to the Hague on the legal status of East Greenland. Assistant state attorney for special affairs in the Knud Kristensen cabinet in 1945. Dr. Eduardo Morgan of Panama—Lawyer and newspaperman. Born in Wales, 1902. Self-educated. Circuit judge, minister of education in Panama, and owner of the newspaper, La Razon and Renovacion. Raul Diez de Medina of Bolivia—Journalist and diplomat. Born in 1909, educated at La Paz and Georgetown University, Washington, D. C. Wrote under the pen name Gaston Nerval. Served in the diplomatic service of his country at Lima, Peru, and Washington, where he now is minister counselor. In 1923 was Latin American editor of the Washington Evening Star. Karel Lisicky of Czechoslovakia—Born 1898, in Moravia, educated at Prague University and Strasbourg University. Spent most of adult life in diplomatic service including assignments in Paris, Washington and London. Where he was charge d'affaires in 1936. Became a member of the ministry of foreign affairs in 1941 and was a delegate to the U. N. Assembly in London and New York. Vincent J. Francisco of the Philippine Republic—Authority on criminal and author of several books on law. Majority floor leader of the Philippine senate and chairman of the Philippine senate committee on foreign relations.

Cars received from connections totaled 10,182 compared with 10,796 for the same week in 1947. Total cars moved were 32,870 compared with 36,879 for the same week in 1947. Santa Fe handled a total of 36,032 cars in preceding week of this year.

C., and Norman Von Nida of Sydney, Australia, one of Friday's leaders. Each had 134.

One of the toughest conference races in history looms next season. Most of the schools report large squads of hopeful candidates, plus a flock of lettermen.

Southern Methodist, undefeated, twice the defending champion, was among the hardest hit.

The Mustangs have only 17 lettermen back and not all of these will be on hand for spring practice.

Coach Matty Bell has excused players who participate in spring sports.

This include All-America, triple threat Donk Walker and a number of other squadmen.

Texas lost some good individual players, including the great Bobby Layne.

Texas Christian University, which didn't lose as much as it gained, may be the team to beat the title. Dutch Meyer's crew is loaded with talent.

Rice lost heavily by graduation and Texas A&M has a new coach, Harry Stiteler. The "Stiteler System" already has attracted a number of Texas high school football players, including the great Bobby Layne.

Arkansas lost only two first string men and has a number of promising freshmen and junior college transfers.

Baylor again is the darkhorse entry.

A survey of conference teams revealed this situation:

Southern Methodist opens spring training Feb. 16. Squad of 60 expected. Seventeen lettermen returning. Kyle Rote, all-state back or Thomas Jefferson (San Antonio) in 1946, most promising freshman.

Texas opens spring training Monday. Candidates galore, including plenty of seasoned men. Biggest problem is finding a replacement for passing star and quarterback Layne. Likely candidates are Paul Campbell, 170-pound junior; Bobby Lee, one-time Austin High backfield star, and Billy Allen, up from Freshman team. Bud McFadin, giant tackle, is only Freshman likely to make starting line-up. He'll be switched to left guard.

Texas Christian—opens spring training Monday. Squad of around 100 expected. Most lettermen in history, 31, returning. Pile-driving fullback Pete Stunt will captain team. Terrific line-in prospect. Also on hand is Lindy Berry, nifty runner, and capable passer. Best Freshman prospect is Frank Struska, 210-pound blocking back from Taylor.

Rice—opens spring training Monday. Squad of 60 expected. Eighteen lettermen back. Biggest gap at guard. Backfield one- of soundest in conference. Best Freshman prospect is Vernon Glenn Corpus Christi back; Paul Kiroski, Houston, tackle.

Arkansas—opening spring training Feb. 16. Squad of 75-80 expected. Twenty-three lettermen on hand. Lost only two first string men. Best Freshman prospects are Ray Parks, Eldorado, Buddy Rogers, Lake Village, under study for backfield star Clyde Scott, and Louie Schaefele, Little Rock, fullback.

Texas A&M—opens spring training Friday. Around 100 candidates expected. Seventeen lettermen back and two former lettermen, Jimmy Clashon and Bobby Goff.

Baylor—tentative date to open spring training March 8. Lettermen will be named Feb. 21. Prospects pretty much a question mark right now.

## Final Day of Winter Olympics Finds Americans in 2nd Place

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland—(AP)—Arguments and snow failed to stop the Americans yesterday as they pulled into second place in the winter Olympic games with a championship in the four-man bobsled race.

It was the United States No. 2 team, piloted by Francis Tyler of Lake Placid, N. Y., that streaked four times down the mile of sheer ice in the total time of five minutes, 20.1 seconds to add more gold medals and points to the American aggregate.

Only last night Tyler threatened to withdraw. Officials had ruled that all second runs yesterday were not to be counted because some of the teams had not been able to compete when a water main burst and flooded the tunnel of ice. He still was angry this morning.

The U. S. No. 1 team, guided by James Bickford of Saranac Lake, N. Y., was third.

Biggest feat of the day, however, was the somersault taken by the International Olympic Committee which restored hockey to Olympic program but added the U. S. Amateur Hockey Association team would not be awarded diplomas of competition. The Swiss had insisted all along that hockey was a part of the Olympics even though the IOC ruled it out in the squabble over U. S. representation.

In addition to Tyler's championship, other titles were:

Figure skating by pairs—by Melchiorine Lamoy and Pierre Baugnot of Belgium. Yvonne Sherman and Robert Swenning of New York, were fourth and the Kennedy children, Karol and Peter, of Seattle, Wash., were sixth.

Ski jumping—won by Peter Husted of Norway, Gordon Wren of Winter Park, Colo., took fifth place—the first time an American made ever scored a point in an Olympic ski event.

With only the hockey championship to be settled—Czechoslovakia is the leader followed by Canada, Switzerland, and the United States—the Associated Press scorecard, based on basis of 10-6-4-3-2-1 for the six places shows:

Sweden 79 points, United States 73, 14, Switzerland 73, Norway 69, Austria 51, Finland 49, France 39, Italy 28, Belgium 18, Canada 14, 14, Great Britain 13, Hungary 10, Holland 6, Czechoslovakia 5.

Only 14 of the 28 competing nations have scored in the competition that ends today.

The victory in the bobsledding gave the American team its third Olympic championships. Dick Button of Englewood, N. J., won one in men's figure skating and Mrs. Catechena Fraser of Vancouver, Wash., triumphed in the women's ski slalom.

Overall, this is the strongest showing the United States ever

## Two-Day Meet To Pick Texas' NAIB Entrants

FORT WORTH—(AP)—Texas' representatives in the National Association Intercollegiate Basketball tournament will be decided here in a two-day tournament, March 5-6.

Gus Miller, athletic director at West Texas State College and chairman of the Texas district for the NAIB, announced yesterday four teams would be eligible to participate.

The 32-team national tournament opens at Kansas City March 8 and lasts a week.

Ablene Christian College, which clinched the Texas Conference title, has already qualified for a spot in the tournament here.

Others to be invited are the champion of the Lone Star Conference, the Texas team which finishes highest in the Border Conference and the top ranking independent college.

Sam Houston State, East Texas State and North Texas State are all strong contenders for the Lone Star Conference title.

Texas teams eligible from the Border Conference include Texas Tech, Hardin-Simmons, Texas A&M, and West Texas State.

Independents eligible are Sul Ross, Texas Wesleyan, Texas A&I, St. Mary's (San Antonio), St. Edward's (Austin), and East Texas Baptist.

A committee composed of Miller, Coach Aiden Pasche, University of Houston, Coach R. M. Medley, Southwestern University, and Dab King, Fort Worth sports writer, will select the independent representative.

Miller said the season record and type of opposition would be factors in the consideration.

In case of a tie in the Lone Star Conference or between the independent and conference teams, has made in the winter Olympics. The Americans won at Lake Placid, N. Y., in 1932 but it was a hollow victory because the depression and travel distances cut sharply into European entries.

Aside from Layne, the only serious losses will be End Max Bumgardner and Guard Joe Magliolo.

Despite these losses, O'Leary isn't worried about next year's prospects.

"I'm optimistic about our team next fall but a lot depends upon the quarterback and right halfback positions," he says.

Jim Canady, regular right half, has decided to quit football, leaving only Bubba Shands and Randall Clay at that position.

Campbell has had two years of field generalship at the T-quarterback post. He is a better-than-average passer.

"Running behind Campbell will be Bobby Coy Lee, who learned his quarterbacking with the wartime Second Air Force team, and Bill Allen, quarterback of last season's Freshman team.

Aside from Layne, the only serious losses will be End Max Bumgardner and Guard Joe Magliolo.

Few industry sources look for much of a tumble in meat prices, because of scarce supplies. A. Z. Baker, president of the American Stock Yards Association, said meat prices are not likely to follow this week's path of grains.

Pickell said he was "convinced that with the lined supplies of hogs which will be available this spring hog prices will continue to range above \$25 a hundred pounds."

The Associated Press wholesale price index of 35 basic commodities slumped another 1.29 points Saturday to 193.68, after suffering the sharpest week to week drop since compilations were started in 1935. The Friday week to week decline was 7.82 points. A year ago the index was 169.34. The index uses 1926 prices as 100.

May wheat in Chicago closed at \$2.50-\$2.51 1-4, compared with its Jan. 16 peak of \$3.06 1-2 a bushel. Corn ended 8 cents lower—the permissible limit—to 1 cent higher, May \$2.15 5-8; oats were 2 1-4 to 4 1-8 higher, May \$1.04 to \$1.04 1-2, and all soybeans were offered eight cents lower—the daily limit—without attracting any bids. 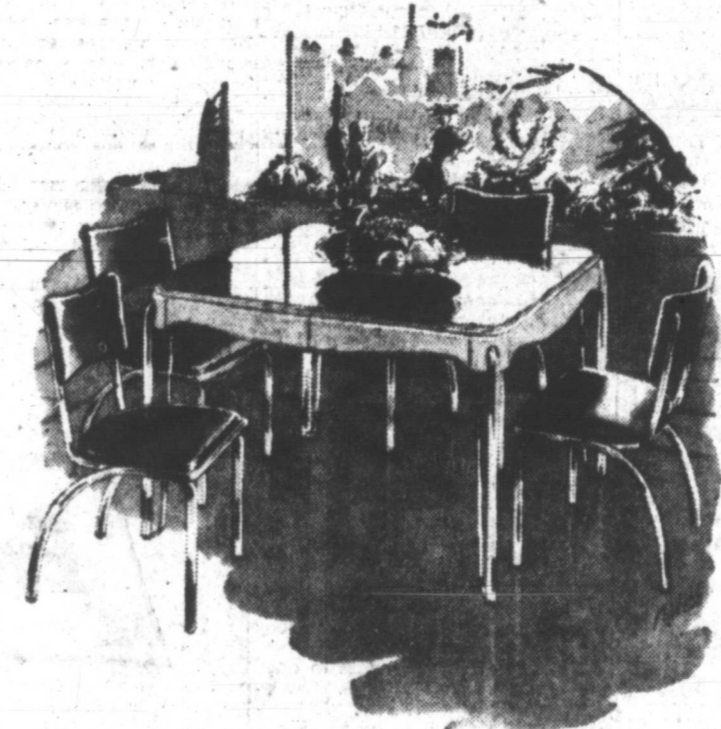

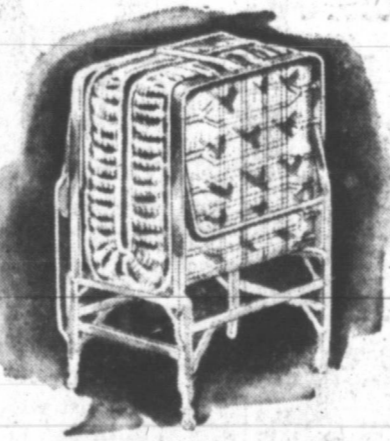

**Tar and Feather Threat of Klan Defied by Coach**

LAKEVIEW, Ga. (AP)—A threat to tar and feather left a coach and a high school principal calm, unfrightened and ready to shoot it out with the Ku Klux Klan.

And when hooded Klanmen burned a cross in front of Coach Walter Bowland's home on Jan. 16 while he was away, his pregnant wife kicked over the fiery symbol and called the masked riders "yellow cowards."

He said he had appealed to Sheriff Jim Moreland of Caloosa County for protection but had been refused.

Bowland said he had collected three shotguns, an automatic rifle, ammunition and a blackjack to meet future Klan demonstrations. "I may get shot, but if they come into my yard and threaten me I am going to shoot some of them," he added.

Principal John B. Burks, ordered to get Bowland out of town or face tar and feathers himself, had this to say:

"I have a pistol and ammunition. If they come to my house making threats I am going to shoot someone."

Pretty Mrs. Bowland's comment: "Now just who do they think they're scaring?"

**Trailers on Block; Vets Get First Bids**

SAN ANTONIO (AP)—A total of 74 house trailers, 16 of them of the expandable type, will be offered for sale to World War II veterans on a spot-bid basis at Corpus Christi Feb. 20, officials of the San Antonio regional WAA office announced Thursday.

The trailers, although equipped with gas stoves, ice boxes, sinks, tables, chairs, divans and electric wiring, lack running gears. The successful bidders will be required to arrange to truck them away from the site within 10 days after purchase.

Inspection of the trailers in Corpus Christi can be made Feb. 19.

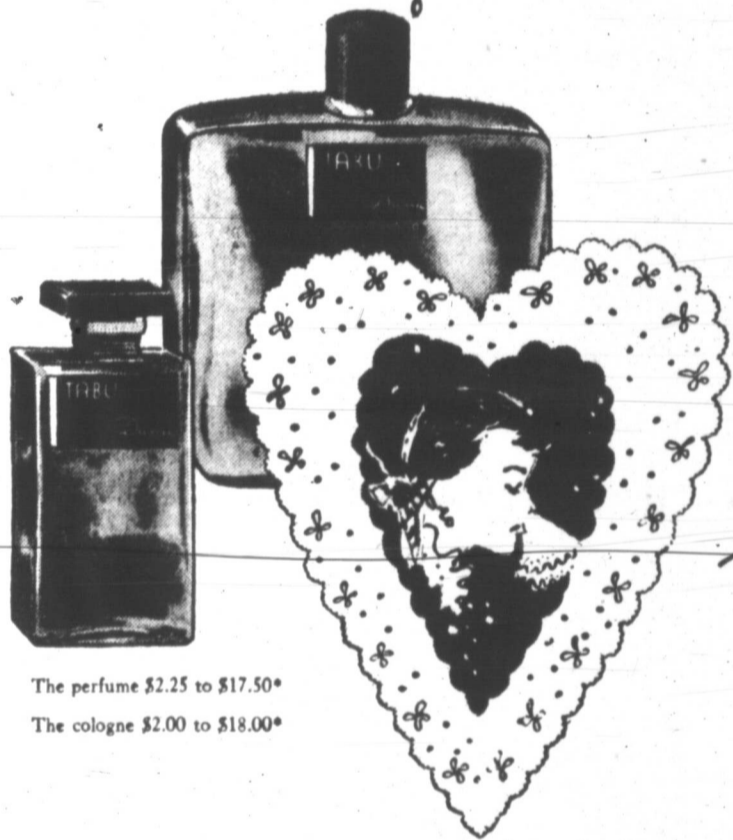

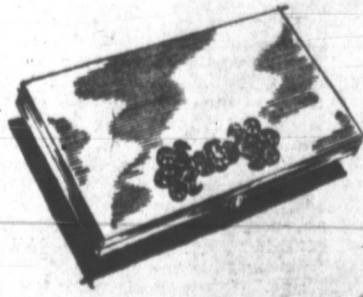

### 1947 Home Fatalities Lead Auto Deaths

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's toll from accidents in 1947, says the National Safety Council, was 100,000 killed, 10,500,000 injured and \$6,700,000,000 economic loss. There was a general increase in

accidental deaths of all kinds—except traffic mishaps—as compared to 1946. Home accidents led, displacing traffic, traditional No. 1 leader. The council said one out of every 14 persons in the country suffered a disabling injury last year.

### Cosmic Ray Samples Hunted by Clippers

JOHANNESBURG (AP)—A small sealed package of photographic plates was carried in a Pan-American Airways clipper that arrived from New York. It had already made two trips from New York to Calcutta, and will make another trip to New York and back to South Africa, and two to London.

When it is unwrapped by physicists of the Chicago University Institute for Nuclear Research the plates are expected to contain information of vital importance in cosmic ray research.

Cosmic ray particles, when traversing photographic emulsion, leave tracks. Even the weight and speed of the particles are clearly shown.

The possibilities of this new type of induced radio-activity were shown by H. E. Huntley of Wilwatersand University, who deposited photographic plates 11,100 feet up in the Drakensburg mountains in Natal, and obtained pictures of cosmic rays smashing a glass atom.

Atom smashing by cosmic rays cannot be controlled as in the man-made article. Its projectiles have vastly greater energies than the artificial product. To get the full force of cosmic radiation it is necessary to be above the blanket of the earth's atmosphere.

Director Moses Smith of the Denver mint said Thursday the initials are those of John Sinnock, an engraver at the Philadelphia mint where all coin dies are made. The Roosevelt dime die was the last one Sinnock made before his death, Smith said.

The initials of the engraver are put on all dies, Smith said, to make counterfeiting more difficult.

### Farm Prices at Highest Peak

AUSTIN (AP)—Record high prices were received by Texas farmers for many commodities, particularly meat animals and grains, during January.

The United States Department of Agriculture, reporting on mid-month prices as of January 15, said sharp advances were registered for meat animals. Price increase for grains were "more moderate."

Cotton, cottonseed and livestock products were exceptions, their prices declining slightly. Citrus prices dropped sharply.

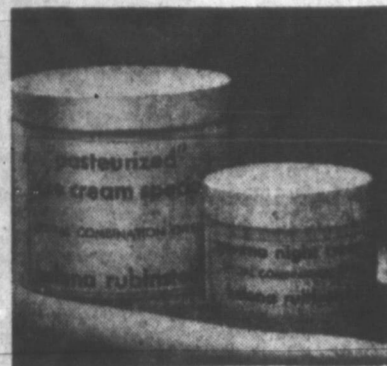

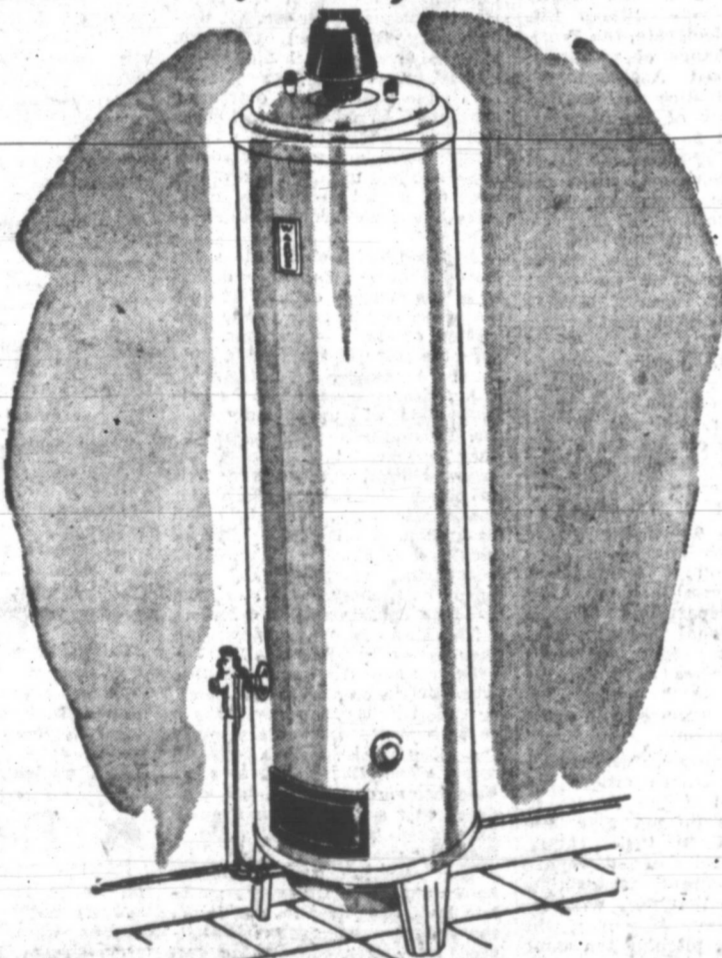

**Skelton Reviews Texas Oil News**

By MAX B. SKELTON  
HOUSTON — (AP) — Two Texans, one a state official and the other an independent oil operator, have advised Congress that fair prices and adequate steel supplies and not governmental price control are the answers needed for solving the nation's unprecedented demand for petroleum products. Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, and Glenn H. McCarthy, Houston independent oilman, made vigorous protests against governmental controls in testifying before the Senate Banking and Currency Committee. Said Thompson: "If price is let alone for free play and steel is made available, we will have plenty of oil from new discoveries." McCarthy said: "Given a fair price and a chance to buy pipe and equipment, the nation's independents will discover and develop reserves untold for our nation's economy and defense." World Oil's 1948 petroleum industry forecast predicts that 34,811 new wells will be drilled in the United States this year with a total footage of 119,357,000 feet, the figures representing an increase of approximately 5 percent over 1947 operations. Other predictions: Exploratory wells for 1948 will exceed those of 1947 by 10 percent. Texas will drill 10,676 new wells, as compared with 9,287 in 1947, with footage amounting to 47,413,000 feet as compared with 1947's 40,680,963. The new year will see construction of 10,000 miles of pipeline, including crude oil, gas and products lines. Last year, 7,945 miles of line were built, with \$2,257 million authorized by companies and approved by the Federal Power Commission at the end of the year. It is estimated 14,628 miles more line is under consideration but not yet authorized by the commission. More than half the lines completed last year and under construction in 1948 are gas lines.

The Navy Department has loaned 4,200,000 gallons of fuel oil to New York State and City to help ease the winter fuel shortage and negotiations are under way for loan of an additional 8,400,000 gallons. The Annual Federal Tax Forum of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association will be held in Fort Worth, April 27-28. After hitting new record highs for three straight weeks, crude oil output for the nation declined 18,000 barrels to a daily average of 5,318,287 for the week ending January 31, as compared with 4,650,150 a year earlier. Texas fields remained unchanged at 2,385,700, the American Petroleum Institute reported. The State Supreme Court, in affirming a lower court judgment declaring a Railroad Commission's oil well drilling permit as invalid, has ruled that a commission finding will be sustained if "reasonably supported by substantial evidence." The Bureau of Mines has reported that stocks of domestic and foreign crude petroleum totaled 221,915,000 barrels as of January 24, a net decrease of 26,000.

**Four Completions Reported in Area**

Four new oil wells were completed in this area during the past week according to a report from the Oil and Gas Office of the Railroad Commission. All of these completions reported were in Hutchinson County. Three new gas completions were also reported; one in Gray County, one in Hutchinson County, and one in Sherman County. **Officials Point to Socialism Danger In Rail Industry**

CHICAGO — The railroad industry is the door through which socialism threatens to come to the United States, C. E. Johnston, of Chicago, chairman of the Western Association of Railway Executives, warns in an article in the current issue of "Traffic World" magazine.

After setting forth statistics showing that the railroads over a period of 25 years have not been permitted to "earn more than a meager and wholly inadequate return" insufficient to provide improvements and pay dividends, Johnston observes that "if and when the railroads fail to be self-supporting, their acquisition by the government will be inevitable, since the country cannot possibly survive without rail transportation."

"Most informed students of the subject believe that if the railroads are allowed to fall into government ownership," the article continues, "the same fate ultimately will overtake all other basic industries and public utilities just as it is happening in England today. That, of course, is socialism and it might well be the forerunner of communism and dictatorship—the ultimate punishment for failure to handle a fundamental economic problem courageously and soundly, and in time."

The financial stability of the railroad industry is very definitely threatened, Johnston wrote, as a result of the accumulating effect of several factors during the past 25 years.

"As a public utility engaged in interstate commerce," he said, "railroads are subject to continuing and minute regulation by a federal agency, the Interstate Commerce Commission, in almost all matters pertaining to their operation. Probably the most important exception is in connection with the matter of wages and working conditions of employees, and those, too, are influenced greatly, and often determined by the action of boards and bureaus of the government."

Other factors whose influence has been felt in the period since World War I, are the accelerated growth of competing forms of transportation, and the subsidies granted these competitors by government, federal and state, and the depression of the 30's. "The record shows that the public has enjoyed a railroad transportation service for the past 25 years with an inadequate return to investors in railroad property and in many instances with a complete loss of their holdings through bankruptcy proceedings."

"No form of free enterprise can survive under such conditions. The public, if it honestly believes in the free enterprise system, should expect and be willing to pay freight and passenger rates all that is required to produce the highest quality of rail service, including a fair return on investment."

Discussing capitalization of the railroads, Johnston said that the several valuations issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission have all been greater than the net capitalization of the carriers as a whole, thus removing any possible basis for the claim that the railroads collectively are over-capitalized.

"Using the Commission's estimate of \$20,662,713,588, which is \$1,926,263,743 below the net investment of the carriers, a return of 4 percent annually reflected in net operating income would amount to \$1,237,363,000. The actual net operating income of Class I railroads for the 25-year period 1922 to 1946 averaged \$397,231,500 per year below a 4-percent return."

"One appraisal of the long-range effect of the commission's administration of the rate provisions of the Interstate Commerce Act may be obtained by a review of the railroad bank policies. The peak was reached in 1939 when 75,028 miles of Class I railroads were operated by receivers or trustees. This was 33.8 percent of the 220,918 miles of road owned by Class I railroads on December 31, 1939. Since then many of these railroads have been reorganized with great loss to investors in rail securities."

"It cannot be truthfully said that an unreasonable amount of money has been appropriated from earnings over the 25-year period for payment of dividends. For every dollar paid out in dividends during the period, two dollars were put back into the property for improvements."

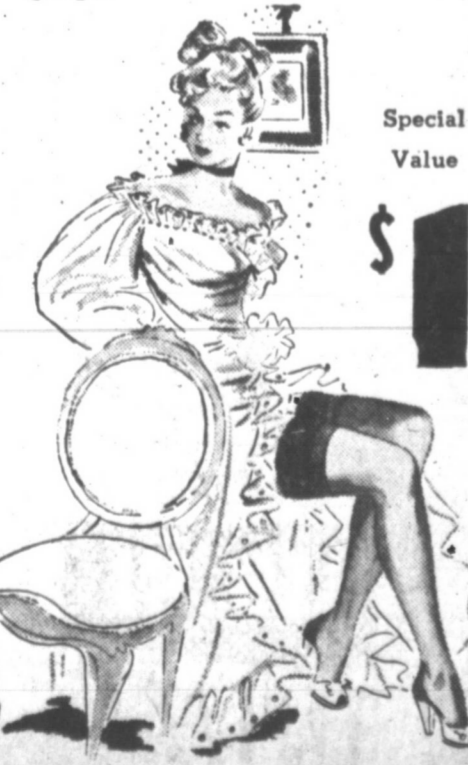
