1,300 Suits Filed In Wake Of Year-Old Price-Fixing Convictions

just one year ago today that a federal judge in Philadelphia sentenced 29 electrical equipment companies for criminal price-fixing and lifted the lid on a Pandora's Box of legal actions by customers to recover millions in alleged overcharges.

It is estimated that more than 1,300 suits have been filed around the country to date by the governnicipalities, rural electrical cooperatives and other electrical equipment buyers, and the end. still is not in sight. The suits have been brought by about 300

A large proportion of these suits have been filed in federal district courts since Jan. 1 in an apparent move by the plaintiffs to ensure their qualifying for a year of grace statute of limitations. Damages otherwise may only be recovered for actions that occurred in the four-year period prior to the filing of a suit.

The convictions that carried fines totaling nearly \$2 million resulted from a Justice Department conspiracy indictment that charged the companies with rigging bids and fixing prices on \$7

All the suits are seeking triple the amount of the alleged overpricing as the law permits. However, no estimate of the millions involved can be made since most of the plaintiffs have asked the courts to assess the amount of any

However, some suits have asked for specific damages ranging from several thousand dollars to as high as \$70 million in the case of four operating subsidiaries of Middle South Utilities against 24 of the electrical companies.

None of the suits has come to trial and it likely will be a year before the first trial starts. In many cases trials may be four to five years away. Legal sources

cite the sheer bulk of the suits

involved and the resulting strain on pre-trial machinery.

The major electrical equipment firms now under legal fire are General Electric, New York; Westinghouse Electric, Pittsburgh; Allis-Chalmers, Milwaukee; McGraw Edison, Elgin, Ill.; Federal Pacific Electric, Newark, N.J., and I-T-E Circuit Breaker, Philadelphia. In no suit are all the 29 companies named.

The Justice Department, acting on behalf of the Tennessee Valley Authority, led off the flood of antitrust suits in an action last March in Philadelphia seeking more than \$12 million in alleged damages. This was quickly followed up by another series of suits which can be amended to include a damage figure after the government goes over its books.

The possibility of a "sunken" saloon being built in the wall of the chasm figured prominently in a House debate Monday on a bill involving mineral rights in the Grand Canyon National Park.

It seems that 20 acres in the middle of the park are owned by a private company. Four of the acres are horizontal, and the other 16 are perpendicular.

The National Park Service would like very much to get title to this Duncan land. Its desire was whetted some months ago by a report that the Barnes company planned to adorn the property with a resort hotel and cocktail lounge.



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

Peace Officers Seeking Clues In Torso Deaths

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HOUSTON (UPI)-A meeting of peace officers from four stater was suggested today as a possible means of unravelling mysterious torso murders in Texas, New Mexico, Georgia and Florida.

Texas Ranger Capt. Eddie Oliver of Houston said no new clue : had turned up after an unusual laundry code mark was found or a brown woolen jacket found with the torso of a woman found Saturday in San Jacinto County north of Houston,

Oliver said there had been some talk of a meeting of peace officers from the four states, but nothing definite had been decided.

"If such a meeting could be arranged at some convenient place, believe we should be able to learn something useful by comparing notes in the different killings," Oliver said.

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
