

# Dr. Tom Dooley, Famed Jungle Physician, Dies Of Cancer

NEW YORK (UPI)—Thomas A. Dooley, dynamic jungle doctor whose hospital in Laos made him "the good American" to thousands of Southeast Asians, died Wednesday night of cancer one day after his 34th birthday.

Dooley, a co-founder of Medico, Inc., which offers medical care for primitive peoples throughout the world, died at 9:40 p.m. EST. He had undergone surgery for chest cancer in August 1959 here and had been discharged as apparently cured. But a recurrence developed in late 1960 after he returned to his Laotian village for the work which has inspired scores of other Americans to follow his footsteps.

Dooley, who re-entered the hospital here Dec. 27, suffered a great deal from pain in his lower spine where the cancer had spread and was under almost constant sedation. Besides family members, the only person permitted to see him was Francis Cardinal Spellman who visited Dooley on his birthday Tuesday and drew from him his broadest smile since entering the hospital.

"I tried to assure him that in his 34 years he had done what few have done in the allotted scriptural span," Cardinal Spellman said on leaving the hospital. President Eisenhower also sent Dooley a birthday telegram, saying, "It must be a source of heartfelt gratification to realize that in so few years you have accomplished so much for the good of distant peoples and have inspired so many others to work for all humanity."

Dooley's jungle hospital in Mount Sing close to the Communist Chinese border in strife-torn Laos was established after he and Dr. Peter D. Comanduras of Washington, D.C., set up Medico in 1958.

Dooley, a bachelor, worked up to 20 hours a day trying to bring the medical standards of his village "from the 15th Century to the 20th Century" but he still found time to raise more than \$1 million for Medico by writing, lecturing and fund-raising programs. He worked right up to the time he entered the hospital for the organization.

Medico now has 17 projects in 12 underdeveloped nations. The announcement of Dooley's death was delayed until early this morning to permit notification of his family.

Malcolm Dooley, a brother, said that the body would be taken immediately to the Arthur Donnelly Funeral Home in St. Louis, the doctor's native city. He will lie in state at St. Louis Cathedral where Mass will take place. Burial will be in the family plot at Calvary Cemetery.

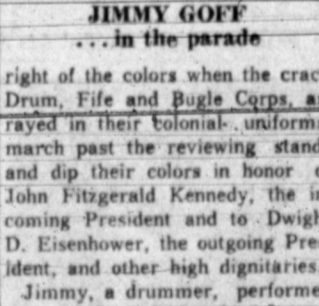

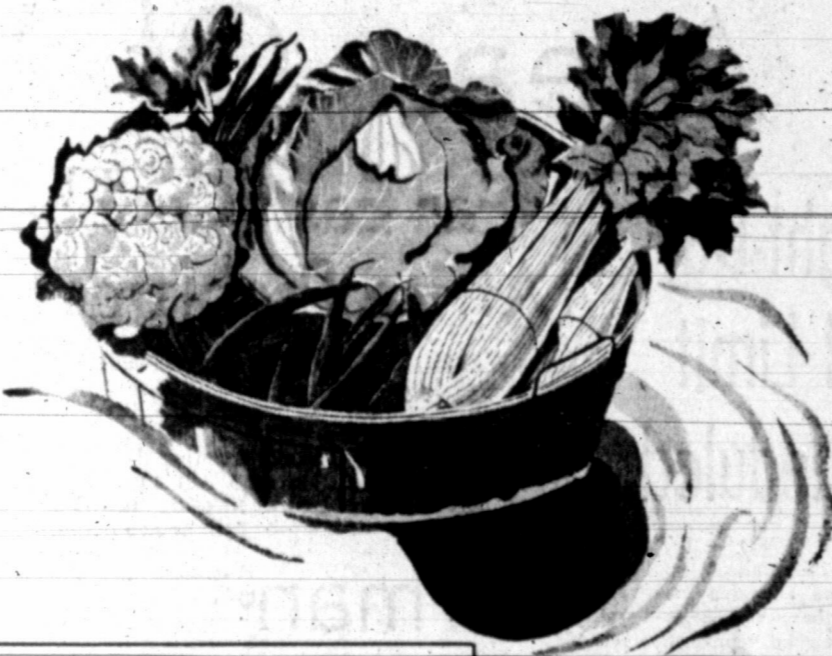

# Japanese Toll In A-Bomb Drop Still Unknown

TOKYO (UPI)—More than 15 years have passed since the first atomic bombs plunged down on the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

To this day no one really knows how many persons died in the blasts, the first and only instances of atomic power being used in war. Perhaps no one will ever know.

Difference in official Japanese casualty figures from official American figures for Hiroshima alone were more than 300,000.

Almost every office queried in Japan discloses different A-bomb death figures.

The Japanese Welfare Ministry said 260,000 persons died in Hiroshima and that 163,263 either were missing or died later from bomb effects.

Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur's headquarters, however, officially announced that 78,150 persons were killed and 13,083 were missing.

The Welfare ministry said its figures included an estimated 70,000 Japanese soldiers who were in Hiroshima when the first A-bomb was dropped Aug. 6, 1945.

But because all records were destroyed, no one knows for sure exactly how many servicemen were in the city.

The Japan Society Against the Atomic and Hydrogen Bombs, a leftist-inclined organization which has long campaigned against nuclear weapons, said it believes the Welfare Ministry's figures are "most accurate."

But the Atomic Bomb Casualty Commission (ABCC) disagreed.

The ABCC set the death toll at Hiroshima at 79,000.

There was more agreement on the Nagasaki death toll.

The Japanese Welfare Ministry said 73,884 persons were killed and 74,000 were missing after the Nagasaki bomb Aug. 9, 1945.

The official American figure also is 73,884 killed.

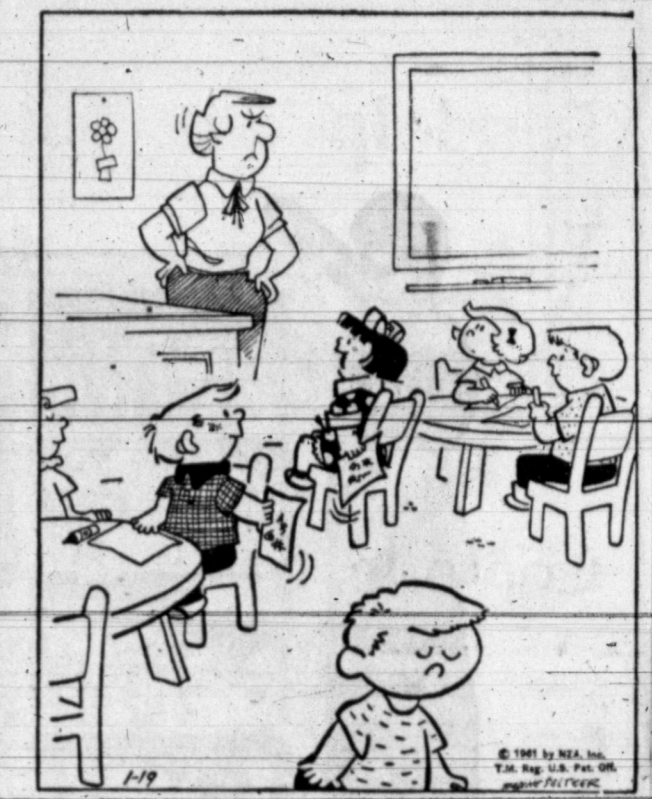

# Soil Conservation Service Has Suggestions On Land Leveling

Recent planning for land leveling in the Gray County Soil Conservation District has been done on Paul Bruce's farm north of Alameda. The topographic survey has been made, the system has been designed, and construction should get under way shortly.

G. W. Shaffer and Bill Bralley also plan to do land leveling on their farms located on Highway 66, according to Soil Conservation officials. They have irrigated the fields in the past but need land leveling for better water distribution and for more efficient water use.

The installation of an irrigation system often involves several steps which should be followed in sequence. These steps usually are water supply, soil profile, climate, crops to be grown, methods of irrigation, layout and construction.

The supply of water is very important. The amount of available water must be sufficient to irrigate the entire field. It should also be of good quality so it will not be harmful to the crop and should not be at such depth as to make irrigation unfeasible.

The profile of the soil should be known to determine the maximum depth the soil can be cut without seriously affecting the agricultural production. Shallow soils often restrict the design of the system.

The climate of an area may also limit the design. An area often places certain limits on slope to prevent erosion from rainfall or to provide adequate drainage. The crops to be grown will affect the irrigation methods selected. Intensively cultivated crops such as vegetables may justify very expensive leveling costs while that of hay or wheat would warrant a smaller investment.

A topographic survey is made of the field to be leveled. This is usually necessary to determine the irrigation system to be used. The entire field may be leveled or it may be leveled in benches. Prior to leveling a farm irrigation system must be planned so that the location of the field boundaries, irrigation water-supply system, drains, and field roads are known.

Before leveling, the field should be cleared of all trash. The field will be staked, usually at 100 ft. intervals, showing the amount to excavate or fill.

The equipment used for land leveling usually consists of a dozer, carry-all, grader, and land plane. A carry-all is needed where large amounts of dirt need to be moved over fairly long distances.

# Historic Ceremony Due Tomorrow

At 12 noon Friday a ceremony will take place in front of the Capitol Building of the United States. It will be viewed with great interest by the Communists in all parts of the world with the hope of possibly detecting some weakness which can be exploited.

People from all over the nation are here for several days before and after the short ceremony which will make Private Citizen Eisenhower out of President Eisenhower, and President Kennedy out of Senator Kennedy, there will be many celebrations and ceremonies and the Nation's capital will be crowded to overflowing. Already, the tickets to all of the ceremonies have been exhausted, hotel rooms have been sold out for months for a radius of 50 miles around Washington; the transportation facilities both within the city and moving in and out of the city will be sorely taxed to meet the demands. The inaugural ceremony itself will be viewed by thousands. But many more thousands who would like to view it will be disappointed. There will just simply not be enough room to accommodate all of those who would like to attend. One of the reasons for this is the fact that this ceremony is held at the East Front of the Capitol. The site of the Capitol was chosen by George Washington. It was determined at that time that the Capitol should face the confluence of the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers. Across from the East Front of the Capitol is the Library of Congress and the Supreme Court Building. The East Front is flanked by the House Office Buildings and the Senate Office Buildings. Although there is a large space within the confines of these buildings, it would be difficult, if not impossible, to view that place where the President will be sworn except from a limited area. It has been my feeling that if the ceremonies were held on the west side of the Capitol, which is that portion of the Capitol viewed from downtown Washington and the side of the Capitol on which the White House is located, many more people could be accommodated. For instance, there is a mall extending from the Capitol Building itself for many blocks to the Washington Monument and on to the Lincoln Memorial. The west side of the Capitol is by far the most beautiful side and many people have thought that it was the front of the Capitol because of its imposing beauty. The Inaugural Ceremony, if held on that side of the Capitol, could be so arranged that thousands more people could witness it in person.

Some people ask why the front of the Capitol was so arranged that it faces away from the city of Washington proper and the White House. There are several stories in answer to this query, but the one that has appeared to me to be most plausible is the following. It seems that at the time it was determined (as before mentioned) to face the Capitol toward the confluence of the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers, some land grabbers who had inside information immediately moved in and bought up all of the land between the river-fronts and the Capitol Building and boosted the price so high that it was almost prohibitive. In retaliation, the people moved into that area between the back of the Capitol and the White House, much of which was semi-swampland. This was filled and made usable. It is in this area that the business district of the city of Washington is presently located, as well as many government buildings, including the Smithsonian Institution, Treasury, Department of Justice, The Archives, Labor Department, Department of

## Norwegian Nazi-Baiter Gained Success After Fleeing Homeland

MIDDLEBURY, Conn. (UPI)—Time is probably more important to Joachim Lehmkuhl than it is to a lot of other persons.

For one thing, he is president of U.S. Time Corporation, a firm that produces one out of three of the 21 million wrist watches marketed annually in this country.

And 20 years ago, Lehmkuhl made a dramatic race against time — fleeing the Nazi invaders of his Norwegian homeland.

Lehmkuhl was a radio equipment manufacturer in Oslo and board chairman of the anti-Nazi newspaper, "Tiliden Tegn," when the Germans invaded Norway on April 9, 1940. At 6 a.m. that day, Lehmkuhl, his wife and four children began their perilous escape.

In the best tradition of a Hollywood movie suspense thriller, the family trekked over the high mountains to the west coast on skis. From there, they traveled north, crossing fjords and more mountains by various boats, foot, truck and horse. They hid by day and moved by night.

They were picked up in a life boat in the North Sea and finally arrived at the Orkneys. A few weeks later they were on their way to New York aboard a Cunard liner.

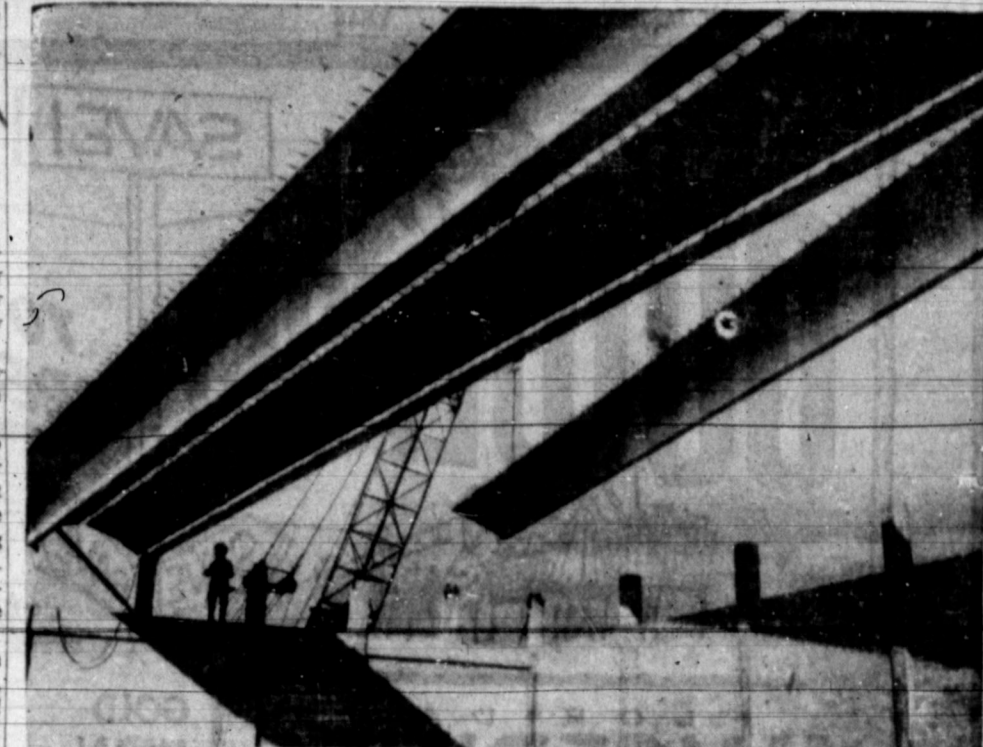
In this country, Lehmkuhl got into war work, joining the old Waterbury Clock Company here, where, with government support, he directed construction of a 120,000 square-foot plant. It was built in 82 days, despite "expert" opinion it couldn't be finished in less than 120 days. The company made time fuses for the allied war effort.

In two years, Lehmkuhl became president of the company.

After the war, he decided to use the company's facilities to produce a revolutionary new timepiece — a quality product that could compete with low-cost imports from Switzerland and Germany. It took three years to come up with the watch, called Timex. In the meantime the company changed its name to U.S. Time Corp.

Today the timepieces are produced in three U.S. factories. There are wholly-owned subsidiary plants in Scotland, France, and Germany.

Lehmkuhl recalled he went ahead with the watch venture, despite predictions of failure, because he was inspired to make it

# Space Weapons Pose Great Threat To U.S.

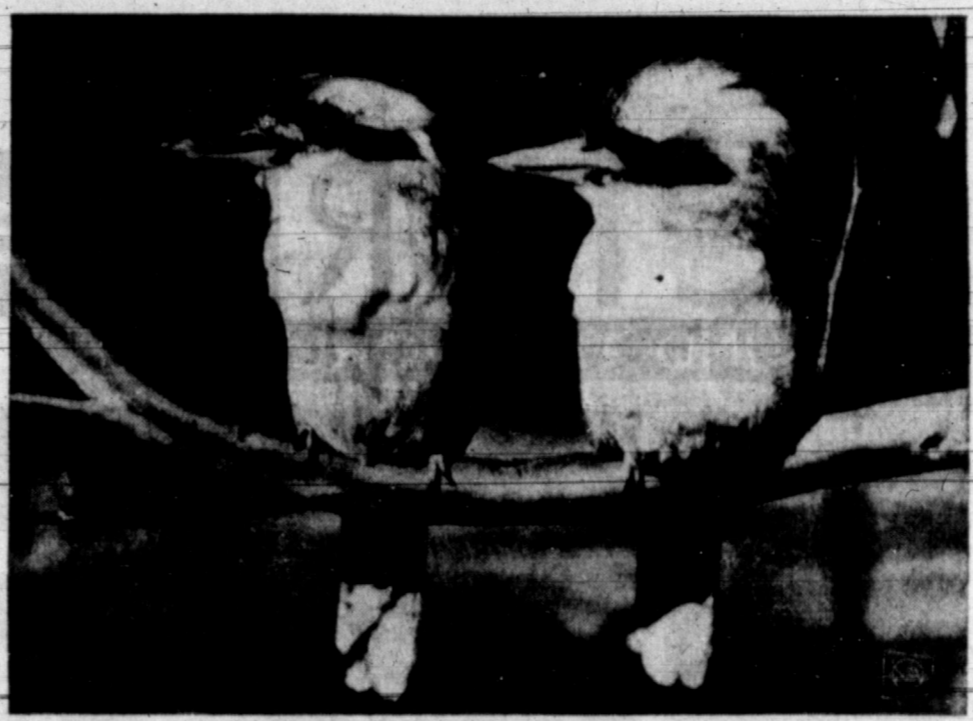

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — A millennial friend of mine whose name in headlines during World War II was thinking out loud the evening. This is what he thought: "The greatest danger our country faces today," he means exactly that.  This, then, is something for the citizens of the United States to consider and about which they should inform themselves. Joseph L. Myler is the very competent writer and reporter who 'experts' for United Press International the news of the atom.

**IT'S THE LAW**

 Legal trouble is easier and cheaper to prevent than to cure. Most wage earning, childbearing, home-buying, installment paying families don't see much need for a family lawyer.  
 Often under prodding, one may get a lawyer to write a will.  
 But can you tell a big legal risk from a small one? Can you spot the signs of legal trouble?  
 Check with your family lawyer when:

1. Your status changes upon coming of age, marriage, the birth of your children, buying a house, divorce or death. For you may then need to draft or revise your will, change your insurance, or refigure your taxes.
2. You buy or sell. Look out for flaws in the papers before you go into debt, part with money, or sign anything involving big expenditures or long term obligations.
3. You enter into other contracts. Promises, spoken or written, bind you if they call for a "consideration," something of value in return.
4. Someone threatens your rights. The law exists to defend them but with some rights you must take action yourself for them to work for you.  
 When you can bring your lawyer "live" facts (e.g. unsigned contracts, vexing tax returns you haven't filed), he can do much more for you, and at a smaller cost than when you bring him "cold" facts (mistakes you have made which threaten trouble).  
 But above all, get both live and cold facts to him at once. For time may run out in many such situations. Your lawyer may be able to do something for you today, which he cannot do tomorrow.  
 Tell your lawyer what you want. Tell him all the facts, good or bad, and then keep him informed all along. He is sworn to keep what you tell in confidence, and he cannot serve you well without full knowledge.

## Foreign Commentary

 PARIS (UPI)—In the sprawling, gray stone Quai D'Orsay along the left bank of the Seine, French Foreign Ministry officials watched carefully the anti-French speeches delivered at the meeting of African neutrals in Casablanca, Morocco.  
 For France, although preoccupied now with President Charles de Gaulle's supreme effort to restore peace to Algeria, still is not so preoccupied but that she does not keep a sensitive finger on the pulse of other events in Africa where her interests still are huge.  
 One reported incident at Casablanca especially created a certain wry amusement.  
 It came when a Moroccan representative denounced French atomic tests in "our" Sahara.  
 Ferhat Abbas, premier of the Algerian rebel provincial government, begged his pardon. The desert, he said, was Algerian.  
 The French, begging no one's pardon, say that particular stretch of Sahara is French and will remain so.  
 France looks to Saharan oil and minerals for help in restoring her to a place among the world's great powers. Morocco, Tunisia, Mauritania and the Algerian rebels all look with equal longing at these riches and each has claimed them.  
 But as De Gaulle leads Algeria toward an independent future which he hopes also will include close ties with France, there is no intent on the part of the French to give up the Sahara where they have invested hundreds of millions of dollars and which just now is beginning to pay off.  
 The independent Algeria which De Gaulle foresees includes only the fertile belt running about 200 miles back from the Mediterranean. The Saharan departments will be administered as always from Paris.  
 Western observers were not popular at the Casablanca meeting where heads of state of Morocco, Egypt, Ghana, Guinea, Mali and Libya conducted their sessions in secret and allowed to leak to reporters only that which seemed most advantageous.  
 Unpublished in the final communiqué but believed here to have been among secret agreements was one for a boycott of France in an effort to force recognition of the Algerian rebel regime.  
 However, this was believed more psychological than real and no date was set for when it should take effect.

## Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — Clark, Dodge & Co. notes renewed speculative interest in the rail group, suggesting that the time to establish trading positions is here or close at hand.  
 This interest, the firm said, has pushed many individual issues well up from their 1960 lows, even though the nearby outlook is still quite bleak and there are few tangible signs of an upturn in carloadings, revenues or earnings.  
 Noting that in the early stages of business recovery, biggest profits in rail shares abound among the lowest quality issues, Clark, Dodge said those who prefer to wait until the business news actually turns favorable will probably have to pay higher prices for such equities.  
 It lists as current good values in the quality group Santa Fe, C&O, Kansas City Southern, Illinois Central, Norfolk & Western and Union Pacific. In the speculative category it picks New York Central and Chicago & North Western common or preferred.

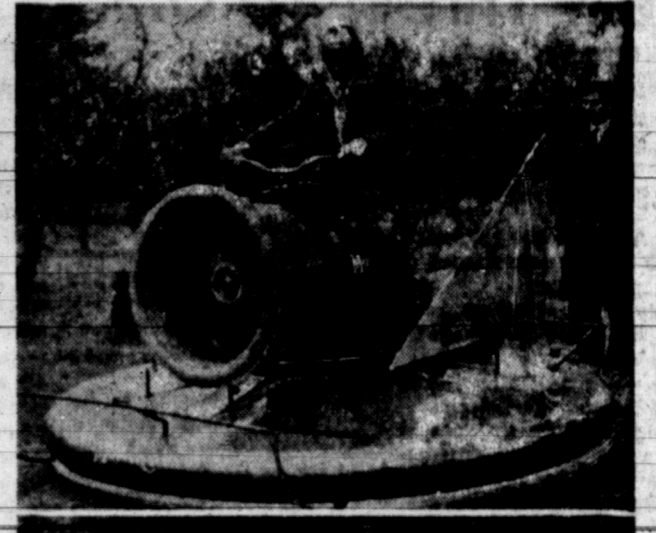

**3 Major Auto Firms Had New Presidents During The Last Year**

By LLOYD NORTHAARD...  
 DETROIT (UPI)—Three of the five major U.S. auto companies named new presidents during 1960 and two of the newcomers held the jobs for two months or less. William C. Newberg succeeded L. L. Colbert as president of Chrysler Corp. in late April and was deposed two months later because of his holdings in two outside-supplier firms. Colbert assumed the dual responsibility of board chairman and president after the Newberg ouster.  
 Robert S. McNamara was the second short-term president of Ford. He was named president of Ford Motor Co. in November and accepted appointment as secretary of defense in the cabinet of President-elect John F. Kennedy early in December.  
 McNamara sold all of his stock in Ford to avoid any possible conflict of interest and resigned his auto post effective Jan. 1.  
 Ford, like Chrysler, returned to a common board chairman-president.  
 Henry Ford II was elevated to chairman of the board in July, 1960, with the resignation of Ernest R. Breech from that post, and held both the board chairmanship and presidency from July to November.  
 He reassumed the dual responsibility upon McNamara's departure.  
 Studebaker-Packard Corp. named a new president in the final week of 1960.  
 Sherwood H. Egbert, who had been vice president of McCulloch Corp., Los Angeles, was named to succeed Harold E. Churchill at the South Bend, Ind., auto firm.  
 Top-level changes were also frequent in the automotive divisions.  
 Lee A. Iacocca was named vice president and general manager of the Ford division at the same time McNamara took over as president of the company. Iacocca succeeded James O. Wight who became group vice president in charge of car and truck divisions.  
 The Cadillac motor car division of General Motors Corp. also named a new general manager, Harold G. Warner. He took over from James M. Roche who became vice president in charge of GM's distribution staff.  
 Dodge division of Chrysler also changed general managers during 1960. Matthew C. Patterson re-

turned and was succeeded by Byron J. Nichols.  
 GM and American Motors Corp. were the only U.S. auto firms which didn't change presidents during the past year. John F. Gordon continued as president of GM and George Romney as president of American Motors.  
 But GM had nine changes at the vice president level, including four new vice presidents, and American Motors named three new vice presidents.  
 Studebaker-Packard added four new vice presidents to its executive roster during the year. Iacocca was the only new vice president named by Ford in 1960.  
 And Chrysler, despite its summer-long conflict-of-interest probe, added no new vice presidents during the year.

**PROMOTE RELATIONS**  
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Samuel Stratton, D-N.Y., has suggested that President-elect John F. Kennedy invite the presidents of Central and South American republics to meet in Washington later this year to promote cordial relations.  
 Such a meeting, Stratton said Monday, would enable Kennedy to capitalize on a "tremendous feeling of friendliness" toward him in Latin America.

**HIGHWAY REPORT**  
 WASHINGTON (BPI) — The Bureau of Public Roads says there is a definite indication that heavier truck-trailers should be having a larger share of the cost of building federally aided highways.  
 In a 550-page report summarizing 4½ years of research, the bureau suggested Monday that federal excise taxes on heavy truck-trailer combinations and trucks might be increased.

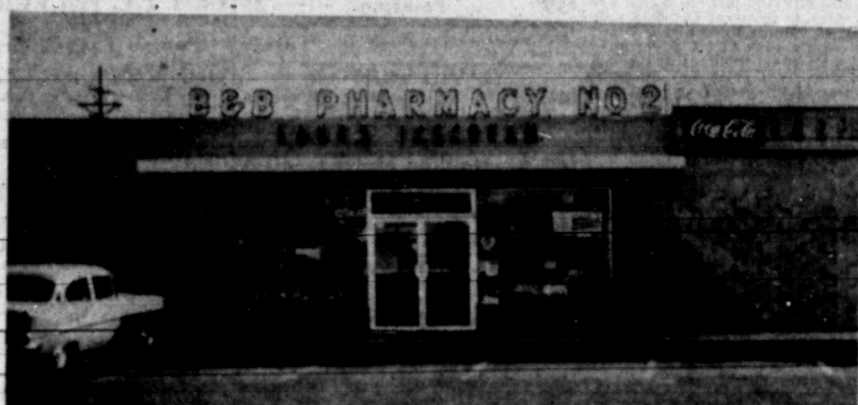
