

IS SUBSTITUTED FOR ACT PASSED BY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (P)-The senate finance committee to-day gave speedy approval of the coalition bonus payment bill by a vote of 15 to 2.

Senators Couzens (R., Mich.) and Gerry (D., R. I.) were the only members voting against a favorable report on the measure which pro-vides for full payment after June 15, next, of the bonus certificates in baby bonds redeemable in cash. Chairman Harrison (D., Miss.) announced the vote and said he would try to get senate considera-tion Thursday. Those voting for the favorable report were: Demo-crats—George, Walsh, Barkley, Gore, Costigan, Bailey, Clark, Lonergan, Black, Guffey, and Harrison; re-publicans — Keyes, Hastings, and Capper; progressive—La Follette.

By a vote of 18 to 0, the committee substituted the senate bill for that passed last Friday by the house which provided for full cash payment of the certificates, but specified no method of payment, Senator Couzens (R Mich) who with Senator Gerry (D R I), were the only members opposing a favor-able report, disclosed Morgenthau's testimony which was given in executive session. Couzens said he would not be bound by any secrecy.

Couzens further quoted M thau as saying that the \$11,000,000,-000 of funds needed for the rest of this fiscal and the next fiscal year included an estimate of \$2,000,000,000 for relief (not included in the president's budget); \$1,500,000,000 which the president estimated as next year's deficit; \$2,000,000,000 if the bonus is paid and \$5,800,000,000 of refun ling operations. Couzens said Morgenthau esti-

mated this would bring the public debt to \$35,500,000,000 by the end of next fiscal year.

#### BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON--President Roosevelt is wiping a lot of the grin off his face.

The change was noticeable in Roosevelt's address to Congress. But perhaps even more significant was his demeanor in his annual "schoolroom" meeting with the correspondents—the occasion when he discusses the next fiscal year's budget in strictest confidence.

Last year, estimating a 1935-36 gross deficit of \$4, 528,000,000, he was no end jovial about it-gay, grinning, wisecracking, and almost hilarious at times.

This year-when the figures were far more favorable and he was even able to make some pretense of budgetbalancing-it was the other way around. Here was a soher, more serious president-probably someone will soon be calling him "the new Roosevelt," a la Hoover press-agentry.

Occasionally there was a half-smile-never one of the full old-fashioned variety for which he became so famous and which presumably is now to be reserved for special occasions.

Thus far none of those intimate with F. D. R. are taking credit for urging him not to be quite so gay. But not long ago certain persons were promising to see to it that he didn't miss a magazine article which comment ed adversely on some of his mannerisms.

Although Dr. Tugwell will be used with restraint and caution as a New Deal campaign orator, Roosevelt has no thought of heeding demands of administration enemies and some friends-that Tugwell be dropped overboard.

Tugwell recently offered his resignation-suggesting that he might be a political liability as many people were saying. Roosevelt refused the resignation and told Tugwell he was more asset than liability.

Tugwell has received no rebuke or order to submit his speeches to the White House as a result of his Los Angeles speech, which called for a stand of farmers, workers, and progressives against "our financial and industrial autocrats.

For the very good reason that Roosevelt had approved the speech in advance—as hardly anyone knew—and that Tugwell has long been accustomed to discussing his speeches in advance with the president.

If you will read Tugwell's "radical" Los Angeles speech, with its four separate references to those "autocrats," you will perceive that it was very definitely forerunner of Roosevelt's sensational night speech to Congress.

That's just another instance of the way Roosevelt Has gone along with his friend and lieutenants without taking public responsibility for their utterances or acts. He has had Tugwell working the liberal side of the street while he has had Moley, Richberg, and Roper

playing up to the conservatives. While that may not seem altogether sweet and pretty to some. Roosevelt apparently has believed the New Deal should appeal to liberal conservatives.

# IS PREDICTED

HARRISON SAYS BILL WILL BECOME LAW

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)-Clear sailing toward a quick and favorable senate vote create new coalition bill to pay the soldiers' bonus in cashable "baby bonds" was cted today by administration

Chairman Harrison (D-Miss) of the senate finance committee expressed a belief the bill would receive committee approval today after Secretary Morgenthau had been questioned in executive session as to the soundness of its financing

The eventual cost to the govern ment is estimated at \$2,491,000 000 but backers of the bill say the immediate expense would be only \$1.

It may come up in the senate Thursday, the next meeting day Both administration and veterans leaders predicted the house would with the plan in view of that branch's passage last Friday of bill which is similar except fo the method of payment. The house bill had no specific payment provi-

Observers felt opposition come from a few senators opposed to spending outside the federa budget and those wanting to pa he bonus with new currency. But Harrison brushed this aside

with this confident expression: "In my opinion this bill will be enacted into law."

Senator Borah (R Idaho) who favored the inflationary Patman bil session, also said he had no doubt the Harrison measure "wil

SWITCH IS NEAR BUT HAUPMANN IS NOT 'THAWED OUT'

byright, 1936, by The Associated Press TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 14,-The tense silence prevailing in the case of Bruno Richard Hauptmann since he lost his clemency appeal presaged today a delay, perhaps until the last minute, in Gov. Harold G. Hoffman's decision on a reprieve.

The basis of this belief was that Governor Hoffman, if he is considering a reprieve, might be withthat before the execution hour-8 p. m. Friday night-some development might occur to change the status of the case. There was no indication, how-

ever, that the governor saw possibility of such development in Hauptmann's statement to his wife vesterday that he would "be glad to see anyone any time and answer any questions or tell anything they might want to know that I might have neglected to say."

In his statement about answering questions Hauptmann reiterated

Attorney General David T. Wilentz, who prosecuted Hauptmann for the Lindbergh baby kidnapslaying, said in his summation at the Flemington trial a year ago: "He will be thawed out. He is cold; yes, he will be thawed out.

When he hears that switch-that's the time he will talk!" Hauptmann's only hope to escape execution, in the view of Ellis Parfriend of the governor, is "the finding of the Lindbergh baby alive." Parker, who has been interested

in the base but not officially as-sociated with the investigation, never has been satisfied with the identification of the body, found in a shallow grave near the Hopewell pear at his office yesterday.

It was reported he was conferring on the Hauptmann case, but this lacked confirmation.
