In his weekly newsletter from Washington, released at noon today, Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa gives the text of his recent remarks on the floor of the House explaining his vote in favor of selling surplus farm commodities to the United Arab Republic for local currency.

**Financial Gossip**

NEW YORK (UPI)—In manufacturing and retailing the most effective economies don't necessarily involve firing people, according to President Jacob Saliba of Fanny Farmer Candy Shops, Inc., Rochester, N.Y.  
Saliba said he almost doubled Fanny Farmer's profits—it's a national company—in 1964 without any significant increase in sales and with little impact on the payroll.  
The biggest single saving, he said, was a 27 per cent reduction in inventories in the face of a 6 per cent production increase.  
Of course candy and the ingredients that go into candy are expensive merchandise and expensive to warehouse. Not every business could save as much money by inventory economy as Fanny Farmer did, Saliba admits. But many firms, he said, could save money faster by tight inventory and overhead control than by simply slashing the payroll when economy is needed.  
To an outsider it might appear that Saliba simply compelled his suppliers to shoulder some of Fanny Farmer's inventory and overhead burdens. However, Saliba contends that the company's suppliers of such expensive perishables as chocolate, sugar, almonds and pecans are satisfied with the

# Panhandle Warned to Brace For Blizzard-Like Weekend

Pampans were warned today to brace for another cold, wet weekend. The U.S. Weather Bureau predicted much colder

temperatures tonight and tomorrow with light snow beginning tonight and continuing through tomorrow.

Skies were clear and temperatures were comparatively mild across most of the Panhandle early today — with overnight minimums ranging from 26 degrees at Dalhart to 61 at Brownsville.

The Panhandle was expected to hear the brunt of the new wintry weather with five-day forecasts calling for one-fourth to one-half inches of moisture tomorrow and Friday and the first of next week.

The high temperature in Pampa yesterday reached 52 degrees. The overnight low today was 27 degrees and the temperature at dawn stood at 29 degrees.

The forecast for Pampa and vicinity issued shortly before noon today by the U.S. Weather

Bureau in Amarillo called for much colder temperatures tonight and tomorrow. Snow showers are expected to move into the area by tonight and continue through tomorrow. The low tonight should be around 20-22 degrees and the high for tomorrow should reach a frigid 30 degrees.

## Teachers Claim Governor's Plan Would Boost Local School Taxes

AUSTIN (Sol) — Local school property taxes would have to be increased immediately under Gov. John Connally's teacher pay proposal, a spokesman for the Texas State Teachers Association said today.

L. P. Sturgeon, TSTA director of public relations, said local districts would pay 70 percent of the \$20 million annual salary program offered by the governor in opposition to the TSTA \$45 for '65' plan.

The TSTA \$45 per month salary increase proposal would provide \$42 million for teacher salaries in 1965-66 and would be financed on the traditional 80-20 basis, with the state paying 30 percent of the cost of the Minimum Foundation Program. This would be effective this September, while the governor's full program for teachers would not materialize until ten years from now.

The governor's measure, introduced as Senate Bill 124 by Sen. Jack Strong of Longview and House Bill 446 by Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah, calls for local districts to pay \$14 million of the bill's \$20 million annual cost.

"This is accomplished," Sturgeon explained, "by including the cost of textbooks and teacher retirement matching in the Minimum Foundation Program. This would require local districts to pay 20 percent of the cost of both these items. Add that to the 20 percent local share of the governor's salary plan and it adds up to an average of \$14 million a year paid by local districts for the next biennium. The state would pay the other \$6 million annually, or 30 percent."

In Texas the state has furnished free textbooks since the text book program began in 1921. The state has paid the cost of matching teacher contributions to the retirement system since 1941.

"The governor's proposal," Sturgeon pointed out, "would

shift part of this cost to local districts and establish new precedents which probably would lead to even heavier local tax burdens in the future."

Local schools already pay the full cost of constructing and equipping local school buildings. They must finance this debt completely from local property taxes, their only source of local revenue, Sturgeon added.

"In many states the financing of buildings is part of the state's responsibility in the minimum foundation program," he noted.



## Full Text of Speech Explaining UAR Vote

By REP. WALTER ROGERS  
Member of Congress

I addressed my colleagues in the House of Representatives last week after I learned that I, along with other Democrats who serve in the House, had been subjected to a vicious personal attack in a press release issued by the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee. The press release, by rank distortion of fact and callously twisted conclusion, attempted to impugn the patriotism of those Members of Congress who differed with the primary GOP "party line" to embarrass the President of the United States at every turn regardless of cost. I made it clear in my remarks to the House that I mean to oppose them down the line, that I mean to expose the villainess of such smears.

My remarks, spoken before the House, are as follows:

Mr. Speaker, I have in my hand a newspaper release of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, which is one of the lowest, most reprehensible, most contemptible acts of any individual or group in my knowledge. The release is headed, "GOP Criticizes Rogers for Vote to Help Nasser." The release quotes Bob Wilson of California as stating that I voted against the best interests of the United States and on behalf of a Middle East dictator. This statement and conclusion I brand as a deliberate lie, and I would include in that category anyone of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee who was associated with this action or knew about it. In my opinion the only thing lower or more contemptible than the act itself would be the people responsible for it. It was, without doubt, the most irresponsible, unconscionable, and fraudulent act that I have witnessed in my experience since I have been a Member of the Congress of the United States of America.

The smear campaign that is being carried on by this Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, including Bob Wilson, its chairman, would exhibit at least some semblance of honesty, decency, and gentility by ceasing and desisting from this sorry practice that so resembles the Communist propaganda methods. However, if it is war they want, and they intend to continue their attempts at character assassination and to try to drag the names of Members of this Congress into the dirt, then I here and now serve notice on them that it is war they will have.

The truth about the vote on House Joint Resolution 234 is quite simple. It was a resolution making supplemental appropriation for fiscal year ending June 30, 1965, for certain activities of the Department of Agriculture. A Republican amendment was offered to the

resolution which had all the earmarks of the rawest kind of political demagoguery, and in my opinion was designed for the sole purpose of trying to embarrass the President of the United States in the eyes of foreign nations, both friendly and hostile. The amendment had nothing to do with foreign aid but was confined to the question of sale of surplus farm commodities to the United Arab Republic for local currency. The foreign policy of this Nation is vested in the President of the United States under the Constitution. The sale of surplus farm commodities, on which this Government is paying storage, has been provided for under Public Law 480. This authority has been used as a weapon in foreign policy to get hold of local currencies without this Country needing to use up any of its gold reserves for that purpose. Not only the security of this Nation is involved, but also millions and millions of dollars of United States private capital investments. The Communists have long sought to gain control of the vast oil reserve under the control of the Arab countries. Nothing would please Nasser better than to be afforded a propaganda weapon which he could use to solidify the entire Arab world against the United States and subsequently justify himself in expropriating properties belonging to private investors of this Country, turning these over to our Communist enemies, closing the Suez Canal and helping the Communists to gain additional power on the continent of Africa. This is also a weapon that could also be used and no doubt would be against the Country of Israel and Jews all over the world.

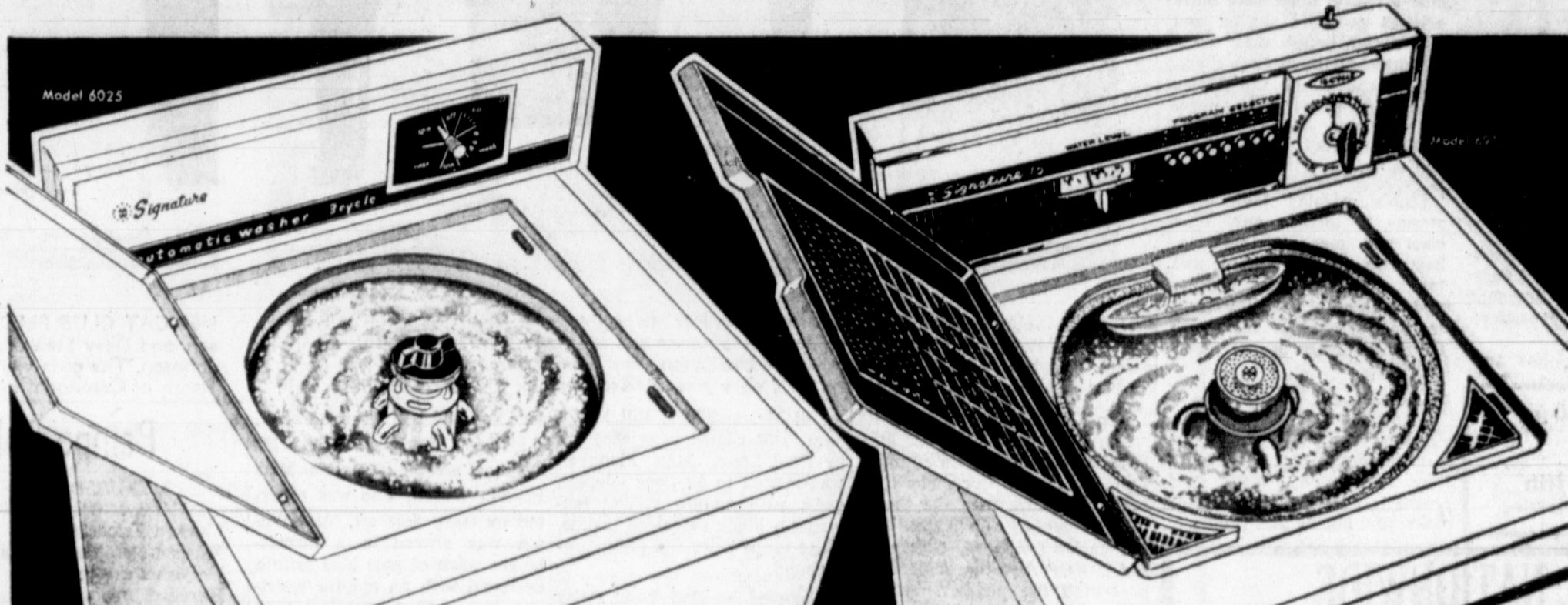
In my opinion the amendment that was offered was designed not only for the purpose of embarrassing the President of the United States in the eyes of all foreign countries, but would take away from him a weapon that has been most effective in our conduct of foreign affairs and hand this weapon and more with it over to an untrustworthy, irresponsible, and despicable dictator in the Mid-East. The vote on the amendment to House Joint Resolution 234 called for a choice between the President of the United States and Abdel Gamal Nasser, a Mid-East dictator. Anytime this choice is offered me my vote will be cast for the President of the United States and this country, and let the chips fall where they may. If my Republican friends want to demagogue I would not deny them that right. However, I would hope in the future that they do not demagogue with the security of this country or the private interests of United States citizens abroad.

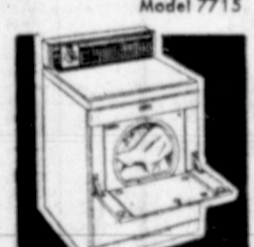

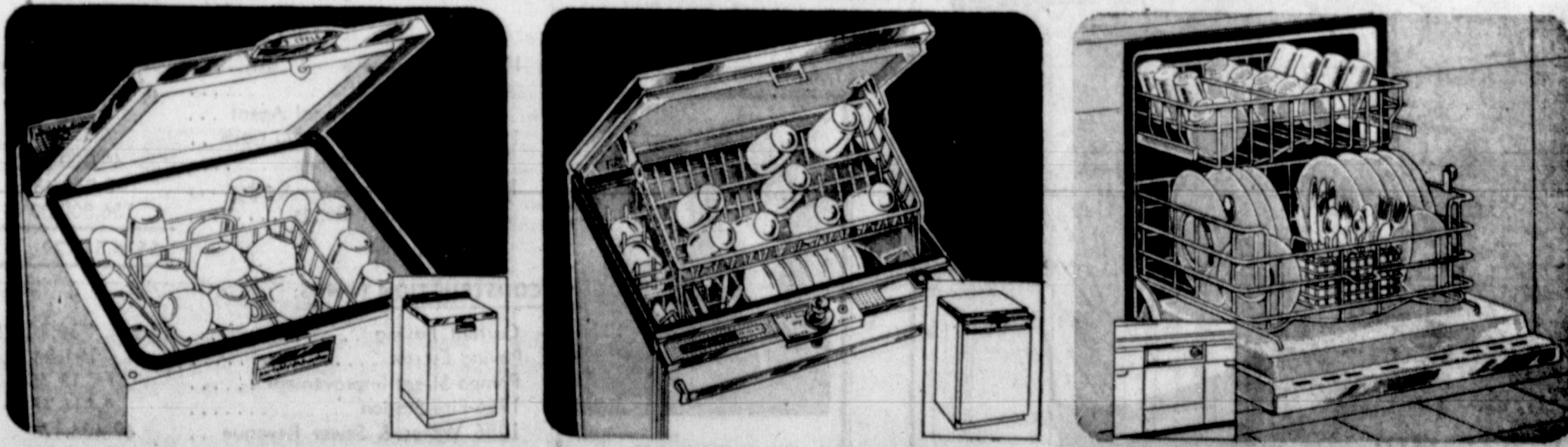

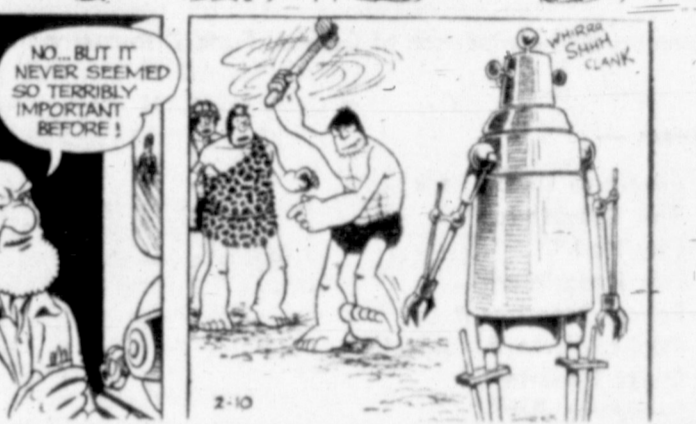

# Pampa Nips Monterey, Within One of Crown

Ropes Roper went crazy on the boards in the fourth quarter as the Pampa Harvesters stalled their way to a 50-42 win over the Monterey Plainsmen last night, moving within one game of the district 3-4A championship before a capacity crowd in Harvester Fieldhouse.

The Harvesters, leading 42-40 midway in the fourth quarter, went into a semistall, going only for the sure shots and sunk two snowbirds, pulling to a four-point lead with two minutes left and then going into a full stall, picking up the final difference as the frantic Plainsmen fouled.

Monterey's tight defense was extremely effective in the first half, but got all their starters into deep foul trouble in the third and last quarters, enabling the Harvesters to pull out the game as they hit 16 of 22 free throws. The fouling also enabled the shorter Pampans to dominate the rebounds, 35 to 22. Roper personally dragged down 16 off the boards, taking almost every bounce in the fourth quarter to insure the victory. A win by Pampa in their final regular-season game Friday against Tescosa gives them the district crown outright.

The score was tied 10 times and the lead changed hands nine times, but the Plainsmen could never get ahead after Ron Curlee sparked a six-point streak to close the second quarter.

Both teams were ice-cold in the opening three minutes, with Bill Abernethy blocking shots and grabbing the rebounds for Monterey. Neither team ever

President Moving To Give Russia and Satellites Trade Increases, Long Term Credits — Without Concessions

WASHINGTON — President Johnson has made a remarkably grave decision on increasing trade with Russia and its Eastern European satellites. He has decided to relax U.S. credit bars and grant "favored nations" trading rights to these Communist countries without first obtaining political concessions.

This highly controversial move is being acted on both in the administration and Congress, and will not be reversed except for a most unexpected and violent turn of events in U.S.-Soviet relations.

Yet only a tiny minority is aware of this portentous decision, let alone fully alerted that it will open the door to the Kremlin rulers to use large quantities of U.S. goods to intensify their "wars of liberation" in Africa, Asia and Latin America.

The President's total commitment to this policy is indicated by his still unannounced plans to establish a 15-member "blue ribbon" council to create a public consensus for increasing trade with the Soviet bloc.

THE NEW STRATEGY — Since Congress has been the main roadblock to any across-the-board easing of trade restrictions on the Reds, the President's advisers are resorting to the strategy of making it appear the legislators are demanding this policy change.

Question Box
