George Grace, regional director of the Office of Emergency Planning, said rivers along the coast are rising again but that low temperatures were holding the snow in the mountain areas. 'If that snow melts fast," he

added, "we're going to have a repeat of the recent floods." The relentless rain and snow, expected to continue another five days at least, brought relief and repair work to a standstill and stranded holiday travelers throughout the area.
