To repair cracks, cut a groove in the walk where cracked about one inch wide and two inches deep. Wash out loose concrete with hose, brush away

tar. Sakrete is an excel wood float or steel trowel.

To replace full sections, re move concrete and break up for use as base. Frame sides with a straight edged board long enough to extend across the form. In about one hour, smooth the surface with a wood float. Move float over the sur face with light pressure in a half are motion. Finish with a steel trowel if smooth finish is desired. As trowel is moved

In a statement Thursday the Post Office Department said it was "most appreciative of the understanding of the seriousness of our budget situation and the potential consequences of the cut in mail service which is reflected in the subcommittee's action."

However, a spokesman said, the action does not effect an order already sent out to the nation's 68 largest post offices to halt all new hiring until July 1. This order went out after the House approved a cut of \$8 million in the department's supplemental appropriations requested for the current year through June

ing until July 1, postmasters in the nation's largest cities are expected to curtail all service to new buildings until they are 90 per cent occupied

A spokesman said there has been no such curtailment yet but this action would take place as soon as the post offices begin to feel the squeeze of the manpower shortage resulting from the hir-
