## Foreign News Commentary

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst In a world dominated by two super powers, each with a nuclear capacity to over - kill, a curious fact emrges.

It is that both of the super powers, the United States and the Soviet Union, have been challenged with relative impunity by nations which are among the world's smallest.

The immediate case in point is Albania's seizure of five Soviet Embassy buildings in the Albanian capital of Tirana. The counter point is Cuba.

#### Leadership Questioned

And from the two comes a wonder whether the two superpowers, as they have moved toward nuclear stalemate and the knowledge of what each could do the other, have not at the same time vacated claims for leadership.

The case histories of Cuba vs. the United States, and Albania vs. the Soviet Union are remarkably similar.

Albania's seizure of the Russian Embassy buildings is the latest episode in a quarrel which has split the Communist world.

But in late December, 1958, it was a different story.

Then, Albanian first party Secretary Gen. Enver Hoxha and Premier Gen. Mehmet Shehu were in Moscow concluding agreements under which Moscow not only would loan Albania \$40 million but also would build free two hydro - electric plants, an oil refinery and textile and other factories. The agreements formally were concluded in April, 1959.

Fidel Visits Washington Also in April, 1959, Fidel Castro visited Washington.

"We are not Communists," he said, and he added that Cuba had no intention of confiscating foreign private industry. In case of conflict between East and West, he intimated. Cuba would be on the side of the West.

But soon the cracks began to

In 1959, the Red Chinese began moving in on the Soviet Inion's Albanian preserve with loan and trade agreements. By late 1959, Castro was denouncing the United States as an ag-

In 1960, Albania openly joined Red China in a denunciation of Nikita Khrushchev's, de-Stalinization program. Hoxha, placed in power with the aid of Yugoslavia's President Tito, joined Red China as one of Tito's bitterest enemies.

And in 1960 Castro nationalized the last remaining U.S. owned property in Cuba, bringing the total value seized to \$1.25 billion.

Albania Ignored In this same year, Castro and

Khrushchev embraced at the United Nations, while Albania's delegate stood virtually ignored by all other Communist na-

In economic and military fields, punitive measures taken by the United States and the Soviet Union against their small adversaries also were similar.

Russian experts were withdrawn from Albania and satellite nations urged to break diplomatic relations. Albania was expelled from the Warsaw Pact just as Cuba was barred from the Organization of American States and placed under economic boycott by the United

But again the line broke. Romania re - established contact with Albania just as the United States' allies refused to join the boycott against Cuba.

As the world has become convinced that the nuclear stalemate between the U.S.S.R. and the United States will prevent a major war, so too has the monolithic structure of world communism and the close ties of the Western alliance been weakened.


And the initiative has been passed to weaker powers.

## Foreign News Commentary

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst In a world dominated by two super powers, each with a nuclear capacity to over - kill, a curious fact emrges.

It is that both of the super powers, the United States and the Soviet Union, have been challenged with relative impunity by nations which are among the world's smallest.

The immediate case in point is Albania's seizure of five Soviet Embassy buildings in the Albanian capital of Tirana.

The counter point is Cuba. Leadership Questioned

And from the two comes a wonder whether the two superpowers, as they have moved toward nuclear stalemate and the knowledge of what each could do the other, have not at the same time vacated claims for

The case histories of Cuba vs. the United States, and Albania vs. the Soviet Union are remarkably similar.

Albania's seizure of the Russian Embassy buildings is the latest episode in a quarrel which has split the Communist world.

But in late December, 1958, it was a different story.

Then, Albanian first party Secretary Gen. Enver Hoxha and Premier Gen. Mehmet Shehu were in Moscow concluding agreements under which Moscow not only would loan Albania \$40 million but also would build free two hydro - electric plants, an oil refinery and textile and other factories. The agreements formally were concluded in April, 1959.

Fidel Visits Washington Also in April, 1959, Fidel Castro visited Washington.

'We are not Communists.' he said, and he added that Cuba had no intention of confiscating foreign private industry. In case of conflict between East and West, he intimated, Cuba would be on the side of the West

But soon the cracks began to show.

In 1959, the Red Chinese began moving in on the Soviet Union's Albanian preserve with loan and trade agreements. By late 1959, Castro was denouncing the United States as an ag-

In 1960, Albania openly joined Red China in a denunciation of Nikita Khrushchev's, de-Stalinization program. Hoxha, placed in power with the aid of Yugoslavia's President Tito, joined, Red China as one of Tito's bitterest enemies.

And in 1960 Castro nationalfized the last remaining U.S. owned property in Cuba, bringing the total value seized to

Albania Ignored

In this same year, Castro and Khrushchev embraced at the United Nations, while Albania's delegate stood virtually ignored by all other Communist na-

In economic and military fields, punitive measures taken by the United States and the Soviet Union against their small adversaries also were similar

Russian experts were withdrawn from Albania and satellite nations urged to break diplomatic relations. Albania was expelled from the Warsaw Pact just as Cuba was barred from the Organization of American States and placed under economic boycott by the United States.

But again the line broke. Romania re - established contact with Albania just as the United States' allies refused to join the boycott against Cuba.


As the world has become convinced that the nuclear stalemate between the U.S.S.R. and the United States will prevent a major war, so too has the monolithic structure of world communism and the close ties of the Western alliance been weakened.

And the initiative has been passed to weaker powers.

can never say too much about the significance of the Christian Year and our part in it. We are now several weeks into Lent - A season of the Church Year which is often taken lightly by so many of us who are outside the Roman, Anglican and Lutheran traditions - We can gain much from readying ourselves for Easter.

The Transfiguration of our Lord stands as a symbol of Lent to me because it shows up our shallow lives as contrasted to the Glory of Christ, who chose by the will of God to take upon himself our human form, but who, none the less, still bore the mark of the divinity of God, a life perfect in love and obedience.

The experience upon the mountain top is a pivot-point in the life of our Lord and in his relationship with the disciples. Peter would have preserved that sacred moment by the building of booths, but first it was necessary to go back down that mountain to the suffering humanity who in their suffering would bear this Christ to the Cross.

Lent reminds us of our sinful condition of our need to enter anew into the life of our Lord - Not only when we get the first glimpse of his glory but when we have made our way with him to the Cross, dying to our old selves and then being made ready for our new life which is raised from the grave in the Easter faith to come.

"This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased, listen to Him."

## Joe Kuharich Named Philadelphia Skipper

The announcement ended months of speculation and Wolman's search for a head coach since the 36-year-old Washington real estate developer purchased the National Football League club last December for more than \$5.5 million.

Kuharich, presently supervisor of league officials for the NFL, becomes the 10th Eagle coach since the club was founded in 1933 and the eighth since Greasy Neale took over for the late league commissioner, Bert Bell, in 1941.

Kuharich replaces Nick Skorich under whose tutelage the Eagles steadily declined in the NFL's Eastern Division after winning the world's championship under Buck Shaw in 1960. A former coach of the Washington Redskins, the Chicago Cardinals, his alma mater, Notre Dame and San Francisco University, Kuharich said it did not concern him in the least that he was fourth choice for the new post.

"I was certainly aware of the entire picture from the first interview with Wolman six or seven weeks ago, but I was well on top of it and now I have no qualms," he said.

Kuharich said he "got an itch to get back into coaching especially since Wolman assured me he would leave no stone unturned to produce a winner" and because "it was tough sitting on the sidelines."

Former Eagles' star Norm Van Brocklin, now coach of the Minnesota Vikings, Paul Brown, former mentor of the Cleveland Browns, and Jim Trimble. coach of the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League had been high on Wolman's list of likely candidates.






