## US Destroyers Strike Communist Vessels

### Ky Names Six New Members of S. Viet Cabinet

SAIGON (UPI)—Premier Nguyen Cao Ky today named six new cabinet members in a bid to quell a serious regional feud within the South Vietnamese government. The move was opposed by Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu in the first open split between the Vietnamese leaders.

### LBJ Continues Busy Schedule

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson, refreshed by a solid eight-hour sleep, told doctors he "felt great" on awakening today. The White House said Johnson retired at midnight after his wedding anniversary party. He "enjoyed the party so much" he didn't do his customary night reading and went to sleep almost immediately.

### Foot Soldiers Stifle Viet Cong Offensive

SAIGON (UPI)—Two U.S. destroyers sank or damaged 26 Communist barges and boats off the coast of North Viet Nam Thursday in a series of sea battles, a U.S. spokesman reported today.

### TV Performers' Work Stoppage Nears Full Strike

NEW YORK (UPI)—In a television performers' work stoppage that could escalate into a full-scale strike, Johnny Carson and other entertainers have been ordered by their union to stay away from taping sessions of "The Tonight Show."

### United Nations To Debate Red China

UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—The General Assembly moved into its annual China debate today with the outcome predictable: defeat for the perennial move to give the Chinese U.N. seat to the Communist regime and expel Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists.

### Red China Doubles Troops In Viet Nam

LONDON (UPI)—Red China was reported today to have more than doubled her "technical troops" in North Viet Nam thereby also strengthening her political hold on Hanoi.

A "two China" move to bring both regimes into the United Nations was under consideration by a coalition of countries including Canada, Italy and Chile. Neither the Formosa nor Peking governments would consider such a proposal, however. It was expected to be referred to a study group to bring forth a concrete proposal next year.

### Police Thwart New Delhi Youth March

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Thousands of street-helmeted police sweeping through New Delhi in trucks made mass arrests today in a drive to thwart a threatened march by students on parliament.

### Bobby Baker 'Bugged' By FBI Agents

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department is reported to have made the embarrassing admission—in private—that it violated Robert G. (Bobby) Baker's constitutional rights by secretly eavesdropping on his conversations.

### Killer of Sheppard's Wife 'Still Out Running Around'

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Although police must assume the killer of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard's first wife, "is still out running around," the acquitted osteopath's prosecutor today planned to close the books on the 12-year-old case.

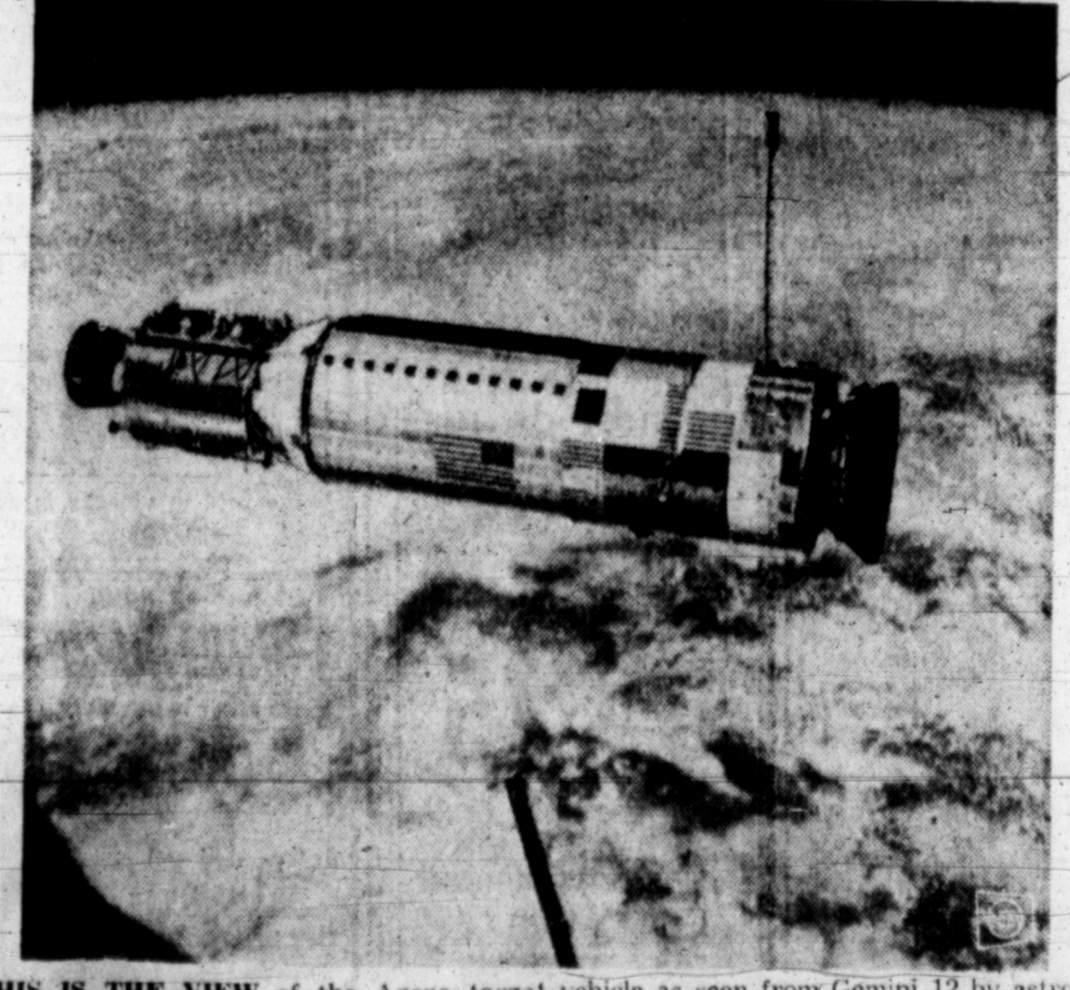

ballot probably will provide a citizens' directive on the court's future conduct. All of that is by reason of the likelihood that the next President of the United States will choose between maintaining the present liberal-conservative division among the justices or of loading the bench in either direction.

If death or retirement does not much intervene to alter the court's membership, LBJ or his immediate successor probably will have the opportunity to name from three to six new justices.

Five justices comprise the present liberal majority which generally prevails in the 5-to-4 divisions of opinion. The five court liberals and their respective ages are:

Associate Justice William O. Douglas, 68  
Associate Justice Abe Fortas, 56  
Chief Justice Earl Warren, 75  
Associate Justice William J. Brennan Jr., 60  
Associate Justice Hugo L. Black, 80

Warren and Black already are beyond minimum retirement age, which is 70 years after 10 years service on the bench. Retirement is at full pay. Before the next president ends his term, these two and Douglas will be very old men if, indeed, they are still alive. Their ages then would be Douglas, 74, Warren 81, Black 86.

Fortas at 56 and Brennan at 60 may reasonably expect to serve into the administration of the President who is inaugurated in January, 1973.

The more or less conservative court members with their respective ages are:

Associate Justice Byron R. White, 49  
Associate Justice Tom C. Clark, 67  
Associate Justice Potter Stewart, 51  
Associate Justice John M. Harlan, 67

Justice Clark has notified President Johnson of his intention to retire if his son Ramsey is named attorney general. Ramsey Clark is deputy attorney general and since Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach was shifted to State, Ramsey Clark has been acting A. G.

Assuming the re-election of President Johnson in 1968, that proud man might feel some humiliation in contemplating the fact that his administrations could become significant and best known in the selective perspective of history more for his choice of Supreme Court justices than for any other thing. That is the fact with respect to President Eisenhower's two presidential terms, like huffed and he puffed and he did this, that and the other thing.

But the Eisenhower administrations will be best remembered by students of government because Ike nominated and the Senate confirmed for the Supreme Court Earl Warren of California, John M. Harlan, of New York, and William J. Brennan Jr., of New Jersey.

Warren and Brennan are two of the five liberals who have so rocked the social, political and governmental structure of the United States in a series of so-called landmark opinions. Ike's thumb print may be as clearly implanted in that area as on the European Western front. He also named to the court Potter Stewart of Ohio.

So it is that Ike, characteristically, is on both sides of this hotly political question. But he really is deeply committed by his choice of nominees to the liberal or Warren side of the controversy. That is because he provided the Warren side with the deeper bench. One less liberal nominee from Ike—a conservative instead of Warren—and things would have been different.

## Foreign News Commentary

When Indonesian strongman Gen. Suharto finally pushed President Sukarno aside early this year, he took over a job about as difficult as any one man could find.

His first job was to find rice for a people in what should have been a land of plenty. Simultaneously, it was necessary to restore some sort of order after the slaughter of hundreds of thousands of Indonesians in the anti-Communist blood bath which followed the attempted Communist takeover Oct. 1, 1965.

And, finally, he had to do something about the economy. The rupiah had fallen to next to nothing and the country owed about \$2.4 billion.

U.S. officials have not given up hope that Suharto is equal to the task but neither are they overly optimistic.

**Not Unwilling**  
Suharto himself is not unwilling to take the hard steps necessary to achieve economic stabilization.

But, after many years of Sukarno, the government continues loaded with corruption. The value of the rupiah has gone up somewhat, but Western observers believe the gain to be only temporary. There are other unhealthy signs.

The Suharto regime seems to be filling key positions with military personnel without consideration for their credentials in particular tasks.

**Unemployment is high:**  
Inflation continues with no Sukarno, although reduced to a figurehead, continues to plot a comeback and time appears to be on his side.

Indonesia's diverse political parties, although mostly anti-Sukarno are engaged in a power struggle for the future without regard for unity now. Students who helped bring Suharto to power also could rise again to bring him down.

Militarily, Suharto can depend for sure only upon his own West Java Siliwangi division. Suharto loyalists lead other units but the are manned with pro-Sukarno troops.

For Suharto the one really bright note is that the Western powers, plus Japan, who will meet on Dec. 19 to hear Indonesian proposals, want desperately to help him without at the same time exposing him to the potentially dangerous charge that he is an imperialist stooge.

Indonesia's biggest single debt is to the Soviet Union, about \$1 billion. Other European Communist nations are owed about \$400 million.

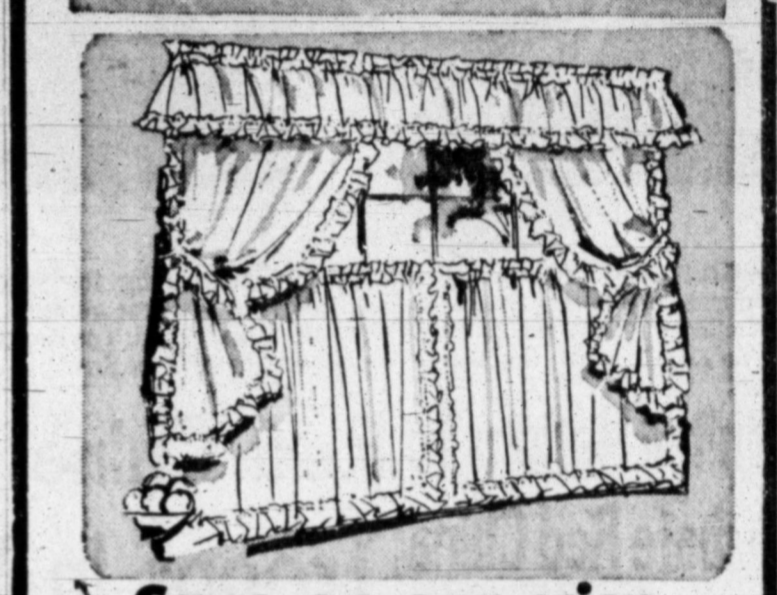

The Pampa weather station recorded a cool 39 Thursday night.

It will be clear to partly cloudy tonight through Saturday with the clouds offering slight obstacles to amateur astronomers who might want to view the final meteorite display tonight.

A Canadian cold front spread over the northern part of the state today, forcing temperatures down only slightly. Fog and drizzle made a dreary morning for East Texas and parts of North Texas.

The overnight low temperatures ranged from 34 at Daltan to the 60s along the Gulf Coast.

The fog-and-drizzle combination will repeat in parts of the eastern half of Texas Saturday, and the western half will be clear to partly cloudy.

## 1968 Model Autos To Get Smog Devices

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Starting with 1968 models, all new cars sold in the United States must be equipped with devices to cut air pollution resulting from automobile exhaust fumes.

Secretary John W. Gardner of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) said Thursday failure to conform to the standard could mean a fine of \$1,000 a car for auto manufacturers.

The devices, also required for 1968 model pickup trucks, would be required equipment for those vehicles appearing late next summer and early fall. They must last for the life of the car.

HEW will open a facility near Detroit soon, Gardner said, to test 1968 models before they go into production to determine if they meet the new anti-pollution standard.

Gardner said gasoline engine trucks and buses probably will be covered starting with 1970 models.

Research on how to cope with two of the major sources of exhaust pollution—diesel buses and trucks—still is going on, Gardner said.

No satisfactory method has yet been found to equip diesel engines with workable anti-pollution devices, he said.

## Catholic Ruling Expected Today

WASHINGTON (UPI)—It has taken a while to change a rule that has been in effect 1,100 years, but American Catholics may be able to eat meat on Friday, starting Dec. 2.

The Catholic bishops of the United States, meeting here for their annual conference, were expected today to finally issue their long-awaited modification of the ancient law of abstinence governing the faithful.

The 210 cardinals, archbishops and bishops have been postponing final action on new abstinence rules all week. A spokesman said there was no serious dissension over the proposal—already enacted by the bishops of Canada, France, Italy and Mexico, among others—merely a protracted discussion of details.

"We have no rule of closure," he remarked wryly.

Dec. 2 is the first Friday of Advent, the beginning of a new church year. It was expected that the bishops would eliminate meatless Fridays for Catholics except during Lent, emphasizing the more positive aspects of the new rules, that they afford Catholics opportunities to gain grace by practicing voluntary self-denial.

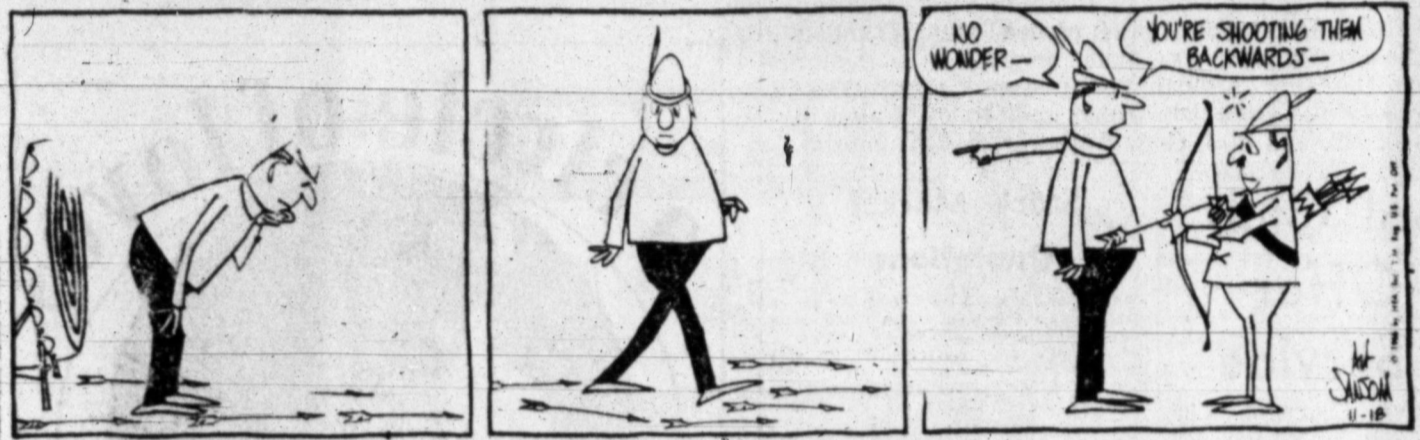

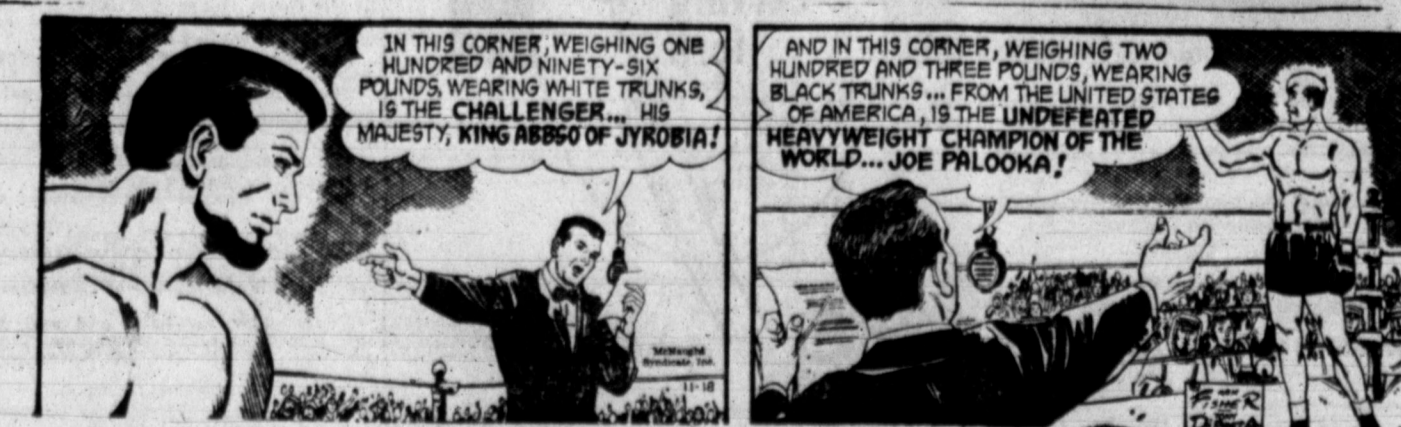

Their argument, which has gained wide acceptance in U.S. seminaries, is being furiously challenged on the other side of the Atlantic by Eric Mascall, professor of historical theology at the University of London. Like the late C. S. Lewis, whom he greatly resembles in the way he thinks and writes, Dr. Mascall is a man of impressive intellectual breadth. He holds degrees from leading British universities in mathematics and science, as well as in theology.

**Challenges New Theology**

His rebuttal to the new theology is contained in a series of books of which the most recent is "The Christian Universe," published in the United States this month by Morehouse-Barlow.

Mascall acknowledges that belief in a supernatural realm is out of fashion.

"The vast majority of men and women today," he says, "organize their lives on the assumption that the only realities of which they need to take account are those that are perceived by their senses in the brief span of time that lies between their conception and their death."

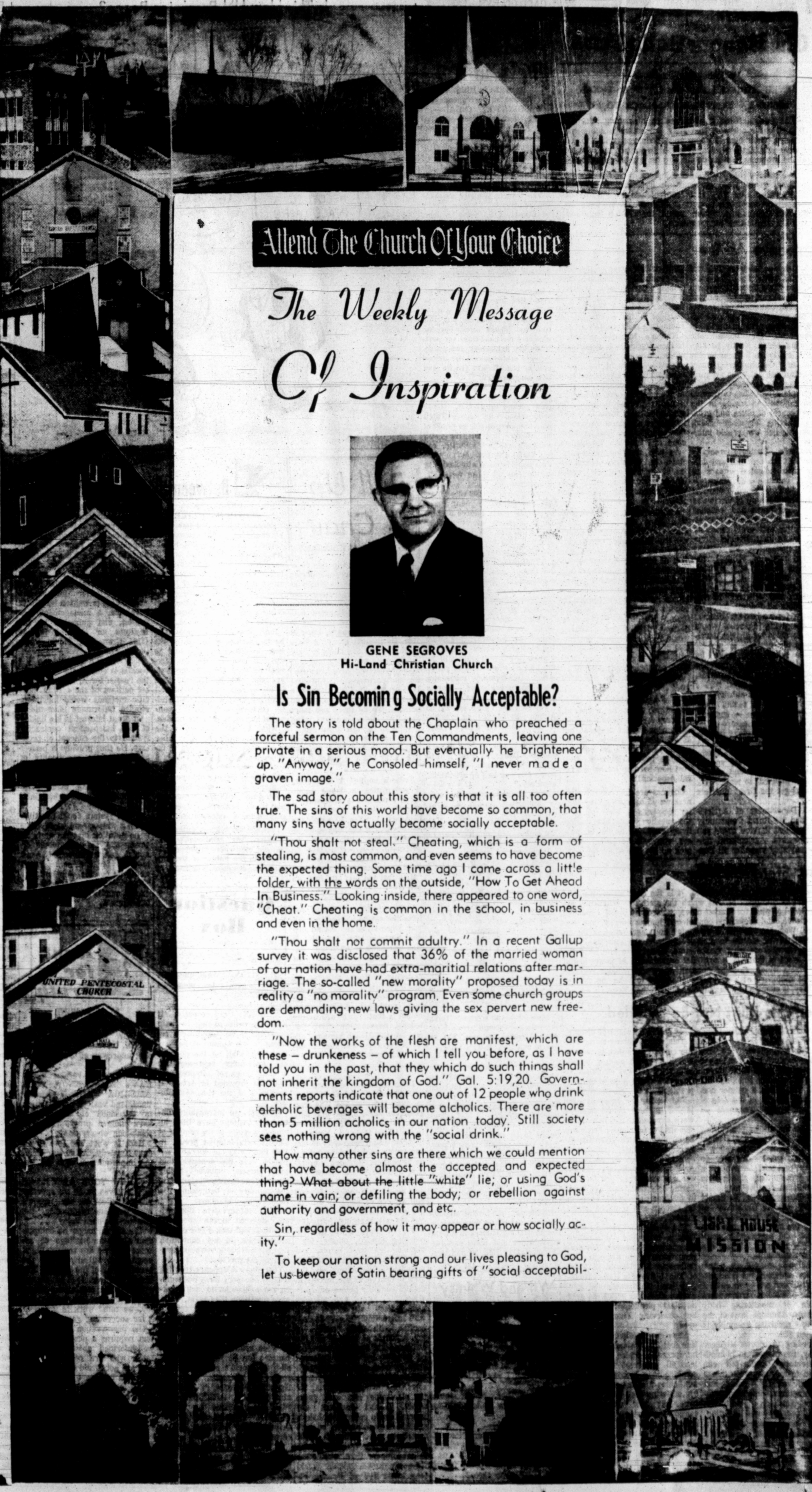

Medicine Must Not Be Shackled

Artificial hearts, organ transplants and the latest wonder drugs to treat disease are what usually capture the headlines in the medical news these days.

But at the same time, another revolution, albeit a quieter one, is taking place in the area of diagnosis — the treatment of disease. One of the most amazing new techniques is biomedical telemetry.

Developed by Dr. R. Stuart Mackey of the University of California, the largest "radio pill" is the size of a large drug capsule and contains a complete FM radio set. There are even smaller units.

Included in the pill are a battery, an antenna, the transmitter circuit and one or more of a variety of sending transducers capable of monitoring body processes. Average cost of the sending-receiving assembly is less than \$20.

Nixon And Romney Top Bets in '68

Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA) — A quick telephone check of a few key Republican leaders around the country indicates that, in the glowing aftermath of GOP victories, it is still Michigan's Gov. George Romney and Richard Nixon for the 1968 presidential nomination.

The leaders warmly welcome the addition of Charles Percy of Illinois, U.S. Senate winner, and Ronald Reagan, governor-elect in California, to the sweepstakes roster, but the feeling is they will serve mostly to add zest to the race and give it a surface look of flexibility and openness.

Romney would have a serious 1968 prospect even if he had done no more than win big for himself, which he did this time by 570,000 votes, but he also met the conditions set partly by his detractors and partly by cold professionals. He helped pull in Sen. Robert Griffin and five congressmen.

Nixon gets a healthy rub-off of credit for the fact that the GOP picked up 47 U.S. House seats, since he concentrated his campaign efforts in many of the winners' districts. He is still a strong southern favorite, and his stock was not hurt when President Johnson attacked him at the end as if he were Mr. Republican.

Riding on a 400,000-vote margin, the attractive young Percy is seen by party figures as sure to be a steady attention-getter in Washington. But, with respect to 1968 presidential chance, one leader says: "That would be an impossible thing."

Though the "not yet" sentiment seem widespread, a seasoned political organizer thinks Percy could crank up quickly even with what will be his limited experience in public office. Anti-Romney moderates — and there are some — surely will be drawn to him.

Reagan, like Percy, is seen as a man who needs time in office to prove himself before going for the big job. Says the same veteran organizer: "If I were advising Reagan, I'd tell him to sit in Sacramento and learn how to be one hell of a topflight governor."

Both Reagan and Percy swiftly indicated intent to serve out their full terms, but this may prove tougher for Reagan, the new hero of his party's strong conservatives. Professionals believe these ardent folks will be busy forming Reagan clubs from here on and that his disavowals of interest will be ignored. His hand could be forced.

Nixon, for all his high status with many party regulars, suffers from the drain of the conservative interest toward Reagan. More and more, too, professionals are arguing that he must go the 1968 primary route to have any chance. Says one: "People are likely to say to Nixon: 'Show us you're a winner.'"

Some of Nixon's friends think the primaries could prove bloody and costly for him. Yet he has to lick the "loser's image." Romney likewise has his problems. The biggest is the nagging notion, expressed by one midwestern leader, that the governor still has not proved his grasp of major foreign and domestic affairs.

Romney, moreover, is believed to be in serious need of more staff people knowledgeable in national politics, who can get him and his moderate supporters some early momentum before any opposition can crystallize as Goldwater forces did in 1964.

Problems notwithstanding, Romney and Nixon nevertheless remain the big choices in a field made wider and more exciting by newcomers Reagan and Percy.

Religious Vietnamese Balk Spread of Cong Influence

Washington Correspondent AN GIANG, South Viet Nam (NEA) — In their own secret documents, the Communist Viet Cong have outlined how they can be defeated.

Note the following message. It was written as part of a report from a Communist whose job it is to supervise activities of the party over a wide southern area of Viet Nam. The report was to the party superiors; it was not intended for non-Communist eyes.

In this document, the Red VC official talked of his many successes in consolidating important areas of South Viet Nam for the Communist cause.

But he notes one major failure which concerned him deeply.

"In the area of... the enemy succeeded in building five hamlets strictly controlled by religious people and we have not been able to infiltrate these hamlets.

Side Effects Unlikely In Drugs for Menopause

Two years ago a doctor warned me not to take hormones because I have cysts in my breasts. Now another doctor has prescribed estrogen for the menopause. He says women are less likely to develop breast cancer if they take the hormone. What do you think?

A—The estrogens prescribed merely replace hormones your ovaries have been producing for many years. They will not cause cancer and may help to prevent it but, if you have a cancer, it may be necessary to stop taking the estrogen.

Q—Will Premarin taken for the menopause cause any side effects, such as male characteristics?

A—Premarin is a strictly female hormone. In the prescribed dosage it will not cause any side effects and will not cause masculinization in any dosage.

Q—Does taking hormones for the menopause prolong or shorten the change?

A—It is now believed that hormones will neither prolong nor shorten the change, but will relieve some of the symptoms associated with it. Specifically they help you retain a sense of well-being and decrease the manifestations of aging.

Q—I am an auto mechanic and am often exposed to carbon monoxide. Does this gas damage the lungs?

A—No, but it displaces the oxygen in your blood as it passes through your lungs. This causes a shortage of oxygen in the brain and results in headache, mental confusion, lightheadedness, blurred vision and nausea.

Q—I have taken 7 or 8 APC tablets daily for several years for headaches. When I read that these tablets, when used for a prolonged period, can cause kidney trouble I switched to aspirin but it upsets my stomach. What should I do now?

A—APC tablets contain aspirin, phenacetin and caffeine. It is true that prolonged use of phenacetin, which is present also in many over the counter pain relievers, may cause kidney disease. Aspirin frequently causes stomach distress.

The first step you should take is to have your doctor determine the cause of your headaches and remove the cause. If, for some reason, this can't be done, you might try a different type of pain reliever, such as propoxyphene or phenylramidol. These drugs require a doctor's prescription.

Your Dental Health

All 32 Teeth May Merge Then More May Appear

DEAR DR. LAWRENCE:

Some years ago I had all my teeth taken out and full dentures made. About six months after that I grew a new molar tooth under the denture. This was extracted. Recently I grew another molar which also had to be extracted. Am I some kind of freak?

ANSWER — No, you're not a freak. The new teeth you grow are probably part of your full complement of 32 teeth; they just never came out when the others did and remained embedded in gums and bone. These teeth are called impacted.

The pressure of dentures on gums and bone often stimulates growth of impacted teeth. This also happens to root fragments left in the jaw after poorly done extractions. They may lie dormant for years, only to come to the surface after wearing dentures for awhile.

There is also a chance that these recently erupted teeth were extra teeth, two more than the usual 32. If so, they're supernumerary teeth. No one knows why extra teeth form in some jaws. Usually they appear behind upper wisdom teeth, or in upper incisor and lower perimolar regions. They're odd in shape and appear in odd places in the jaw.

Q—My dog's teeth never decay. How come?

A—I don't know. Dog's teeth are apparently very resistant to decay. Even attempts to artificially induce decay in laboratory animals have proved unsuccessful.

Q—The enamel has broken away from my 2 1/2-year-old son's front teeth. They must be sensitive because I think that's why he won't drink from a cup. Can something be done about this?

A—That's pretty young to be exposed to even the simplest kind of dentistry. Yet it may be possible to place steel caps on his teeth. They won't look beautiful, but they'll protect his teeth and may save them until he gets permanent ones at about age 6.

# White Deer, Tigers Battle for Class A Bi-District Title

McLean's Cinderella-type Tigers will try to spoil White Deer's defense-minded Bucks when the two meet at 7:30 p.m. tonight in Harvesters Stadium in a Class A bi-district clash.

McLean, the district 2-A winner, was picked dead last in their conference but upset all the "expert" pickers by finishing in a tie for the district title with Wheeler and Clarendon and taking honor, in a coin toss.

The tigers have posted a 7-2 season record, much better than anyone thought they'd do and have lost only to White Deer, 20-0; Wheeler, 16-14 and last week to Grover, of district 2-A, 26-8.

The Bucks have been their usual selves knocking off nine straight opponents since losing in the state finals a year ago. But how they've done it is next to fantastic.

None of the nine opponents have been able to muster a touchdown against the "Terri-

ble 11" defense the Bucks throw up.

White Deer has had two touchdowns scored against them but both have been on pass interceptions, run back against the offensive team.

To add insult to injury, the nine foes have run up a total of only 620 offensive yards.

McLean hasn't scored against the Bucks in two years, losing in 1965, 48-0.

But this time could be different, the Tigers of Fred Hedgecock have the area's second leading scorer in Raymond Baker, a strong running 65-pound fullback who has scored 10 times and run six, 2-point conversions for 78 points.

The Tigers have been tough defensively in their own right, having given up only 88 points, an average of 8.8 per contest.

White Deer is heavier in both the line and backfield with the Buck line, from end to end, weighing an average of 172.2 pounds per man and 187 pounds per player in the backfield.

McLean averages 164.2 pounds per player from end to end and 149 pounds per man in the backfield.

The Bucks are loaded with talent, both in the line and backfield and have several all-state candidates.

Vernon Marlar, whom new coach Sherill Bottoms changed from fullback to tailback, is the leading scorer with 11 touchdowns and two conversions for 70 points.

Marlar, almost an all-state cinch, has carried 119 times this season for 1,120 yards. Randy Elliott, who has seen only part-time duty this year, has 40 points and has gained 390 yards while fullback Gary Smith, playing in only four games has gained 430 yards on 34 carries.

LEFORS — Groom shoots for their second straight district 5-B championship, beginning at 7:30 p.m. tonight in Pirate Stadium.

Last year the Tigers won the title and finished 1-0 for the season while Lefors was the top place team and was 0-10 for the year.

But under the guidance of Jack York Lefors, like Groom, stands 2-0 in league play setting the stage for the battle of the giants.

Groom has run to a 5-3-1 season record while Lefors is 4-1 but have won four straight games, including a 38-12 decision over Booker two weeks ago.

Groom counts heavily on the running of halfback Jerry Littlefield and quarterback Kyle Black. Littlefield has scored eight touchdowns and four conversions for 56 points while Black has run across seven markers and four conversions for 50 points.

Leading ground gainer for the Pirates has been fullback Gary Smith while halfback Marvin Finney has done most of the scoring.

Smith has carried the ball 53 times for 506 yards and scored 26 points. Finney has carried 95 times for 163 yards but has scored even times.

Gene Hix, 154 pound senior end does the kicking for the Pirates and has booted home seven conversions.

# Arkansas, Ponies Face Stern Saturday Games

Arkansas and Southern Methodist, involved against each other in a big showdown battle only a week ago, find themselves still facing crucial tilts this week end with the stakes still high.

Arkansas can clinch a share of the Southwest Conference championship (maybe win it outright) and the Razorbacks' third consecutive Cotton Bowl visit if they can maintain their nine-game domination of Texas against the loop's stingiest defense at Lubbock Saturday afternoon.

SMU faces an almost "must" situation against Baylor at Dallas in which the Mustangs must beat Baylor to keep alive their hopes of a share of their first title since 1948 if Arkansas wins as expected.

Frogs For Neely

Rice and Texas Christian collide at Houston in the only other game on the program and about the only thing at stake there will be Rice's effort to give Coach Jess Neely a fine memory of his last home appearance as the Owls' coach. Neely retires after this season.

Arkansas is favored by 17 point, SMU by four and Rice by one.

The sixth-ranked Razorbacks, who sport an 8-1 season record and 5-1 in conference play, could win an unprecedented third straight undisputed championship by beating Tech should SMU stumble against either Baylor this week or TCU the following week.

SMU could sweep both games and take the title and the Cotton Bowl berth should Tech upset the Razorbacks, but if Tech dumps the Hogs and SMU also drops one of its last two games, then the winner of the Texas-A&M Thanksgiving Day game also could figure in a three way championship.

Arkansas still would get the bowl nod in that case since it had beaten both of the other champions.

Texas Tech has never beaten Arkansas, but gave the mighty Razorbacks a scare last year in a wild 42-24 game at Fayetteville when both teams' Cotton Bowl hopes hinged on the outcome of the game.

This time, Tech is struggling to stay out of the cellar with its 15 league mark and 3-6 for the season. A crowd of 32-35,000 was expected for the game which statistically will put Tech's league-leading offense against the loop's stingiest defense.

Leinert Lame

Tech halfback Mike Leinert, the club's leading rusher, may miss the game with a sprained ankle, while Arkansas again will play without top rusher Bruce Maxwell and linebacker Lee Johnson and probably guard Jim Barnes.

SMU, 6-2 for the year and 4-1 in conference action, is having its injury troubles, too, with quarterback Mac White a big question mark with a wrenched knee in a cast. Mike Livingston probably will fill in. A crowd of 30-35,000 is expected.

Baylor appears to be regaining the sharp form that saw it turn in big victories over Syracuse and Arkansas. The Bears whipped Texas Tech 29-14 last week and it marked the second week in a row their Terry Southall had completed 24 passes in a game.

TCU will again be playing with out its head coach, Abe Martin, who is in a Fort Worth hospital recuperating from a mild heart attack and there were indications the TCU staff might let southpaw Larry Peel start

at quarterback in an effort to spice up the offense.

## Irish Four-Point Favorite to Win

First-ranked Notre Dame and second-ranked Michigan State, a pair of teams that won't be going to any bowls despite their high ratings, clash Saturday in a battle that promises to be remembered long after the post-season classics are forgotten.

Never in recent years has a college game received so much attention. Special arrangements have been made so the duel for the No. 1 spot can be seen across the nation on television, and the traditional rivalries have been ignored while Michigan State and Notre Dame grab the publicity.

The Irish are rated four points better than Michigan State by the oddsmakers.

Quarterback Terry Hanratty and end Jim Seymour, a brilliant sophomore passing combination, spearhead the Notre Dame attack along with fullback Larry Conjar and halfback Nick Eddy.

Hanratty has completed 77 of 143 passes for 1,221 yards, and Seymour has 37 catches for 712 yards and six touchdowns. Eddy has carried 67 times for 498 yards and seven touchdowns while Conjar has 426 yards on 62 carries.

Clinton Jones and Bob Apisa lead the Spartans' running attack, which is ranked second nationally with 240 yards per game. Jones has accounted for 771 yards on 149 carries, and Apisa has gained 444 on 84 tries.

Michigan State quarterback Jim Raye, who has completed 55 of 103 passes for 968 yards, has two capable receivers in Gene Washington and Al Brenner. Washington has caught 22 for 554 yards and Brenner has 21 catches for 349 yards.

Michigan State will not be able to go to a bowl this year since it was the Big Ten

representative in the Rose Bowl last season, and the conference forbids any team from going two successive years. Notre Dame passes up bowls as a matter of tradition.

In another battle, the Southern California Trojans meet the UCLA Bruins in a game that could shake up the ratings somewhat and might determine the Western representative to the Rose Bowl. Southern Cal is ranked seventh, and UCLA is eighth.

Gary Beban, the amazing UCLA quarterback who has been responsible for 1,699 yards this season, will be out of action for the game because of an ankle injury, and his absence seriously hampers the Bruins' hopes for an upset. Mel Farr, who has gained 742 yards on 121 carries, will carry the load for UCLA.
