





Aliens To Be Required To Give Address

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Thurman, officer in of the Dallas Office of Immigration and Naturaliation Service, stated Saturday that allens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year, must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) accredited diplomats; (2) persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obatined at the Pampa Post office or from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during January.

Thurman said the law pro vides severe penalties for failure to comply with the report. Ark ing requirements.

Millions of dollars will be spent on gifts for children during the next several weeks. Unfortuna ely, part of the money will have been wasted because the gifts were not chosen properly. Gifts that are carefully chosen are usually appreciated more and provide greater enjoyment.

An ideal gift should be chosen af er careful consideration of tne child's age, ability interests and personality. If these factors are satisfied, the gift is more likely to become a favorite plaything.

You surely have heard of cases when an expensive doll has been discarded and an old ragdoll continued as the favorite. Disappointing? It shouldn't be. Adults do similar things. There is a certain security in fimilar items

Don't always try to replace something which the child has enjoyed and has grown old try to find out something about the child's personally and present interests. Don't purchase a quiet game for an extremely active child who spends most of his time on the ballfield. It would also be wrong to buy a baseball glove for a child who dislikes the game or may have no opportunity to play it.

A gift is more appropriate when it is proper for the age level and reasonable for the particular home. A toy or game which is too difficult for the child to understand or too simple to hold 'is interest will surely end up on the shelf. A twelve year old girl may not be interested in a play stove if her mother allows her to participate in actual cooking. Double runner ice skates are not -propriate for the child who is already skilled with single runner skates.

George liked opium. When police arrested him on a narcotics charge, George showed up in court with an unusual defense:

"I stand on my constitutional rights. I am entitled to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. This happens to be my way of pursuing happiness."

But the court found him guilty anyhow, because the protection of his health - whether he liked it or not - was a legitimate concern of the govern-

Actually, the phrase "pursuit of happiness" does not appear in the federal constitution at all. It was used by Thomas Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence.

Nevertheless, by judicial interpretation (and by the constirutional provisions of many states), it is now included among the basic rights of us all. So George was correct in claiming that the right exited.

But George was not correct in thinking that it had no limits. Letting people break windows, rob banks, or set fires, just because it made them happy, would surely turn organized society into chaos.

Furthermore, all too often, one man's pleasure is another man's woe. As an old legal ad-

"Your right to swing your fist ends where my nose begins."

For this reason, the courts have always held that the pursuit of happiness cannot override the proper functions of government. Not only matters of health but also of safety, public order, and general welfare are within the government's realm.

"Wheat producers have not planted all of the acres allotted for 1967. Many of the retired acres will never come back into production as they have been converted to other uses," he pointed out.

While all segments of agriculture have the capacity to produce in excess of market needs. Shuman said, the availability of land does not determine wheat, soybean, -cotton or feed grain production.

'Price, the prospect for prof-it, and the availability of capital, are the most important determinants of production," he

Shuman suggested several prorective actions that should be taken in making the transition from governmental manipulated prices to the market price sys-

Since government price sup port and allotments have tended to become capitalized into land values, Shuman said that Congress should appropriate sufficient funds to purchase the allotment of any farmer who chooses to discontinue growing the controlled crop for a stated period of years rather than producing for the competitive

A second important transitional protection, he said, would be to prohibit the dumping of gov-ernment-held stocks on the market to wreck farmers' pric-


