## Soviet-Made Crises Looming for U.S. in Korea, Cuba and Berlin

WASHINGTON - The pattern of world-wide events seems clearly to be pointing to a convergence of crises late this summer and fall that could overshadow the conflicts in the Middle East and Vietnam.

Whether one speaks to officials in responsible positions in U.S. intelligence circles or Democratic and Republican congressional leaders, one conclusion is now

a series of closely connected crises in Korea. Cuba, and Berlin that will involve U.S. forces with those of other Communist nations but not the Soviets direct-

At all of these East-West confrontation points, the Russians are supplying vast new amounts of arms, as the Kremlin did in the Middle East just prior to the Israeli-Arab fighting.

Most immediate danger area now appears to be Korea, where two under-strength divisions are

At the outbreak of the Middle East crisis, Soviet Deputy Premier Vladirai M. Novikov made a little-noticed virit to Pyongyang. During his stay in that capital the Soviet leader worked out a new strategy with North Korean authorities othat so far has produced the following ominous developments:

-General mobilization of North Korean military forces and the civilian population.

Soviet jet planes, tanks, and SAM ground- to- air missiles.

-A series of border incidents and naval clashes between North and South Korean units. -Student demonstrations and riots in South Korea against the

present pro-U.S. government. SECOND FRONT—According to one U.S. intelligence estimate, Novikov's main mission was to arrange for North Korean military pressure on South Korea to force the latter's withdrawal of forces from South

The South Korean contingent of 45,000 troops is the largest from any Asian nation other than South Vietnam now fighting alongside U.S. troops.

A forced withdrawal of these veteran South Korean troops could be very embarrassing to the U.S. and could mean that additional Americans would have to be sent to Vietnam as replacements.

A renewal of the fighting in South Korea could also force the U.S. to send more troops there.

Now, one out of every five soldiers in the two U.S. divisions in Korea is South Korean.

As the Kremlin official in charge of Russia's defense industries, Novikov is considered to be the Soviet's number one arms production expert. In recent weeks Novikov was given the extra task of overseeing foreign arm shipments.

In early March the North Koreans and Russians set the stage for Novikov's visit by signing an agreement calling for "military collaboration" as

-If it is to safeguard either the health of life of the woman. If there is sound reason for believing the infant will be born physically deformed or mentally

mif a pregnancy resulting from rape or incest threatens the mental or physical health of the woman.

The policy statement also said herapeutic abortions falling into these categories could only performed under these circumstances.

The medical evidence justifying the abortion must be documented.

The abortion decision must be concurred in by two other physicians in writing.

It must be performed in an accredited hospital.

The policy statement originated with the AMA's board of trustees which had adopted a years-long study of all aspects of the abortion question of its committee on human reproduc-

The new AMA policy replaces one adopted in 1871 which held it was "unlawful and unprofessional for any physician to induce abortion or premature view of the safety of the child -if that be possible. The new Thursday, policy makes no mention of the safety of the child.



Taking to the skies in a formation test run at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., is a newcomer to aerial warfare, a unique tilt-wing transport, officially dubbed the XC-142A, that takes off and lands vertically like a helicopter and flies at speeds of more than 400 m.p.h. Designed to carry 32 fully equipped combat troops or 8,000 pounds of cargo, its mission is to transport troops and supplies to and from inaccessible areas. It is one of three vertical take-off and landing (VTOL) aircraft being developed by the Pentagon.

Right, the Vought-built VTOL transport in action: (1) Thousand-pound cargo pallets tumble from the transport's rear hatch in a parachute drop. Plane's ability to fly slow or hover permits pinpoint accurate drops. (2) Wings tilted straight up for vertical hovering, plane rescues a stranded pilot in a rescue mission. Adams said the club is oper-ating on the theory that the turtles will return to the place where they were hatched to lay their eggs.

In the past the experiment has been only partially successful. The first year the eggs were replanted none hatched. The most eggs which have ever hatched after being transported and replanted was 47. This year might be the best,

The egg replanting team arrived at the Mexican beach before the female turtles this year and the eggs were transported to the Texas beach in record

Adams said

Using an airplane and two teams of men-one in Mexico 2,000 eggs were replanted just six hours after they were laid. Adams said the eggs were replanted in special wire mesh nets this year as protection against predators. One year, coyotes dug up the eggs and ruined the experiment,

He had to get special permission from the Mexican government to dig up the eggs and take them out of the country.
