daily price changes and consistently sluggish trading made the stock market a study in slow motion during the past week.

Over the course of the week the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials declined a mere 0.73 to 887.78. Daily trading volume on the New York Stock Exchange never exceeded 12.6 million shares.

"There is a total lack of interest, people aren't responding to good or bad news," said one broker last Friday.

Observers noted that developments generally regarded as favorable, such as President Nixon's proposed visit to Communist China and a continuing ter earnings, failed to spark any sustained rally.

On the other hand, the news that the Nixon administration's economic plan had been dealth setback in the form of a sharp rise in the cost of living in June had no visible negative impact FLINTSTONES on the market.

At least some observers attributed the market's lethargic attitude to the cautious attitude of investors whose uncertainty about the direction of the economy prompted them to retreat to the sidelines.

Market indicators behaved as follows over the past week: The Dow Jones average of 30

industrials declined 0.73 to 887.78. The Associated Press 60stock average lost 0.6 to 119.0. The New York Stock Exchange index of some 1,300 commons slipped 0.15 to 54.82; and The American Stock Exchange index declined 0.17 to 25.44.

The Water Development Board has just ocmpleted the study and is rerady to make it available for use over the entire state. Masch and Associates, also steps might then be taken the appropriate State agencies to alleviate or eliminate any waste discharges that exceeded the maximum amount the stream can absorb.

They devised a mathematical modeling system known as QUAL-1 that uses a computer to stimulate a stream system and to evaluate the effects of a given waste loading upon that system. The models analyze temperature, biochemical oxygen, and conservative minerals (those that don't brerak down or decompose thorugh biological activity) of any given rate of stream discharge as it passes through the simulated stream system.

The modeling system was tested for accuracy and dependability by applying it to a segment of the San Antonio River basin for which sufficient and reliable fieldcollected data were available. Although the models are both practical and reliable right now, further testing and verification will continue to improve and refine them.

The results of these research efforts are described in a highly technical new publication, Simulation of Water Quality in Streams and Canals," that will be of interest mainly to water quality specialists and a discussion of the theory ebhind them, along with numerous examples of typical computer print-outs.

Genocide is the most ghastly crime man has yet perpetrated; unfortunately its victims are many and its history as old as civilization itself.

The mass extermination of people began many centuries before the persecution of the early Christians and has ignominiously proceeded down to the atrocities committed by the Nazis during World War

It was the systematic ed Nations General Assembly in 1948 to condemn genocide as a crime under international law. Although 75 nations have ratified the UN convention - an international agreement or treaty - the United States is still a holdout.

Recently, however, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved the treaty by a vote of 10-to-4. A two-thirds vote by the entire Senate is now required for ratification. The history of ratification

efforts is lengthy. In 1950, President Truman submitted the Genocide Convention to the Senate for ratification. Public opposition was so strong that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee took no action.

A year later, then Sen. Richard M. Nixon made the following statement:

"The major objection to the treaty is that its provisions would not apply to the persecution of political minorities in the Soviet Union. In addition, the treaty, in its present form, grants far more power to the international organization (the UN) than the United States should agree to. . .you can be sure that in view of these objectionable features; I shall continue to oppose the Genocide Treaty in its present

After President Eisenhower's election, there was renewed effort for Senate ratification; but, again, the public said "no." In 1953, Eisenhower's Secretary of State (John Foster Dulles) said the Genoconvention "could better he considered at a later

For 13 more years the Convention lay dormant in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Then on May 12, 1966, Arthur J. Goldberg - former U.S. Ambassador to the UN told the American Jewish Committee that the Johnson administration would press the Senate for immediate ratification of the Convention. Johnson did not press hard, and public opposition re-

mained strong. In December 1969, a liberal group within the American Bar Association (ABA) urged the association - which had opposed the Convention for 20 years - to reverse its stand. But it remained firm, claiming the treaty is "full of holes" and would really do

nothing to prevent genocide. On Feb. 19, 1970, President Nixon reversed his 1951 position and urged the Senate to ratify the Convention. Liberals are hopeful that Nixon has enough conservative image to overcome conservative oppo-

Urging the ABA to recommend ratification of the Genocide Treaty, former Attorney General Nicholas Katzenbach, on Feb. 23, 1970, said:

"I remind you, remember who is looking at you. The world is looking at you."

Consideration of the treaty has been delayed primarily because critics have raised questions over definitions and

The treaty defines genocide as the commission of various acts - killing, causing bodily injury or mental harm, efforts to bring physical destruction, trying to prevent births and transferring children "with intent to destroy, in

whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group.

The treaty further specifies that genocide may be committed by "... rulers, public officials, or private individuals" whether in wartime or peacetime and that their crimes are to be adjudicated in the state where such acts were

allegedly committed. However, if a government systematically disregards the rights of its own people, the treaty provides for extradi-

This would negate part of Article VII of the Convention, which suggests the use of an international penal tribute for those states accepting such jurisdiction.

Existing law provides for extradition only when there is a treaty in force between the United States and another government.

being accused of committing genocide against the blacks. American Indians or Alaskan natives has created more opposition to the treaty. It is now generally conceded, as it was in 1950, that special implementing legislation will have to be enacted before the document is finally approved.

All officials acting in accordance with the terms of these laws could be charged under Provision (d) of Article 11 of the Genocide Convention with "imposing measures intended to prevent births" within one of the groups protected by the Genocide Con-

The same charges could be brought against all who help provide birth control instruction, devices or medicines to members of such groups.

The Genocide Convention not only prohibits killing of members of a group, but also bans whatever causes "serious bodily or mental harm" to members of the group, and imposes "measures intended to prevent births within the group."

It appears that any form of compulsory abortion or birth control would be in violation of the Genocide Convention.

Both the Convention and laws for or against abortion are efforts by government to regulate the lives of the people, to coerce individuals to conform to the ideas of others as to what one group believes is right and proper.

Opponents of ratification state that when the United States enters into international agreements involving Communists powers, the agreements bind this country to a course of action, but have no effect on Communist nations, because Communists never honor their treaty obligations.

The record shows that not once in 38 years has a Communist nation honored an important treaty commitment to the United States.

Following is a summary of Ervin's objections of ratification of the Convention.

Under the Treaty, the International Court of Justice could require the United States to go to war to prevent one nation from killing the nations of another nation.

2. The International Court of Justice could allow the United States to investigate or take action concerning the acts of public officials and other individuals in the U.S.

3. The Convention could lead to the creation of an International Court for trials of American citizens for genocide without the constitutional safeguards and legal rights accorded persons charged with a domestic crime.

4. The Convention could make American soldiers subject to trial for killing and wounding members of the military forces of a warring enemy.

5. The Convention could authorize any party to call on the United Nations to take such action against the United States-under the charter of the UN-which it considers "appropriate for the prevention and suppression of acts of

6. Individuals and government officials would be subject to trial and punishment for offenses which have always been regarded as matters falling within the domestic jurisdiction of the various

NIXON'S FOR IT

President Richard M. Nixon took 19 years to change his mind about the Genocide Convention.

In 1951, as a senator, he voiced opposition to the treaty on the grounds that "it grants far more power to the (UN) than the United States should agree to."

On Feb. 19, 1970, Nixon made the following statement:

"I believe we should delay no longer in taking the final convincing step which would reaffirm that the United States remains as strongly opposed to the crime of genocide as ever.

"By giving its advice and consent to ratification of this Convention," Nixon continued, "the Senate of the United States will demonstrate unequivocally our country's desire to participate in the building of international order based on law






