The packers do not welcome the stampede, even with its low prices, however, well informed persons declare, for much of their careful work of the past year in building up the hog supplies of the state to insure a steady, normal market may be undone. Much of the profits which Texas farmers have reaped the past year must fairly be attributed to packers' efforts to increase the hog population

Need Steady Supply.

On January 1 of this year there were about twice as many hogs in Texas as there were in the same date, 1926, figures being 2,300,000 as against 1,200,000. The big in-crease came from the offspring of about 80,000 bred gilts which the packers helped to distribute last year, it is said here.
What the farmer should do where

possible, experts here say, is to keep a common sense supply of hogs, especially the brood sows, possibly turning them out to rustle while the grain prices are steep and maintain a normal, year-to-year marketing movement which would result in profit to seller and buyer alike in the long run.

# Seasonable Dishes

CAN BY HIGH PRESSURE

Canned string beans can be good or mediocre, depending on the way they are canned.

Either glass or tin containers may be used for packing, but the steam pressure canner is essential. They should be canned within two hours after they are picked.

Select carefully, string wash thoroughly and cut into pieces the size desired. In enough boiling water to cover, boil for five minutes in an uncovered vessel. Pack in containers at once while boiling hot. Cover with water in which they were boiled. Add one teaspoon of salt to each quart.

Process immediately at 10 pounds pressure, or 240 degrees Fahrenheit, quart jars, 40 minutes, pint glass jars, 35 minutes, and No. 2 and No. 3 tin cans, 30 minutes. Remove jars from the canner an dinvert glass jars, placing them out of drafts. Plunge tin cans in cold water to cool quickly,

# Hints for.

With few exceptions, the most sat isfactory proportions for making jelly are three-fourths of a cup of sugar to one cup of fruit juice.

Peaches may be canned by the wa ter bath method. A syrup made from one cup of sugar to each two or three cups of water is used, according to the sweetness of the fruit. Put in one cracked peach pit for each quart of syrup, and strain. Peel the peaches, cut in half, discard the pits and pack in jars. Fill containers with boiling syrup. Process quart and pint jars 25 minute if the fruit is fairly firm and hard; 20 minutes if it is ripe and tender. No. 2 and No. 3 tin cans are processed 15 minutes.

### FARM HINTS

Domestic rabbits need to be fed twice daily. The quantity of grain required depends on their age and condition and also on the kind and quantity of hay and green feeds they receive. The doe requires more grain while suckling young that between breeding periods.

Trees grown close enough together in the farm woods so that their tops are in contact produce high grade saw-logs. The resulting shade discourages excessive limb growth along the trunks, which makes knotty lumber and encourages height growth at the tops.

Grain should be fed to high-producing cows under all pasture conditions. When pastures become short, soiling crops, silage or legume hay should be fed throughout the summer. Browse ranges usually are best adapted to use by cattle dur-ing spring and fall rather than for the full season from spring to fall.
