DEATH PENALTY IS MANDATORY

Jurors Agree Quickly; No Appeal Yet Filed

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, May 10 .- Mrs. Ruth Snyder is under the care of physicians today following her conviction with Henry Judd Gray yesterday, which is expected to be followed Monday with a sentence to die in the electric chair.

Consciousness was restored an hour after her collapse in the cell to which she was returned following hearing the verdict of "guilty of murder in the first degree.'

A doctor said the symptoms resembled epilepsy.



Election Likely Will Be Held Within 60 Days

The next step will be the prepar ation of a petition calling for an election in this district. This petition must include designation of the routes to be followed and include plans and specifications. Considerable research will be necessary in the preparation of the election call.

On receiving the petition the county commissioners will call a hearing. likely to be over a 10-day period. to consider objections, if any devel-

State laws require 30 days' publi cation of the election notices prior to the voting. In other words, the actual vote will take place within the coming 60 days.
