



Mrs. Ewing Recalls Early **Days In Mobeetie Section**

(Continued from Sunday) Ewing recalled her introduction to Mobeetie.

Remembers Stove

"When I think of things which are outstandingly good, I always remember that red-hot stove in Hus-elby's hotel. We were so very cold and it was so satisfyingly hot. My mother was so chilled that she didn't get thoroughly warm and was cold all night in spite of the quilts and heavy buffalo robes. However, the weather had been fine up until that last day."

were moving to the Panhandle on account of my father's health. He suffered from asthma. We lived in Austin. We went to Ft. Worth on the train, and that was as far as the railroad went. We stayed in Ft. Worth several days getting things ready for our trip. We got a hack and two sorrel horses-my father was from Kentucky and always had good horses.

"It was such a long distance, and I remember that my mother was quite sad about leaving her home. was very small, but I remember that she looked sad.

"There were no fences at all between Ft. Worth and Mobeetie and almost no houses. We saw a few houses along where they were building the railroad. Once in a while we saw a cowboy and it was from these cowboys that we received our directions. I remember that they would tell us to go on until we came to a buffalo head and to turn right or left, as the case might be. The buffalo heads seemed to be the only land marks. I remember very well the deserted log-house and the night we were lost in the woods and were afraid the Indianms might find us. But above all I remember how very nice that red-hot stove in Huselby's hotel was."

First Called Sweetwater At the time the Fitches came to Mobeetie, it was a very small town. Located close to Sweetwater Creek was first named Sweetwater. When application for a post office was made, it was refused because there was another town in Texas named Sweetwater. The people had grown accustomed to their town's name and not wanting to make too great a change, they called it Moceetie, an Indian name for "sweet water.

There were five or six saloons in Mobeetie, but the town was not a typical border town of that era. A eneral store or two accomodated the needs of the citizens. A hotel and cafe completed the business section. Ft. Elliott, the government outpost, was located on the hill just above the town.

There were very few residences in the town. Most of the houses were constructed of pickets made by setting the pickets upright in the ground and plastering the cracks with mud. There were a few real log houses. The best houses were made of adobe, but there were very few of them. Robert Fitch managed to get a two room house which was half nicket and half frame.

Women Suffered Discomforts "The walls were very open and the cracks in the floor were so large we could see through them," Mrs. Ewing continued. "The most thing I remember outstanding about those early days was the dis-





AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS TO BE HELD SATURDAY NIGHT

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)-The indoor track season reaches its climax this week as the stars who have been shattering records for the past few weeks and the future record smashers come together in a pair of meets in Madison Square Garden.

The National A. A. U. championships Saturday night will bring out e nearly all the aces who have been competing in the big invitation meets here and at Boston, including Glenn Cunningham, winner of four onemile fixtures; Don Lash, two-mile record smasher; Syracuse Eddie O'Brien, who lowered the indoor 500 yards standard to 57.6 seconds at New York A. C. meet last Saturday and George Varoff, new pole vault record holder, and Earl Meadows, who missed equalling the mark by a quarter of an inch when he cleared 14 feet, 4 5/8 inches Saturday.

As a curtain raiser, the national high and prep school championships will be held in the afternoon along with trail heats for some events of the big meet.

Thirteen of last year's 16 cham-pions are slated to defend their A. A. U. titles with international com-

petition in at least three events. Gene Venzke, defending the 1,500-meter crown, is expected to face the hardest opposition. In addition to the durable Cunningham, Luigi Beccali of Italy, Milklos Szabo of Hun-gary, and Archie San Romani, of Emporia, Kas., all finalists in the Olympic 1,500 last year, are entered. Likewise Lash, after being clocked in 8:58 and 9:01.6, the two fastest times ever recorded by an American. in successive two mile races, has shifted to the shorter event.
