

Volcano spews rocks

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Popocatepetl volcano spewed red-hot rocks late Thursday, its crater lighting up against the night sky.

The two-minute explosion, which happened at 9:36 p.m., launched some red-hot rocks for a small radius near the 17,886-foot volcano, but presented no immediate danger to residents living on its flanks, Mexico's National Center for Prevention of

Disasters said.

The volcano, located about 40 miles south of Mexico City, has been closely monitored since Dec. 18. when the volcano staged its most violent eruption in 1,200 years.

Child found naked, alone

Man, 37, charged with endangering

A 19-month-old Pampa child is safe in a foster home today. A 37-year-old Pampa man is in Gray County Jail. Matthew Lynn Schiffman, 37, 401 N. Banks remained in jail this morning on charges of child abandonment, a state jail felony, and endangering a child, a felony.

Following up on an anonymous report around 10 p.m. Thursday night, Gray County Sheriff's deputies discovered the female toddler left alone at a residence located at 401 N. Banks at 10:15 p.m.

Deputy Randy Langwell said officers were dispatched to the residence. Finding the doors locked, they shined flashlights through the

He said the officers saw the 19-month-old lying on the couch


without any clothes on.

Langwell said officers contacted him at home as well as Child Protective Services workers.

The front door was kicked in by the officers and the child was found alone in the residence.

Langwell said the CPS workers immediately took the child to Pampa Regional Medical Center Emergency Room to be examined. After receiving medical treatment, she was later placed in a foster home by CPS workers.


Langwell said the home was in disarray. He said there was old and (See CHILD, Page 2)

Two Pampans earn kudos for Special Olympics work


AMARILLO – Two Pampa residents brought home two top honors from the Area 16 Special Olympics awards banquet at Amarillo Civic Center on May 4.


Officers probing mishap

LAKE McCLELLAN — Law enforcement officers continue to investigate an incident at Lake McClellan this weekend in which a four-year-old child suffered severe head injuries after being struck by a motorcycle.

Gray County Deputy Randy Langwell said Thursday that the Gray County Sheriff's Department and the U.S. Forestry Service are continuing to investigate the incident and are withholding the names of persons involved until officers decide whether or not charges will be filed.

Langwell said the incident occurred about 8 p.m. Saturday when an 18-year-old man, riding a dirt bike, used an loading ramp located at a camping and picnic area on the northwest corner of Lake McClellan as a jump

Danforth says FBI was reluctant to turn over papers for Waco probe

WASHINGTON (AP) Former Sen. John Danforth said the FBI was so uncooperative in his Branch Davidian investigation that he threatened FBI Director Louis Freeh with a search warrant to gain access to relevant documents, Danforth told The Washington

As special counsel, the Missouri Republican conducted a 14-month investigation into the deaths of about 80 Branch Davidians near Waco, Texas, in 1993.

His inquiry was aimed at determining whether the FBI started a fire that led to the deaths of those inside the religious sect's compound and whether FBI agents opened fire. Danforth's investigation concluded that the FBI did neither.

The process of gaining information from the FBI was harrowing for him, Danforth said. He told the Post that the agency had a "spirit of resistance" to outside authority.

While Danforth said it is possible the FBI did not turn over all of its documents on the subject, he doubts that documents were withheld that had any bearing on his investigation.







HOUSTON — The recent surge in power prices is shocking Houston's religious community and forcing some churches and groups to cut or curtail programs and services.

The utility bill increases also are compelling churches, synagogues and other religious institutions to consider forming alliances to negotiate low-cost, long-term energy contracts when electricity deregulation takes effect in Texas Jan. 1.

"Our combined utility costs for the entire diocese probably runs \$5 said. million plus," O'Toole said. "But if it keeps going the way it is going, it is projected to go to \$7 million to \$7.5 million.

O'Toole and a committee of priests and church members are studying the option of uniting the diocese's 151 parishes, 60 schools and other institutions into a negotiating association to attract a low-cost, long-term electricity contract.

The April 2000 bill was \$43,593. This year, the April bill totaled \$51,382. The price hike impact could be worse if the buildings were old, but First's 1,000-seat worship center and 1,000-student educational wing are less than 2 years old.

Ranking Lutheran bishop resigns before term ends

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California's ranking Lutheran bishop announced he would resign a month before his term ends for participating in the ordination of a non-celibate lesbian.

Admitting "ecclesiastical disobedience," Bishop Paul W. Egertson said Tuesday he would step down July 31. His six-year term ends

Aug. 31; he had not been expected to seek re-election. Last month, Egertson, whose son is gay, became the first active bishop in the 5.1-million-member Evangelical Lutheran Church in America — the nation's largest Lutheran body — to join in the ordi-

nation of a non-celibate gay or lesbian. Presiding Bishop H. George Anderson, who had asked Egertson to resign, called his decision honorable.

"I respect Bishop Egertson's integrity and his beliefs," Anderson said. "I do, however, regret that he participated in the ordination of a candidate who was not approved for ordination in the church, and therefore, violated church policy."

The church ordains homosexuals only if they remain celibate. Anita Hill, who is in a relationship with another woman, was ordained by Egertson and others in St. Paul, Minn., where she has led a ministry to gays and lesbians for two decades.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A \$500 million stadium could be the Dallas Cowboys' new home, but team owner Jerry Jones says taxpayers would have to help finance the project.

Jones has been considering what it would take to relocate the team's venue to the Dallas-Fort Worth mid-cities. The city of Arlington is considered a leading contender for the team's home.

"We're moving quickly now, and Arlington is obviously close to the center of the Metroplex," Jones told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in Friday's editions. "This would be a focal point of sports not just here, but nationally. This would not just be a place for the Cowboys to play."

The new stadium, Jones said, should have 100,000 seats and a retractable roof and should host the Super Bowl within a year or two of opening. He wants a 300-acre site that could accommodate projects such as a Cowboys Hall of Fame or art gallery.




