

Lawmaker calls for execution moratorium

AUSTIN (AP) Saying there are innocent men languishing in Texas' death row, Rep. Harold Dutton filed a bill this week calling tor the state to halt executions while a commission studies the process.

The bill seeks a moratorium on executions until 2003 and would set up a ninemember commission to study issues such as legal representation of inmates. The commission would recommend improvements that would be implemented through legislation.

"I don't think there's one legislator who would say that our whole process by which a person receives the death penalty doesn't have some tlaws," said Dutton, D Houston I just didn't think that we should hurry and do in 140 days what I thought should be a reasoned approach to resolve this problem."

People close to the issue say this may be the first bill that has called for a moratorium in lexas.

The move even surprised staunch death penalty opponents who have been unsue cessful in rounding up legislative support for the measure in the past.

"That will be an uphill battle," said Jimmy Dunne of the Texas Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty.

Texas is known as the death penalty state around the world. It's hard to turn something like that around.

PISD looks at budgets for money it can move into heating bill fund

Heat has not been shut off at any of Pampa's seven school campuses and it will not be even though the bills for gas are sky-rocketing.

That was the word when high Energas bills for the Pampa Independent School District were discussed during Thursday night's school trustee meeting

Superintendent Dr. Dawson Orr told the board that principals from each campus are scrutinizing budgets to see where adjustments can be made due to the high cost to heat the schools. During the November and December billing cycle the district's bill was \$80,000. For the same time frame last year the bill was \$28,000.

The school district budgeted additional money for utilities in anticipation of increased natural gas costs but it was

Orr mentioned rumors that have circulated in the community that heat has been turned off at some campuses. He assures the community heat has not, and will not be, turned off at any campus due to high bills,

The Pampa News has received some phone calls from people alleging that heat has been turned off at some schools. Each call has been followed up, and no campus has been found to be without heat.

PISD Energy Manager Rod Wichert told board members the school district has been working very hard to

identify any areas that can be changed to conserve energy. "Back in August, when it was so hot, we began turning on air conditioning only 30 minutes before class to conserve electricity," he said. "We're taking the same measures with the gas situation.

Wichert said inquiries and requests by staff members are being addressed very quickly. "We're trying to stay on top of the e-mails to help prevent as many problems as

He said the biggest factor in the high gas bills has been extremely cold temperatures. Wichert, a career and technology teacher at Pampa High School, has been energy director for seven years. Orr said Wichert conducts regular energy audits of district facilities.

Suit against **PEDC** moved back to Amarillo

After legal wrangling by both sides, the lawsuit filed against the Pampa Economic Development Commission and three board members by former Executive Director Bill Ready will be heard in

Ready's suit was originally filed in Austin where he lives and his attorney had sought to keep the matter there. The PFDC was successful earlier in having the case moved to U.S. District Court in Amarillo where U.S. District Court Judge Mary Lou Robinson then

sent the case back to federal court in Austin. But on Thursday, Chief U.S. District Court Judge James R. Nowlin filed an order moving the case to Amarillo citing that all the defendants' residences, principal place of business, events in the case and all material witnesses were located in Gray County.



PISD Facilities Director Denver Bruner said the school district is doing everything it can to keep the gas costs down. "We were being very frugal before the gas prices sky-rocketed," he said.

Bruner said he is glad the school district has replaced older heating units at some of the elemen-tary schools, as it has been cost-effective and energy saving.

"I hazard to guess what the gas bills would be if we hadn't changed those out," he said. "Early Learning Center and Mann, which haven't been changed out, were the areas with the highest bills."

Dr. Orr said there is definitely a correlation between the cold weather and the high gas bills. He said when the gas bill is received for January the staff will examine the issue further. He said he anticipates high bills in January, February and March as

those three months are traditionally high consumption months due to the cold. "After that time-frame, they should drop drastically," he said.

Also, the cost of gas has been going up each month, Energas reported earlier.

He said discretionary items in the budget will like-

ly be where the money comes from for the gas bills. He said usually the administrative staff didn't address the discretionary budget items so intensely until mid-April. Orr also said the district is now moving slowly to fill a recent vacancy in personnel in an effort to be cost-effective.

Business Manager Mark McVay told the board the current gas bills heighten the importance of maintaining an adequate fund balance (emergency fund) for the school district. "This is why we have this fund. We can use it to pay unexpected expenses to keep the school going when an emergency situation such as these high gas bills occur," he said.

As previously reported, the PEDC did purchase the Suburban from Culberson-Stowers after advertising for bids.

As far as accounting services by Meers, it has been previously reported that he did work for the now defunct U.S. Bus Company which received: PEDC funds.

The PEDC and the named defendants have denied any wrongdoings as alleged by Ready.

HONOLULU (AP) — The outrageously long backswing and the brisk walk down the fairway puffing on a cigarette was vintage John Daly. Nothing else about him looked familiar in the first round of the Sony Open, least of all his score.

When his 6-foot birdie putt disappeared into the cup on his final hole Thursday, Daly had a 6-under 64 — his lowest score in three years - and a share of the lead for the first time since the 1997 PGA Championship.

"I'm a little shocked myself," Daly said.

He wasn't alone. "Everything he does kind of surprises you," Brad Faxon said after an eagle on No. 18 put him in a tie for first with Daly and Larry Mize.

Daly has a history of springing surprises, whether it was winning the PGA Championship as an alternate in 1991, winning the British Open at St. Andrews in 1995 or some of his wild living that has made him a cult figure in golf.

The last time Daly had a 64 was in the final round of the Honda Classic in 1998, when he finished tied for fourth. He hasn't had a top-10 finish

There was reason to believe that might change this week at Waialae Country Club.

Daly said he can't remember the last time he had a drink. He has dropped 60 pounds from this time a year ago, cutting out the snacks and getting off medication such as lithium and Prozac that he took for three years.

"I was the rat for some doctor," he said.

He also put steel shafts back in his club and went back to an old putter with added weight in the toe of the club. But perhaps the biggest change is that he no longer just grips it and rips it.

"I play a lot more conservatively than I used to, and I think that's starting to pay off," Daly said. "As a kid, all I even thought of doing was hitting driver on every hole but the par 3s — at times I did that, too. I taught myself to be as aggressive as I possibly can.

"It's taken me at least two or three years to learn.

Hitting driver on only five holes and getting into serious trouble only once, Daly made seven birdies in his round of 64 on a windy day at Waialae, although 15 mph gusts are relatively calm for these parts.

Mize was one of the few who was not caught off guard by the sight of Daly's name atop the leader board. They played the final round together at the Tucson Open last


For the season, the Harvesters are 16-10.

Economy: Trade deficit declines for second n

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit declined in November for a second consecutive month to \$33 billion as America's sharp economic the November report. slowdown took some pressure off a soaring trade imbalance. Imports of oil, autos and computers all fell.

The Commerce Department said the 1.7 percent drop in the deficit in November marked the first back-to-back declines in more than three years, since a three-month improvement from May through July 1997. The October figure dropped 0.6 percent.

Even with the two small declines, the trade deficit remained close to its record high of \$33.7 billion set in September. 

Bush's long hello begins with star-studded show

inaugural festival stretched into Friday, with celebrations for authors, veterans and youth on tap by day and the Texas Black Tie and Boots Ball on the party list at night.

Beneath a canopy of gray clouds and floodlights on the Lincoln Memorial, Bush promised "a fresh start" as the four-day inaugural festival began Thursday night. Hip-swiveling singer Ricky Martin, the 2 1/2-hour show's headliner, sashayed over to Bush and coaxed him into busting a dance move, the two of them briefly swaying together on stage to the Latin beat of "The Cup of Life."

The two were the biggest draws. "I wanted to see the president and Ricky Martin," said a smiling Lorenz Everett, 10, of Woodbridge, Va., accompanied by his mother, Retina, a brother, Levance, and neighbor Camden Babcock.

Bush and his wife, Laura, sat together chatting and beaming at the tens of thousands of onlookers who crowded the memorial and lined the Washington Mall.

CNN talk show host Larry King played master of ceremonies, the Radio City Music Hall Rockettes kicked up their heels and military jets buzzed overhead. Las Vegas entertainer Wayne Newton won an enthusiastic thumbs up from Bush, while country music stars such as Brooks & Dunn set a plaid-and-saddle tone for the former Texas governor's ascent to the White House.

Secretary of State-designate Colin Powell, who sat in the audience with Commerce Secretary-designate Don Evans, at one point stood up and clapped and sang "Let the Sun Shine In" along with Marilyn McCoo and her husband, Billy Davis Jr., founding members of the 1960s group The Fifth Dimension.

Christian singer Sandi Patty performed the national anthem. Spectacular red, white, blue and gold fireworks erupted over the Washington Monument, blending pageantry with storm

We had to come down to celebrate a new president. It's something you want to see at least once in your life," said Rick Davies of Reston, Va., who was joined by his wife, Terry, and their son, Dean.

Before laying claim to the presidency on Saturday, the Bushes and Vice President-elect Dick Cheney and his wife, Lynne, allowed themselves some time to celebrate after the grueling five-week presidential contest and shortened time for assembling a White House Cabinet and staff.

Other politicians at the show were Attorney General-designate John Ashcroft, and Florida Secretary of State Katherine Harris, who played a critical role in the troubled presidential vote count-

Bush took to the stage toward the end of the show, telling the crowd, "I am honored to serve and I am ready to start."

Organizers had anticipated that 75,000 people would attend, but the cold and an intermittent drizzle kept many away. Bush and other members of the incoming administration had seats protected

Officer admits asking Marines to falsify Osprey records

Osprey aircraft squadron has admitted asking his subordinates to falsify maintenance records relating to the flight readiness of the hybrid helicopter-airplane, a senior Marine Corps official said Friday.

The officer was fired Thursday, nearly a week after the allegations were made anonymously.

"He admitted that he had done essentially what was on the tape," the senior official said, referring to an audio tape received Jan. 12 in which Lt. Col. Odin Fred Leberman allegedly told members of his Osprey records.

The senior official, who is closely on condition of anonymity. He said the Marines would announce the Leberman admission and perhaps release a transcript of the tape later

Leberman made the admission Jan. 13 to his immediate superior, a colonel who in turn passed the word to Maj. Gen. Dennis Krupp, commanding general of the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing. Krupp relieved Leberman of duty as squadron commander on Thursday, the same day the Marine Corps inspector general arrived at Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C., to launch an investigation of the squadron.

The Marine Corps also has began a legal investigation that could result in criminal charges against Leberman, the senior official said.

In announcing the allegations Thursday, the Marine Corps said it believes there is no connection between the alleged falsification of documents and the causes of two Osprey crashes last year that killed 23

There is nothing in these allegations, even if substantiated, that would have affected the safety of the aircraft," said Maj. Patrick Gibbons, a spokesman at Marine Corps headquarters in the Pentagon.


