Sharpe and Reid Are Instigating Plans For Building

FIRST FLOOR ALREADY TAKEN

Only Leases Hold **Back Immediate** Work

Proposing to rear another tall structure into Pampa's growing skyline, a group of local men now propose to erect a seven-story office building to be known as the Oil Exchange.

Tentative plans have been drawn and longtime leases on the first floor have been secured. Those behind the project also have many assurances' that the upper floors will be in demand, and they confidently expect that the fine structure can be built.

Chas. H. Sharpe, local contractor, who built the Adams hotel, Schnelder hotel, Pampa hospital, and other fine structures, is in charge of plans for the Oil Exchange, and would like to confer with all firms and individuals who would be interested in taking a lease on part of the new building. Mayor F. P. Reid and Mr. Sharpe are instigators of the project, and they declare that the building can be started as soon as sufficient leases are obtained.

For Oil Capital

Pampa as the oil capital of the drilling territory has made the demand for such a building very keenly felt, and the proposal would be carried out to fill this need and to enable Pampa to more fully realize its possibilities. It is asserted that many companies will establish district headquarters here when office space is available.

The Sunday school department will have an outside entrance by sairway on the west side. Later, when a church auditorium is built, the Sunday school annex will be incorporated in the large plant.



Recollections of Pampa as a "whis- Six Escape As tling post" at which the Santa Fe not even "hesitate" were given at the Lions club luncheon Thursday by Judge Newton P. Wilis, who contrasted the Pampa of old with the Pampa of today.

Citing history, the judge recalled that in 1852 Captain Marcy of the U. S. Army explored Gray county for the source of the Red river. With him was George B. McClellan, who discovered the creek which Marcy named for McClellan, a topographical engineer. Previously, Indians who abounded in this section had assured the explorers that there was no water in this vicinity. Marcy buried a bottle near LeFors containing the names of his men, but it has never been found.

Judge Willis' grandfather founded the first Sunday School and the first, church in the Panhandle, at Mobeetie, and his father, Frank Willis, Sr., became the Panhandle's first district judge. The orator-judge from Canadian declared Pampa has a wonderful opportunity at this time. He sketched the city's history, through king, the cotton king, and the oil king, closing with a clever poem of his own writing, in which he recited Judge Newton P. Willis recessed the romance of the wildcatter.

EXPENDITURE OF \$400,000 NEEDED

Par Is Expected Today For McLean's Bonds

Voters in the Pampa special road district will go to the polls September 10 to determine whether hard-surfaced highways shall be built in this community.

Gray county commissioners Monday afternoon approved a new petition. Setting of the election date had been delayed because the commissioners found an error in a previous petition. Action at that time indicated that an election would be called when the correct document was ready for action.

The election contemplates the issuance of \$400,000 in loagtime bonds to hard surface approximately 42 miles of highway extending in six directions from Pampa and serving both through and oil field traffic.

The commissioners received bids on the \$250,000 bridge and road project in the McLean special road district, but rejected all of them as teo low. Appearance of attorneys for Dr. Fred M. Boso, asking for a 60-day extension of the time limit to fulfill the conditions of the new gas franchise precipitated a lengthy discussion. The new company, under the terms of the franchise, must have laid four miles of gas mains by August 21. 

Menus for the Family

BREAKFAST-Grap fruit, broiled fish, potato cakes, rye muffins, milk and coffee.

LUNCHEON-Cold boiled tongue in aspic, potato salad, corn muffins, blackberries and cream, plain cookmilk, tea.

DINNER-Vegetable plate, watermelon, salad, caramel custard, milk,

In this dinner menu the proteinrich dish is found in the dessert. Often a poached egg is served on a bed of spinach or any creamed vegetable on toast but for this "plate" the addition of the egg is unnecces sary. When planning a vegetable dinner always choose vegetables of contrasting color and arrange them at-

Cold Boiled Tongue in Aspic

Two tablespoons granulated gelatine, 1/2 cup cold water, 2 cups boiling water, 2 bouillon cubes, 2 tablespoons minced carrot, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 2 tablespoons minced celery, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1/2 teaspoon salt, few grains of pepper, 1 cup diced cold boiled tongue, 1- head celery.

Soften gelatine in cold water for five minutes and dissolve in boiling water the bouillon cubes. Add carrot. onion, parsley, celery and salt to the dissolved bouillon cubes, cover closely and simmer 20 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in softened gelatine. Strain through wire and then through cheesecloth. Place a spoonful of the aspic in the bottom of each individual mold. It will stiffen very quickly. On this place a slice of crisp celery. Cover with a thin layer of aspic and a layer of diced tongue. Continue layer for layer of aspic, celery and meat until all is used. Put on ice for several hours to chill and become firm. Sumoid on a bed of lettuce hearts and celery curls.

To unmold wrap each cup in a towel wrung out of hot water. Invert and the aspic will slip out eas-

KING ALBERT BACKS CONGO FLIGHT. SEEKS BELGIUM-AFRICA AIR LINK

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Aug. 11 .-(AP)-Out of a king's vision of 48-hour air service between Brussels and Leopoldville, in the Belgian Congo of Africa, has come a plan of two Belgian aviators, Lieut. G. Medaets and Lieut. Jean Verhaegen, to fly from Belgium to the mouth of the Congo river. The nonstop flight to the land, of the heart of darkness is being made at the request of King Albert, one of commercial aviation's most enthusiastic patrons.

Lieutenants Medaets and Verhaegen have already flown the 5,589 miles from Brussels to Leopoldville, taking 12 days for the flight. If they can span the jungle and the Brussels boulevards in a nonstop flight, King Albert believes that much of the world's fear of Africa's wilds and isolation will vanish.

The king and queen are giving unstinted support to the project. A member of the royal family is expected to christen a Brequet plane for the flight. It is considered possible that Princess Astrid will give her name to the plane.

Although the distance of the contemplated flight is just about the same as that covered by Byrd and his crew in the America, the scientific data resulting is expected to be entirely different in character because of the wilderness over which the Belgians will fly. The effect of the equatorial heat on atmospheric conditions is something about which aviators know very little. Mail planes now operating in the Belgian Congo have supplied the bulk of what is known of African flying conditions. Extension of the African air mail and eventual establishment of a direct air service with Europe is the dream of King Albert for the Belgian Congo.

acquittal should be found if the de fendant did the act charged under "reasonable apprehension or fear of death." He pointed out, however, that while the Rangers had the right to arrest Christian, it was their duty to turn their prisoner over to the sheriff and accept a receipt for him. The sheriff, subject to the order of the courts, is thereafter responsible for the safe-keeping of the prisoners.

Quotes Rangers' Words.

Opening his state argument the District Attorney Douglas recalled testimony of Bates that De-Graftenreid said "to hell with the district judge and district attorney' when the deputy said his orders came from those officials and the sheriff, not from Rangers. It was stated that Bates was struck a terrific blow by the Ranger and shot at as he reeled backward with his right hand over the injured organ. The shooting at the deputy was declared intent to kill without any justification.

Charges Bullying

Douglas declared it was unreasonable that Bates would attack three Rangers. He imputed a bullying attitude to the state officers, although he contended it was none of their business to dictate how the Hutchinson-county sheriff's department shall provided by law.
