

Troopers net \$1.7 million of marijuana

Two Texas Highway Patrol officers Thursday discovered a speeding tractor-trailer rig was hauling a lot more than 40,000 pounds of lettuce.

The truck also held almost a ton and a half of marijuana valued at \$1.7 million - the largest marijuana seizure ever recorded in the Texas Panhandle.


While on patrol about 10 a.m. Thursday, Troopers Jerome Ingle and Jason Henderson of the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), clocked a truck-

tractor traveling 81 miles per hour in the eastbound lane of Interstate 40, about two miles east of Conway. The posted speed limit in the area is 70 miles per hour, Ingle said.

The driver of the truck told the troopers he was traveling from Salinas, Calif., back to New

The DPS officers stopped the rig for speeding and obtained a consent to search from the driver, Louis Gilmer, 35, of South Hackensack, N.J. Ingle said when he checked the trailer, he found a legitimate load of ice-

Authorities said today that a motorist on Texas 70 north of Pampa called the Gray County Sheriff's office shortly before 7 p.m. Thursday to report a woman tied up in the back of a Chevrolet El Camino pickup speeding south on

Sheriff Copeland said he was out for Regional Medical Center when he heard the call go out. The deputy responding to the call was south of Pampa at the time, the Sheriff said.

Copeland said he turned north onto to Perryton Parkway, thinking he could slow the El Camino down or stop it until the deputy got there.

on U.S. 70, he saw the El Camino stopped by the side of the road on the hillside curve near Walnut Creek. Copeland said a man was bending over the bed of the pickup and appeared to be tightening the bonds on a woman in the back of the truck. As the Sheriff pulled in behind the El Camino, he said the man slid behind he steering wheel and sped away ignor-

ing the Sheriff's orders to stop. Copeland chased the El Camino south n Texas 70, then east around Pampa on Loop 171 at speeds up to 85 mph.

The El Camino slowed, Copeland said, as it turned off on Browning and went through Danzinger Crossing. The El

The Sheriff said that as he drove north Camino turned west on Tyng, then south on Tignor.

> 'He crossed U.S. Highway 60," Copeland said, "to McCullough." There the El Camino turned west on McCullough to Osborne, then turned north on Osborne before sliding to a stop in front of a house trailer at 1200 Osborne.

> After identifying himself, Sheriff Copeland had the driver of the car lie on the ground until deputies arrived.

> During the chase, Copeland said he kept hoping deputies could position themselves in front of the fleeing vehicle to stop it, but every time the truck turned, it required law enforcement officers to try

Grand jury indicts 21 this week

Twenty-one people were indicted by a Gray County grand jury this week involving charges that ranged from drugs, alcohol, sex, robbery, child abuse, government documents and stolen cars.

A Lefors man, recently sentenced to 60 years after being convicted of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, was indicted on possession charges.

Kerry Layne Zeek, 30, Lefors, was indicted on charges of possession of a controlled substance - methamphetamine, more than one gram but less than four grams. Earlier this month he was convicted of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver by a Gray County jury and sentenced to 60 years in

Barney Earl Sawyer, 44, Lefors, was indicted on charges of possession of a controlled substance - methamphetamine, more than one gram but less

than four grams. The indictments returned this week stem from Zeek's and Sawyer's arrest on April 1, by Gray County deputies. A deputy said he approached Sawyer's pickup that day because it appeared to be parked on private property and the two men inside were trespassing. Pair enters guilty plea for federal mail theft

AMARILLO - A Pampa father-daughter team remain in Potter County jail awaiting sentencing on federal mail theft charges.

John Hardy King, 50, 1608 N. Sumner, is expected to be sentenced in late June on one count of stealing mail. He pleaded guilty to two counts of stealing mail in federal court on April 26. As part of a plea bargain, he will be sentenced on one count on June 21 by U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson. The other count will be dismissed.





WACO, Texas (AP) — A Dallas Floating menace is likely to spread, choking river inlets

HOUSTON (AP) — As temperatures heat up, water hyacinth in the San Jacinto River are expected to start reproducing, causing major headaches for homeowners along the waterway.



front port of the trailer. "(Henderson) got up and looked in the top port and saw a different kind of boxes. He could smell

the marijuana," Ingle said. The troopers discovered a homemade freezer, constructed in the front of the trailer, filled with cardboard boxes wrapped in plastic wrap and smeared with mustard. Inside each box was a 55pound brick of marijuana.

Mustard is sometimes used to block the smell of the marijuana.

"It didn't work," Ingle commented.

A total of 2,487 pounds of marijuana with an estimated street valued of \$1.7 million was found in the trailer, Ingle said.

"It's the largest marijuana seizure to date in Texas," he said.

Ingle and Henderson arrested Gilmer for possession of marijuana over 2,000 pounds, a first degree

Gilmer remained in Carson County Jail at press time today awaiting a bond hearing, according to the Carson County Sheriff's Office.


