

Big storm kills cattle, strikes Carson home **By DEE DEE LARAMORE** Staff Writer

A "monster" tornado, at times reaching a half-mile in diameter, spared White Deer residents and skirted other populated areas as it swept through the Texas Panhandle Tuesday evening.

The cone-shaped tornado destroyed à Carson County farm house, killed and injured a number of eattle and leveled a weight station at grain elevator west of White Deer before veering south of the community and crossing through open pastureland. Eventually, the twister lost strength and ascended back into the storm southwest of White Deer, spotters reported.

"It got pretty scarv last night," said Gray County Sheriff's Deputy Gary Noblett: "White Deer was really lucky. If they weren't religious there, they are now."

White Deer City Marshal Tam Terry agreed.

"At White Deer we ought to have a prayer meeting or something, because there were a lot of prayers answered last night."

Engineering pact gets nod from city

An engineering contract has been approved so that all will be in place once the state gives the go ahead on plans that will improve the treatment process at the city's water plant.

City Commissioners voted Tuesday in favor of hiring engineers CH2M Hill of Dallas at a cost of \$186,750.

A new system to be installed — Actiflo — will increase the detention time of water, according to City Manager Bob Eskridge. Also, an alternative chemical process to be utilized will eliminate the need for chlorine

. The changes are necessary to comply with orders from the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission.

Actiflo is an "active sediment removal system," as opposed to the present method which allows sediment to settle into a basin, Eskridge said. Actiflo will restore sedimentation basin capacity to six million gallons per day.

Regarding chlorine, abandoning its use will eliminate interaction of that chemical with organic matter (leaves, dirt, etc.,) in water from Lake Meredith. The chemical byproduct that results from the interaction produces a known carcinogen, trihalomethane

Previous tests of the city's water showed total trihalomethanes to be above allowable limits and the TNRCC suggested pregnant women drink bottled water.

Pending the switch from chlorine, Eskridge said previously more city well water is being introduced into the water supply thus diluting the amount of Lake Meredith water and bringing the trihalomethane count down to approved levels.

Also, Lake Meredith water will be diluted when the Roberts County well field project comes on-line this summer. Eskridge has said adding the Roberts County water to the salty lake water will improve the taste of local drinking water.

Lack of rabies shot is reason

Animal Control officers in Pampa are bewildered.

"We just keep finding dogs that aren't vaccinated against rabies," said Sandy Burns, Pampa Director of Animal Control. "Many people are not taking this rabies situation seriously, and pets are having to be destroyed.

She said a small child was bitten in the face by a dog again last week, and the family pet had to be destroyed to be sent to Austin to be tested. "It was good the animal was not rabid, but the dog had to be destroyed to send its head to Austin for testing.

"It is so unnecessary to have to destroy these family pets," she said. "If people would only

have their animals vaccinated, the pets wouldn't have to be destroyed in these instances."

In early May, a 22-month-old girl had to undergo rabies shots when a dog bit her in the face. The Texas Department of Health recommended the small child begin the shots immediately because of her age and the location of the bite in case the dog was rabid.

Dr. James Alexander, Zoonosis veterinarian of the Canyon TDH office, said the shots were a precaution. He said in that case if they waited to begin the shots until after the dog was tested and it was rabid, it could be too late for the child.

When the report came in from the Austin laboratory that the dog was not rabid, the shots were discontinued.

Governor pushes selected programs, Fort Bliss sergeant, brother embraces some centrist issues

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry embarked on his first legislative session as governor with a dose of caution and with commitment to his pet programs.

Improving education, the state's roads and the Texas border region topped Perry's agenda.

More contentious matters — a hate crimes bill, a nursing home fee and Medicaid simplification met him along the way as the governor charted a course mostly free of political land mines.

"I see no major mistakes," said Bruce Buchanan, a government professor at the University of Texas. "I don't see any evidence that he's shot himself in the foot in any major way."

After the 77th Legislature adjourned Monday, the governor declared it a success.

"It may not have been the most graceful session, but ultimately the people of Texas will judge us on results, and on that basis, this session was a tremendous success," said Perry, who plans to run for governor in 2002.

The Republican ascended to governor from lieu-tenant governor after George W. Bush resigned in December to become president. While preserving Bush's legacy, Perry managed to use some legislative issues to move himself toward the political center before his campaign in 2002, Buchanan said.

Jury continues deliberation in case

AUSTIN (AP) — A West Virginia man accused of killing a teen-age girl in a Central Texas yogurt shop almost a decade ago says his confession was coerced, while prosecutors contend he is making for captivity, torture up stories to hide his crime.

Jurors were set Wednesday to continue deliberating the fate of Robert Burns Springsteen IV, who would face the death penalty if convicted of capital murder in the shooting death of Amy Ayers, 13.

Springsteen's defense lawyers on Tuesday urged jurors to acquit him despite a confession given to police in 1999.

Springsteen took the witness stand during the three-week-long trial to proclaim his innocence. The 12-person jury deliberated for about six hours Tuesday before breaking for the night at 7 p.m. The panel was sequestered overnight and was to reconvene Wednesday morning.

Springsteen, 26, is accused of killing Ayers during a botched robbery that turned into murder on the night of Dec. 6, 1991 at an I Can't Believe It's Yogurt shop.

Eliza Hope Thomas, 17, and sisters Jennifer and Sarah Harbison, 15 and 17, also were killed. All four girls were bound, gagged and shot in the head. The store was then set on fire.

The 1999 confession, in which Springsteen admitted killing Ayers, is the key piece of evidence. Prosecutors have no physical evidence against him as the crime scene was destroyed by the fire.

The family loaded up in two pickups, heading in what they thought was the opposite direction. When they got onto the highway, though, the tornado was running parallel to their vehicles before turning toward their rural Carson County home. "It was awful," Martin, 38, said late Tuesday night. "It was terrifying. The tornado was between us and the house and that was it." Their 2,200 square-foot farmhouse, two vehicles left on the land and a horse trailer were destroyed when the tornado hit. Martin, her husband and four children, ages, 18, 14, 7 and 5, survived. "I was trying to cook supper and I have no idea where it's at — the steak and potatoes and the corn are all gone," she said. Part of the house, was thrown many feet onto railroad tracks. She said they had been leasing the house for about a year and had no insurance.

arrested in murder plot

EL PASO (AP) - A bloody hand print on the arm of a slain Fort Bliss captain led police to arrest her husband and his brother and charge them in the murder, according to police.

Army Sgt. Roger Reister, 27, allegedly hired Rodney Reister, 25, to kill Lynn Reister. The 30year-old woman was found stabbed to death Thursday in the couple's off-post home.

Police said a bloody hand print they found on Lynn Reister's right forearm was "positively identified as being made" by Rodney Reister's left hand

Rodney Reister made a statement to authorities, implicating himself and his brother, police said.

Both men were arrested Sunday morning. Roger Reister remained jailed Wednesday in lieu of \$500,000 bond on a capital murder charge. Rodney Reister was held in lieu of \$125,000 bond on a murder charge.

Lynn Reister was found lying in a pool of blood with stab wounds to her throat in the master bedroom of her home. Roger Reister had called the police minutes earlier, saying he found his wife's body upon returning home from work, police said. The couple has a 4-year-old son who is now stay-

ing with grandparents, police said.

Bridget Reeves, who graduated from Norwich University with Reister in 1994, said students at the military campus in Northfield, Vt., were shocked to learn of the death.

Judge orders Iraq to pay four men

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal judge has ruled that the Republic of Iraq is liable for personal injury in a multimillion-dollar judgment to four men who say they were taken hostage and tortured in the early 1990s.

U.S. District Judge Louis Oberdorfer ruled that Iraq must pay more than \$18 million to the men. Lawyers will seek to collect the damages from an estimated \$1.2 billion in frozen Iraqi assets in the United States.

The ruling Friday was made possible after Houston attorneys lobbied Congress for an amendment to the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act to allow lawsuits against foreign nations for committing acts of terrorism. The amendment was passed in 1996.

"I don't think this is compensation for what I went through, but it would help with financial security for my wife and children," said Ken Beaty, who said he was held in a Baghdad prison for 205 days after mistakenly crossing the border from Kuwait into Iraq in April 1993.

Beaty, who lives in Mustang, Okla., said he was in Kuwait working as a drilling-rig supervisor when he accidentally drove across the border. Border guards arrested him at gunpoint, he said, and he was confined to a prison cell for 11 days with no water, toilet or bed.

Embassy bombings trial enters death penalty phase

NEW YORK (AP) — Calling guilty verdicts against four men implicated in the bombings of U.S. embassies in Africa "a triumph for world justice," prosecutors must now try to convince a jury why two of the men should be put to death.

The same panel that convicted the four accused followers of Osama bin Laden will decide the death penalty part of the case, which was to begin Wednesday in federal court in Manhattan.

They were found guilty Tuesday of a global conspiracy to murder Americans, including the 1998 bombings of U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania that killed 224 people, including 12 Americans, and injured thousands of others in a hail of rubble and shattered glass.

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the wood frame house rented by Kevin and Debbie Martin east of Panhandle, said Carson County Sheriff Gary Robertson. The couple looked out the window and saw the tornado headed toward their house

"Although the house had a basement, it was old enough there was no concrete on top," Robertson said Kevin Martin told him. "They were in fear that something would fall on them," he said, so the family chose to leave the house. "They thought they had time to get away, and I guess they did.

The parents and two children got in one vehicle and their two teen-age sons got into the family's pickup with their dogs with the understanding they would meet at a designated spot in Panhandle.

For some unknown reason, Robertson said, the boys went east toward White Deer instead of turning west to Panhandle. When they didn't arrive at the meeting place, he said, the Martins became extremely concerned they had been caught in the tornado. Fortunately, they were located after the storm passed over, the sheriff said.

A weight station at the Cuyler Elevator, off U.S. Highway 60, east of Panhandle, was also destroyed by the twister.

There's nothing there but a commode and a concrete slab," Robertson said.

A mother cow-calf operation owned by Carson County Judge Lewis Powers sustained possibly the greatest loss from the storm, the sheriff said.

"He's out there looking over the damage today. There's veterinarians out there, too. He's not sure how many can be salvaged," Robertson said.

An undetermined number of animals were killed outright, he said. Judge Powers had to euthanize several others last night, he added. The cattle were on pastureland north and west of the elevator, the sheriff said, in the direct path of the tornado.

Robertson said deputies from his office spent the evening checking on the welfare of farmers in the area where the supercell storm first spawned the tornado. Farmers there reported damage to farm equipment and irrigation systems, he said.

Storm spotters, including Channel 7's meteorologist Heather Hope, Terry, and Trooper David O'Brien of the Texas Department of Public Safety, converged on the tornado as it was forming between Pantex munitions plant and Panhandle.

Also out in the thick of things were David Bowser, Pampa News photographer, and a crew from KFDA Channel 10.

"It was a big one. It reminded me of (former Gray

County Sheriff) Randy Stubblefield's video of the Pampa tornado," Terry said.

"I thought we were going to get smacked pretty good," he said.

"It was a nice, pretty tornado. And then I thought, you learn in weather watching school that when a tornado isn't moving and it seems to be getting bigger that means it's coming straight at you," he said. Terry and the Channel 7 Highlander driven by lope nearly collided, he said, when they both tried to turn their vehicles around as they realized at the same time that the tornado was heading toward them.

"It was coming straight at us," he said. "It crossed the highway right in front of us."

As it crossed U.S. 60, the twister strung a major power line and power pole across the highway creating a hazard for drivers, officials said.

"SPS got there as soon as the weather cleared," Terry said.

Law enforcement officers east of White Deer and west of Panhandle closed the highway, a major thoroughfare between the eastern Panhandle and Amarillo, because of the danger from downed power lines.

Noblett, and Gray County deputies Heath Cates, Randy Langwell, and Morse Burroughs, protecting the closed highway, watched the tornado as it skirted White Deer.

You could see White Deer and Highway 60 and all around it was tornado," Noblett said. "I thought White Deer was going to be history.

"It was a monster. They said on the west side of (the tornado), it was all white and pretty. It was black and dirty on our side," he added.

Robertson said the highway wasn't re-opened until approximately 1 a.m. today.

Power outages were reported in eastern Carson County, rural residences along the twister's path and the west side of White Deer, officials said.

Employees of Scarab Manufacturing, a recycling plant west of White Deer, had been evacuated, he said.

"Why it didn't blow Scarab off the face of the map, I'll never know," Terry said.

As Terry and the other storm spotters watched, the tornado ascended back into the storm about two miles west of the facility.

"It whooped around in a field and just played out," he said.

'It was a tragic deal. We lost a lot in property and livestock, but from my perspective, we came out great. There were no human injuries. We were really lucky," Terry said.

RABIES during May of 2001 is nearly double what they

were last year. "We have had 17 dog bites reported to us this year compared to nine a year ago," she said. "We feel like more are probably being reported this year because they are more aware of the danger."

Burns said only six of the 17 dogs reported in 2001 to have bitten humans have been vaccinated for rabies.

According to the state law if a dog, cat or ferret bites a human the animal must be quarantined for 10 days.

If a currently vaccinated animal has been exposed to a rabid animal the animal shall be euthanized or if sufficient justification for preserving the animal exists, the exposed animal shall be given a booster rabies vaccination and placed in

strict isolation for 45 days, according to Burns.

People who have not had their animals vaccinated could lose them needlessly. An unvaccinated animal which has been exposed to a rabid animal faces much stricter enforcement by the laws, said Burns

The animal shall be euthanized or if sufficient justification for preserving the animal exists, the exposed animal shall be immediately vaccinated against rabies, placed in strict isolation for 90 days and given booster vaccinations during the third and eighth week of isolation, according to the state law.

Burns urges all animal owners to contact a local veterinarian about getting the rabies vaccine administered to the family pets. Vaccinations for rabies are required in Texas, and citations are being issued on owners of the pets, said Burns.

As we moved from courtship into marriage, most of us felt we should grow up and leave the game-playing behind. But we may not have matured as much as we'd like to think. In some ways, our romantic relationships will always bear some characteristics of adolescent sexuality.
