THE BARBECUE Go to

The two days barbecue at Gail was well attended and notwithstanding the inclement weather, a pleasurable affair. There was a furious rain storm on Thursday evening, the day before the festive occasion, and the elements, next morning, as if conspiring against it, sent down another fresh supply of rain. About 10:30 A. M. however the sun struggled out and a goodly number of people collected on the grounds, intent on having a pleasant time. About 1 o'clock dinner was announced and the crowd responded well to the call, doing ample justice to the plentiful supply of good barbecued meats and delicacies, for we suspect some, of having come for that purpose.
