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



Chisum: Redrawn lines create stir across Texas

New boundary lines have been drawn for public office holders, and it has created quite a stir across the state.

Call

State Representative Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, said when the census is taken every decade redistricting inevitably occurs. He said the U.S. Constitution mandates a census be taken every 10 years.

Chisum was the guest speaker Tuesday at the monthly luncheon sponsored by the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

Gray County, as well as the majority of the counties across the Texas Panhandle, lost population according to Census 2000 results.

As a result, larger geographic districts become necessary in order to encompass the required amount of people so that every district is near equal in population.

Chisum, who was elected as state representative of the 88th District in 1988, served 16 counties of the Texas Panhandle during the 1990s. Following redistricting action by the Legislative Redistricting Board (LRB) on July 24, Chisum now has 19 counties to represent.

Prisoners found hiding above ceiling

AUSTIN (AP) — Three inmates were hiding above a kitchen ceiling in the same South Texas prison from which seven inmates made a high-profile escape in December, officials say.

The three inmates, all kitchen workers, were captured by a civilian kitchen supervisor and taken back into custody Friday at the Connally Unit near Kenedy, said Larry Fitzgerald, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Authorities are treating it as an escape attempt but haven't decided whether to charge the men with escape, Fitzgerald said. He said the men might have been trying to avoid kitchen work.

\$1.1 million federal grant **By DEE DEE LARAMORE**

Pampa's "Worth the Wait" is one of only three Texas agencies chosen to receive part of \$17.1 million in federal abstinence-only education grants.

"Worth the Wait," a teen sex education program promoting abstinence, has been awarded a \$371,691 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to develop and implement an abstinence-only education program for teens aged 12 to 18. Scott and White Memorial Hospital in Temple and McLennan County Collaborative also received HHS grants.

Teen pregnancies in the Texas Panhandle are among the highest in the state, according to Texas Department of Health statistics. This area ranks third in the state for pregnancies of women ages 13 to 17.

Pampa's Worth the Wait, The Amarillo Area Foundation and The Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation have formed a partnership which has resulted in the receipt of the highly competitive federal grant. Worth the Wait has been awarded a total of \$1,091,133 over a three-year period from the HHS for abstinence education. It received one of only 31 implementation grants throughout the country awarded under this project.

"Building a powerful alliance of volunteers and professionals has been instrumental in changing social expectations regarding early teen sexual activity," said Stacey Ladd, Worth the Wait executive director.

Local physicians, nurses, social workers, and youth workers volunteer on a regular basis to deliver classroom presentations to teens and community presentations to parents, she said.

Prescribed burns
set at Lake Meredith
 Wildfire prevention is goal

FRITCH Park Superintendent John C Benjamin has announced Lake Meredith National Recreation Area (NRA) will conduct two prescribed burns between Sanford Dam and Fritch Fortress. National Park Service (NPS) firefighters plan on starting the burns shortly after the National Fire Preparedness Level is reduced, pending suitable weather.

The National Fire Preparedness Level is a fivepoint scale used to gauge the availability of resources and difficulty of wildlife suppression. The Level 5 rating reflects conditions in the Pacific Northwest, Nevada and California.

While no prescribed fires are allowed under a national Level 5, the Southwest Region is at Preparedness Level 2, which means conditions would be roads or old railway beds.

favorable for a prescribed fire as soon as the national rating is lowered.

The Sanford-Yake burn unit is between the marina and the Cedar Canyon boat ramp and extends to the Sanford-Yake road. This fire will reduce the buildup of grassy fuels that typically feed a wildfire and return the mesquite grasslands to their natural cycle of growth.

The Cedar Creed burn unit is adjacent to the Sanford-Yake unit and continues to the Fritch Fortress. The unit is bounded on the south by a railroad right-otway that runs parallel to Lake Meredith NRA boundary. The reintroduction of fire will help traditional plant distribution and reduce the danger associated with wildfires.

Each burn unit is small in size and is bordered by the lake, wide Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Warden Raynaldo Castro has been promoted to senior warden at the Telford unit near New Boston, he said Tuesday. Castro has been at the TDCI unit here for 22 months.

Warden: Prison guard shortage getting worse

The correctional officer shortage at the Jordan/Baten Units is the worst it has been since Warden Raynaldo Castro came to Pampa almost two years ago.

Castro, who leaves next week to accept a promotion (see related story), said the two units are "roughly 45 officers" short of a full staff of 224 officers.

"That's kinda low," he said of the 77 percent staffing level.

Presently the Jordan Unit has 983 inmates and a capacity for 1,008, he said. The Baten Unit has 398 inmates and a capacity for 420.

The current staff includes the 19 officers who graduated from a recent class paid for by the Pampa Economic Development Commission, the warden said.

To help take up the slack, Castro said officers are "working some overtime" on a schedule of six days on and three days off.

"We'll never be 100 percent," Castro said of the officer corp, "but we've only been hit with (a large) shortage" in the last couple of years. He said "10 or 12 officers short" was more normal.



Rivas prosecutors to ask jurors for death penalty wife, 44 at the time, conspired with three men to DALLAS (AP) -- Defense lawyers will plead for kill her husband and then disguise the crime scene jurors to save the life of George Rivas, a confessed prison gang ringleader now convicted of killing a North Texas police officer.

The leader of a violent prison escape was found guilty of capital murder Tuesday in the slaying of bullets and run over during the Christmas Eve robbery of an Irving sporting goods store.

He faces the death penalty or life in prison. Testimony in the sentencing phase was set to start Wednesday before State District Judge Molly Francis.

Defense attorneys have indicated that Rivas, 31, may testify on his own behalf.

Bill Lane, a Fort Worth criminal attorney not involved in the case, said the defendant has nothing to lose by testifying.

However, if Rivas takes the stand, prosecutors will be able to question him about his past criminal history. He_was serving a life sentence for armed robbery and kidnapping when he and six others escaped Dec. 13 from the Connally Unit near Kenedy.

Texas jury deliberates in tire defect case

McALLEN (AP) — Jurors have begun deliberating whether Bridgestone/Firestone Inc. is guilty of knowingly letting a defective tire be used on the Ford Explorer that rolled over and paralyzed a South Texas woman.

In instructions handed down before teams of attorneys on both sides presented their closing arguments Tuesday, U.S. District Judge Filemon Vela told the nine-member panel they must also decide if Ford Motor Co. is to blame, and if so, how much. Plaintiffs are seeking damages of up to \$1 billion.

The defense's argument throughout seven days of testimony has been that the tire on Dr. Joel Rodriguez's Explorer had been injured by driving over a baseball-sized object, which began the slow process of tread separation.

When the tire fell apart on March 9, 2000, vehicle defects turned the driver's correction response into a strong jerk left that caused the Explorer to lose balance and flip into a highway ditch,

Jorge Rodriguez, Joel's brother, was driving at the time of the wreck.

Experts such as former longtime Firestone tire designer James Gardner testified that on any other vehicle, the tire failure would have merely resulted in a tire change.

Murder-for-hire target found hung in tree

MOUNT SELMAN (AP) — An East Texas man who foiled a 1997 murder-for-hire scheme died in an apparent hanging outside the house he once shared with a woman who prosecutors said had plotted to kill her husband.

John Othello Haskins was found hanging from a tree, with a pistol stuffed in his waistband. Law officers on Wednesday were trying to determine whether Haskins, 37, was killed by assailants or ended his own life.

Bush's vacation continues with work, few fish

CRAWFORD (AP) - To hear President Bush tell it, few things in life could be finer than a spending Officer Aubrey Hawkins, who was showered with a month away from Washington's stuffy bureaucracy, jogging at dawn and reeling in fish from the rocking chair on his ranch patio.

> Nevertheless, Bush keeps cutting his vacation shorter, bringing the bureaucracy to Texas with him and slivering off days.

> His wife is itching to leave. Every day, the searing heat steals away a little more of his fishpond. If the fish had a choice, they might go back to Washington with him.

> "We're going back on the 30th," Bush said. He later noted that the pond is evaporating but didn't indicate a connection between the early return and the evaporation.

> The president and Mrs. Bush originally planned to stay at their ranch through Labor Day but announced last week they would leave Aug. 31 and spend the Labor Day weekend in Washington. Bush didn't elaborate on why the first lady wanted to head back to the White House even earlier.

Because the nearest hotel is more than 30 miles away in Waco, senior White House advisers, Secret Service agents and military aides have been bunking together in a cluster of doublewide trailers across the road from Bush's gated ranch.

Softer prices don't deter bidders for federal offshore leases

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Even though natural gas prices are lower than a year ago, petroleum exploration companies were not deterred from putting up bids for the latest sale of federal offshore leases in the western Gulf of Mexico.

On Wednesday, the U.S. Minerals Management Service planned to open 386 bids on 320 tracts, mostly off the coast of Texas. It is the fourth-largest lease sale in the region in the past decade.

Last year's sale, during a time when gas was around \$5 per thousand cubic feet, attracted 266 bids on 226 tracts. In 1999, just as a decade of low natural gas prices was ending, the western sale attracted only 174 bids on 153 tracts.

Currently, natural gas prices are hovering above the \$3 mark. But since most of the interest in offshore Gulf leases are in potential deep-water fields that require hundreds of millions of dollars in investment, companies make their bidding decisions on what they interpret as long-term trends.

There also has been a slight softening of oil prices along with the current economic slowdown.



The reason that stands out, he said, "is the upturn in the oil busi**ness**" which pays better wages than the TDJC.

"I had three supervisors ... good supervisors ... come into my office and all were leaving for the oil field," the warden said. "They said they can go out and make \$45,000 or \$50,000 for the next two or three years as long as the work lasts. You can't blame them.

"We call it fast money," Castro said of the oil field dollars. "They can make that money for two or three years maximum usually. Then they say they know we'll still be here and they'll be back."

Castro says he's hopeful a \$200-\$300-a-month raise approved by the legislature will help in attracting and retaining more corrections officers

Fed Beef Challenge gives 4-H and FFA students a chance to gain practical experience in commercial cattle feeding, said Burt Rutherford, spokesman for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

Students feed a pen of three steers, then compete on the carcass merit of the cattle, plus the student's ability in live animal evaluation, a written test, oral interview and record keeping.

The contest also features a team challenge, where students who don't feed cattle can compete on their cattle feeding knowledge.

This year, Rutherford said, 38 students from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico competed in the Junior Fed Beef Challenge and eight teams of two to three students competed in the team challenge.

Overall champion and top scholarship winner in the senior division was Hayley Henderson of Childress, who won a \$2,000 scholarship. Kathryn Wright of Menard captured reserve champion and a \$1,500 scholarship. Jerad Johnson of Hereford was first runner up, winning a \$1,000 scholarship.

The team from Hallettsville won the team challenge. Second place went to a team from Hooker, Okla. Third place went to another team from Hallettsville.

Cheerleading contest rigged

HOUSTON (AP) — All of the 60 girls who tried out for Brazoswood High School cheerleading will get a place on the squad after two judges admitted rigging tryout scores, the district superintendent says.

The cheerleaders' faculty sponsor who allegedly directed judges to fudge scores has resigned and has been replaced, Brazosport Superintendent Rudy Okruhlik said Tuesday.

Okruhlik had considered disbanding the cheerleading squad altogether after suspicions rose about scores delivered by a panel of judges hired to assess cheerleading candidates' skills.

Some tryout candidates were award-winning cheerleaders, but didn't score well enough to make the team.

Complaints were lodged and at least one parent threatened legal action, a teacher who didn't want to give her name told the Houston Chronicle in Wednesday's editions.


Okruhlik said he got involved in the investigation in June and interviewed three of the four judges by telephone.

He threw out the tryout results after two judges admitted they had not scored the competition objectively.

Okruhlik said he doesn't know what motivated faculty sponsor Lynn Smith or the judges. He said there was no evidence the judges were bribed.

Several cheerleaders said Smith was motivated by favoritism.

"She just wanted certain girls to make it that weren't going to make it," said Katherine Perello, 16, a junior who is representing Texas in the Miss Teen USA 2001 pageant on national television Wednesday.

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some rough treatment at the hands of her peers these days. She wasn't invited to a party given by a girl who had been her best friend, and she cried herself to sleep that night. It's just tearing me up to see her hurt like this. Will this experience leave lifelong scars on her mind?

Our 15-year-old daughter is getting

It's all a matter of degree. Most teenagers experience a measure of rejection like your daughter is experiencing. They typically roll with the punches and

eventually get beyond the discomfort. Others, however, are wounded for life by the rejection of those adolescent experiences. I suggest you give your daughter plenty of emotional support, keep her talking, and do what you can to help her cope. I think she'll get her legs under her when the pressure of these years.

Let me address the larger issue here. When we see our children struggling with the teen experience or other frustrations, it's natural to wish we could sweep aside the problems and obstacles. Sometimes we have to be reminded that the human personality grows through adversity. "No pain, no gain," as they say. Those who conquered their problems are more secure than those who have never faced them.

I learned the value of hard times from my own experience. During my seventh and eight grades, i lived through the most painful years of my life. i found myself in a social crossfire that gave rise to intense feelings of inferiority and doubt. And yet those two years have contributed more positive qualities to my adult personality than any other span of my life. What I learned through that experience is still useful to me today.

Though it may be hard to accept now, your child needs the minor set backs and disappointments that come her way. How can she learn to cope with problems and frustrations if her early experience are totally without trial?

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downward in search of water. Consequently, it remains poorly anchored and can be toppled by even a moderate wind. By contrast, a mesquite tree that's planted in a dry desert is threatened by its hostile environment. It can survive only by sending its roots down 30 feet or more into the earth, seeking cool water. But through this adaptation to an arid land, the well-rooted tree becomes strong and steady against all assailants.

Our children are like the two trees in some ways. Those who have learned to conquer their problems are better anchored than those who have never faced them.

Our task as parents, then, is not to eliminate every challenge for our children, but to serve as a confident ally on their behalf, encouraging them when they are distressed, intervening when the threats are overwhelming, and above all, giving them the tools

What is your opinion of Nintendo and other kinds of video games? They've been claiming a big portion of our son;s time over the past few months, and I'm getting uneasy about it

Depending on the particular games in question, you may have a valid cause for concern. Dr. Vince Hammond, head of the National Coalition on Television Violence, has described the potentially harmful nature of video games, especially those with violent themes. Some observers have come to the conclusion that these games can become obsessive and encourage aggressive behavior. There's even evidence to suggest that children between the ages of 8 and 10 are 80 percent more likely to fight with one another after playing with them.

I'd advise you to put clear limits on the amount of time your son will be allowed to spend with video games or the Internet so that he won't become obsessed with them. Insist that he avoid the violent ones altogether. With realistic guidelines I think it's possible to keep this kind of activity under control rather than letting it control your son and family.

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

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -Prosecutors dismissed a disorderly conduct charge Tuesday against a Little League coach accused of mooning his players.


Coach Bob Ross and his supporters cheered the decision, while accuser Natasha Delk complained that justice had been denied.

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — NATO authorized the deployment of 3,500 allied troops to Macedonia, hoping the mission to collect and destroy rebel arms will nudge Macedonians and ethnic Albanians along the road to reconciliation. An advance party of 400 has been in place since

the weekend, following an earlier decision by NATO's ruling council. Wednesday's council authorization means the main body of troops can be underway within 48 hours. The full deployment is expected to take 10 days to two weeks.

Once the entire force is in Macedonia, the clock will start ticking on NATO's self-imposed 30-day time limit for the mission.

Economists believe Fed drawing close to end of credit easing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Reserve started its campaign to shore up an ailing U.S. economy nearly eight months ago and many economists predict it will still be at the task come October.

These analysts say there is a good chance the central bank will cut rates for an eighth time at its next meeting on Oct. 2. But they also believe that move could be the last one.

As expected, the central bank on Tuesday reduced the federal funds rate, the interest that banks charge each other, by a quarter-point to 3.5 percent.

NATO authorizes deployment of 3,500 IMF offers Argentina \$8 billion in additional loans

WASHINGTON (AP) - After lengthy negotiations, the International Monetary Fund agreed to offer Argentina an additional \$8 billion in loans, which will bring to \$22 billion the amount of IMF help available to help the country weather a severe economic crisis.

The new money comes with a series of conditions that the United States demanded be included in an effort to make sure the economic rescue package had a better chance of healing South America's second-largest economy.

Argentina's problems have reverberated through financial markets in Brazil and other countries in the region. Fears have been aroused of a repeat of the Asian crisis in which troubles that began in Thailand pushed 40 percent of the globe into recession as investors rushed to take money out of volatile emerging markets.

Agreement on the new package was announced late Tuesday night by IMF Managing Director Horst Koehler after 12 days of talks with an economic team from Argentina.

Arafat and Mubarak meet as Arab ministers gather for talks

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Palestinian leader Yasser "The Fed is saying we are getting closer and Arafat met Wednesday with Egyptian President Matruh as diplomatic efforts picked up to contain the Israeli-Palestinian crisis.

Arafat described the meeting as "constructive and positive," in brief comments to reporters as he arrived later Wednesday at the 22-nation Arab League headquarters in Cairo. There, Arab foreign ministers held an emergency meeting requested by Arafat to discuss Arab efforts to support the

Arafat said he spoke with Mubarak about "many things concerning the conditions that we live in" and international diplomatic efforts. He was not specific.

Diplomats have been busy trying to quell 11 months of Israeli-Palestinian violence that has ered the bloody body of a 3-year-old boy in a raised fears of creating a regional crisis if left to escalate too far.

TOKYO (AP) — Tropical storm Pabuk swept nationwide manhunt that began after he allegedly over Tokyo, dumping torrents of rain Wednesday, grounding airplanes and halting trains. The storm killed at least seven people in central Japan.

Pabuk, which hit Japan on Tuesday, was the first typhoon in two years to come ashore on the country's main island. Though it has since been downgraded to a tropical storm, officials said it continued to pack winds of up to 56 mph and they warned of possible flooding and landslides.



Through their participation in the Academy, faculty become acquainted with public education policy and related issues that will support their leader-ship and active role in fieldbased preparation programs.


