

Two PEDC board members resign

Pampa Economic Development Corporation Board President Richard Stowers resigned that position Thursday afternoon. The resignation was closely followed by the resignation of fellow board member Joe Mullenax.

Controversy has surrounded the PEDC for sometime. Dissatisfaction has grown since a July 10 public meeting was held about the North Carolina based company, National Pig Development, building a genetic research facility for pigs locally. A permit filed by NPD states that as many

the swine odor. The biggest fear has been the contamination of the water supply. Many protestors have indicated the Ogallala Aquifer would be contaminated due to the lagoon

system of handling the hog waste. Stowers' resignation letter to the Pampa City Commission members reads:

"I have always said that I'm not mar-

ried to my appointment at the PEDC, and that if there was someone that you would rather have in my position, that it is available. Apparently, the current mood of the commission, due to the sentiments of a small, but vocal faction of the community, is that I resign from the PEDC board.

"If that is your desire, then please consider this to be my formal resignation. The offering of this resignation does not in any way imply any implication of any

"I have been involved in the economic development efforts in our community since inception. I refuse to compromise my values — whether or not it is in my personal best interest.

"The challenges that you now face not only include your current budget problems, but also how the city can confront the upcoming EDC tax election.

"I only hope that each of you, beginning with the mayor, will come out in support of our PEDC and how critical it is for our future.

Local voters will decide Pampa Economic Development Corporation's fate on Nov. 6. Establishing a 4B economic development corporation will not be on the ballot.

1,768 signatures were on the petition he delivered. City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers said 1,241 (10 percent of the qualified voters) signatures needed to be certified as registered voters for the issue to be placed on the ballot. She said 1,260 signatures were certified as valid before

Lane said if the voters pass the measure to abolish the PEDC on Nov. 6 that all corporation activities will cease. He said the PEDC board would still be in office, but the only authority they would have would be to

meet and could take no action. He said the sales tax designated for PEDC activities would continue until all the financial obligations of the PEDC are met. PEDC Executive Director Susan Tripplehorn said the group has \$2.5 million in debts.

If the voters of Pampa vote to abolish the entity, the City of Pampa would manage the payment of the outstanding financial obligations.

Afghanistan's ruling Taliban on notice that it must hand over Osama bin Laden and his terrorist followers or "share in their fate" when the United States strikes. The Taliban refused.

Bush, in an address to Congress, announced creation of a Cabinet-level department to tighten security at home and coordinate efforts to prepare for potential attacks. "Some speak of an age of terror," the president said. "I know there are struggles ahead and dangers to face."

Hours after Bush addressed the nation, the Taliban rejected his demand and warned that attempts to apprehend bin Laden by force could plunge the whole region into crisis. The White House ruled out negotiating with the Taliban, but was open to diplomacy by other nations that could create pressure on terrorist-harboring coun-

"But don't mistake the two," said White House spokesman Ari Fleischer. "The president could not

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush put—have been more clear about his conditions. But diplomatic efforts around the world will continue to help secure the president's goals."

Bush placed phone calls Friday morning to the presidents of Turkey and Nigeria and the sultan of Oman and met with his national security advisers.

Bush presented a rough outline Thursday night of how he planned to unravel the terrorist conspiracy in which hijacked jets became flying bombs that destroyed New York's World Trade Center and severely damaged the Pentagon on Sept. 11, with a death toll now expected to exceed

At the heart of Bush's plan is a nonnegotiable demand for the Taliban to lead U.S. authorities to the masterminds of bin Laden's al-Qaida network, tree imprisoned foreigners and "immediately and permanently" close terrorist training camps in the rugged Atghan hills.

The Taliban must act and act immediately.

In Islamabad, Pakistan, Taliban ambassador Abdul Salam Zaeef said Friday he is sorry people died in the attacks, and appealed to the United States not to endanger innocent people in a military retaliation.

Zaeef said the Taliban would not hand over bin

Laden without evidence, and called for an investigation by the United Nations, telling reporters that Bush's ultimatum poses great danger for Muslims.

A White House spokesman Friday morning reiterated the passage in Bush's speech that stated, "These demands are not open to negotiation or dis-

Bush was sitting down Friday with insurance industry executives for more assessments of the body blows that the attacks dealt to an already weak-kneed U.S. economy. The House also was poised to approve a \$15*billion plan to prop up the nation's airlines, so devastated by the attacks that they began laying off thousands of workers.

My little girl, Tara, is sometimes sugarsweet and other times she in unbearably irritating. How can I get her out of a bad mood when she has not really done anything to deserve punishment?

I would suggest that you take her in your arms and talk to her in this manner:

"I don't know whether you've noticed it or not, Tara, but you have two personalities. A personality is a way of acting and talking and behaving. One of your personalities is sweet and loving. No one could

your personalities is sweet and loving. No one could possibly be more lovable and happy when this personality is in control. It likes to work and looks for ways to make the rest of the family happy. But all you have to do is press a little red button, 'ding,' and out comes another personality. It is cranky and noisy and silly. It wants to fight with your brother and disobey your mom. It gets up grouchy in the morning and complains all day.

"Now Tara, I know that you can press the button for the neat personality or you can call up the unpleasant one. Sometimes you need help to make you want to press the right button. That's where I come in. If you keep on pressing the wrong button, like you have been today, then I'm going to make you uncomfortable one way or the other. I'm tired of the cranky character, and I want to see the grinny one. Can we make a deal?"

When discipline becomes a game, as in a conversation such as this, then you've achieved your purpose without conflict and animosity.

Many of our friends have begun to home-school their children with seemingly positive results. My wife and I are considering this possibility as well, but aren't quite sure. What are your views on this education option? What would you do in my shoes?

This is a subject of which my minds has changed dramatically over the years. There was a time when I subscribed wholeheartedly to the nation that early formal childhood education was vital to the child's intellectual well-being. That was widely believed in the '60s and '70s. I no longer

was widely believed in the '60s and '70s. I no longer accept that idea and favor keeping kids with their parents for a longer time.

Dr. Raymond Moore, author of "School Can Wait" and an early leader of the home-schooling movement, had a great influence on me in this regard. The research now validates the wisdom of keeping boys and girls in a protected environment until they have achieved a greater degree of maturity. Not only do they benefit emotionally from that delay, but they typically make better progress academically. That's why home-schooled individuals often gain entrance to the most prestigious universities and colleges in the country. What their parents can teach young children in informal one-on-one interactions surpasses what their little minds can absorb sitting among 25 age mates in a classroom.

You asked what I would be in your shoes? If Shirley and I were raising our children again, we would home-school them at least for the first few years.

Would you speak to the impact of what has been called "the absentee father" -- especially during the tougher years of adolescence?

It is stating the obvious, I suppose, to say that fathers are desperately needed at home during the teen years. In their absence, mothers are left to handle disciplinary problems alone.


This is occurring in millions of families headed by single mothers today, and heaven only knows how difficult their task has become. Not only are they doing a job that should have been shouldered by two; they must also deal with behavioral problems that fathers are more ideally suited to handle. It is generally understood that a man's larger size, deeper voice and masculine demeanor make it easier for him to deal with defiance in the younger generation.

Many mothers raise their teen-agers alone and do the job with excellence, but it is a challenging assignment.

Texas A&M, Oklahoma State ready to resume playing

(AP) — When Texas A&M got around to thinking about football again after the terrorist attacks, the team discovered an angry R.C. Slocum.

"I've seen him upset but not like this," safety Jay Brooks said. "That was a different coach Slocum. He made it clear he was upset that we were not playing Wrecking Crew football."

Slocum and the Aggies (2-0) return to football Saturday in a more security-conscious Kyle Field against Oklahoma State (1-1) in the Big 12 Conference opener for both teams.

The Aggies had an open date last week. Slocum understandably kept football in the background during the days following the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington.

Then, after studying game film, he let his defense know exactly how he felt about their play, despite opening with victories over McNeese State and Wyoming.

"I. have not been pleased with the way we have played, and do not think they are either, particularly the older guys," Slocum said. "The starting point is to recognize what a good performance is."

The Aggies had struggles on offense and defense in winning against underdog

COLLEGE STATION, Texas opponents and Slocum was that over time the atmosphere particularly pointed with his defense for not playing with intensity and emotion.

"I have coached football for a long time and I know what it looks like when a player is not playing the way he should be," he said. "I have watched the tapes all week and it doesn't require someone to have to tell me when we do not play

Brooks thinks the defense got the message. He's certain that he did.

"He wants eleven guys out there and I want to be one of those guys," Brooks said. "You're going to see a different player in me and you will see other players different

Oklahoma State's game last week against Northern Arizona was canceled as were all major college games, leaving coach Les Miles with less game experience to get his

team ready for the Aggies. "I honestly want it to be college football, just exactly how you might expect it, no different," Miles said. "I don't want there be any other worries."

Some will be worried about security so Miles just hopes

will change.

"There's some thoughts that I'm sure everybody in this

room and I are having around whatever the next contest brings," Miles said. "Is there any more terrorist-friendly environment than a full stadium? I don't know."

Kyle Field will have added security, including a beefedup police presence from university and local law enforcement agencies

A&M students organized a plan to turn Kyle Field into one giant sea of red, white and blue instead of the solid maroon that usually blankets the seats.

Fans on the upper deck will wear red, those in the middle will wear white and those on the lower deck will wear blue.

Slocum likely had heightened concerns about his defense because of the challenge it will face from Cowboys quarterback Aso Pogi, who is rapidly climbing the school passing charts.

"I was shocked last year at how good he was, before we had not seen him," Slocum said. "Once I got on the field I was amazed at how big he is. He is like a defensive lineman.

"He is difficult to take down. He is way bigger than any of those defensive backs and maybe even our linebackers... He is someone to be reckoned with."

The 6-foot-4, 225-pound Pogi already is 13th on the alltime Cowboys passing list in only his sophomore season. Miles also knows to expect

his defense to be tested by quarterback Mark Farris. "He's an awfully talented,

big, strong-throwing guy," Miles said. "It seems like to me they want to throw the ball with him more than they have wanted to in the past.

"They're throwing for just under 300 yards a game... That's awfully good."

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Except for the last time they played at Texas Stadium, Texas Tech has never had an easy time against North Texas.

North Texas followed that 30-0 loss in 1998 with a 21-14 victory over the Red Raiders the next season. Last year, Tech escaped with a 13-7 win only after safety Kevin Curtis stripped UNT receiver LaDarrin McLane and the Raiders recovered the football at the 2 with less than two minutes left.

Since becoming a Division I-A team in 1995, the Mean Green (0-2) are 2-12 against Big 12 teams, the only wins coming against

Texas Tech (1-0) in 1997 and 1999. The two teams play Saturday night, again at Texas Stadium in a home game for North Texas.

"Neither team, in my opinion,

has trouble getting ready to play," said UNT coach Darrell Dickey. "Every game we've played has been intense, emotional, hard-hitting. I know that when we've won, people have said, 'Tech's flat.' I haven't seen

One concern for both teams is coming back after the unexpected layoff. All Division I-A games were postponed last week after the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington.

"Our worst practice was probably the one after we discovered we weren't playing at all," said Tech coach Mike Leach. "Up until that point we really did practice well. Our whole team was looking forward to a game."

Tech hasn't played since winning its season opener 42-30 over New Mexico on Sept. 8. The Mean Green at least got to play two games before then, losing 37-10 at No. 3 Oklahoma after a 19-5 opening loss to





Americans in Pampa and across

Americans in Pampa and across the country are proudly displaying their patriotism by flying the U. S. flag since the Sept. 11, 2001, tragedy.

The Pampa News is providing the flag information due to the many questions which have arisen about the proper flag etiquette. The following flag laws and regulations are contained in the Public Law as amended July 7, 1976, by the 94th Congress of the United States. They set forth the existing rules, customs and etiquette pertaining to the display and use of the flag of the United States of America.

Section 174. Time and Occasions for display; hoisting and lowering.

(a) Display on buildings and stationary

Section 174. Time and Occasions for display; hoisting and lowering.

(a) Display on buildings and stationary flagstaffs in open; night display

It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

(b) Manner of hoisting

The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

(m) The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised o the peak before it is lowered for the day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon only, then raised to the top of the staff. By order of the President, the flag shall be flown at half-staff upon the death of principal ures of the United States Government and the Governor of a State, territory, or possession, as a mark of respect to their memory. In the event of the death of other officials or foreign dignita be displayed at half-staff Presidential instructions or order accordance with recognized custom practices not inconsistent with law. In event of the death of a present or form official of the government of any State territory, or possession of the United States, the Governor of that State, territory, or possession may proclaim that the National flag shall be flown at half-staff. The flag shall be flown at half-staff thirty days from the death of the President or a former President; ten days from the day of death of the Vice President, the Chief Justice or a retired Chief Justice of the United States, or the Speaker of the House of Representatives; from the day of death until interment, a former vice president, or the governor of a state, territory, or possession; and on the day of death and the following day for a member of Congress.

As used in this subsection-1. the term "half-staff" means the position of the flag when it is one-half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff;

2., the term "executive or military department" means any agency listed under sections 101 and 102 of title 5; and

3. the term "Member of Congress" means a Senator, a Representative, a Delegate, or the Resident Commissioner from Puerto Rico.
