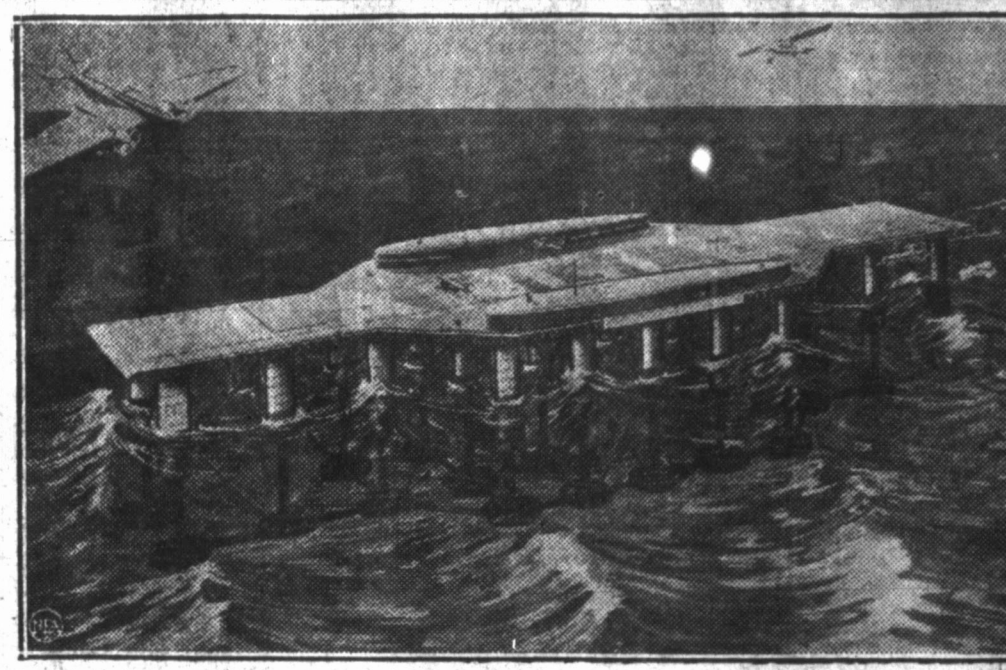

BALANCING THE FORCES TOWARD RECOVERY

Frances Perkins tells the New York Merchants' Association that the NRA provides "a good technique for balance" among finance, industry, agriculture, and labor, and that, she adds, is perhaps the most significant fact in the whole recovery program.

This remark, while it says nothing that has not been said before, nevertheless helps to clear up one of the most common reasons for criticism of NRA activity.

Getting a proper balance among the forces mentioned by Miss Perkins simply means fixing things so that each shall get its fair share of whatever degree of prosperity happens to be available, and devising a method whereby no one group can throw the whole works out of line by taking a greater profit proportionately than the economic set-up can stand.

Now the getting of such a balance might not necessarily, of itself, restore full prosperity. What it would do would make it certain that such prosperity, when it did return would be a self-accelerating thing, that it would be distributed evenly, and that it would not, as in the past, create the contradictions that lead to new depressions.

The NRA framework, in other words, is not so much a measure to restore prosperity as a conduit through which returning prosperity can flow more smoothly and rapidly.

It is just as well that we keep that fact in mind. Otherwise we are apt to gaze about us, see that the depression is lingering, and conclude that the NRA is worthless and should be junked.

Restoration of good business, as Miss Perkins points out, depends on the interlocking of a number of factors. The NRA is one of them, the Agricultural Adjustment Act is another, the public works program is another, the present manipulation of the currency seems to be still another. And Miss Perkins properly warns us:

"Restoration will be a comparatively slow process, with possible checks from time to time. No great co-operative effort such as this has ever been carried to a successful conclusion without some setbacks."

We can stand the setbacks, so long as we don't let them persuade us that the NRA is a flop because it isn't doing something it never was designed to do.

He said that it was "too bad some of the county commissioners' court had argued that relief should be distributed on a precinct basis."

Ferguson referred to President Roosevelt as "the greatest human heart president this nation ever has had."

"He has no higher province than taking care of the unfortunate," he said. "You should be slow to criticize or disagree with any policy of the federal government at this time. An army can have but one general."

"Our present condition is the result of years of mismanagement of our affairs. Some persons are impatient because President Roosevelt has not undone all the republicans have been doing for twelve long years."

"If the NRA does not please you keep it to yourself. We should follow the president blindly if necessary in order that his will be carried out."

He said Texas "does not have a kick, any how," and pointed out that the federal government had contributed \$20,000,000 for relief in Texas and was ready to give that much more.

Westbrook said that approximately 191,000 persons would be placed at work under the C. W. A. program in Texas. One hundred and forty three thousand would be placed on state jobs and 48,000 on purely federal projects.

"Although it was a pretty rapid landing, neither of us was hurt. We took our bearings, saw we were in marshy ground, surrounded by woods and that it would be best just to put up for the night. So we got out of the gondola, wrapped up in the balloon and slept for the night."

Soar 11 Miles. "Leaving Tex to stand watch over the balloon, I struck out for civilization at 8:44."

At this point Major Fordney showed he was still uncertain of the time by saying he had reached the farm house at 9 a. m. A bystander corrected him, and he said: "Oh, no, I guess it wasn't 9 o'clock. It was 9:30."

As he talked the major was helping himself to a breakfast of fried ham, potatoes, and black coffee. Meanwhile, by telephone, he was relaying cross-country the details of the balloonists' experiences as they soared 11 miles above the earth yesterday.

As he chatted gaily—the usual reserve of the army officer giving way to his pardonable glee—major Fordney glanced occasionally at his muddy shoes, and the marks of water which at times had almost reached his waist.

According to the altimeter within the gondola, Major Fordney said the highest altitude reached was 59,000 feet but the actual height attained must be officially checked.

Major Fordney reported the landing as government airplanes were zooming over south New Jersey and searching the sea when no report had been received from them after dawn.

Some doubt was first expressed when it was reported the landing occurred at 5:50 a. m., EST yesterday, but Major Fordney dissolved

WIFE SHOTS OIL OFFICIAL IN ARGUMENT

KILLS CLARK AFTER HE STRUCK HER WITH BILLIARD CUE

PAULSBORO, N. J., Nov. 21. (AP)—A bullet ended the colorful career of Sheldon A. Clark, wealthy young oil company executive and sportsman, after a quarrel with his wife who told police today she does not recall what happened after he hit her with a billiard cue.

Mrs. Clark, a former actress, is under police guard at a hospital with a severe head injury. Six stitches were required to close the wound which investigators said was inflicted before the shooting last night. No charge was placed against her.

Clark, 35-year-old son of A. Sheldon Clark, of Barrington, Ill., senior vice president of the Sinclair Refining company, and prominent in Illinois and industrial and civic leader, met almost instant death from a bullet in the breast while he stood in the billiard room in the

WIFE SOUGHT IN CONNECTION WITH ASSAULT

YOUTH STATES WOMAN HAD PROFESSED LOVE FOR HIM

HEMPSTEAD, Tex., Nov. 21. (AP)—A detailed statement in which R. B. Oakley, 21-year-old pre-medical student at the University of Texas, purportedly admitted beating H. G. Hudson, Hempstead storekeeper, with a blackjack, was in the hands of authorities today.

Oakley was arrested in Austin and brought here on a charge of assault with intent to murder for the attack, which allegedly occurred last Saturday night.

Officers were seeking Mrs. Texia Hudson, estranged wife of the attack victim, on a similar charge. Mrs. Hudson, who had been operating a student boarding house at Austin, was reported last night to have left for Beaumont with the intention of aiding Oakley to make the \$1,000 bond set for him.

In the statement Oakley was quoted as saying the 45-year-old woman had often professed love for him and had paid most of his entrance fees at the university this year. He said she had suggested he come to Hempstead last week-end.

"I decided that I would come down to Hempstead and talk to Mr. Hudson and give him a whipping and make him know why I did it and what it was all about," the statement read.

Oakley bought a blackjack in Austin and took it with him to Hempstead, according to the statement.

"In Hempstead I went over the road where I had been told Mr. Hudson lived and when I saw him coming I walked by him," the statement continued. "He stopped. I don't remember exactly what he said. I think all he said was 'hello.'"

Oakley was quoted in the statement as saying he walked a "couple of steps" past Hudson and then turned around, getting "very scared."

"I told him 'now I am going to show you something,'" the statement read. "I was scared to jump on him so I thought I would make him think I was going to rob him. I asked him for his money and he said it was in his pocket. I didn't know what to do so I thought I would just hit him on the head lightly and then run off."

"I didn't want to hit him too hard because it was too dangerous. I hit him once and he began to holler. I don't remember exactly what he said or what I said. I think I told him I was going to teach him how to treat Mrs. Hudson. I hit

School Recovery To Be Theme Of P-TA Convention

AUSTIN, Nov. 21. (AP)—The responsibility, reorganization, and the needs of the schools in the recovery of the nation, is the theme of the annual convention of the Texas State Teachers' convention, which will be held in Austin Nov. 20 to December 2. Attendance will probably be from 6,000 to 8,000, according to an estimate made by T. H. Shelby, former president of the association.

Several out-of-state speakers will be on the program. Gordon J. Laing, dean at the University of Chicago, will talk on "The Education of a Citizen." Other speakers are Miss Jessie Gray, president of the National Education association, Philadelphia, "Teaching That Interprets and Defends Education"; Herbert B. Bruner, Teachers college, Columbia university, "Educators Opportunities"; Dr. Ambrose L. Sahrle, New York university, "Million Dollar Teachers for American Public Schools"; Dean J. B. Johnston, University of Minnesota, "Higher Education and Public Policies"; and Frederick C. Howe, consumers council of agricultural adjustment administration, Washington, speaking on current problems.

Railroad Is Being Built To Carlsbad's Huge Potash Plant

CARLSBAD, N. M., Nov. 21. (AP)—A 20-mile extension of the Santa Fe railroad into the potash fields near Carlsbad—perhaps the only rail construction of any consequence this year in the United States—will be completed by January 1.

The spur, which will cost approximately half a million dollars, is being built from Lake Avalon, near Artesia, to the mines of the Potash Company of America. A similar track was built to the United States Potash company a year ago.

Entire trainloads of potash are being shipped over the old track. There were 36 cars in one day's shipment in October, and 37 cars in one day in September, the biggest shipment to date.

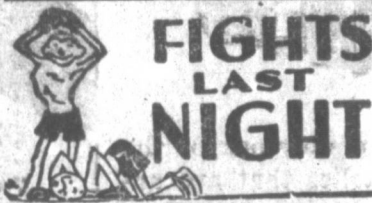

BRUNDAGE IS AGAIN CHOSEN HEAD OF AAU

JEWISH EQUALITY AT BERLIN OLYMPICS IS DEMANDED

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 21 (AP)—The Amateur Athletic Union, facing what may prove to be the most critical year of its history, today called on Avery Brundage of Chicago to remain as president for another term. He accepted.

Brundage had planned to retire after holding the post since 1928 but the action of the convention in voting to withhold its team from the 1936 Olympiad at Berlin unless Germany removes its restrictions on Jewish athletes raised a contentious international question which he felt he should aid in solving.

It will be his sixth successive year as head of the A. A. U., the longest tenure of office in the 45-year history of the organization.

A prominent athlete in his undergraduate days at the University of Illinois, Brundage has been active in A. A. U. councils since before the world war and previous to taking the union presidency was head of the Midwestern association.

Final action on retention or rejection of the metric system for running events in the union's national track and field championships comes up today.

It is believed the system, adopted by the convention last year, will be retained. The track and field committee unanimously recommended such action to the convention and the first test vote on the question in the general committee showed an overwhelming favorable sentiment.

Its finances sharply curtailed by the depression, the union seeks new economies and new sources of revenue in its final sessions. An effort to abolish the office of assistant to the president, held by J. Lynn Bingham of Chicago, is in prospect and it is considered likely the salaries of other paid officers will be trimmed.

After the close of the convention tonight several of the delegates will proceed to Washington for the meeting Wednesday of the American Olympic committee, of which Brundage also is president.

It was to the Olympic committee that the union's resolution on the 1936 Olympiad was addressed with a request that the United States delegates to the International Olympic committee be instructed to appraise Germany of the matter.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 21 (AP)—The national executive committee of the American Legion today awaited recommendations of its sub-committee which heard testimony relating to charges of political activity and membership roll padding in the New Mexico department of the Legion.

The four-day hearing was concluded yesterday and the sub-committee took the case under advisement. Shortly before adjournment, indications were seen the Legion might attempt amicably to adjust factional differences in the department.

It was brought out that one faction composed of supporters of Senator Bronson Cutting is headed by New Mexico, Wood, who is national executive chairman, and the other, the anti-cutting group, by Roy Cook, former state commander.

James P. Ringley, chairman of the sub-committee, asked if Wood and his associates would cooperate with a representative of the national organization, were one sent to New Mexico. Wood, who is adjutant general of New Mexico, said he would be happy to receive any suggestions from national headquarters.

Dummy Will Be Used To Locate Victim's Body

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Baffled in the prolonged search for the body of Brooke L. Hart, San Jose kidnaping victim, officers of four counties today joined forces for a new effort.

By means of a dummy, built to correspond to Hart's measurements, the searchers hope to check the tides and currents of south San Francisco bay into which the kidnapers allegedly threw the 22-year-old store executive.

Sheriff William Emig of Santa Clara county said the dummy will be weighted with two 20-pound cement blocks, corresponding with those the kidnapers said they tied to Hart's legs.

Emig said Thomas H. Thurmond, accused with John M. Holmes of the kidnaping and slaying, had examined a pillow slip found near the death scene and declared it was smaller than the one pulled over Hart's head.

At the same time, Sheriff Emig said that Thurmond, who protested when arrested that the officers must be mistaken because he was "a good church member," had confessed to two robberies in San Jose.

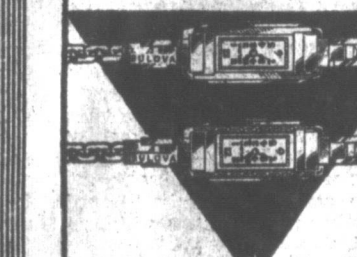

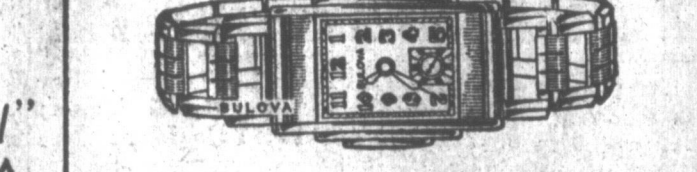
