WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE CONSTITUTION

This is the third of a series of six articles reviewing the history and contents of the U. S. Constitution, in observance of "Constitution Week" and the 147th anniversary of the Constitution's birth, Sept. 17, 1787.

The Constitution of the United States divides the government into three important branches, each devised to be what has been termed a "check" and a "balance" to the other two.

As against the legislative, therefore, stand the executive and the judiciary. Article Two defines powers of the president and how he is to be chosen. The manner of choice has been changed by amendment, but the original method was by means of electors chosen by the various states.

The electors were to vote for two candidates, the one receiving the greatest number of votes, if a majority, becoming president, the second highest, vice president.

Otherwise, the House of Representatives was to choose the president from the five highest.

Article Two also makes the president commander-in-chief of the army, navy and militia of the states, and gives him power, with senatorial consent, to make treaties and appoint major officials under him.

Article Three vests judicial powers in a supreme court and such inferior courts as Congress may establish. It determines the scope of federal jurisdiction, provides for trial by jury, and defines treason.

Under Article Four, equal rights are assured as among the citizens of all states, provision is made for return of escaped slaves, and for the return of escaped prisoners.

Another section anticipates admission of new states into the Union, and another guarantees to all states a republican form of government and protection from invasion.

Article Five provides for amendments to the Constitution. Article Six establishes supremacy of the Constitution over all other laws of the land and forbids any religious test for holding office. It also accepts responsibility for all public debts of the Confederation.

The Sixth and last article provides for ratification of the Constitution by nine of the 13 states, to make it effective.

POLITICS at Random

WASHINGTON — Orthodox republicans had a lesson in Maine two years ago like the one in the elections just over. It was that their campaign was missing fire, they had better get busy or take the consequences.

It was two months before the Roosevelt avalanche. They got busier, surely enough, and recaptured rocky Maine for Hoover; but nevertheless lost 43 of the other 47 states.

Now Maine is definitely out, so far as strengthening their cause in November is concerned.

Taking It To Heart How much they will profit from this new lesson can only be guessed, but the national organization is manifestly taking it to heart. The incidents are not strictly parallel. In 1932 the high command had no idea of the extent of the swing away from Hoover until the Maine returns were in.

This time the organization was alert, militant. It bore down determinedly with some of the best talent it could muster.

The results were about the same. No party can laugh off such results unconcernedly. Nor are republican regulars doing so. Their countenances are grim. Smiles that were all set to break out when republican Maine went republican have soured.

The leaders will take counsel in their own way. The situation would seem to preface a serious review of strategy so far, to seek a strengthening. Pronouncements of both parties from now on will be studied the more closely for indication of new tactics.

An Intenser Campaign The first straws in the wind are not unlike those after the last

more of it. Democratic Governor Brann's majority of 3,000 became 30,000. This despite calls for his defeat to disown the "new deal."

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Maine tally. President Hoover at that time telegraphed Chicago headquarters of a "need for renewed and stronger effort that the people may fully understand the issues at stake."

Now Chairman Fletcher says "the people have not yet understood. . . . We intend to redouble our efforts all along the line."

And Senator Hastings predicts dire results "unless the American people can be made to see the dangers that confront them."

"Thus, the only clear prospect today is for an even intenser campaigning of the familiar pattern. One possibility that could change it would be for more pronounced party cleavage, with greater numbers of life-long democrats entering the republican lists and vice versa."

Farley Is Active On the "new deal" side the natural things to say is being said enthusiastically. It will be heard oftener, in the words of Chairman Farley, that Maine's decision proves "the majority of people" are with Roosevelt.

He knows the people like a winner. He also knows they like a scrapper who carries the fight to the other fellow. And he still is a great believer in correspondence.

These are three of the bases on which he is conducting his particular part in the "new deal" cause. What Maine did, he reiterates, shows Roosevelt winning. His speeches bristle with denunciation of "stand-patters." Talk in Washington has it that 50,000 letters went from democratic headquarters into Maine during the two weeks before the vote. The postage bill will be higher by November.

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 18. (AP)—With opening honors tucked away in her locker, the crew of Endeavour, British challenger for America's cup, faced the starting line today for the second decisive race with more reason for confidence than any challenger in many years.

Tom Sopwith, skipper and owner of the challenger, sailed Endeavour around a thirty-mile course in more than two minutes better time than the defender, Harold S. Vanderbilt's Rainbow. Endeavour won in spite of accidents and mishandling of her canvas. Everyone who saw the contest agreed she is a very fast boat and that unless those responsible for the defense are very much on their toes there is a good chance the "old mug" will go back to its homeland for the first time in 83 years.

# TEXAS SENATE COMMITTEE FAVORS KEEPING BANKHEAD LAW

## VOTES TO KILL RESOLUTION BY SEALY FRIEND

### WHARF COMPANY HEAD SAYS MARKET WILL BE RUINED

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. (AP)—The Texas senate committee on agriculture was on record today as refusing to petition congress for repeal of the Bankhead cotton act.

After an extended hearing, the committee voted four to three to kill a resolution by Senator T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, which condemned the act as detrimental to Texas' principal farm crop and urged its repeal.

George Sealy of the Galveston Wharf company told the legislators the act would ruin the world market for Texas cotton crop, of which 90 per cent is exported.

"Let's keep this until you offer something better," responded A. M. Bourland of Vernon, cotton farmer.

"Don't repeal it and put us back into poverty."

Several farmers, however, criticized the act mainly because of discriminatory administration.

Compulsory reduction of cotton acreage was necessitated by "chisellers" who would not cooperate in voluntary reduction campaigns, said R. M. Hubbard of New Boston.

Hubbard and Bourland are members of the state allotment board.

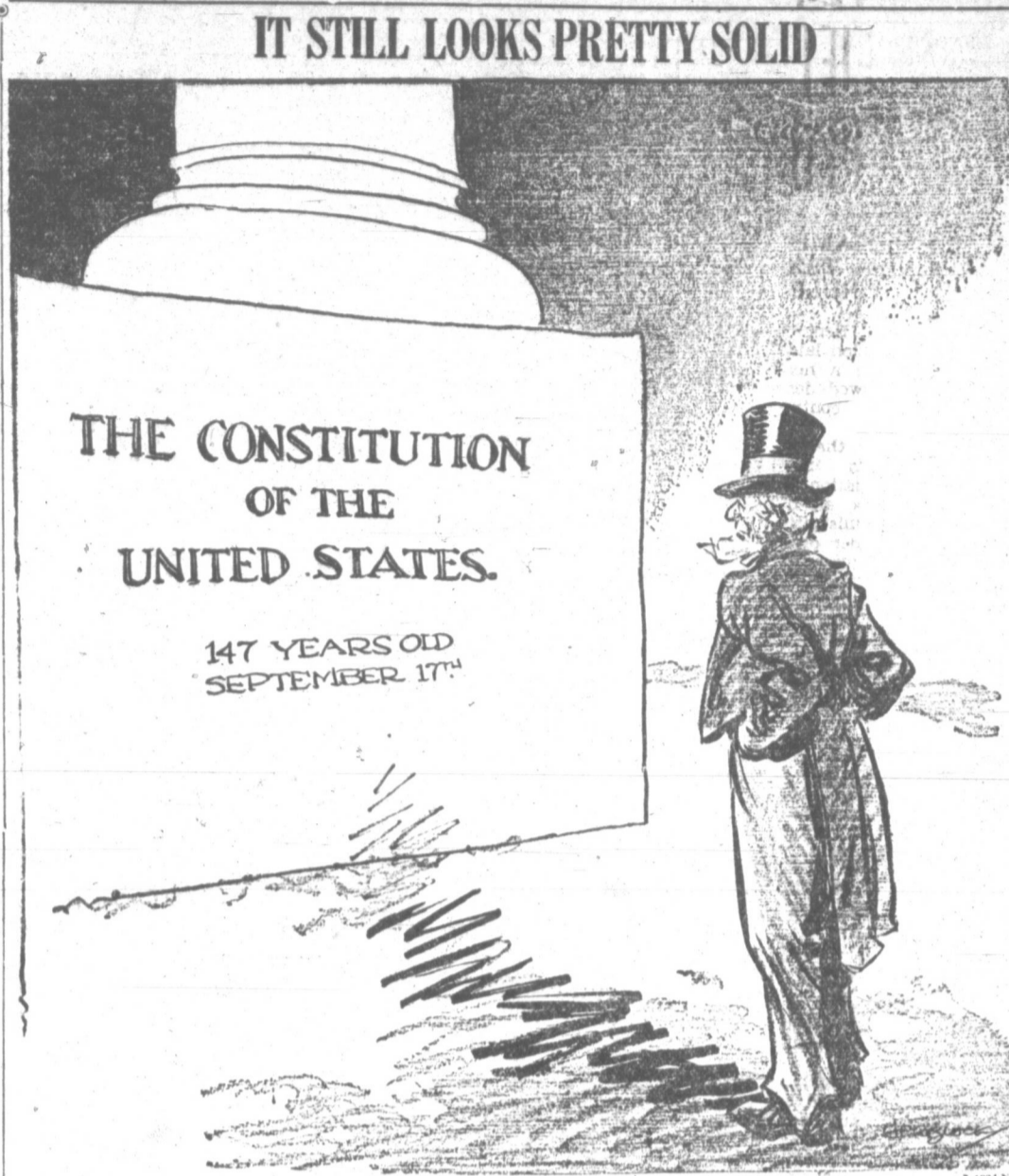
## Ford Sales for August Climbed Very Near 1930

DEARBORN, Mich., Sept. 18.—Ford automobile sales for the month of August were the largest in number of any August since 1930. They were more than 7,000 over the estimates.

Sales within the United States during August were greater in number than those of July—reversing the usual seasonal trend.

Ford's world total for the month was 88,800 units—a 40 per cent increase over the August figures for last year.

Two very significant features

where that sales increased in volume as the month progressed and that cash formed an unusually large proportion of the total. Passenger car sales within the United States were more than 72,000.

Another interesting index feature is that the sale of Ford trucks and commercial cars in August, this year, was greater than in any August since 1929. In this field, also, sales increased definitely toward the end of the month.

The company reported that the outlook for September is excellent.

## Argentine Mad Because U. S. Bared Secrets

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 18. (AP)—Argentina held the United States government responsible today for the "defamation of character" of its citizens mentioned in the senate munitions inquiry and demanded damages.

The foreign office ordered Dr. Felipe Espl, ambassador to Washington, to assure "rectification of the procedures which permitted the launching of slander against the names of Argentine officers and civilians, and to obtain amendments and reparations for those affronted."

The note also requested that legitimate documents available be used to clear up the charges. The foreign office offered the use of documents in its possession, which, in its opinion, would assist the United States senate in its investigation. The communication said the Argentine government's steps were inspired by a fear that the investigation might cause a disturbance by being directed from its original purpose.

Action by the foreign office quickly followed a report of the marine ministry which exonerated Lieut. Silvio Pevorace. The officer's name was mentioned in connection with allegedly irregular sale of aircraft to Argentina.
