STATE CHARGES STILL FACE EX-UTILITY

BY ROBERT M. YODER, Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, Nov. 24 (/P)—In two hours and two minutes del tion today, twelve federal court jurors shattered the government's charges of a \$1,000,000,000 mail fraud against Samuel Insull and his 16 business associates with a verdict of acquittal.

Between lunchtime and the din ner hour, the voluminous case, against the ruler of a one-time two billion dollar utility system, was put into the hands of a jury and decided in his favor.

The jury's decision read in hushed court room by Foreman John D. Lent, came with a rapidity startling to defense attorneys and prose cutors alike

The case was developed from nearly five tons of business records, but when the jurors retired they sent out only for three letters.

Principles and aims of true communists in Moscow thirty-four states, including smalland communists in Berlin, Paris, New York, Los Angeles, Fokyo, and Pekin are the same; they stand on the same platform and advocate the same principles, and all take their orders from Communist Internationale. And what of the ere the confessed purposes of the Internationale? The U. S. report defines them as follows:

1. Hatred of God and all forms of religion; 2. destruction of private ownership of property; 3. absolute social and racial equality; promotion of class hatred; 4 revolutionary propaganda, stirring up communist activities in other countries, such as riots, sabotage, bloodshed, and civil war; 5. destruction of all forms of representative or democratic governments, including civil liberties such as freedom of speech, of the press, of assembly, and of trial by jury; 6. the ultimate and final objective is by means of world revolution to establish the dictatorship of the so-called proletariat into one world union of soviet socialist republics with the capital

Modern communism began with the "Manifesto of the Communist Party," by Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels, two apostate Jews, which appeared in January, 1848. Socialism is the half-brother of communism. Anarchists seized upon the Marxian doctrine but he was forced to denounce them for in reality they were opposed to all governments, including the one he suggested.

Marx' first Internationale lasted 9 years. Six years after his death, the Second Internationale was proclaimed in Paris. This was disrupted by the world war. French patriotism rose above revolutionary doctrines. Nicholai Lenin, a Russian disciple of Marx and an exile from his ewn country, denounced the patriotic wing and set about to set up the Third Internationale at the first opportunity. Contrary to popular belief, the communists of Russia did not overthrow the Czar. At the time, Lenin was in exile n Switzerland and Trotsky was living in the Bronx, N. Y. A provisional government succeeded the Czar, and this was recognized by the United States. There were probably not more than 30,000 communists in all of Russia but these, headed by Lenin and Trotsky, rallied remnants of the old army and in the famous October (1917) revolution overthrew the provisional government. nmunists repudiated the representatives of the people and set up a bitterly aggressive party rule. Then, in March of 1919, the U.S.S.R. having been set up, the Third Internationale was organized to spread the revolution to the whole world. A million dollars was approriated for revolutionary purposes abroad.

The government of Russia is an autocratic, selfstituted dictatorship by a small group of self-peretuating revolutionists. Joseph Stalin, the secretaryeneral of the communist party, is the actual dictator. party consists of fewer than two millions of bona ide members out of a population of 150,000,000 persons, but it controls the government.

The communists of America organized at Chicago in 1919. Stalin at that time exhorted them to prepare eaders in America for the class wars to be fomented in this country. For several years, a Japanese communist. San Katayama, was the American representative at Moscow. Until 1924, the U.S. war measures kept communism under cover, but since that time the freedom allowed Americans has given the communists full play of their program. Special work is being directed among the 12,000,000 negro workers in this country, who are promised racial equality.

William Z. Foster, twice candidate of the communist party for president, is quoted as follows:

"The aims and principles of the communist party are to organize the workers to defend their interests under the capitalist system and to eventually abolish the capitalist system and establish a workers' and farmers' government. . . . Our party considers religion to be the opium of the people, as Karl Marx has stated, and we carry on propaganda for the liquidation of these prejudices among the workers. . . . The workers of this country and of every other country have only one flag, and that is the red flag.

The method of communism is to form nuclei in the major industries, rather than on broad party lines. Communists do not hurry. They plant a propagandist here, another there, and slowly build up their chain of influence. They wave the red flag only after months of careful preparation. They fasten themselves to focal oints of social distress and, by terrorism, try to make peaceful settlements of disputes impossible. They organize riots and spread pamphlets to inflame sympathetic factions. They sow propaganda in the colleges and form Young Communist leagues. They try to plant communists n military positions to cause unrest among the armed

It is vastly to the credit of labor leaders in this country that they have fought the entrance of communts with every weapon at their command, though not

always successfully. The U.S. government has done little since 1924 to defend the principle of democracy against that of communism. The American people must decide, before many more decades, what government they wish. No government can exist half communist and half democratic; shaos would result. The best defense is good democracy, and a job for every man.
