



Iraq's U.N. Ambassador Mohammed Al-Douri said Thursday the government is doing "the utmost" to cooperate with inspections.

Secretary of State Colin Powell headed for a five-day trip to Asia Friday while handling delicate negotiations with Turkey that would trade economic aid for ground support in a war.

The United States wants to base tens of thousands of soldiers in Turkey to open a possible northern front against Iraq. Turkey has asked for \$10 billion in aid.

Powell said "there may be some other creative things we can do" in negotiations with Turkey. He did not elaborate, but one official said the government could seek a \$1 billion congressional appropriation that would permit Turkey to obtain loans at preferential

Turkey's top politician,

Recep Tayyip Erdogan, said Friday he would not order lawmakers from his governing party to vote in favor of a U.S. deployment if it comes before Parliament, though he said he hoped they would. With public opposition to war high in Turkey, his stance raised the possibility that lawmakers would reject a deploy-

Gen. James L. Jones, the supreme allied commander in Europe, has ordered AWACS surveillance planes to Turkey, part of an alliance agreement to protect Turkey if it comes under attack from its neighbor Iraq during a war.

The alliance had been split for weeks over whether to start the preparations until an agreement was reached last weekend. The planes will fly their base Geilenkirchen, Germany, to a Turkish air force base in the central city of Konya in the next few days and will start flying missions by Thursday.

President Bush sought to

keep up pressure on the Security Council Thursday, telling a suburban Atlanta audience, "Denial and endless delay in the face of growing danger is not an option."

Despite his insistence, other countries are urging a more cautious approach. In an oblique reference to the United States, Russian NATO said Friday that President Vladimir Putin on Friday said that some countries' "aggressiveness" had broken the geopolitical balance in the world.

Putin said the "growth in aggressiveness in very influential forces in some countries," along with the reduced effectiveness of institutions "to maintain global security and solve conflicts, causes concern."

Putin's remarks came a day after his foreign minister accused Britain and the United States of trying to pressure international weapons inspectors to provide a pretext to launch a war

West Texas A&M announces new doctoral program

CANYON — The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board granted formal approval on Jan. 30 to WTAMU's proposed Ph.D. in agriculture degree, which Dr. James Clark, dean of the College of Agriculture, Nursing and Natural Sciences, says is different from any other program in the southwestern United States.

"To reach a status where a university can begin training people for the highest degree awarded in education is not something that is taken lightly, so we're delighted that the program has been approved," Clark said. "This program will allow our faculty and students to pursue opportunities in interdisciplinary research in agriculture that is not available at any other university in Texas or the southwestern United States."

As it was proposed, West Texas A&M's doctoral candidates will be trained in a "systems approach" to problem solving that will incorporate aspects of agribusiness and economics, animal science and plant, soil and environmental science. It will be the only doctoral program in Texas with this particular multi-disciplinary approach. Only Iowa State University has a Ph.D. program remotely similar, Clark said.

"Our doctoral students will conduct research that will assist in answering real challenges that are facing the agricultural industry in the High Plains of Texas," Clark said. "Each doctoral student's research will address various challenges facing the agricultural industry, from the animal, plant, environmental and economic aspects."

Though WTAMU's proposed Ph.D. program received full support from the Coordinating Board, Flavius Killebrew, WTAMU provost/vice president for academic affairs, said implementation of the program was made contingent upon the University's ability to finance it.

"Our plans will provide for the funding and resources necessary to move forward with the Ph.D. program," Killebrew said. "It's important to our University and to our region, and in spite of today's tough economic climate, we will implement this program as soon as it's feasibly possible."

Approval of WTAMU's newest program comes just one week after Gov. Rick Perry mandated that most state agencies immediately reduce spending by an amount equal to at least seven percent of their 2003 general revenue appropriations. That mandate is what spurred the contingency attached to approval of the University's first Ph.D.

Player's status on Texas Tech team uncertain after suspension

Dad e-mails apology to the coaching staff

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A Texas Tech basketball player whom coach Bob Knight suspended earlier this week for one game failed to show up for a scheduled practice, leaving his status on the team is uncertain.

Senior Nick Valdez has not attended practice since he and Andre Emmett were benched for Monday's game against No. 3 Texas for missing breakfast and a walkthrough meeting that morning.

Both Emmett and Valdez effectively were reinstated to the team late Tuesday night after finishing disciplinary conditioning work. Emmett was at practice both Wednesday and Thursday, but not Valdez.

Tech athletic director Gerald Myers said that Nick Valdez missed practice Wednesday because his teammates did not want him to practice with him in the wake of an e-mail Valdez's father had sent to a newspaper.

"That's what happened: He came to practice and they said, 'Look, you're airing our problems out in public, and we don't think that's the way it should be handled, and we don't want you to practice," Myers told the Lubbock



Work crews are taking apart Dallas' historic Sportatorium

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Elvis Presley, Patsy Cline and Hank Williams played there. The Von Erich family wrestled there.

But now, the only action seen at the Dallas Sportatorium comes from the crews who are taking apart the historic wrestling, boxing and concert VCHUC

After a few recent reprieves, the barnlike wood-and-metal arena is coming down.

The city of Dallas granted a

demolition permit last week for the building at Cadiz and Industrial on the southwest corner of downtown Dallas.

The Sportatorium opened in the 1930s and has featured wrestling, boxing and the "Big D Jamboree." The popular honky-tonk show was a Dallas radio and television fixture from the 1940s into the '60s.

The original Sportatorium burned in 1953, but was rebuilt four months later. Famed rockabilly star Ronnie Dawson

night for four years in the Press.

"It's just a big ol' tin building that I can still smell - a smell of stale beer, the Trinity River, popcorn and grease," he told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in Friday's editions.

Such top stars of country and rock music as Johnny Cash, Buddy Holly, Gene Vincent and Willie Nelson played the venue in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Presley still had not yet achieved national stardom when he played Sportatorium in April 1955.

"Like some idiot, I wasn't interested in Elvis at the time," Dawson said. "I was interested in his guitar player who had done some work on a record I loved."

Such famed wrestlers of today as "Stone Cold" Steve Austin, Shawn Michaels and Booker T got their starts there, but its wrestling mainstays the years "Gentleman" Chris Adams, "Playboy" Gary Hart and the Fabulous Freebirds.

But the wrestling icons of the place were Frtiz Von Erich and his some, un conus of local fans in the 1960s, '70s and '80s with a dynasty built on the elder Von Erich's signature hold, "The Claw."


