





A cold front brought a blast of arctic air to Texas, threatening much of the state with snow, sleet or a wintry mix Monday night.

The front howled across North Texas on Sunday, bringing gusty and occasionally damaging winds.

In Tyler, gusts measured at up to 46 mph toppled trees and caused widespread power outages that had repair crews scrambling Sunday Sunday night.

As many as 1,000 East Texans found themselves without power in East Texas, TXU Energy spokeswoman Kimberly Morgan told the Tyler Morning Telegraph. The lights were back on in almost all areas by Monday morning.

Dallas, measured a 58 mph gust before noon Sunday.

Temperatures plummeted from the 70s ahead of the front to below freezing after nightfall Sunday. The front ignited some thunderstorms in Southeast Texas, with marble-size hail reported near Lake Livingston.

The National Weather Service predicted frigid temperatures for North Texas Monday night. Sleet and freezing rain was likely south and southeast of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, with a chance of sleet, snow or a wintry mix of precipitation elsewhere in the region. 



UConn still unanimous in poll

Connecticut received a mild challenge in its last two games. Not in The Associated Press

The Huskies, who have won 65 straight games, were a unanimous choice for No. 1 in the women's poll for the fourth consecutive week on Monday.

UConn (26-0) received all 44 first-place votes from a national media panel and had 1,100 points to lead a top five that was unchanged from last week.

Duke (25-1) remained second with 1,050 points and was followed by Tennessee (24-3), LSU (23-2) and Kansas State (25-2). LSU held at No. 4 despite Sunday's 68-65 loss to Tennessee, which has won 15 straight since a Jan. 4 overtime loss to Connecticut.

The rest of the top 10 included the same teams as last week, with a slight shuffling in the order, and the poll had no newcomers. Arkansas fell from 15th to 21st after losing to a pair of ranked opponents, Mississippi State and Georgia.

Only two members of the Top 25 lost to unranked teams during the past week. Purdue stayed at No. 11 after a 56-51 loss at Ohio State. Washington fell two spots to 25th after losing at Oregon State. The Huskies bounced back to win at Oregon two nights later.

Connecticut · beat · Notre Dame and Miami by doubledigit margins in its last two games but trailed Miami by eight points in the first half, matching the biggest deficit the Huskies have faced in their winning streak.

Then they went on a 30-4 run to blow it open and won 81-60. Against Notre Dame on Sunday, the score was tied late in the first half before UConn pulled away to a 77-59 victory.

Duke has been impressive since losing the No. 1 ranking after a Feb. 1 loss to Connecticut. The Blue Devils have won five times by an average of 31 points.

Chinese calling for direct talks between U.S., Korea

BEIJING (AP) — Chinese officials rejected Monday Secretary of State Colin Powell's appeal for a regional approach to the North Korean nuclear standoff and called for direct talks between the United States and Pyongyang to resolve concerns over the communist nation's nuclear weapons programs.

Powell also made his case for a second U.N. Security Council resolution on Iraq that would authorize military action against that country if President Saddam Hussein refuses to disarm, but the Chinese stood by their longstanding position that U.N. inspections should continue. It was not clear whether China would exercise its veto power if a second resolution is voted on by the Council.

A resolution backed by the United States and Britain was expected to be introduced Monday.

North Korea and Iraq dominated separate meetings Powell held with Foreign Minister Tang Jiaxuan, Vice President Hu Jintao and President Jiang Zemin.

On North Korea, Chinese state television quoted Tang as saying that China hopes for talks on the nuclear issue between the United States and North Korea "on an equal basis."

The Chinese state news agency Xinhua, meanwhile, reported that Hu made the same point and said U.S. talks with North Korea should begin as soon as possible.

Powell told an afternoon news conference that China is eager to play a positive role in helping to resolve concerns about Pyongyang's weapons programs. He added that China was undertaking initiatives with North Korea that he was unable to discuss publicly.

After his discussions here, Powell flew to South Korea to attend the inauguration
Tuesday of President-elect Roh
Moo-Hyun. Roh also has advocated direct talks between
Washington and Pyongyang to
resolve the weapons issue.

Powell has said direct talks with North Korea are possible so long as they are limited to a conversation on what Pyongyang must to do comply with its international obligations.

He said the United States feels strongly that "North Korea's actions pose a threat to regional stability and to the global non-proliferation regime.

"I cannot emphasize how seriously all of us would view any move toward reprocessing of the spent fuel and the production of nuclear weapons."

Powell said Japan backs the U.S. insistence on a regional approach to the issue. He also noted that the International Atomic Energy Agency agreed earlier this month in a near-unanimous vote by member states to refer the issue to the U.S. Security Council.

An administration official said last week that strong action by the Council is not likely because of opposition by Russia.

China is the chief provider of foreign assistance to North Korea. Privately, administration officials have said China has not used all the leverage it has to induce North Korea to curb its nuclear ambitions.

Powell told reporters the administration has seen a deterioration in the human rights situation in China.

Since December, he said the United States has been "deeply concerned by the execution of a prominent Tibetan, the detention of more than a dozen prodemocracy activists and the continuation of a pattern of inconsistent and irregular legal and judicial procedures."

Rainbow Trout arrive at local lake

One thousand Rainbow Trout averaging 12-inches in length were recently released at Recreation Park Lake in Pampa. The fish were transported here by Texas Parks & Wildlife officials and were initially acquired from Crystal Lake, Mo.

The fish were grown to approximately 12-inches in length at Possum Kingdom Lake near Wichita Falls. Texas Parks and Wildlife technician, Don Reinisch hauled the transport trailer from Dundee Fish Hatchery near Wichita Falls where he is stationed to Possum Kingdom Lake to pick up the trout which he then delivered to Recreation Lake.

Before the trout could be released, water from the transport trailer was exchanged for Recreation Lake water to help ward against the fish suffering shock due to any sudden temperature change.

The City of Pampa has participated in the Rainbow Trout stocking program since 1993 and this year purchased 1,000 trout at 84-cents apiece. The state matched this figure with 1,000 trout supplied at its expense. The first shipment arrived back in December.

As Recreation Park Lake is a public waterway, state fishing regulations must be applied and are enforced by game wardens and not by the city.

Generally, a fishing license is not required for

individuals age 17 and under or individuals born before Sept. 1, 1930. For individuals born after this date who are over 17, a state fishing license and a Freshwater Trout Stamp Endorsement must be obtained. According to 2002-03 Texas Parks and Wildlife Outdoor Annual Hunting and Fishing Regulations, the daily catch limit on trout is five per day with no minimum length required.

Former mob hitman faces murder charge in detective's death

HACKENSACK, N.J. (AP) — Former mob hitman Salvatore "Sammy the Bull" Gravano will face murder charges for allegedly arranging the 1980 shooting death of a New York City police officer, a prosecutor said Monday.

The charges come just days after another hitman, Richard Kuklinski, pleaded guilty to killing Peter Calabro, 36, of Upper Saddle River. Kuklinski was charged after he confessed to the slaying in an interview broadcast May 20, 2001, on the HBO series "America Undercover."

In a statement issued early Monday, County Prosecutor John L. Molinelli said Gravano, the onetime hitman for the Gambino crime family who later became a government informer, hired Kuklinski to kill Calabro. It said he provided Kuklinski with "the specific weaponry and equipment needed to carry out the homicide."

Gravano also was in the area at the time Calabro was killed, the statement said. Calabro's body was found inside a station wagon with two shotgun wounds on March 14, 1980.

The statement said Gravano would be charged with murder. Molinelli didn't return a phone call Monday morning but his statement said he would provide further details about Gravano's connection to the slaying later Monday.

Gravano is now in prison in Colorado, where he is serving state and federal sentences for masterminding an Ecstasy drug ring when he lived in Arizona.

Gravano was the government's star witness in the case against crime boss John Gotti Sr. in 1992. Gravano admitted to plotting 19 murders as a mob hitman but served only five years in prison on racketeering charges under a deal with prosecutors. He had settled in Arizona after leaving prison.

Gotti was found guilty on 14 counts, including murder, racketeering and tax evasion and received a life sentence. He died last year at a prison hospital in Missouri.
