that following the change many times the families would go together and pool their resources to bury their loved ones.

"It's difficult," he said.

Precinct Three County Commissioner Gerald Wright expressed reservations about the county enacting a policy requiring that indigents to be cremated. He cited personal and religious beliefs.

Peet asked Hutchinson County Judge Jack Worsham, who was at the meeting to discuss the delinquent fee consortium, about that county's

indigent burial policy. He said the costs in that county was similar to Gray County.

"It's probably what you spent last year or more," said Worsham. "We bury about 20 a year."

Worsham said Hutchinson County hasn't offered cremation as an only option yet. "But we're leaning that way,"

In other business, the commission will consider District Attorney Rick Roach's request for additional space in the courthouse as well as the request of Judge Phil Vanderpool. Roach appeared before commissioners at the Feb. 14 meeting and Vanderpool sent a letter requesting more space.

Additional items to be considered Friday include creating petty cash fund of \$750 through sheriff's office for Narcotic Task Force agent, the racial profile report of Constables James Lewis and Frank Sparling, a policy on accrued vacation and sick leave regarding family medical leave, a bid on tax property located at 932 E. 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


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

Listen for the bird's song

For weeks I've been waiting for "the call" when my son Dave would tell me that he was going to war. I thought I would be ready for it when it came. I wasn't. Nothing can prepare a mother to hear those words, "Get ready, Mom."

I tried not to cry. I know you're supposed to be brave and strong, so they can be brave and strong. But I did cry a little.

"This is what I signed up to do," he said. "I'm going to do it."

Fortunately, Dave called me about three days before the news that the 101st Airborne would be deployed to Iraq hit CNN, the major networks and wire serv-

In the midst of this, I'm acutely aware that I'm only one person among the hundreds of thousands of families affected by what is happening in this insane

So many have been, and are being, affected right here in Pampa. So many, in fact, that I feel guilty for saying anything about it at all.

My models for this new role come from the wives and mothers who watched their loved ones go to World War II, Vietnam and the Persian Gulf. Two of them work here at the newspaper. They help me know that the emotional roller coaster I'm experiencing doesn't mean I'm going crazy. Each time I nearly lose it, they kindly, firmly, help me get

back on track.

When I expressed my concern in an earlier column, my cousin-in-law Karan Cross reminded me that persons of faith do not live in fear. She's right. Sandy Carr sent me two prayers that I have turned to many times. In fact, the first thing I did on New Year's Day was sit down with those prayers, knowing they would be especially important this year.

When I was 12 years old, my family moved to Minden, La. A lady who worked with my dad introduced me to her niece, Cindy, who was my age.

Thirty-five years later, Cindy and I have traversed adolescence and adulthood - marriages, children, divorces, deaths, tragedies, happiness and heartache. We never dreamed that we'd share the experience of having sons in the military. But here we are. Dave's in the Army. Cindy's son Heath is in the Air Force Reserve.

We supported each other while Dave served as a peacekeeper in Macedonia and when Heath had to leave college to

serve in Turkey and Afghanistan after the Sept. 11th attacks.

In the dark days that followed "the call," Cindy has often been my light. But nothing helped me more than this beautiful e-mail that I'm compelled to share with others who stand where we stand.

"I woke this morning to the news on TV of 'wars and rumors of war,' Cindy wrote. "There were frightening stories of terrorist attacks, 'dirty bombs' and countries filled with hate for us. There was even a Home Depot demonstration on how to make your own 'safe room' with plastic and duct tape in the event of an attack. The most crushing blow to me was seeing the young faces of the mon and women who are prepared to defend us ... faces that looked'a lot like Dave and Heath. I muted the TV when the news got to be more than I could handle.

"The silence that followed was broken only by the singing of a tiny bird outside my window. It seems that his beautiful song had been overwhelmed by the chants of war. I took his song as a reminder from God that everything will be okay and that in the midst of turmoil and unrest we can find peace and strength in the love of a Father who sends us hope through the songs of a tiny bird.

"Dee Dee, keep listening for that tiny bird's song."

I'm listening, Cindy. I'm listening.


Affirmative action bake sale

Not all college students support racial preferences, and some UCLA students made their feelings known in a highly innovative way.

In early February, Bruin Republicans organized a campus cookie sale - but not your ordinary cookie sale. They offered cookies at different prices depending on the customer's race and sex. Black, Latino and American Indian females were charged 25 cents for a cookie, while their male counterparts were charged 50 cents. White females were charged a dollar. White males were charged two dollars. Asian males and females also were charged two dollars a cookie.

Students selling the cookies assigned themselves nametags. Some of the name tags read "Uncle Tom," "The White Oppressor" and "Self-Hating Hispanic Race Traitor." Chris Riha, third-year business economics student participating in the Affirmative Action Bake Sale, said that the students decided to one-up their detractors by assigning the names themselves. That's what minorities who disagree with racial preferences are either called, or thought to be: an "Uncle Tom" or self-hating black or Hispanic.

Chairman of the California Democratic Party Art Torres voiced his disapproval, saying, "I am deeply saddened and disheartened at the activities of the Bruin Republicans." He accused them of having been emboldened by Sen. Trent Lott's remarks that led to his ouster as the Senate majority leader. Torres'



condemnation was joined by many of UCLA's racial preferences supporters.

Here's my question for those who condemned the event. Why be offended by a money version of racial preferences? After all, it's identical in principle to admission practices sanctioned by university communities across America. In fact, that's what the University of Michigan case before the U.S. Supreme Court is all about - treating people differently by race.

Some might ask: "Why are Asians charged two dollars? They're a minority." You'd be right. According to the 2000 Census, residents who reported as Asian, or in combination with one or more other races, totaled 11.9 million - or 4 percent of our population. In my book that makes Asians a minority and eligible for the cookie affirmative action discount. Instead of being charged two dollars for a cookie, Asian females and Asian males are rightful claimants to the racially discounted price of 25 cents and 50 cents, respectively.

If you see things that way, and think Asian-Americans are eligible for preferential treatment, it simply means that you

haven't kept abreast with modern racial enlightenment. A minority group is not a minority if, as a group, it is successful. Asian median family is \$55,525, the highest of any other racial group in America. More than 44 percent of Asians age 25 and over have bachelor degrees; the rate for all other Americans was 26 percent. Other indicators of group success would include low crime rate and high family stability. Case closed -Asians are not a minority.

Being a UCLA alumnus (doctorate 1972), I can sympathize with critics of the Affirmative Action Bake Sale. Were I still a student, I'd walk up to these people and tell them that selling cookies on campus is OK, but it's a despicable, mean practice to treat people differently just because they're members of one race or sex or another.

I'd take a principled stand - that's where I differ from other critics of the Affirmative Action Bake Sale. They take a situational stand on racial preferences. For them, whether racial preferences-are wrong or right depends upon whom it's practiced against.

I'd like to ask my fellow critics just one question: If racial preferences, highlighted by the cookie, are wrong and offensive, why wouldn't it also be wrong and offensive in the university's admissions practices?

After all, the Affirmative Action Bake Sale was promoting diversity in cookie ownership.

BEIJIN Visiting formed by economic Cuban Castro sai hardly country th ailing remaining allies.

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Fidel struck by Chinese capitalistic economy

BEIJING (AP) -Visiting a China transformed by capitalist-style economic development, Cuban leader Fidel Castro said Thursday he hardly recognized the country that is one of his ailing nation's few remaining communist allies.

Castro, the world's longest-serving communist leader, said China's changes left him bewildered.

"I can't really be sure just now what kind of China I am visiting, because the first time I visited, your country appeared one way and appears another way," Castro said in a meeting with the head of China's legislature, Li Peng.

"You can say that every so often your country undergoes great changes," Castro said.

Castro met Li took in the Great Hall of the People, the hulking seat of China's legislature on the edge of Tiananmen Square — one of the few parts of Beijing to remain unchanged in decades of economic reform and urban renew-

Reforms in China have brought in foreign investment totaling hundreds of billions of dollars and produced a dynamic private sector — concepts still largely unknown in Castro's Cuba. While Castro has adhered closely to Marxist economics since seizing power in the 1959 revolution, China has produced ever more market-oriented leaders focused on economic growth.

China has provided hundreds of millions of dollars in economic credits to Cuba, as well as some direct aid. Castro's talks with Chinese President Jiang Zemin on Wednesday focused on economic ties and concluded with the signing of an economic cooperation agreement and Chinese aid package for Cuba:

Castro, 76, was to meet Thursday with Chinese Premier Zhu Rongji, Vice President Hu Jintao and Vice Premier Wen Jiabao. Hu and Wen are expected to take over as China's president and premier, respectively, at the annual legislative session beginning next week.

Castro will visit Japan this weekend for the first time in more than seven years, the Japan's Foreign Ministry said Thursday. He will have dinner with business leaders Saturday before meeting former Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto on Sunday. He is due to tour Hiroshima on Monday.

Organic food measure could weaken program, Veneman says

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman says organic food standards could be undermined by a measure passed in Congress that allows farmers who feed animals conventional meal to label the meat organic if reasonably priced organic grain isn't available.

The measure "could weaken the national organic program," Veneman said Wednesday, defending the department's organic labeling standards while siding with food companies, farmers and environmental groups.

To use the new organic labels, food must be grown by a certified farmer who does not use conventional pesticides and fertilizers, biotechnology, antibiotics or growth hormones. The standards were adopted last year after a dozen years of discussions between department officials and the organic foods industry.

"It is important to maintain a strong organic program that ensures the integrity of the organic label placed on consumer products," Veneman said in a statement. "The best way to do that is by maintaining the organic standards as we implemented them in October 2002."

She stopped short of endorsing an effort led by Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., to repeal the language wrapped by Rep. Nathan Deal, R-Ga., into the \$397 billion government-wide spending bill. Still, organic food supporters welcomed her statement.

"I think that USDA's statement provides the perfect justification for quietly saying: Let's repeal this," said Bob Scowcroft, head of the Organic

Scowcroft and others have been anything but quiet over Deal's measure. The outcry against it has made for unusual alliances as groups ranging from chicken giant Tyson Foods Inc. to the Environmental Working Group push for a repeal.

Deal sought the measure on behalf of Fieldale Farms Corp. in Baldwin, Ga., after it complained it couldn't find enough organic grain for producing organic chickens.

"You would want to know what is the supply," Deal said. "No study was done, not even by the USDA. We asked them to do it in advance of the new standards.'

Alisa Harrison, a department spokeswoman, said that a study is being done now but she didn't know when it would be completed.

Tomas Hensley, vice president of Fieldale Farms, said his company will lobby against Leahy's bill and tried to downplay the back-

Strikers in Guatemala seize oil pumping station

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — Striking teachers have seized a pumping station on Guatemala's only oil pipeline to press their demands for a hefty wage increase and better schools.

The striking teachers, in the 39th day of a strike, shrugged aside government warnings on Wednesday that it would no longer tolerate protests that have blocked highways and airports and shut down government buildings.

The State warned Department American travelers to exercise caution as the protests continued.

"As large demonstrations may continue throughout the country, American citizens visiting or residing in Guatemala are advised that it may be more difficult to move about freely and safely State Department warning

Some 2,000 teachers seized a pumping station on French-owned pipeline that carries all of Guatemala's oil production from wells in the north to Atlantic ports.

Antonio Minondo, a spokesman for oil company Perenco, said the line carries some 25,000 barrels of crude oil a day.

Teachers also protested for a second day around La Aurora International Airport in Guatemala City and at Atlantic and Pacific ports.

American Airlines suspended at least three flights on Wednesday. Delta and Continental canceled one flight each the day before, according to airport manager Fredy Kopp.

Other airlines appeared to be operating normally, though passengers had to use emergency exits and circuitous routes to bypass pro-

Prosecutor Carlos de Leon told a news conference that the government would seek permission to immediately remove the demonstra-

The presidency issued a statement accusing teachers of taking advantage of the government's patience and warning it "will not permit that the law be violated and injured."

About 60,000 of the country's 80,000 teachers are striking to demand a neardoubling of salaries that now range from about \$190 to \$390 per month. They also seek improved school buildings, more books and better school lunches.

Federal negotiators have offered a monthly bonus of \$12 to supplement educators' incomes.





Fearing setbacks for women's sports, at least two Title IX commission members plan to protest the group's work by giving a minority report to Education Secretary Rod

Title IX, the anti-discrimination law credited with opening sports to millions of girls and women, is under fire from those who say its enforcement has led to cuts in men's sports. Paige set up a commission to suggest how to clarify and strengthen the law, but the group's report is slanted and incomplete, said U.S. women's soccer team captain Julie Foudy, a commission member.

"A lot of the recommendations, we don't even know what the impact would be," Foudy said. "To recommend things to the secretary that could impact millions of young girls is just something I can't

Critics of the Title IX review call it rushed and flawed. They object to the final report's tone and to some of its recommended changes about how schools could comply with the law.

The commission's co-chairman, Stanford athletic director Ted Leland, tried to negotiate a compromise last week with Foudy and Donna de Varona, the other commission member protesting the report.



The book, "Perfect I'm Not! Boomer on Beer, Brawls, Backaches and Baseball," will be published April 1 by William Morrow, a subsidiary of News Corp.

All eyes on Matsui for spring debut

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Hideki Matsui might be the only person who's not ready for his spring training debut.

"For me personally, I'd like a little bit more time to prepare," he said Wednesday through an interpreter. "I'm not mentally ready yet, but I'm doing my best right now."

It seems the rest of the baseball world couldn't to see how the Japanese star fares in his first game with the New York Yankees.

Thursday's game against the Cincinnati Reds is a sellout and Matsui's performance will be watched by Yankees fans back home in New York and many other people around baseball.

Fans in Tokyo will be watching Matsui live on highdefinition television at 3:15 a.m. Friday local time except his family.

"They'll probably be sleeping," he said.

There will be 11 other games across Florida and Arizona on Thursday, highlighted by new Chicago Cubs manager Dusty Baker taking on his former team, the San Francisco Giants, Scottsdale, Ariz.

"It is spring training. I've got a lot of guys over there I gare about," Baker said. "I know half of the staff. It'll be a little different for me to come out of the other club-

In other games in Arizona Thursday, Surprise Stadium hosts its first

matchup, a charity game between Texas and Kansas City; Seattle and San Diego play a charity game; Arizona faces Colorado and Oakland plays Milwaukee.

The other Florida games are Detroit vs. Los Angeles, Philadelphia vs. Pittsburgh, Baltimore vs. Florida, Atlanta vs. Georgia Tech, the Mets vs. St. Louis, and Minnesota vs.

But the biggest focus will be on Matsui, who signed a \$21 million, three-year contract this offseason to play with the Yankees.

"I'm more excited to watch him in games now," Yankees manager Joe Torre said. "I feel a little bit better about his early results. I still stress patience. It's tough to get used to a new crop of pitchers."

Even Yankees owner George Steinbrenner, who has been known to lose his temper in spring training, is preaching patience for his new star.

But Matsui knows he'll have to produce soon, and that all those homers he hit in Japan don't mean anything.

"I'm not going to look into the results too seriously for the first few games," he said. "But obviously, I haven't earned the starting roster yet. For my teammates and coaches, I want to make sure I do my best out there."

Hall of Famer Reggie Jackson, who knows what it's like to be in the spotlight, gave Matsui some advice before his first game.

"Basically, I said, not to

worry," Jackson said. "Worry if you don't have the talent, but he has the talent."

Matsui is a celebrity back home and is followed by a horde of Japanese journalists in Florida.

He was a three-time MVP in the Central League, playing for the Tokyo Yomiuri Giants, Japan's most renowned team. Matsui hit 332 homers in 10 seasons with the Giants, including 50 last year.

While his prodigious power earned him the nickname Godzilla, Matsui has impressed the Yankees with his disciplined approach at the

Matsui is the first power hitter to come over from Japan and some scouts questioned whether he'd be able to adjust as easily as slap-hitting Ichiro Suzuki did with Seattle, when he won the AL MVP award as a rookie two years

The Yankees are confident

Matsui will be a success. "He's got a very manageable swing against pretty much anybody," Torre said. "When I think of left-handed hitters, I'm thinking more uppercut type swings. He's more of a line-drive type level swing than most of your lefthanders."

The Yankees also will show off their other big international acquisition. Cuban pitcher Jose Contreras will Sterling starter Hitchcock in Torre's Game 1 pitching lineup. Jeff Weaver also is expected to pitch.

Report: Baker will be suspended by Celtics

BOSTON (AP) — Vin Baker will be suspended by the Boston Celtics to deal with alcohol-related problems and other issues, The Boston Globe reported Thursday.

The center will be suspended for two weeks, beginning Thursday, said the Globe, citing unidentified sources.

Celtics spokesman Jeff Twiss said he could not comment. A call Baker's agent, Aaron Goodwin, was not immediately returned. The team was expected to release a statement Thursday.

Baker, often criticized by fans for his lack of production this season, came to the Celtics from the Seattle SuperSonics last summer. He was to meet with the coaching staff and his teammates Thursday.

"Me and coach (Jim O'Brien) and the others are just going to talk about things," Baker said Wednesday night after the Celtics beat Indiana 71-69. For the third consecutive game, Baker did not

"I'm making a request," said Baker, who did not elaborate. "I just want to talk, and then I'll let everyone know. As you know,

this is a very tough time for me." Asked about the team's medical concerns with the 31-year-old Baker, general manager Chris Wallace declined comment.

Baker told the Globe he was not considering retirement or a buyout. The Celtics are to pay Baker about \$44 million during the next three years.

Baker missed a Feb. 5 game against Seattle after complaining of lightheadedness, in addition to reporting heart palpitations following a Jan. 18 game in Milwaukee.

Senators still bickering over judicial nominees

WASHINGTON (AP) -Two of President Bush's other judicial nominees may hit a roadblock in the Senate even as senators continued their third week of debate over the nomination of Miguel Estrada to the federal appellate bench.

A vote on U.S. Appeals Court nominees Deborah Cook and John Roberts was scheduled for the Senate Judiciary Committee on Thursday, but Senate Democrats have asked the White House and the GOP for additional time to question the two candidates.

"Some of us believe the January 29, 2003, committee hearing did not provide an adequate opportunity to ask the questions necessary for senators to effectively carry out their constitutional duty," Democrats senators wrote to the White House on Monday.

Democrats blocked a committee vote on Roberts and Cook last week in hopes of getting additional questions, but White House counsel Alberto Gonzales said V.'ednesday the White House would resist additional hearings on Cook, an Ohio Supreme Court justice and Roberts, a Maryland lawyer. Both nominated in May 2001.

Each nominee answered many questions in previous hearings, Gonzales said. "There is no legitimate justification for

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the extraordinary delays that already have occurred with respect to these two nominees," he wrote. "And there is no justification for further delay."

Democrats say they didn't have enough time to question Cook and Roberts during their original confirmation hearing because Senate Judiciary Chairman Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, had three federal appellate candidates at the same hearing, instead of doing them one at a

This came as President Bush called it a "travesty" that Democratic senators refuse to allow a full Senate vote on Estrada's nomination.

Bush summoned officials Hispanic from throughout his administration and recruited dozens of Hispanic political backers to press Estrada's case as he angrily demanded confirmation.

"They're blocking the vote on this good man for purely political reasons," Bush told the Hispanic supporters. "The senators are applying a double standard to Miguel Estrada by requiring him to answer questions that other judicial nominees, over time, have not been forced to answer."

Democrats have refused to let Estrada's nomination for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia come up for a final Senate vote for three weeks because they say the Washington lawyer was not forthcoming about his legal opinions during his confirmation hearing last year.

They also say Estrada lacks the judicial experience to serve on that court. Republicans have accused Democrats of treating Estrada unfairly because he is a conservative Hispanic.

Lab officials obstructed probe, investigators say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Officials at the university that runs Los Alamos National Laboratory were blindsided by reports of theft and corruption at the lab, but changing management at the lab could undermine its national security mission, says a University of California official.

The most experienced nuclear weapons scientists at Los Alamos are nearing retirement and could leave the lab if management changes, Bruce Darling, senior vice president at the university, told members of the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Oversight Investigations and Wednesday.

"Turning over the contract on a regular basis creates a real threat of disruption to our nation's security," Darling said.

The New Mexico lab maintains and develops the nation's nuclear weapons. It has also been the training ground for many of the nuclear weapons inspectors working in Iraq and developed systems to detect chemical and biological weapons.

But reports of widespread abuse of lab charge cards, missing computers improper purchases have the Energy Department considering whether other universities and companies should be allowed to compete for the contract to run the lab, which the University of California has held without competition for 60 years.

House subcommittee chairman Rep. James Greenwood, R-Pa., questioned the wisdom of awarding a \$1.7 billion contract without competition and not having methods to hold the contractor account-

A trio of Los Alamos inves-

tigators testified Wednesday that lab managers looked the other way for years while corruption took hold, and then obstructed investigations into the misuse of funds.

Jaret McDonald, a lab facilities manager, went to the FBI after lab managers ignored his concerns of dozens of inappropriate purchases by lab employees. He showed the subcommittee photos he had taken of television sets, sleeping bags, fishing equipment, lawnmowers and other items purchased with lab funds.

Other items suspected to have been purchased with lab money were found in the homes of Scott Alexander and Peter Bussolini when the FBI searched them in October. They have not been criminally charged.

Investigators Steven Doran and Glenn Walp said management also obstructed their investigations. They were fired after they reported \$2.7 million in missing computers and property, and the misuse of lab-issued charge cards including one employee who tried to purchase a customized sports car worth \$30,000 with a lab charge card.

Walp and Doran have since

been hired by the university as consultants on the school's investigation of the lab. Doran was hired permanently Tuesday as head of security and investigations for the university.

Despite the lack of financial controls, the Energy Department's inspector general, Gregory H. Friedman, said there are no indications that nuclear weapons secrets or national security were compromised. However, with 400 computers stolen over three years, there can be no guarantees, he said.

Darling said 15 senior Los Alamos managers have been fired or removed from management positions, including former lab director John

Walp said more is needed.

"My personal opinion is it's time to gut the place. I think it's so infected, it's a culture that has been ingrained in that place for decades," he said.

HOUSTON (AP) — A man received at least \$18,210 from Watson Laboratories Inc. of Salt Lake City for the sale of hundreds of human fingernails toenails between November 1999 and August 2001. The nails were used to test experimental medicines.

> Officials have closed the Willed Body Program indefinitely.

Federal law prohibits profiting from the sale of human bodies and the FBI is investigating, said spokesman Bob Doguim. No one has been charged.

Tyler declined to comment on the report when The Associated Press contacted him Thursday at his Galveston home. He has so far refused to talk to investigators, the Chronicle reported.

A purchasing agent at the laboratory, Shirley Krouse, confirmed that the company issued checks directly to Tyler for shipments of toenails and fingernails the company used in research, the newspaper reported. Krouse said officials at the lab believed Tyler turnedthe money over to the school.

In one transaction, Tyler received \$4,005 for 232 fingernails at \$15 each and 35 toenails at \$15 each, according to Tyler's records.

The newspaper said Tyler also received at least \$56,000 in direct payments from a New Jersey company.

Officials said they also learned that Tyler had allowed the ashes of dozens of cremated donated bodies to be mixed, making it impossible to return ashes to donors' families. After the medical center informed the families involved, relatives of several body donors sued Tyler and the school. Those lawsuits are

The university had refused last year to grant -the Chronicle access to thousands of documents associated with the Willed Body Program, the newspaper said. The Texas attorney general's office issued an opinion saying the school should turn over the records. The school appealed to a state district court but dropped the appeal
