SKIN CANCER PREVENTION

Hours spent working in the sun on farms and ranches, in construction or other outdoor occupations can add up to skin cancer.

Since skin cancer appears to be caused by long-term exposure to the sun, people who work mostly outdoors could be considered at risk.

The death rate from malignant melanoma, the most serious form of skin cancer, is increasing faster than any other cancer in the U.S. except lung cancer in women.

Malignant melanoma is common in light skinned, middleaged or elderly people who have spent most of their lives in the sun. Most of their melanomas develop from moles they have had since childhood.

Most medical authorities recommend avoiding prolonged exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., when the rays are strongest.

No secret to selecting a ripe watermelon

For some people, picking the "perfect" watermelon is a favorite summer rite that involves thumping and shaking and looking for telltale signs of what could be inside.

But, judging the quality of a

watermelon is very difficult unless it's cut in half or quartered.

In fact, one recent produce industry study showed that

about forty percent of consumers find melons the most difficult fruit to judge for ripeness and freshness,

There are a few appearance factors which may be helpful but not totally reliable in guiding you to a good, ripe, juicy

watermelon.

The surface of the watermelon should be relatively smooth. The rind should have a slight dullness, neither shiny nor dull. The ends of the melon should be filled out and rounded, and the underside of the melon should have a creamy color.

It's easier, but usually more expensive to buy a cut melon. Even, then, you may not get the best melon for your money unless you inspect it well. The best melon has firm, juicy flesh

with good red color. Look out for white streaks and whitish seeds since these indicate immaturity.


Also avoid a melon with dry, mealy flesh or watery, stringy flesh. These are signs of overmaturity or ageing after

The peak watermelon season is here so there are plenty of delicious melons to choose from at the supemarkets and produce stands. With prices low and likely to get lower as the season progresses, you may have several chances to pick the "perfect" melon.



DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

I realize many of you have spotty stands of cotton and more of you have no stand at all. If you consider replanting another crop, you must file a disaster claim before replanting, and you must report the new crop acreage to us within 5 days after planting is completed. You will remain eligible for a possible deficiency payment on your cotton acres provided you maintain your ACR (Set-Aside) Remember grain ground. sorghum is not an approved cover on ACR.

HAYING & GRAZING ACR

You must file a request at this office before having or grazing crops on ACR ground. ACR baled or grazed must be fed to your own livestock. Balilng on the halves is not permissible. Eligible livestock are those you owned as of April 15, 1984.

EMERGENCY FEED

Applications are still being taken for the Emergency Feed Assistance Program in which you could be eligible to purchase government lowgrade corn at a price of \$2.05 bushel. Grain Sorghum that was sold in 1983, including PIK, will no longer count against you as feed on hand. So, if you were ineligible before because of the Grain Sorghum provision, you may want to reappl.

1985 WHEAT PROGRAM

The provisions for the 1985 Acreage Reduction Program are as follows

Signup period is October 15. 1984 through March 1, 1985. The Target price is \$4.38 per bushel and the National Average Loan

Rate is \$3.30 per bushel.

The 1985 acreage bases will be the average of the farms' 1983 and 1984 planted and considered planting. The maximum permitted acreage will be limited to no more than 70 percent of the farms' base.

There will be no PIK program, and no advance deficiency payments. There will be a required paid diversion payment on 10 percent of the farms' base at a rate of \$2.70 per bushel. Producers can receive 50 percent of the diversion payment at signup upon request.
The Acreage Conservation

Reserve requirements will be basically the same as in 1984. Producers will be required to sign binding contracts when enrolling in the program.

FOOD AND ACRICULTURAL COUNCIL NEWS

Food and Agricultural Council, FAC committee, this group wants to give an update on the drought situation and suggest several recommendations concerning proper grass management and practices to protect cropland from wind and water erosion.

County is still continuing to experience severe drought conditions. Official county rainfall records indicate that only 10.28 inches have been received during the period of September 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. Some parts of the county have received even less. The average rainfall for this 10 month period based on a 48 year average is 17.86 with the highest rainfall months being September and May averaging 3.10.

Producers greatly depend on receiving rainfall during the months of September and May to provide moisture to plant small grains, cotton, and grain sorghum. Peak grass production also occurs during these two months, Below average amounts of rainfall have been received during these two peak periods giving a good indication as to why our grass production is depleted and shy our fall and spring crops have failed.

Hay for livestock consumption is in short supply now and prospects for this winter are not favorable. Producers with a failed cotton crop should consider planting a forage crop to be harvested and sold as hay. This would alleviate some of the problems of locating hay during the winter months as well as deriving income and protecting the soil.

Since pastureland has been severely set back because of the drought, a minimum of one growing season will be needed on a majority of the pastureland to allow time for plants to recover. If livestock numbers have been reduced or disbursed a careful analysis of the grass conditions should be completed before any restocking is done after conditions begin to

improve. Contact the local Soil Conservation Service or Extension Service for assistance in evaluating your rangeland, and for recommendations of cover crops to be established on cropland. The local ASCS office should be contacted before replanting failed program crops

to other crop uses.
