Cable TV provider on city's agenda

Cable One cable company will be discussed at the next regular meeting of Pampa City Commission, 4 p.m. Tuesday in the third-floor commission chamber at City Hall.

The cable company recently drew public attention when Nexstar Broadcast Group required that it

stop retransmitting KAMR Channel 4, the group's Amarillo television station, unless it agreed to pay for the retransmission. KAMR was dropped from Cable One's programming at midnight March 31.

City Manager John Horst will report on sales tax revenue. City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers will present a health permit report.

City-sponsored teen activities are

another discussion item on the agenda, along with Cable One.

Action items include possible adoption of Resolution No. 05-005, authorizing the refund of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority Contract Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 1999 (Conjunctive Use Groundwater Project); possible adoption of the City of Pampa compensation plan, to go into effect Oct.

1; and salary adjustments for designated positions for recruitment and retention.

Four bids for tax-delinquent property are on the agenda. They are \$200 from Gary Chaffin for 708 E. Scott; \$200, Gary Chaffin, 604 Reid; \$210, name of bidder not provided on agenda, 739 Brunow; and \$205, name not provided, 722 Denver.

Bolton says he'll work with others to help U.N.

WASHINGTON (AP) — John R. Bolton, a blunt diplomat whose nomination as U.S. ambassador to the U.N. is opposed by most Democrats and some in the foreign policy establishment, pledged Monday to help strengthen an institution that has occasionally "gone off track."

The Bush administration is committed to the success of the U.N., Bolton, the undersecretary of state, said on the first day of his confirmation hearing before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He told lawmakers that "we view the U.N. as an important component of our diplomacy."

President Bush's selection of Bolton last month has stirred controversy because of his expressions of disdain for the United Nations and the blunt criticism he has leveled at North Korea and other countries and arms control treaties.

The committee's top Democrat, Sen. Joseph Biden of Delaware, expressed his "grave concern" about Bolton's nomination, citing doubts about his "diplomatic temperament," his statements about the U.N. and

international laws and treaties, and his leadership on weapons threats in places like North Korea and Iran.

"In my judgment," Biden said, "your judgment about how to deal with the emerging threats have not been particularly useful."

Sen. George Allen, R-Va., however, called Bolton "the absolute perfect person for the job."

Bolton, 56, has served in the past three Republican administrations and been one of his party's strongest conservative voices on foreign affairs issues. He is now the administration's arms control chief.

Bolton was asked about the impact on American standing overseas of the flawed U.S. intelligence on weapons of mass destruction in Iraq — displayed with much fanfare at the U.N. by

former Secretary of State Colin Powell. "Unquestionably the failure to find weapons of mass destruction in Iraq has led some people to question our goodwill and credibility," Bolton responded.

He noted that the U.N. has both strengths and weaknesses and said that if confirmed he would try to help forge a stronger relationship between the United States and the United Nations, "which depends critically on American leadership." He said he aimed not just to promote American interests at the world body.

Bolton also took a critical tack, saying the U.N. General Assembly needs to

focus more on human rights violators and international terrorism.

"We must work to galvanize the General Assembly to focus its attention on issues of true importance," he said.

"Sadly, there have been times when the General Assembly has gone off track," he added, citing the "abominable" resolution that equated Zionism with racism. It was repealed in 1991, with Bolton playing a leading role as a State Department official.

Sen. Richard Lugar, the Foreign Relations Committee chairman, talked at length about the controversy over Bolton, saying opponents have criticized him as "abrasive, confrontational and insensitive."

"In the diplomatic world, neither bluntness nor rhetorical sensitivity is a virtue in itself," the Indiana Republican said. "There are times when blunt talk serves a policy purpose; other times it does not."

Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said he had serious questions about Bolton's "commitment to the U.N."

"It is critical we have someone with respect for diplomacy, who believes in the United Nations despite its flaws," he said.

"I'm surprised the nominee wants the job he's been nominated for, given the many negative things he's had to say about the U.N.," Biden said.

Added Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., who aired excerpts from a 1994 Bolton speech to demonstrate what she said is his disdain for the U.N.: "You can dance around it, you can run away from it, you can put perfume on it, but the bottom line is the bottom line."

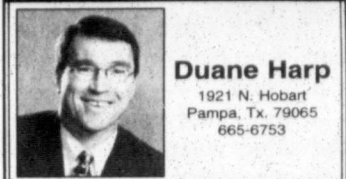

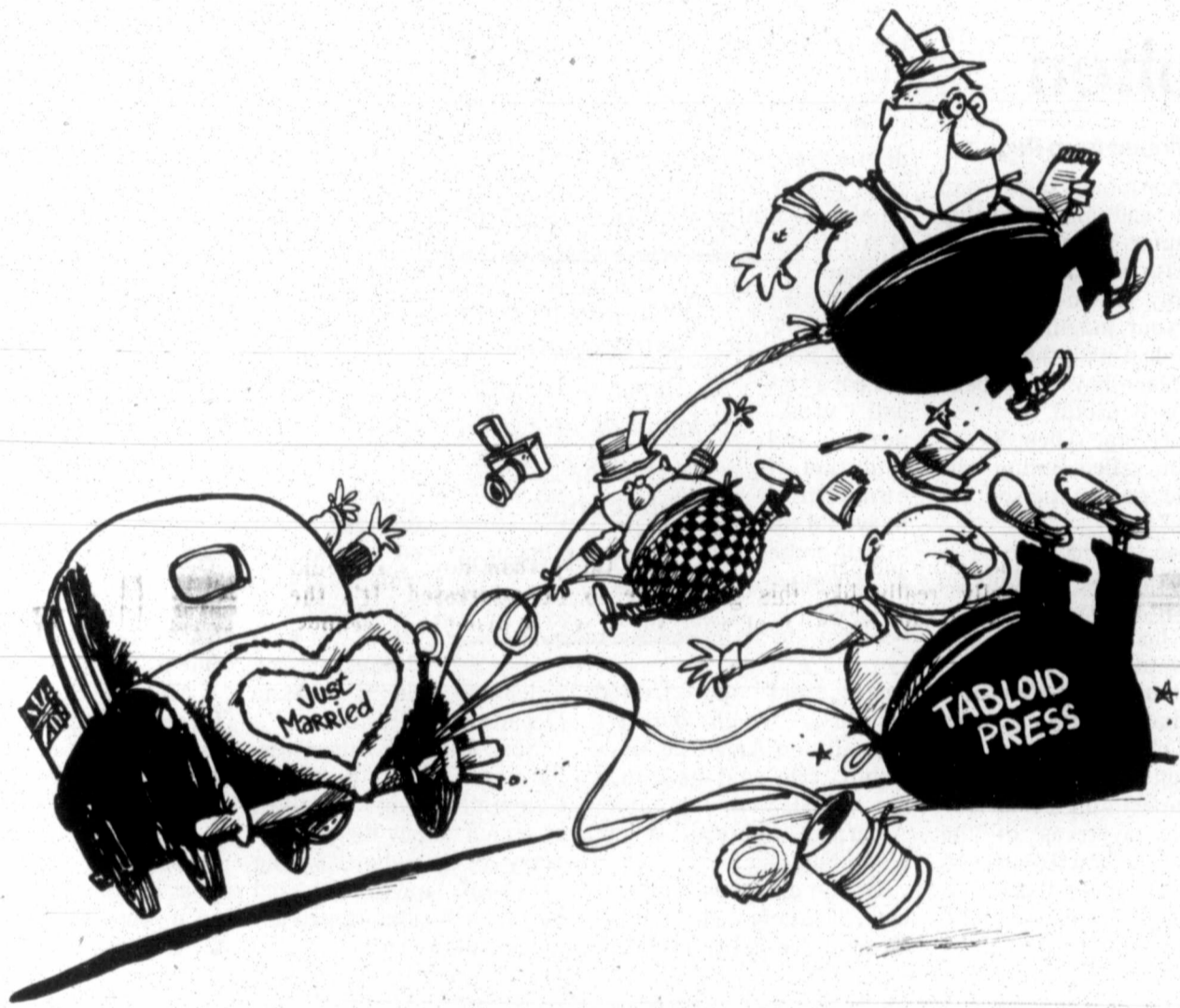

1976 wasn't right in God's time

"God works in mysterious ways, his wonders to perform," and we all saw an example of that in 1976, when my father Ronald Reagan failed to win the Republican nomination for president. I thought it was a disaster then, but I now know that God had other plans in mind. It wasn't the right time in His scheme of things.

I thought about this when I was aboard Air Force One flying back to California after my dad's funeral. I was sitting with Lady Margaret Thatcher and we were talking about the events in the '80s when she and my dad, the pope, Lech Walesa and Mikhail Gorbachev played such important historic roles. I told her that people often tell me that it was too bad that my father didn't win in 1976 and I said that I have really thought that over and I'm convinced that my dad was not supposed to win in 1976.

I believe that everything happens in God's time and His time and our time is not always on the same plane. We wanted my father to get the nomination and win in '76 but God had other plans. Now, looking back, those plans are clear as they were not at the time.

I asked Maggie Thatcher that if Dad had won in 1976,

who would have been in place then to bring about the momentous events in the '80s that saw the Evil Empire destroyed. Think about it, none of the key players in the drama were onstage. In 1976 Mrs. Thatcher was not Britain's prime minister, K a r o l W y t o l a was not the pope, M i k h a i l G o r b a c h e v was not in charge in Moscow and Lech Walesa was an obscure electrician in a Polish shipyard.

Anybody familiar with Ronald Reagan's plans for dealing with the Soviets and their domination of Eastern Europe knows that his determination to bring down the Soviet monolith depended on a number of factors, and having the right allies in the right places at the right times eventually proved to be the key to victory. Those factors were not present in 1976.

In 1980, however, things

were changing and it took the entire decade of the '80s to do the job. It was done because Dad was the president, Margaret Thatcher was Britain's prime minister, John Paul II was the Pope, Lech Walesa had risen to leadership of Solidarity and Gorbachev had taken over in the Kremlin. If a single one of those key players was not in place, the outcome would have been different and the Cold War would have continued.

Each had a key part to play. After my dad met privately with the pope in 1982, a plan was devised to cripple the Soviet hold on Eastern Europe and Poland was seen as the key. The two men agreed to use the fledgling labor movement known as Solidarity as the means to drive a wedge between the Polish Communist government, the Polish people and

the Kremlin.

The pope has already relit the fires of liberty burning in the hearts of the Polish people in June of 1979 when he swept through his native land enheartening his fellow Poles and giving them hope.

Joined by Mrs. Thatcher, Ronald Reagan and the pope secretly financed and supplied Solidarity, which along with covert CIA aid applied so much pressure on the government that, by the end of the '80s, Lech Walesa had become president of Poland, Eastern Europe was throwing off the Soviet chains and the Soviet Union itself was heading towards a complete collapse.

They all accomplished their missions and they are slowly leaving the scene. My dad is gone, now the pope has died and all the other players are living in their final years. They played the parts God had written for them.

She's a great little girl, but the problem is that Hayden still lives with the child's mother. I can't guarantee that you won't get hurt again, but if you avoid this kind of "challenge" in the future, the odds against being hurt will be more in your favor.

DEAR ABBY: Please tell me how to use "Miss," "Mrs." and "Ms." when addressing a female. I would especially like to know which one is used for a widow. — **CAROL IN ANDERSON, S.C.**

DEAR CAROL: "Miss" denotes a young woman who has never married. I use "Miss" when addressing someone under the age of 18. 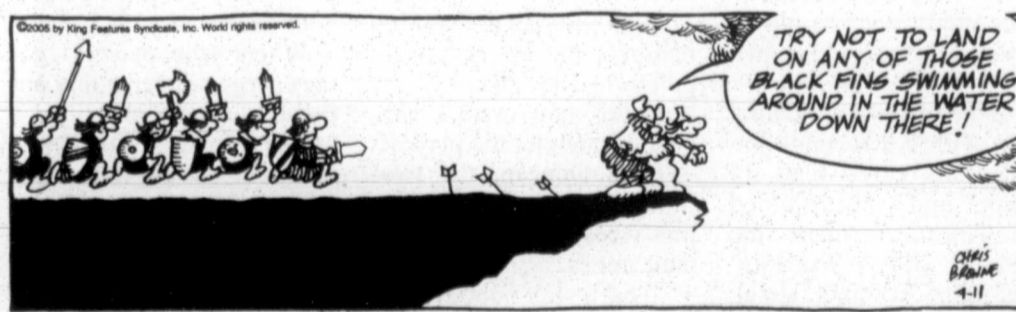

But one of the most amazing is that lead-off hitter Shea Brown has gotten on base 15 times out of 21 opportunities.

That's an on-base percentage of .714. And with the line-up Coach Doughty has behind Brown, it is no wonder Pampa is capable of manufacturing runs and wins.

"I feel it is very important for our lead-off hitter to get on base anyway he can," said Doughty. "And Shea has done a great job of it. It is one of the reasons we have been successful this season."

At 16-5 overall and 4-0 in district, Pampa moves to a one game lead over Dumas and Randall (3-1).

The Harvesters host Caprock (5-15-1, 2-2) tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 p.m.

"I expect a feisty Caprock club coming to Pampa tomorrow," Doughty said. "They are 2-2 and can give themselves an excellent chance to make the playoffs if they can knock us off."

Spurs outlast Warriors in shootout

(AP) — Tony Parker made sure the San Antonio Spurs didn't need to play a fifth overtime period in two nights.

Parker made a sprawling layup with 2.9 seconds left to cap his career-high 35 points, and short-handed San Antonio ended the Golden State Warriors' eight-game winning streak with its second straight double-overtime win, 136-134 on Sunday night.

"I was done," he said. "If we'd gone to a third overtime, it would have been tough. Big cramps."

San Antonio, which beat the Los Angeles Clippers 125-124 on Saturday night, became the first team to win double-overtime games on consecutive nights since the Vancouver Grizzlies on Feb. 16-17, 1999.

Playing without ailing starters Manu Ginobili, Rashaun Nesterovic and Tim Duncan, the Spurs hung on for their fourth victory in five games when Bruce Bowen and Robert Horry jarred the ball away from the Warriors' Mike Dunleavy shortly before time expired in the NBA's highest-scoring game this season.

San Antonio moved with-

in one game of Phoenix for the NBA's best record. Though injuries are making it tough, the Spurs haven't given up on catching the Suns for home-court advantage throughout the playoffs — and Duncan, the two-time MVP, should be back this week, further boosting their hopes.

"That's why nobody gave up tonight," Parker said. "We want to hang around and try to get that first place if we can."

In other games, it was: Detroit 80, Miami 72; Sacramento 124, the Los Angeles Lakers 105; New York 113; Indiana 112, OT; Portland 90, New Orleans 81; and Memphis 102, Charlotte 95.

Parker also had 12 assists while winning a sensational duel with Baron Davis, who had 38 points, nine assists and two last-second shots to force both overtimes. However, Parker — who totaled 99 minutes during the Spurs' two wins during the weekend — delivered the last blow to snap Golden State's longest winning streak in 10 years.

"Tony was just stupendous as a leader," San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich said. "Both teams

showed a lot of character. Both played aggressively at both ends.

Where (the players) got the energy to keep going out there, I have no idea."

The Warriors scored just two points in the final 3 1/2 minutes of the second overtime.

Jason Richardson had 23 points, but his last-second heave after corraling Dunleavy's fumbled pass fell well short.

"It hurts bad, because we did everything we were supposed to do, and they just kept fighting," Davis said. "We had some mental mistakes at the end of the game. Maybe it was fatigue, who knows? It cost us the game."

Golden State had an 11-point lead in the fourth quarter, but Parker led the Spurs' rally with six points in the final two minutes of regulation.

The clubs combined for 22 points in those frantic minutes — and after Parker hit a go-ahead jumper with 5.9 seconds left, Davis forced overtime with a layup around two defenders to tie it at 117 as time expired.

Arena football player dies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Arena Football League teammates of Al Lucas stood stunned as the 300-pound lineman they called "Big Luke" was carried motionless on a stretcher off the Staples Center floor.

Lucas, 26, a former player with the NFL's Carolina Panthers, died Sunday from a presumed spinal cord injury sustained while trying to make a tackle for the Los Angeles Avengers, the team said.

"There's nothing you can say about what happened," Avengers lineman Sean McNamara said. "It never entered our minds as a possibility."

Players prayed on the sidelines and about 11,000 people watched from the stands as Lucas was carried from the field. He was pronounced dead at California Hospital, team physician Dr. Luga Podesta said in a statement. An autopsy was planned for Monday or Tuesday.

The game continued, and players were told of his fate in the locker room after the game. Los Angeles beat New York 66-35.

"When you've got a player lying on the ground, the only thing that goes through your mind is that it could be any of us out there. Al was a great teammate," Avengers fullback Lonnie Ford told the Daily News

of Los Angeles.

"I just wish this was a bad dream," receiver Tony Locke told the Los Angeles Times.

Lucas was injured during a first-quarter kickoff return against the New York Dragons.

Television replays showed him bending down to make a tackle. As the Dragons' ball carrier and a blocker tumbled over his head and back, the blocker's leg appeared to hit Lucas in the head. Lucas did not move after falling to the ground.

Lucas was married to De'Shonda Lucas and had a daughter, Mariah.

He was well-known in Macon, Ga., where he was born and lived. His father is state Rep. David Lucas, and his mother Elaine is on the Macon City Council. His younger brother, Lenny, plays for the Macon Knights in Arena Football's minor league.

"He grew up in an athletically and politically based childhood," Steve Edwards, Lucas's former coach at Macon's Northeast High School, told the Macon Telegraph. "He was a super person and a super athlete."

The Kings moved 1 1/2 games ahead of idle Houston for the fifth seed in the Western Conference.

Knicks 113, Pacers 112, OT

At Indianapolis, Michael Sweetney scored a career-high 20 points, hit a rebound basket in the final second of overtime and the Knicks ended their longest losing streak in 20 years at nine games.

The Pacers, who had a season-best six-game winning streak end, were ahead 112-106 with a

minute left after a driving layup by Reggie Miller, who led Indiana with 34 points.

Lee Nailon led New Orleans with 20 points in 28 minutes.

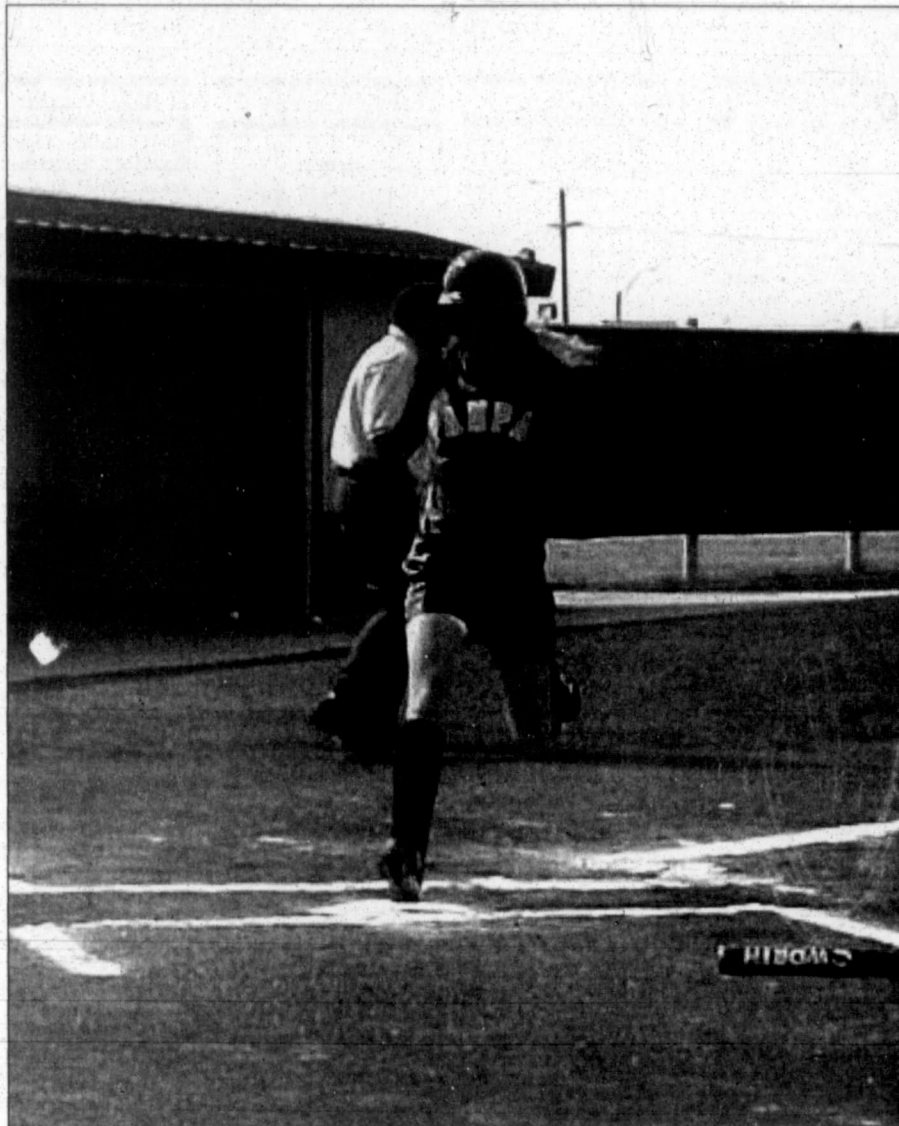
Grizzlies 102, Bobcats 95
