

Veterans of four wars - World War II, Korea, Vietnam and Iraq their families and friends, crowded Pampa's Memorial Park at sunset Monday for the Pampa VFW Post 1657's candlelight service honoring those who gave their lives in service of their country.

A traditional memorial to the fallen soldier, consisting of a rifle stuck into the ground with the soldier's helmet on top and boots beside it, was placed in front of the memorial marker. U.S. Air Force veteran Andy Epps set up the memorial.

A wreath of poppies was laid on the memorial, surrounded by lighted candles.

Post Commander Danny Martin explained that the memorial began as a marker of fallen troops during World War H.

Pampa's Boy Scout Troop 413 began the ceremony by posting the colors and raising the flag to half-staff in memory of those who died.

Don Emmons, Post chaplain, led the group in prayer, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Rod Porter,

Brack, a Pampan who was wounded recently while serving in Iraq. In the e-mail, Brack told of his pride to be able to serve his country and his appreciation for his friends and neighbors who have supported him and his family in his trials.

"There are 131 names of those killed (in military service) from this area on this monument behind me," Chaney, a Vietnam veteran, told the group. "When you go home tonight, let's pray there won't be any more added to them."

Paul Nachtigall, pastor of Highland Baptist Church, referred to the book of Joshua in the Bible when God told Joshua there would be war and fighting as he was about to enter the Promised Land with the Jews.

God told Joshua to "be strong

America's soldiers do what they do, Nachtigall said, because they believed in what they were doing. They had a goal to achieve, he said, and they were willing to put their lives on the line in order to achieve that goal.

Because of these soldiers and their sacrifices, "the great land we live in today still carries God's promise," he said.

"For the veterans, the battles they fought are forever etched in their memory," he said, "yet there are battles they must fight at home."

Nachtigall admonished everyone present "to be strong. and very courageous. If you trust in God, you don't have to tremble or be afraid. One day, we all will be able to stand hand in hand, heart to heart, and say, God did bless America."

As Joe Martinez sang Lee Greenwood's, "Proud to be an American," the group raised their lighted candles to the night sky and joined him in singing, "God bless the U.S.A."

Larry Ray, a local U.S. Marine veteran dressed in uniform, played "Taps" followed by the group calling out names of many who died.






He said he wishes to thank the Pampa High School Rodeo Club and the folks of Pampa who have been so supportive of him. He also extends a

French voters throw wrench in EU works

France is at it again.

That country seems to have a talent for getting a check mark on an imaginary report card beside the comment, "does not work or play well with others."

In a Sunday referendum, over 54 percent of French voters gave a thumbs-down to the proposed European Union (EU)constitution.

The proposed constitution, which is actually a treaty, must be ratified by all of the 25 member states of the EU in order to take effect.

This has thrown other member nations into a veritable tizzy. To read some of the comments by member nations' leaders, you'd think

the sky was falling.

What did they expect? That the latest incarnation of globalization would go off without a hitch?

Not likely. Not everyone thinks exactly alike and has exactly the same opinions. We could have told Europe that after France's behavior regarding Iraq. The proposed EU treaty

that France rejected was created in order to "ensure smooth decision-making in site. the enlarged bloc" of member nations, according to an EU web site.

In other words, it was created in order to more firmly entrench the organization as a single entity. It even refers to the member nations as

"states," not "countries" or "nations."

The European Union traces its roots to World War II, when it was conceived of as a means "to prevent such

The union has its own Parliament, court of justice, central bank and investment bank, among other things. It has its own currency, the

euro, which by the way suffered a decrease in value after France's Sunday referendum

The EU even has its own flag and anthem, which is Beethoven's

> "Ode to Joy." The first countries in the Union were Belgium, France, Germany,

Luxembourg. In 1973, Denmark, Ireland

and the United Kingdom joined. In 1981, Greece was added, followed by Spain and Portugal in 1986.

In 1995, Austria, Finland and Sweden entered the union.

The biggest single jump in membership occurred in 2004, when 10 more countries signed on.

One has to wonder why we need yet another multinational coalition. We already have the United Nations (UN), which dates to 1945 and currently has 195 members and a budget of over \$2,000 million.

After all, the UN seems to have a lot of the same goals. The UN's purpose, according to its official web site, is to "maintain international peace and security; to develop friendly relations among nations; to cooperate

in solving international economic, social, cultural and humanitarian problems and in promoting respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms; and to be a center for harmonizing the action of nations in attaining these ends."

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The EU may already be overreaching its original design and even name. Right now, Bulgaria, Croatia, Romania and Turkey are petitioning to join the club.

Turkey? Is that a European nation?

France is not alone in its less-than-blind allegiance to the EU. One Italian party leader called it "the Soviet Union of Europe."

I sure hope he's wrong.



TPWD project helps provide family fishing opportunities *Finding Nemo*

see great action this summer. As part of a pilot Texas Urban Fishing Program, selected lakes will receive multiple stocking of catfish.

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Texas Parks and Wildlife Department began stocking eight Community Fishing Lakes with 12-inch channel catfish in late April, and will continue to do so through October 13. Stocking will be stopped during August due to the potential for heat-related water quality problems.

The stocking project is in its third year. It's primary objective is to create a stocking program which stocked again June 9.

Some city anglers should will provide family fishing opportunities all season long. Anglers are reminded that - Community Fishing Lakes have special regulations for channel and blue catfish: The bag limit is five per day, and there is no minimum length regulation for catfish on these small lakes. A valid Texas fishing license is required for anyone that doesn't meet state exemption guidelines. Only fishing by pole is permitted.

Bell new Royals skipper


(AP) — The Kansas City Royals hired Buddy Bell as their manager Tuesday, three weeks after Tony Pena resigned.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Phoenix Suns played their ideal game.

Their uptempo offense was in gear from the opening tip. They got good inside production. They made half of their 3point attempts.

But even with all that, the Suns had only a one-point lead over San Antonio in the final minute of Game 4 of the Western Conference finals

Monday night. Not known for their defense, the Suns then came up with the defensive play of the night from Amare Stoudemire and held on for a 111-106 victory. "For our own pride, we weren't going to concede any-

thing," Quentin Richardson said.

With the victory, the Suns avoided a sweep and sent the best-of-seven series back to Phoenix for Game 5 on Wednesday night. The Spurs would have iced helped them a bunch."

the series if Tim Duncan had shot his free throws the way he did in the first three games. Duncan, 15-of-15 in Game 3 and 33-of-36 in the first three games, was 3-of-12 in Game 4.

A little luck on the rim could have changed a few of Duncan's errant free throws into points, but several in the fourth quarter were beyond help.

Miami coach Stan Van Gundy gave Detroit credit for what it has done to give the Heat problems during the series, knowing the Pistons were not doing the same.

"If they don't have the respect for us to think we're having anything to do with winning games, that's fine," Van Gundy said. Just as it did during the regular season, Dwyane Wade's play has

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





