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Study: PJHS building 'obsolete'

Independent consultant finds major problems with school district's facilities

"It's all pretty overwhelming," said school board member Derrell DeLoach following a sobering, two-hour report on the condition of Pampa Independent School District's facilities.

Paul Trautman of the Texas Association of School

Administrators presented his findings at a special meeting of the Board of Education at Carver Center Thursday night.

Trautman's most significant findings included the following:

Pampa Junior High School is "economically and educationally obsolete" and should be abandoned immediately;

Pampa High School has

"significant needs;"

All administrative and central support services should be combined and moved to a larger facility in a more easily accessible location;

Most classrooms throughout the district are too small to serve the educational needs of the students;

Three schools, the junior high, Lamar and Austin ele-

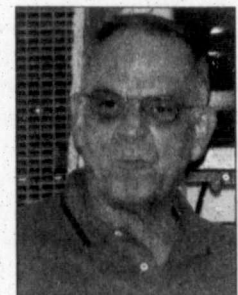
mentaries, are overcrowded;

A long-term building is needed for alternative education programs; and

Despite recent renovations to the elementary schools, the buildings will need to be replaced or redeveloped in five to 15 years.

Trautman also recommend-

Former DA files notice of appeal

Former 31st District Attorney Rick Roach has filed a notice of appeal with the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals regarding his five-year sentence handed down June 6 in Amarillo U.S. District court on a federal firearms charge, according to a source in the U.S. Attorney's office in Amarillo.

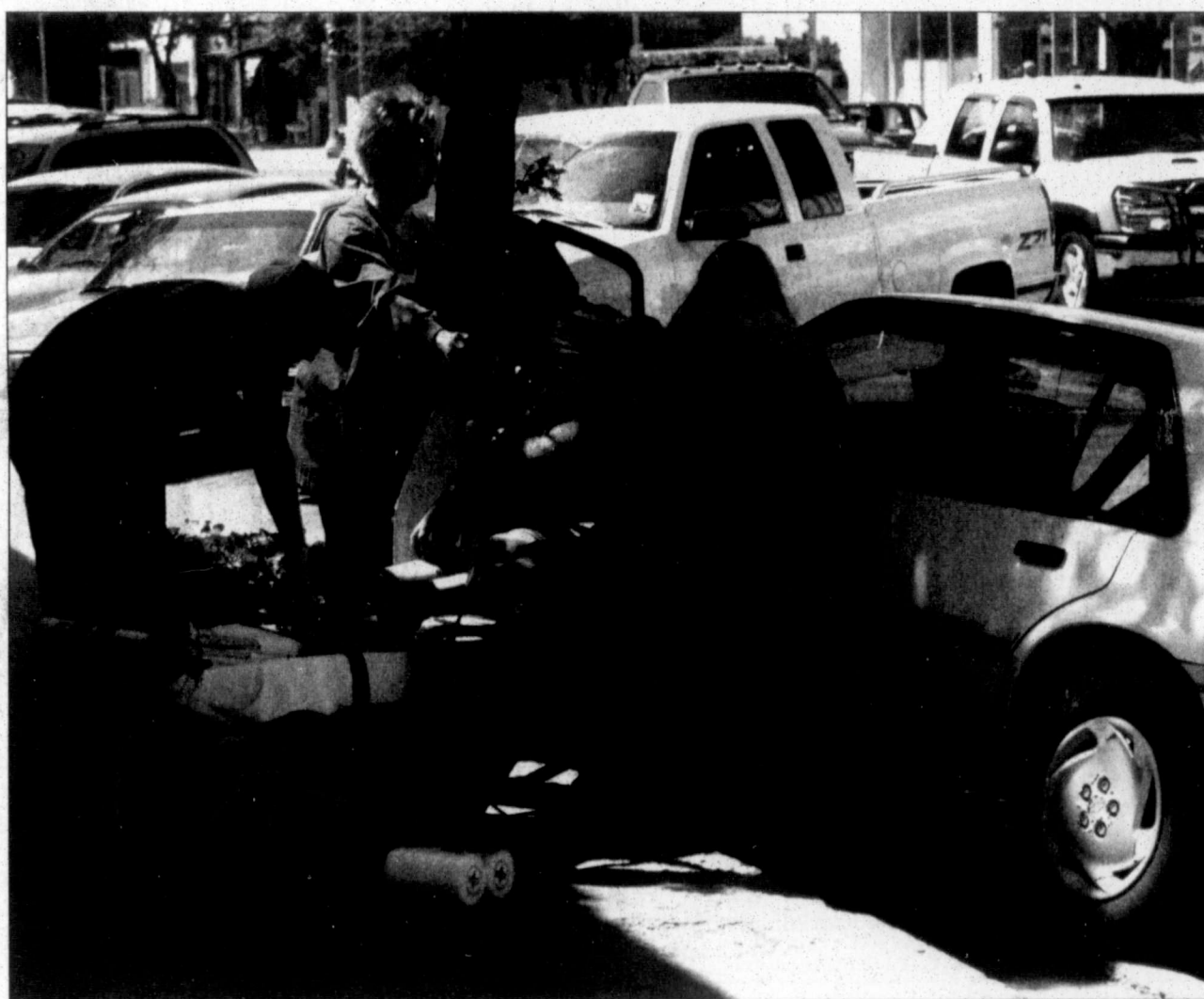
Roach is representing himself for the appeals process, the source, who asked not to be named, said. Canyon attorney Bill Kelly had represented Roach through June 6 concerning federal charges involving illegal substances and firearms.

The notice of appeal was filed in the U.S. District Clerk's office in Amarillo on June 7. Appeals notices are forwarded to the appellate court, which acknowledges their receipt, issues a case number for them, and sets a deadline, usually about 40 days from that time, for briefs to be filed, the source said.

A Woody Guthrie fan from Massachusetts decided to learn more about the legendary folk singer by visiting his hometown in Oklahoma and Pampa.

"I've been a fan of Woody Guthrie since my college days at Amherst 20 years ago, said Hall Kirkham, an investment consultant from Cambridge, Mass.

He's been the guest of Thelma Bray, local Guthrie historian, and Reed Echols who is establishing a "Woody Guthrie Artist's Retreat" near the Woody Guthrie Folk Music

Center, 320 S. Cuyler.

A folk musician himself who plays guitar and harmonica, Kirkham said he had read alot about Guthrie, but wanted to learn more about him by seeing the folk singer's birthplace at Okeema, Okla., and the place where he grew up - Pampa.

When he mentioned his trip plans, he discovered that there's a circle of folk music fans in the Boston area who, "when you mention Okeema and Pampa, they know all about it."

He said folk music is quite popular in the

These Bible verses describe Geneva perfectly and reflected her philosophy for life. School snafu

Suit threatened over pregnancy test

AUSTIN (AP) — A 15-year-old San Marcos girl and her father have filed a federal lawsuit against her school nurse, who allegedly forced the girl to take a pregnancy test.

The lawsuit claims that nurse Dyanna Eastwood called the girl to her office and told her that a student at another school claimed he impregnated her. Eastwood insisted the girl take the test, according to the lawsuit.

The girl said she did not have sex with the boy and denied that she was pregnant. The girl's lawyer also said she was not pregnant. The suit, which was filed Wednesday in U.S.

District Court in Austin, claims the girl's privacy and constitutional rights were violated during the January event.

The lawsuit, which seeks unspecified damages, claims Eastwood violated the girl's Fourth Amendment right against unreasonable search and seizure.

"I remember the incident," Eastwood said. "Is that how it went down? No, of course not."

She declined to comment further, saying she wanted to seek legal advice.

The lawsuit also names the San Marcos Consolidated Independent

School District as a defendant. The district's general counsel, Juan Cruz, declined to comment, saying officials have not been served with the lawsuit.

"This whole thing is intrinsically wrong," said John Hindera, the family's Austin lawyer. "She's a 15-year-old girl that's suddenly being confronted with having sex and being pregnant."

Hindera said that Eastwood did not threaten any consequences if the girl declined to take the test, but that the girl felt she had no choice because the nurse is an authority figure.

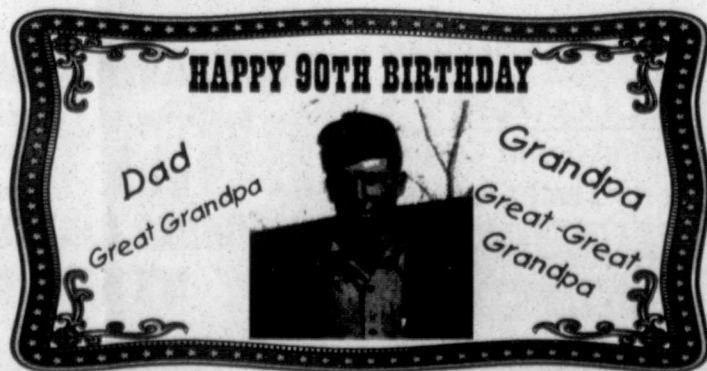

east. Kirkham said he found many pleasant surprises during his visit. "I was struck by the beauty of the area," he said. He also discovered unique cuisine, like chicken fried steak and a Texas-style breakfast.

"These don't seem to be towns that have changed much."

For the past 10 years, Hall's been an investment consultant but recently responded to a call to the ministry. He plans to enter seminary in the fall to become an ordained minister in the Episcopal Church.

The Woody Guthrie Folk Center was formerly Harris Drug Store where Guthrie worked in the early 1930s. He is said to have found his first guitar in a back room of the drug store.

Guthrie's musical career began in the southeast corner of that building, where he played guitar in between serving customers, according to Bray in her book, "Reflections - the Life and Times of Woody Guthrie."

Pampa's Tribute to Woody Guthrie, a non-profit organization of area residents dedicated to preserving local history of Guthrie, purchased the building in 2000.

Life without parole now law

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry signed into law Friday a new life-without-parole sentencing option for Texas juries in capital murder cases.

Texas juries have been able to sentence capital murder convicts to death or life in prison with the possibility of parole after 40 years. The new law, which takes effect Sept. 1, will strip the possibility of parole.

Texas leads the nation in executions with nine this year and 345 since the state resumed the practice in 1982. Of the 38 states that execute capital offenders, Texas and New Mexico are the only ones that lacked the life-without-parole option.

"I believe this bill will improve our criminal justice system because it gives jurors a new option to protect the public with the certainty a convicted killer will never roam our streets again," said Perry, a Republican.

The Legislature approved the change in the session that ended May 30.

A Scripps-Howard poll in October found that 75 percent of Texans support the death penalty and 78 percent favored giving juries the option of life without parole.

Opponents of the change argued the current parole option gives convicts a reason to behave in prison if good behavior will help them get out. Supporters preferred to call it "truth in sentencing" since convicts sentenced to life are guaranteed never to be freed.

While some prosecutors were opposed to the legislation when it included keeping the possibility of life without parole, many decided to support the bill once the parole option was removed.

Bill sponsors who had failed to pass the measure in previous years felt their case was bolstered by the Supreme Court ruling in March that banned the execution of murderers who kill when they are younger than 18. In 2002, the courts also struck down executions of mentally retarded inmates.

Hutchison will wait to announce intent until after special session

IRVING (AP) — U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison said Friday she is "in the final stages of making a decision" about whether to run for the Republican nomination for Texas governor in 2006.

Hutchison, speaking to the Texas Press Association, hinted that she would not announce her intentions until after the conclusion of a special legislative session on school funding, which she believed would start next week.

"I want them to succeed," she said. "I'm going to try and hold my firepower."

Hutchison has criticized Republican Gov. Rick Perry's lack of leadership in reforming the way Texas pays for public

schools. Lawmakers did not reach a consensus in this year's legislative session, or in a special session last year.

Perry's office wouldn't confirm whether the governor planned to call a special session for next week.

"The governor remains committed to bringing these members back to finish their job and in terms of when that will be, just stay tuned," Perry spokesman Robert Black said.

Lawmakers are under a court order to replace Texas' \$30 billion share-the-wealth school funding system, nicknamed "Robin Hood." The system has been under fire from rich and poor districts that claim it does not adequately fund public education.

A state judge last fall ruled the system unconstitutional and gave the state until October 2005 to fix it. Lawyers for the state appealed to the Texas Supreme Court, which will hear the case in July.

Perry said he wants to lower Texas' high property taxes, which largely pay for public education, but lawmakers could not agree on what kind of business tax to impose and how high to raise the sales tax to compensate for the loss in property tax revenue.

Hutchison said Texas should be leading the nation in educating its students and in finding innovative ways to fund public education, but it's currently not doing that.

ed that the district provide "adequate housing for all special needs students, especially those in self-contained environments."

School board members asked that a facilities study be done by an outside, independent consultant during a goal-planning session last July.

"The board saw that the district was spending about

\$400,000 per year to maintain the facilities," Superintendent Barry Haenisch explained. "They wanted a study done and they wanted one by an impartial evaluator."

Trautman, a Dallas-area resident, former educator and administrator, was selected for the task. With 12 years' experience as a facilities consultant, he has worked with school districts throughout the United States, he said.

One of the major problems with Pampa schools is

age, he said. Most buildings are from 46 to 64 years old. Lack of maintenance is another factor, he said.

He acknowledged that most maintenance decisions were based on limited funds and the district's desire to put educational needs first.

Haenisch said that a discussion of the facilities studies will be included on the agenda for the regular school board meeting scheduled for Thursday, June 23, to give board members time to think about what they heard at the meeting last night.

"The needs are more than anyone anticipated," Haenisch said after the meeting. "And there are emotional issues involved as well."

He said school officials plan to share the details of the study with community members and come up with a plan to address the problem.

"All I know right now is, we're talking about rebuilding something and remodeling something," he said.

The facility study cost the district about \$10,000, Haenisch said.

A Fort Worth attorney will be assigned to represent the U.S. Court in the appeal at the time the 5th Circuit Court accepts the notice and court records.

The U.S. Court which handled the case has 30 days from the time Roach's brief is filed to file their reply, the source said.

"We won't know what his issues are" until he files the brief, the source said when asked on what Roach is basing his appeal.

Vicky Roberts of the U.S. Marshal's office in Amarillo said this morning that Roach was still in Randall County Jail awaiting transport to a

federal prison to begin serving his sentence. She did not know where Roach would be incarcerated, and said that for security reasons, she could not reveal when he would be transported.

Roach was indicted Jan. 12 in Amarillo on charges of addict or unlawful user in possession of firearms, possession with intent to distribute or dispense methamphetamine, possession with intent to distribute or dispense cocaine, and unlawful possession of a controlled substance.

He pled guilty to the firearms charge Feb. 8, the same day he resigned as 31st District attorney, in a plea bargain arrangement.

Roach remained in Randall County Jail today awaiting transport to a federal prison to begin serving his sentence. Officials will not release the prison's location for security reasons.

Two state indictments on drug charges against Roach

were handed up May 17 by a Gray County grand jury, after David Scott, a Perryton attorney, was named special prosecutor in an investigation to explore possible state charges against Roach.

The indictments concern four or more grams but less than 200 grams of methamphetamine and cocaine. In each indictment, a handgun was allegedly present at the time of the incident, which occurred within 1,000 feet of Community Christian School, 220 N. Ballard, a drug-free zone.

The Pampa CPA firm of Brown, Graham & Co. has been retained to audit financial records from Roach's office, and the state investigation is continuing concerning possible additional charges against Roach.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 17, 1775, the Revolutionary War Battle of Bunker Hill took place near Boston. The battle, which actually occurred on Breed's Hill, was a costly victory for the British, who suffered heavy losses while dislodging the rebels.

On this date:

In 1856, in Philadelphia, the Republican Party opened its first convention.

In 1885, the Statue of Liberty arrived in New York City aboard the French ship Iser.

In 1928, Amelia Earhart embarked on a trans-Atlantic flight from Newfoundland to Wales — the first by a woman.

In 1940, France asked Germany for terms of surrender in World War II.

In 1944, the republic of Iceland was established.

In 1948, a United Air Lines DC-6 crashed near Mount Carmel, Pa., killing all 43 people on board.

In 1963, the Supreme Court struck down rules requiring the recitation of the Lord's Prayer or reading of Biblical verses in public schools.

In 1969, the raunchy musical review "Oh! Calcutta!" opened in New York.

In 1972, President Nixon's eventual downfall began with the arrest of five burglars inside Democratic national headquarters in Washington, D.C.'s Watergate complex.

In 1992, President Bush and Russian President Boris Yeltsin signed a breakthrough arms-reduction agreement.

Ten years ago: Russian commandos stormed a hospital where Chechen rebels were holding more than 1,000 hostages, but the Chechens beat the Russians back.

Five years ago: In Cuba, more than 300,000 people turned out to protest the continued stay of Elian Gonzalez in the United States; it was the largest such demonstration since the previous December, when Cuba launched a national campaign of mass gatherings demanding the boy's return.

One year ago: A bipartisan report found that officials, blindsided by terrorists and beset by poor communications, were so slow to react on Sept. 11, 2001, that the last of four hijacked planes had crashed by the time Vice President Dick Cheney ordered hostile aircraft shot down.

President Bush disputed the Sept. 11 commission's finding that Saddam Hussein had no strong ties to al-Qaida, saying the former Iraqi leader had had "numerous contacts" with the terrorist network.

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Children's Internet safety a concern

Internet safety is always a concern, especially when it comes to children surfing and using the Net.

Concern for that safety was reinforced by Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer in a conversation with Associated Press reporters and editors Thursday in Washington. Ballmer and other executives, members of the Business Software Alliance, had been meeting with members of President Bush's Cabinet and congressional leaders.

Ballmer said something that strikes right at the root of responsibility when it comes to computer safety:

"We need to oversee and use technology and teach our children what's appropriate. Some of it's still going to have to come from parents kind of teaching their kids what's right. That was true even before the Internet."

That puts responsibility right where it should be - with the parents. Just as parents should monitor what their children watch on television, they should know what their kids are doing on the computers that are so

ubiquitous these days.

The possibilities of children getting in over their heads when it comes to the Internet are many, ranging from Internet porn sites to chat rooms to computer dating.

Computers are wonderful tools that just keep growing in popularity and uses. The Internet can be invaluable, playing a huge part in education and entertainment for young people.

But kids can't - shouldn't - be turned loose on comput-

ers with no supervision.

Ballmer also had some general words of caution that ought to be heeded. He voiced worries that consumers who use the Internet to buy stuff have become too complacent and run the risk of identity theft and financial fraud.

He's right again. Know what you're doing when you make purchases on the Internet. Be careful when divulging information. Be careful of scams.

The Internet is a great resource - when well-supervised and used with care and common sense.

Fourth person detained in teen's disappearance

ORANJESTAD, Aruba (AP) — A fourth person has been detained in Aruba in the disappearance of Alabama teen Natalee Holloway, authorities announced Friday.

The person "suspected of being involved" in Holloway's disappearance was identified by the attorney general's office only as a 26-year-old with the initials S.G.C. The office did not disclose the gender or say when the person was detained.

Also in custody are 17-year-old Joran van der Sloot, the son of a justice official on Aruba, and his two friends, Surinamese brothers Deepak Kalpoe, 21, and Satish

Kalpoe, 18. Holloway disappeared in the early morning hours of May 30 on Aruba, a Dutch protectorate in the Caribbean.

Also Friday, prosecutors filed a motion asking a judge to rule there is sufficient cause to continue holding van der Sloot and the Kalpoe brothers. The three were detained June 9. Under the law, a judge must review their case after 10 days and decide their status.

A judge was expected to rule as well Friday on another petition, from van der Sloot's father, Paul van der Sloot, to be able to visit his son in jail. None of the four

detainees has been formally charged with a crime.

Holloway disappeared the same day she was to return from a five-day trip with 124 other students celebrating their high graduation in Mountain Brook, Ala.

Searches by authorities, volunteer islanders and tourists have come up empty. Authorities were refusing to say if they thought Holloway was dead.

On Thursday, Police Superintendent Jan van der Straaten told The Associated Press that authorities used a helicopter "to search for possible remains — but found nothing."

Gay and lesbian rights group protests amendment with wedding cake

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Lesbian Gay Rights Lobby of Texas has chosen its symbol of protest against a proposed state constitutional amendment: the wedding cake.

The group opposes a November ballot proposal that would define marriage as a union solely of a man

and a woman.

"The historical precedent, really, is what makes this such a critical issue," Heath Riddles, the lobby group's development director, said of the proposed amendment. "This is the first time every Texan will have the opportunity to go to the ballot box and vote up or down —

thumbs up or thumbs down — on the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community."

About 30 people gathered at a San Antonio art gallery Thursday to launch the lobby group dubbed, the Wedding Cake Liberation Front.

Mike Reagan, the eldest son of the late President Ronald Reagan, is heard on more than 200 talk radio stations nationally as part of the Radio America Network.

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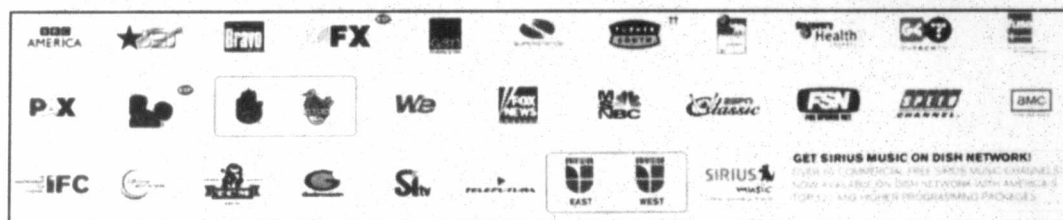


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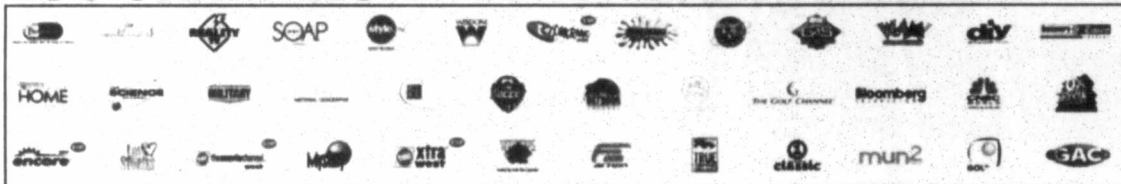
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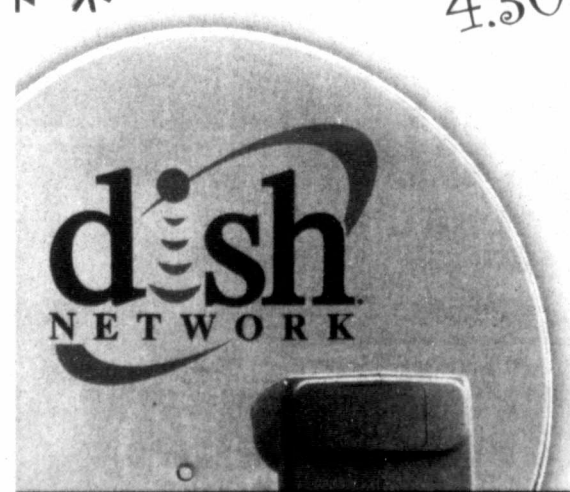
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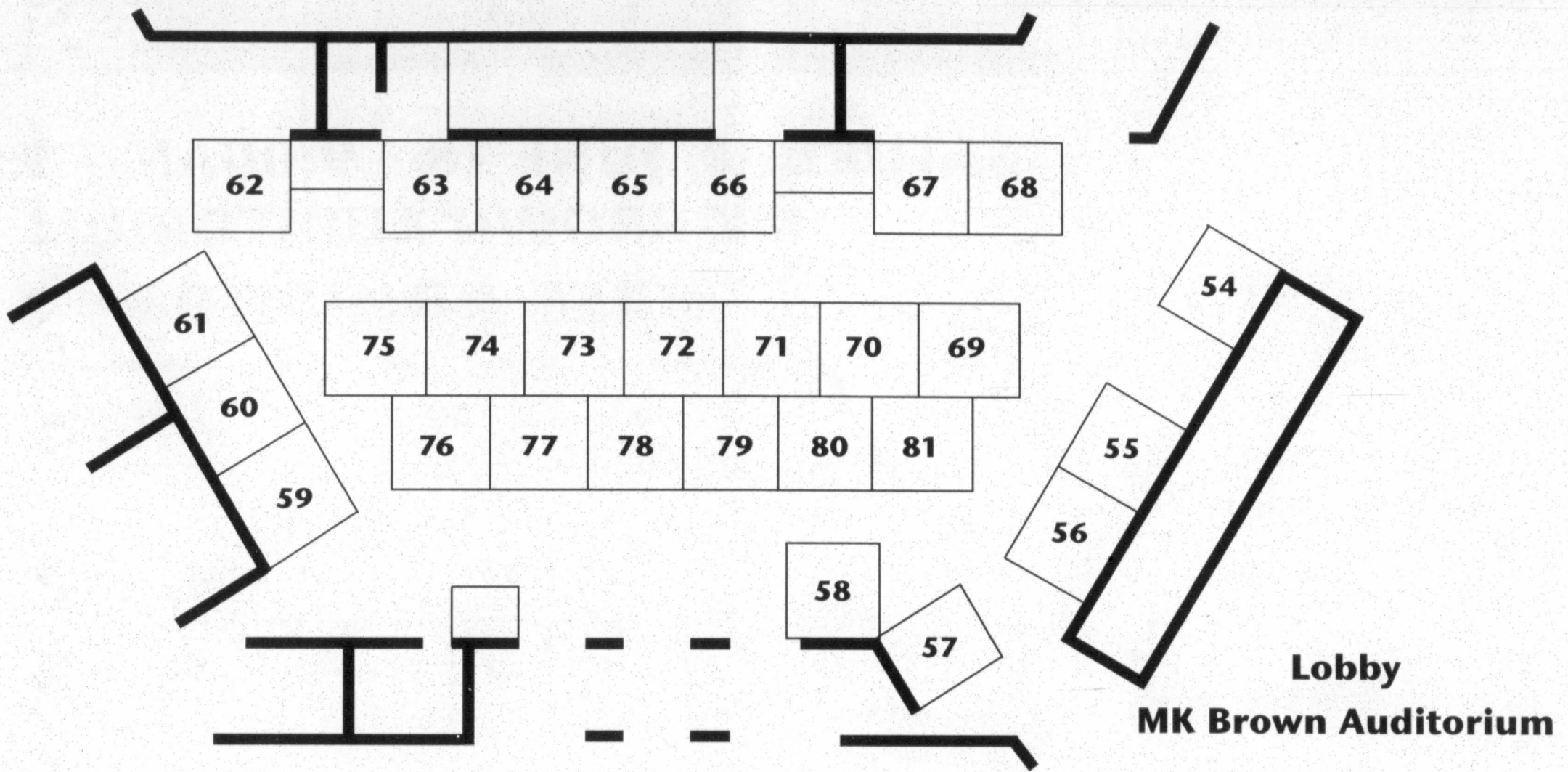
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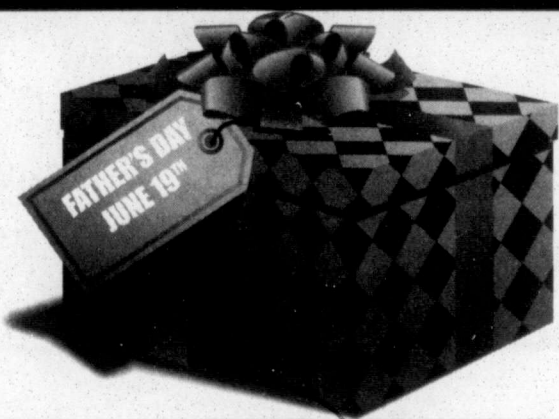
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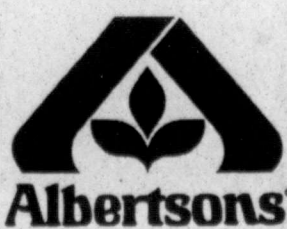
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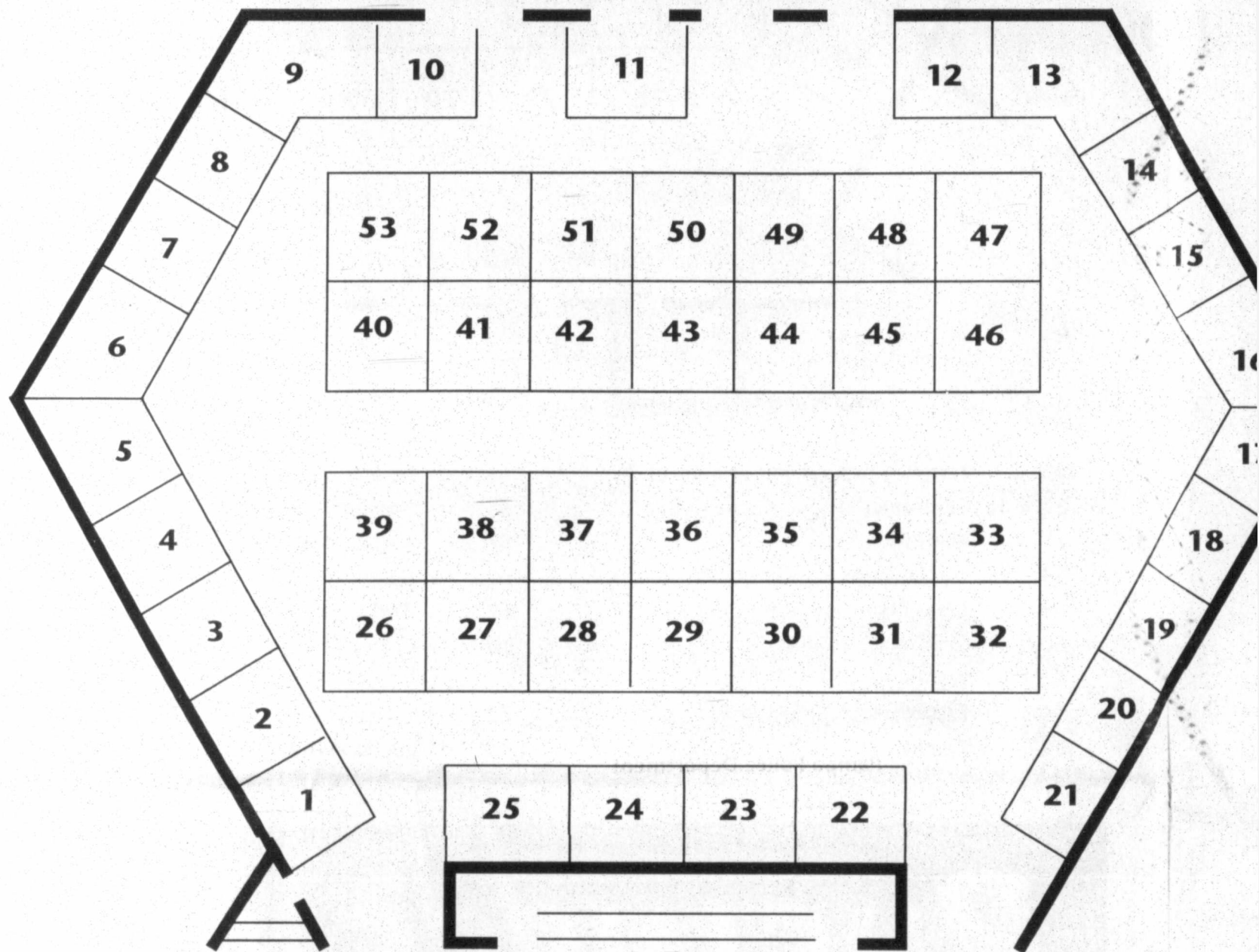
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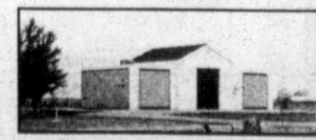


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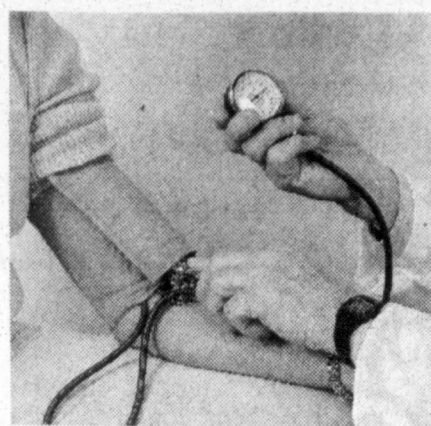


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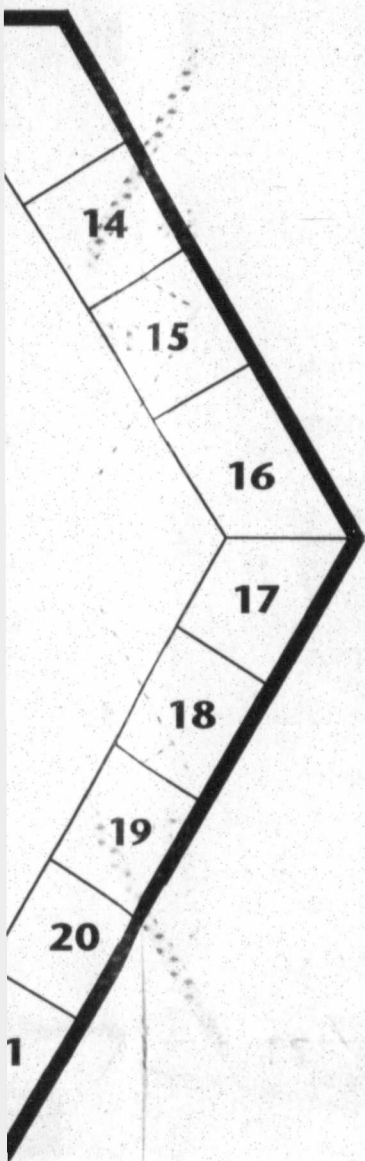

Silver rings a reminder of teens' pledge to purity

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — When Katie Chromik put a silver ring on her finger and promised at church to save sex for marriage, her junior high school friends giggled.

"Some people have made bets on me that I'm not going to make it," she said. "It just makes me more determined."

Even if pledging purity draws snickers, it's still gaining acceptance among some teens, especially those who attend Christian schools and churches. They say they're standing up to a barrage of sex-related messages.

"It comes at you in every direction," said Kayla Ballmer, an eighth-grader at Toledo Christian School. "Movies, TV, radio, magazines. Even on clothing."

The movement is driven by Christian educators and religious groups promoting abstinence education.

The Silver Ring Thing, backed by \$1.2 million in federal grants since 2003, is one such program. It has expanded its reach in the United States and internationally, growing the most in South Africa, where HIV/AIDS is spreading.

A year ago, founder Denny Pattyn took his message to England and Scotland, and he plans a DVD-based program to reach even more

young people.

The organization, based in suburban Pittsburgh, puts on shows at churches nationwide that include "Saturday Night Live" style skits, music videos and a message of abstinence. Young people are given a silver ring and decide whether they want to pledge to abstain from sex.

Three out of four choose to wear the ring, Pattyn said.

Critics say the message is too focused on abstinence alone, which is hard to maintain and, if broken, can lead to unprotected sex and a higher risk of disease.

Deb Hauser of Advocates for Youth, which promotes education about birth control, also said that the abstinence-only groups teach young people that condoms fail more often than they really do.

"The question is are they doing more damage than good?" Hauser said.

But Pattyn contends that the safe-sex message taught in schools has failed. Young people, ages 15 to 24, account for about half the new cases of sexually transmitted

diseases in the U.S. annually.

Funding for the Silver Ring Thing program has also drawn criticism.

The American Civil Liberties Union filed a lawsuit May 16 that accused the federal government of improperly using taxpayer money to fund Christian religious activities in the program.

The Bush administration has increased funding for abstinence education, emphasizing abstinence over condoms to stop the transmission of HIV and other diseases.

The silver ring movement began in 1994 through the Southern Baptist Convention's publishing house, Lifeway Christian Resources, in Nashville, Tenn.

It's True Love Waits program has reached an estimated 3 million teens, said spokeswoman Kristi Cherry, and ring sales have grown by 10 percent to 15 percent over each of the last three years.

There's no standard silver ring. Some are engraved with Scripture or phrases such as "True Love Waits" or "Faith." Some are enhanced with a diamond or a cross.

They can be worn on any finger or even a thumb. Teens also can declare their intention via wrist bands, bracelets, pins, watches and T-shirts.

Gina Layman, owner of Reger's Religious Bookstore in Toledo, had stopped selling the rings a few years ago because nobody wanted them, but has brought them back.

"Now it's a cool thing," she said. "It's mostly the parents buying for their kids."

Chromik, an eighth-grader in Toledo, said the ring helps her remember her promise to God and her parents.

"Every time I'm with my boyfriend, I look at that ring and it just reminds me I'm going to be pure," she said.

Mothers and fathers slid the rings onto the fingers of 13 teens during a ceremony at Mayfair Plymouth Congregational Christian Church after a weekend retreat in January where they talked about sexual purity.

"I hear so many stories from the kids. They all seem to know some-

one who's gotten pregnant. It disheartens them," said youth minister Craig Marsee.

But even those who make the pledge may not want others to know.

Boys who agree to abstinence are less likely to wear the rings, said Ron Rightnowar, spiritual life director at Toledo Christian. Some girls, worried they'll be questioned or teased, also won't wear the ring, said Ballmer, who took part in the Mayfair Plymouth ceremony with her father.

"That kind of defeats the purpose," she said.

Still, ring sales are strong.

Jerry Rady, a jeweler in Escondido, Calif., made the first ring carved with "True Love Waits" in 1994, and now sells about 3,500 purity rings a year, accounting for nearly all his sales.

Rady's sterling silver rings sell for \$35 while the solid gold versions are priced at \$245. Sales are strongest in the Bible Belt states of Texas and Florida, he said.

"It's part of the whole Christian movement," Rady said. "It's more vocal than it used to be. They don't feel like they have to hide it. It wouldn't have worked when I was a teenager, I can tell you that."

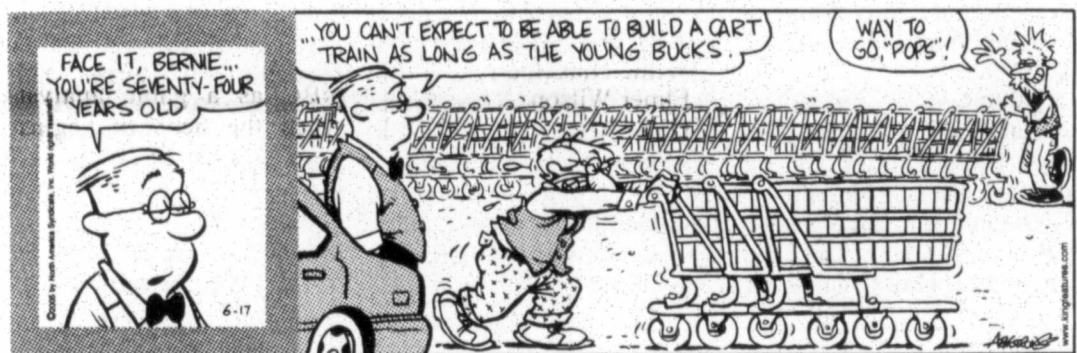

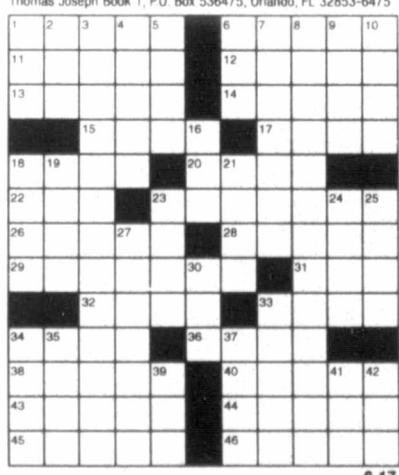

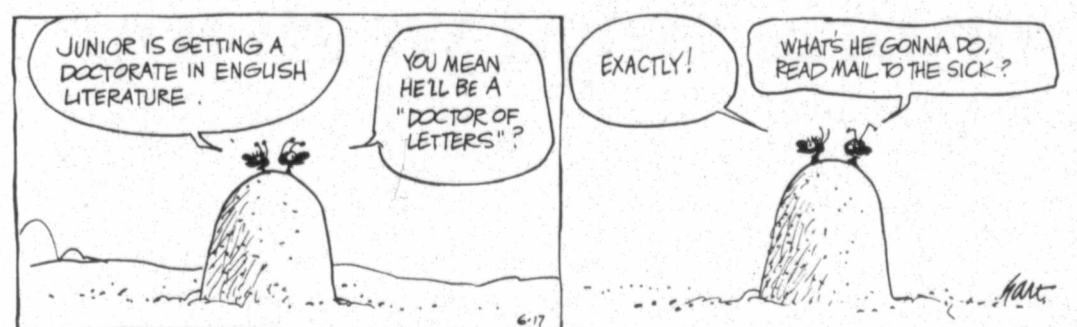

It was easy to see both men were well adapted to understanding and working with these kids, no matter the child's skill level or experience.

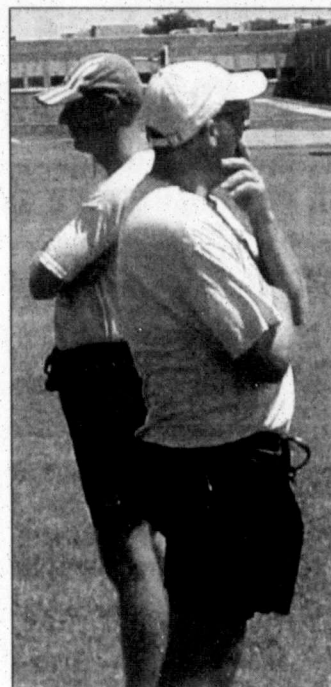
A visit with the two instructors holding the camp made it clear they weren't from around here. Not just Pampa. Not Just Texas. Heck, they aren't from the U.S. at all.

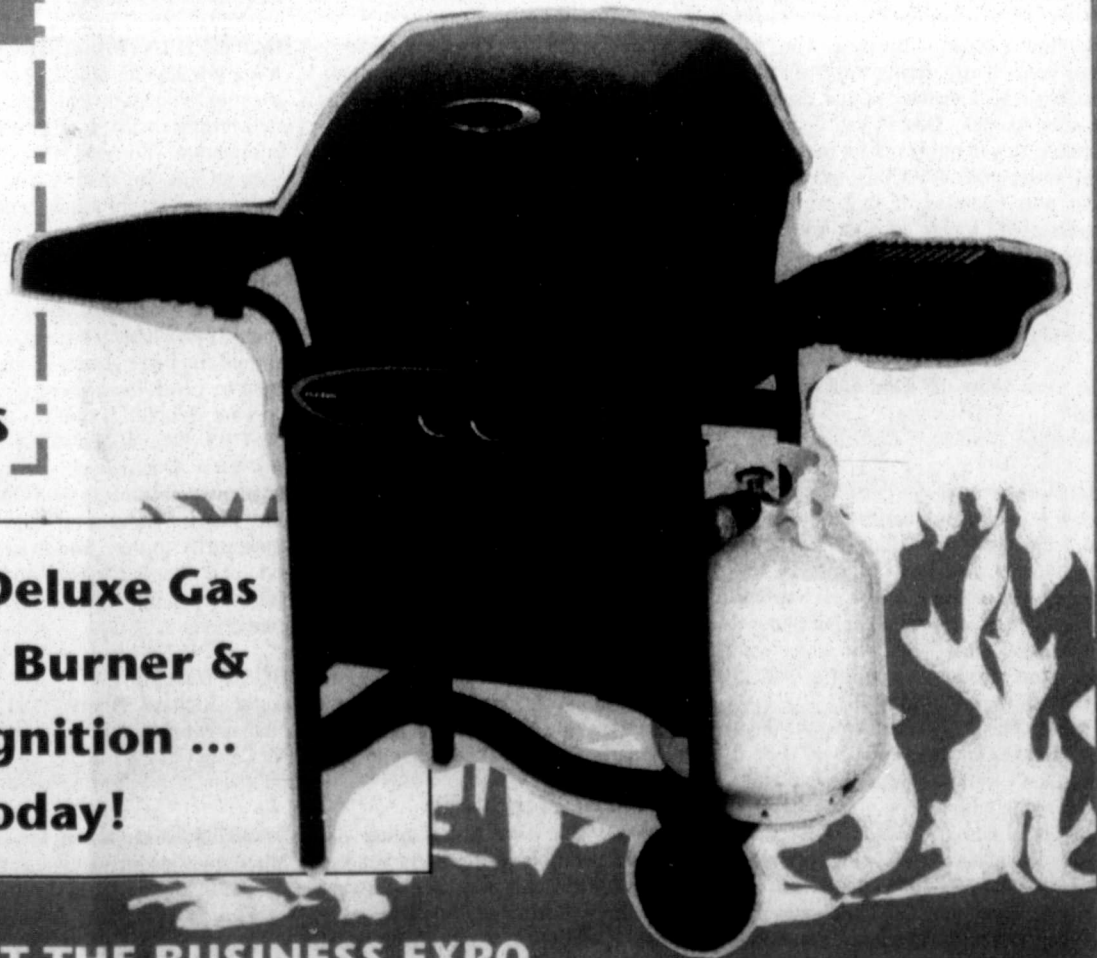
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
