PEDC, with diverse backgrounds, ready for work

The new Pampa Economic Development Corp. is settling in.

After electing officers at their first meeting earlier this month, they adopted a corporation seal and began the record keeping with a new book to keep the minutes of each meeting.

At their next meeting on Friday, in the city commission chambers at City Hall, they are expected to adopt by-laws. Eventually, the PEDC will meet regularly at 10 a.m. on the second Thursday of each month in the commission chambers, but for the first four months, they will meet twice a month.

They won't have any money to

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials are struggling to rescue the hard-won Japanese export market after mistakenly shipping beef that contained bone, considered a mad cow disease risk

Japan halted American beef shipments immediately after discovering the bone. Hours later, Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns dispatched extra inspectors to Japan and U.S. plants and ordered unannounced checks.

"It's a situation where very, very clearly our inspectors should have caught this," Johanns said. "And I'm going to do everything I can to make sure that that doesn't happen again."

Millions of dollars in exports hang in the balance while officials struggle to repair the damage. Of the \$3.9 billion in global sales of American beef in 2003, Japan, once the biggest U.S. customer of the meat, accounted for \$1.4 billion of beef and meat products.

There was much celebrating when Japan ended an earlier ban last month. One U.S. group flew in a beef

shipment for a banquet in Tokyo with the Japanese food service industry. Hong Kong, South Korea and Singapore quickly followed Japan's lead, reopening markets worth \$911 million before the ban.

The product Japan found - bone-in veal from a plant in New York — is widely consumed by Americans and allowed under international trading rules, but Asian officials worry that bone presents a risk of mad cow dis-

Japan was allowing only boneless beef from animals younger than 21 months, a stricter requirement than international guidelines call for. It was among dozens of countries that banned American beef after mad cow disease was discovered in the United States in 2003.

For now, American beef is being held at Japanese ports until the U.S. government completes a report on what happened, which Johanns said would be delivered immediately. Japan will decide later whether to impose a ban on further imports, department officials

TIME FOR CHANGE

Irritated educators placing their names on state legislative ballot

AUSTIN (AP) - Fed up with inaction at the Capitol, at least 27 frustrated Texas educators are running for the state Legislature this year in an attempt to push along school funding reforms that have eluded other lawmakers.

"They were not happy with the debate and some of the bills that came out, so they're showing their irritation ... by running for the Legislature," political consultant Bill Miller said. "It's the great American way — if you don't like it, change

Both Republican and Democratic educators — former and current teachers, principals and school board members — have filed for places on the March 7 primary ballots. Most say they want to oust incumbents they blame for bungled attempts to resolve the state's education problems.

Since 2003, lawmakers have tried to find new ways to fund the state's \$33 billion public school system so that it's less reliant on property taxes. Despite two regular legislative sessions and three special sessions, lawmakers were unable to agree on new money sources for Texas' 1,037 school districts.

A group of school systems sued over the funding formula, and the Texas Supreme Court ruled last year that the state's dependence on local property taxes to pay for public schools was unconstitutional and ordered lawmakers to devise a new system by June 1. Republican Gov. Rick Perry is expected to call another special session this spring, likely after the primary election.

"Voters around here are eager for a

change," said Mike Alberts, a Republican teacher from the East Texas town of Troup who hopes to oust Democratic Rep. Chuck Hopson of Jacksonville. Alberts teaches 7ththrough 12th-grade history at a small rural school.

"Texas has an education problem and we need an educator" to fix it, Alberts said. "I want to go and be a voice for our schools."

Powerful legislators facing opposition from educators include Rep. Kent Grusendorf, R-Arlington, who led school reform efforts as chairman of the House Public Education Committee. He's being challenged by Republican Diane Patrick, a former State Board of Education mem-

play in an unprecedented number of primary races," said Richard Kouri, a lobbyist for the Texas State Teachers Association. "A lot of that is in response to what hasn't happened."

For many teachers, what hasn't happened in the Legislature is a fully funded pension system, sustained health care benefits and pay that matches the national average.

Legislative leaders blamed their failures on advocates for the state's 295,000 teachers. Republican House Speaker Tom Craddick said reform efforts failed when superintendents launched an attack on the House proposal.

Tensions peaked when some at the Capitol began referring to education lobbyists as whiny. That animosity stirred action among educators, who are rallying, volunteering and making monetary contributions to get their own elected to office.

"I've seen more activity, questioning and willingness to go and work and vote among the teacher population this year than I have in the last ten years," said Brock Gregg, a lobbyist for the Association of Texas Professional Educators.

Education-friendly candidates are getting a boost from a new political action committee, Texas Parent PAC, created by parents and educators to support candidates, many of them school board members, who share their pro-public school ideas.

"School boards have to work together, so they're used to bringing all opinions to the table and trying to reach consensus," said Carolyn Boyle, chairwoman of the group. School board members also know how to balance budgets and the hardships caused by funding cuts, she

office manager for the Texas Workforce Center in Pampa.

"I'm hoping that we can bring new industry in," Cota said, "but my real hope is that we have several town meetings and find out what the citizens of Pampa really want us to do. That's where I'm putting my hopes right now."

She said she thinks there will be a learning curve for the new economic development corporation board.

Cota said she plans on sharing her information with the public. She sees that as critical for public

"That's my number one thing," Cota said. "I just want to make sure that they know what we're doing."

"We're very aware of the public trust," said Bill Berry, the board's assistant treasurer. "Integrity is a huge thing with me personally, and I think that the board members that have been chosen, I'm very, very comfortable with them at this point."

Berry, 71, is president of Titan Specialties in Pampa.

"I was one of the founders of the company," Berry said. "We've been here 39 plus years."

Born in DuBois, Pa., he attended high school in West Virginia.

"My father was a J.C. Penny manager," Berry said.

Ken May, 56, site manager for the Celanese Pampa Plant and PEDC vice president, said he wants to make a difference in the Pampa community.

Originally from Chicago, May has been with Celanese for 34 years. He's been at the Pampa plant, Gray County's largest private sector employer, for about 14

'We need to be doing anything we can to promote the city and the county," May said.

He said he's committed to bringing jobs to Pampa and improving the economic standing of the community.

Shawn Clifton, the PEDC treasurer, said he thinks it will take a lot of steady work to win the race.

Clifton, 40, was co-founder of Fluid Compression Partners in 1996. He's also involved in Clifton Supply.

Fluid Compression sold about a year ago and Clifton is helping with the transition.

Born in Wichita Falls, Clifton

moved to Pampa when he was 5. With deep ties to Pampa, he said he's concerned about the city's economic future.

Consequently, Clifton said he wants to increase Pampa's industrial base. The question, he said, is how to do that. He indicated that he thinks it will take a lot of time and a lot of work.

Clifton said the new economic development corporation needs to concentrate on hitting singles and not try to swing for the wall. The new economic development corporation, he said, needs to help local businesses expand and bring new businesses to town.

"There are a lot of people out there looking to relocate," Clifton said, "but we can't overlook people here."

He said there are a lot of good people, business owners, in Pampa that benefit the city.

When the economic development corporation gets its first tax receipt check in June, the organization needs to be ready to act.

"We need to do our homework," Clifton said, "and be ready to make a move."

Clifton said that Pampa has a number of good attributes, including a lot of cheap land, central shipping location, a dry climate and access to water.

Clifton said he's excited about being on the economic development corporation and excited about Pampa's future.

Berry agrees with Clifton that the EDC needs to prepare for this summer when the tax money begins to go into the corporation's coffers.

"One of the things we're aware of is there is no money to spend right now," Berry said.

He said the next few months will be spent by the board members getting to know each other and learning what they can and

'We've got to become as familiar with the rules and regulations as we possibly can," he said.

Still, he doesn't think the next few months will be wasted.

"I think there are things that we can be doing in our community prior to having any funds," Berry

One of those things is taking a hard look at the image the city projects and the entrances to Pampa from a motorist's viewpoint.

"We have some housekeeping to do," Berry said.

While funds will be needed for some projects, Berry said he sees

part of the EDC board's responsibilities to encourage the residents of the community to take part in building Pampa and its reputation.

Berry said he'd like to see Pampa spruced up.

"That's a very initial and early goal, to see our city as clean as it can be," Berry said. "From there, we'll work on the entries. I understand there's state help. I've been told there's state help. You can drive down through Quanah and Childress and see some nice masonry entries to those cities. I would certainly hope that in due course we could see that something happens on the entries to our

Berry said he'd like to see Pampa's curb appeal improved.

He said the city needs to be concerned about how visitors traveling through Pampa perceive the city.

"If he's not impressed, he's not impressed," Berry said. "We've got to look at it through his or her eyes."

Pampa Mayor Lonny Robbins said he thinks the seven people selected by the city commission will do a good job on the economic development board.

"We're going to give it our best shot," Berry said. "It's going to be



Questions of suffering, assisted suicide fuel for controversy

The Supreme Court ruled last week that the Bush administration could not punish doctors in Oregon who assist terminally ill patients in suicide.

Oregon doctors are free to prescribe oral prescription medications in lethal doses to seriously ill people who want to end their lives of agony

The ruling, according to The Associated Press, could encourage other states to consider similar laws, and it could set the stage for Congress to try to legislate outlawing assisted suicides.

This subject brings up two distinct points that have to be considered

One, is it OK to take someone's life?

Two, how much suffering should one have to endure?

suicide, abortion, and accidental deaths are all forms of taking a life. Wars and plagues have also decimated populations around the

Yes, it is morally wrong to intentionally take a life prematurely.

The second subject, suffering, is another matter.

All of us have suffered in one way or another at some point in our lives. Illness, the loss of a loved one, the heartache of a romance breaking up, the pain of physical injury and resulting surgery all are examples of human suffering.

Usually, time will heal most of those wounds. But there are instances where time cannot heal the pain.

There are those poor souls who have deadly diseases, mostly cancers, and have no hope of recover-Murder, manslaughter, genocide, ing and leading a normal, fruitful

life. Some will take years to die. Some have exhausted all their insurance benefits and their families are bankrupt and broken.

They lie in nursing homes and drool on pillows with no hope of getting well.

If they are terminal, why prolong their suffering?

A recent episode of Gray's Anatomy on television had a patient who needed heart surgery, but had no insurance and little money. An intern took it upon himself to approach the head of the

hospital about donating the surgery. The hospital head said "No. We are in the business of saving lives."

That is the conundrum. The medical profession is all for saving lives, not taking them, and most of them are really good at what they

The question is, how far do they take that drooling patient who has no hope of a fruitful life? Is it cruel and unusual punishment to keep that person alive day after day when he could end his life peacefully with dignity and little pain?

The New York Times reported last week that about 30 terminally ill patients each year hasten their deaths with lethal drugs, and Oregon authorities do not expect that number to increase because of the ruling.

Do we treat our animals better

when we have them put down?

I received a call from an aunt in Kansas last week. She called to tell me that another aunt, her sister, had died. Her sister had suffered from Alzheimer's for nearly 20 years. The aunt who called said the family was relieved that her sister was not suffering anymore.

I think if I was in a state of prolonged agony with absolutely no hope of getting better, I would probably be grateful if someone would give me something to put me out of my misery and give my family the satisfaction of knowing that I went out with some dignity.

Globalization, with all its efficiencies and free trade incentives, is taking

a similar toll. One of the saddest indicators is a surge in the number of children migrating here illegally and alone. In four years the number has increased 30 percent. They come here, experts say, to join parents who have sought work in the United States and to find relief from persecution, abuse and other hardship at home. While Englishspeaking countries long ago banned workhouses, the United States still punishes child refugees and illegal migrants like adults.

Because our immigration system makes few provisions for children, even the smallest children caught or smuggled unaccompanied have no right to legal representatives or even adult guardians. Three years ago, Amnesty International published a

report called "Why Am I Here?" describing what these child migrants endure. According to Amnesty's report, one-third of the minors in custody were held in facilities for juvenile offenders.

Half these children shared cells with offenders. At Pennsylvania's Berks County Youth Center, the children said, guards kicked them, knocked them down and doused them with pepper

Two important things have happened since this disturbing expose appeared. In 2003, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, with its law enforcement culture, transferred care and custody of unaccompanied child migrants to the Department of Health



and Human Services, which uses a more humane childnow are supposed to be placed in home-like shelters 72 hours after apprehension, though in practice immigration officials routinely fail to meet the deadline.

Unfortunately, there is no regulation of what one advocate calls the 72-hour "black hole" in which children are held by untrained border guards. Texas has only three staff attorneys for more than 500 solitary child migrants held across the state.

But a second hopeful change has surfaced. Just before Christmas, the U.S. Senate unanimously passed a bipartisan bill launched by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif. The law calls on officials to determine if an unaccompanied child is a national security risk and, if so, to



> As early as February, the Senate will start considering comprehensive immigration plans. Only one aspect of this process should be fast and simple. Whatever Americans decide about illegal immigration policy, unprotected, solitary child migrants cannot serve as. pawns. Citizens should insist that whatever legislation is include passed Unaccompanied Child Act. Any minor who migrates here alone has been propelled by adult failures. It is the duty of all who find child refugees and child migrants to protect them.


Callie Cobb finished the night with eight

Weekly Migratory Bird Hunting Report

High Plains Mallard Management Unit/Panhandle: Decoying action for Canada geese was good over the weekend and better early this week as a stiff cold front blew through the region. Good hunts were posted near Spearman in corn field; most hunters setting dark spreads posted their limit, despite late-season hunting. Fields west of Amarillo walked out with heavy straps of Canadas and snow geese. Many western Canadas from six to seven pounds along with the occasional 10-pound birds have been showing lately. The region received rain ahead of the front, which helped to knock the dust from the roads. Playas near Lubbock and Knox City continue steady for ducks. Water levels remain huntable in the this area of the region. Mallards, pintails, wigeons, gadwalls and teal have made up the brunt of straps. Prospects are good.

North Zone: Those hunters who have access to water have been consistently harvesting mallards and wood ducks in the timber. Mere puddles of water have been roosting ducks. The region did receive rain early this week, but dry, parched dirt soaked up the moisture quickly. Hunters have been resorting to big water on lakes and reservoirs for scaup, ringed-necks and a few canvasbacks. Locals are saying they have never seen rivers and lake levels so low. Closer to the coast along IH-10, duck hunting was fair at best last week. Early week rain did recharge leveed ponds, which should bode well for the last 10 days of the season. Duck season close at sunset Jan. 29. Prospects are fair.

South Zone: Duck hunting slowed across the coastal prairie last week. Mild and dry conditions continue to aid in evaporation of water from ponds, leaving ducks with few sources for fresh water. The region did receive as much as an inch of rain early this week, which should recharge ponds for at least a few days. The duck hot spot seems to be the bays around Port O'Connor and Rockport. Lack of water in freshwater marshes has pushed many birds to the bays. Most hunters are taking their limit of pintails and redheads. Good hunts were posted on the north shoreline of Trinity Bay. Snow geese are beginning to

break into smaller groups as food sources deplete.







Pluto target of spacecraft

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The fastest spacecraft ever launched began the first full day of its 3-billion mile journey to Pluto, where it will study the last unexplored planet and the mysterious icy area that surrounds it.

The New Horizons spacecraft blasted off aboard an Atlas V rocket Thursday afternoon in a spectacular start to the \$700 million mission. Despite the speed — it can reach 36,000 mph — it will take 9 1/2 years to reach Pluto and the frozen, sunless reaches of the solar

"It looked beautiful," said Ralph McNutt Jr. of the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory, one of the mission's scientists.

New types of treatments can help people control everyday aches.

Giving weather aches the cold shoulder ...

(NAPSA) — Many people believe that seasonal and daily changes in weather affect their aches and pains. A new study shows that they might be right.

The study, conducted by the American College of Rheumatology, found that rheumatoid arthritis (RA) pain rises as temperatures fall. But doctors say RA sufferers aren't the only ones affected by weather.

A recent poll from Stanford University Medical Center found that four out of every 10 Americans experience some form of pain on a daily basis. Doctors think those aches could sometimes be triggered by dampness and dry or cold air.

Treating Aches

While there are a number of pain therapies available, some have been linked to side effects ranging from stomach irritation to-in extreme cases involving Cox-2 drugs-heart problems and even death. Additionally, consumers say that many topical pain medications have unpleasant odors or are relatively

One new type of treatment, called ALCiS Daily Relief, may help people get control of everyday aches and pains. Clinical trials demonstrated a positive correlation between the treatment and a reduction of pain and stiffness. After one topical application, patients receiving the treatment experienced pain relief after five minutes.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A major makeover is coming for the little written inserts that accompany prescription drugs. The new versions are supposed to play up information that's useful to pharmacists and patients while paring down the small-print legal disclaimers.

Confusing medical information is behind many of the estimated 300,000 preventable cases of death or injury that occur each year in the nation's hospitals, Surgeon General

Richard Carmona said in introducing

the new drug labeling rules. The rules should make it easier to quickly learn the most critical things about a drug, according to the Food and Drug Administration.

But the FDA's repeated assertions that the federally approved labels preempt state law alarmed some activists and legislators, who call that a curtailment of patient rights. The rules come amid a flurry of high-profile drug lawsuits, including cases involving Merck & Co.'s painkiller Vioxx.

The guidelines seek to roll back additions made over the years that have made prescription drug inserts, intended for physicians but useful to patients, dense and difficult to negotiate, acting FDA commissioner Dr. Andrew von Eschenbach told a news conference.

"We are making the prescribing information much more targeted and useful for physicians," said Dr. Janet Woodcock, the FDA's deputy commissioner for operations.

The American Medical Association applauded the FDA, saying it had long encouraged the regulatory agency to make labels more useful and user-friendly.

Patients should benefit as well.

"We have hit a point of information overload and the public health message is being diluted," Carmona said. "This is of great concern when it comes to making sure a patient knows how to use prescription drugs safely and

Publication of the new guidelines comes more than five years after the FDA proposed retooling the look of the labels for the first time since 1975. Driven in part by the liability concerns of pharmaceutical companies, labels have turned into "disclaimers rather than important public health tools," said Dr. Scott Gottlieb, the FDA's deputy commissioner for medical and scientific affairs.

The new rules remove many of the legal warnings and move further to the back the diagrams of each drug's chemical structure that long have introduced the densely written pamphlets.

In their place will be more up-to-date and easy-to-read information, including a box of "highlights" that spell out a drug's risks and benefits. The labeling information also will include novelties like a table of contents

Doctors and pharmacists still should read the inserts to the end, said Frank Palumbo, a pharmacist and attorney who heads the University of Maryland's Center on

> Drugs and Public Policy. "I don't think a prescriber should prescribe something unless they've familiarized themselves with a prod-

> uct," Palumbo said. The reduction in warning information had sparked concern among pharmaceutical companies worried it would open them up to greater liability. Apparently to address that, the FDA staked out the agency's position that federally approved drug labels pre-

empt state liability laws. "State law actions also threaten FDA's statutorily prescribed role as the expert federal agency responsible for evaluating and regulating drugs," the rule reads in part.

That sparked immediate concern that the FDA was seeking to curtail patient rights. The president of the watchdog group Public Citizen, Joan Claybrook, called it a "sneak attack."

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said: "It's a typical abuse by the Bush administration — take a regulation to

improve the information that doctors and patients receive about prescription drugs and turn it into a protection against liability for the drug industry."

All new drugs approved after the rule takes effect June 30 will have to include the new labels. Use of the labels will be phased in for those drugs approved within the last five years, as well as those now under FDA review, Woodcock said.

The new drug labels will also include:

The date the drug received initial U.S. approval. —Recent major changes to information about the drug. -A toll-free phone number for patients or doctors to report suspected side effects to the FDA.

-Drug interaction information gathered in one section. A final section that prompts doctors on what keys facts they should relay to patients.

Thornberry outlines issues Congress should consider this year

Thornberry, in a press conference Thursday, outlined several significant issues that need to be considered in Congress this year.

Thornberry said experience shows that Congressional efforts in recent years to stimulate the economy by reducing the tax burden on the American people have paid off. More than 4.5 million new jobs have been created since May of 2003 when the President signed the tax legislation known as the "Jobs & Growth Act."

The number of Americans who own homes is at an all-time high. manufacturing activity has increased for 31 consecutive months, and real after-tax income per person has climbed by 7 percent since 2001.

"The best thing Congress can do for the economy is to allow people to keep more of the money they earn so that they can spend it on their families' needs instead of sending it off to the government," Thornberry said. "It is also important to give people some certainty and stability so they can plan."

Thornberry also said that unless action is taken by Congress this year:

Many middle income Americans will face a tax increase through the Alternative Minimum Tax. Failure to extend the higher AMT exemptions will affect 19 million taxpayers in 2006;

 Texans could lose the right to deduct state and local sales taxes from their federal income taxes;

 "Above the line" deductions for higher education expenses and out of pocket teacher classroom expenses will not be allowed. (Above the line deductions can be claimed without having to itemize deductions);

 Marginal oil and gas well producers will lose full benefit of "percentage depletion deductions";

· Lower income workers contributing to retirement accounts will not be allowed the "saver's tax credit" and;

· Taxes on capital gains and dividends will increase.

Thornberry said he hopes that this year Congress will address the

energy bill that promotes greater country's domestic development of many forms of energy including oil and gas, ethanol, wind, and nuclear.

He added that even more must be done to make our country less reliant on foreign energy. He supports allowing oil and gas produc-Refuge, encouraging construction of new refineries in the United States through regulatory relief and other measures, and funding research into new forms of energy and into more efficient use of existing energy sources.

On border security and immigration, Thornberry said the House began to address the issue of strengthening border security by passing a bill to hire additional border agents, improve technology and physical barriers along the border, and end the "catch and release" program by requiring all illegal immigrants apprehended at U.S. borders to be detained until their removal from the country.

"The safety of our nation is dependent upon us doing a better job of controlling who or what crosses our borders," Thornberry

As for immigration policy, Thornberry believes a guest worker program should be considered, but he is opposed to granting illegal aliens amnesty.

He addressed the global war on terror by saying, "Because Iraq is the central front in the war on terror, success there is critical to our national security. Our folks have done an incredible job, and we must give them all the support they

He said the 13th Congressional District plays a significant role in our nation's defense through the presence of facilities such as Sheppard Air Force Base, Bell Helicopter, and the Pantex plant.

Thornberry believes Sheppard has a solid foundation for future growth because of the base's excellent facilities and strong communi-

Thornberry is also committed to making sure that essential programs at Bell Helicopter and Pantex stay on track. Bell Helicopter is home to production of the V-22 Osprey, upgrading of the tion in the Arctic National Wildlife H-1 helicopter, and also plays a key

role in building the new Presidential helicopter. Pantex is the only facility for assembly and disassembly within our nation's nuclear weapons complex.

On lobby reform, he said recent news has made it abundantly clear that there is an urgent need for lobby reform in Washington.

The effort to develop reform measures is already under way in the House. Action is expected soon after lawmakers return to Capitol

"We should look for common sense reforms that make it less likely someone will abuse the system," Thornberry said.

Among items expected to be considered are a ban on privately funded travel; further restrictions on lobbying by former members and staff; and a ban on former members convicted of a felony from receiving a Congressional pension.


