## FDA unveils new labeling system

WASHINGTON (AP) - A major makeover is coming for the little written inserts that accompany prescription drugs. The new versions are supposed to play up informaton that's useful to pharmacists and pa
Confusing medical information is behind many of the estimated 300,000 preventable cases of death or injury that occur each year in the nation's hospitals, Surgeon General Richard Carmona said in introducing he new drug labeling rules $\qquad$ quickly learn the most eritical things about a drug, according to the Food and Drug Administration.
But the FDA's repeated assertions that the federally approved labels pre empt state law alarmed some activist ment of patient rights. The rules come amid a flurry of high-profile drug lawsuits, including cases involving Merck \& Co.'s painkiller Vioxx.
The guidelines seek to roll back additions made over the years that have made prescription drug inserts, intend
ed for physicians but useful to patients, dense and difficult to negotiate, acting FDA commissioner Dr. Andrew vo Eschenbach told a news conference. We are making the prescribing information much more targeted and useful for physicians," said Dr. Janet
Woodcock, the FDA's deputy commissioner for operations.

The American Medical Association applauded the FDA, saying it had long encouraged the regula
to make labels more useful and user-friendly.

## Thornberry outlines issues Congress should consider this year

Thornberry, in a press conference Thursday, outlined several signifi cant issues that need to be considered in Congress this year. Thornberry said experienc shows that Congressional efforts in
recent years to stimulate the economy by reducing the tax burden on the American people have paid off. More than 4.5 million new jobs have been created since May of 2003 when the President signed the
tax legislation known as the "Jobs tax legislation known as the "Job
\& Growth Act." The number

tant to give people some certainty and stability so they can plan." Thornberry also said that unless action is taken by Congress this

idends will increase. Thornberry said he hopes that

release" program by requiring all illeagal immigrants apprehended at U.S. borders to be detained until their removal from the country. "The safety of our nation is
dependent upon us doing a better job of controlling who or what crosses our borders," Thornberry
said. As for immigration policy,
Thornberry believes a guest worker program should be considered,
but he is opposed to granting illegal aliens amnesty.
He addressed the He addressed the global war on
terror by saying, "Because Iraq is error by saying, "Because lraq is
the central front in the war on terror, success there is critical to our
national security. Our folks have done an incredible job, and we
must give them all the support they must give them all the support they
need." need."
He said the 13 th Congressional District plays a significant role in
our nation's defense through the presence of facilities such as Sheppard Air Force Base, Bel
