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Working for Progress group to meet on improvements

Working for Progress, a group of residents hoping to improve conditions in all Pampa's neighborhoods, will meet at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the auditorium at Lovett Memorial Library, 111 N. Houston.

Residents of each ward of the city are expected to make up the group, said Barbara Patrick, one of the organizers. Their primary goal will be to help clean up the city and

improve its appearance.

"Every area of Pampa needs to be developed," Patrick said. "The city does not have enough manpower or equipment. We have equipment and manpower donated to us, and we can assist the city in cleanup and other work."

The group will provide input to the city commission concerning needed improvements in each ward. Patrick plans to seek grant monies to

help fund the cleanup and improve-

"Our volunteers will help clean up areas that are not privately owned," she said. "The city manager has a list of homes and lots that are privately owned, so we'll know which ones not to go to."

An ordinance has already been drawn up concerning Working for Progress. "We are legally on our way," Patrick said.

Patrick and her husband, Rev. I.L. Patrick, have been Pampa residents for 22 years, living part of that time on the south side of town. Rev. Patrick is pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church.

"There is a need here. There is no sense in all of us sitting here looking at it and nobody doing anything about it," Patrick said.

Tuesday's meeting is open to the public. Officers will be elected.

\$1.6 billion payment Hoops action for duping investors

settlements ever, American International Group Inc. has agreed to pay more than \$1.6 billion to settle allegations that it used deceptive accounting practices to mislead investors and regula-

The settlement announced today by New York Attorney General Eliot Spitzer's office also requires the New York-based company, one of the world's largest insurers, to adopt changes in its business practices to ensure proper accounting procedures in the future.

The pact settles a civil suit filed last May by Spitzer with backing from the New State Insurance Department. The Securities and Exchange Commission, which also worked with Spitzer on the investigation, was to file and settle allegations of accounting fraud with the company simultaneously.

Spitzer spokesman Darren Dopp said the settlement was final.

The settlement does not cover Maurice "Hank" Greenberg, the company's former chairman and CEO who was named in the suit but has pledged to fight it in


NEW YORK (AP) — In Spitzer told Associated Press in an interview, "This is a company that didn't have to cheat. But once they began, they found it hard to stop. And like an addict, they grew dependent on financial gamesmanship that could ultimately destroy the company."

He said that the new business practices AIG was adopting would improve the market for property and casualty insurance in the United States.

"AIG's obligation to be transparent, its obligation to report honest financials and its obligation to permit consumers to know what fees its agents and brokers will be deriving from sales, are going to define a new level of transparency in the market that all consumers will benefit from," Spitzer said.


Shareholders welcomed the settlement announcement, sending AIG shares up 22 cents to \$66.60 in morning trading on the New York Stock Exchange.

Under the agreement, about \$800 million will go to investors who were deceived by AIG's accounting tactics and about \$375 million will go to AIG policyholders.

Pampa's newest corporate executive works from a virtual office. It could be from home in Pampa. It could be from his office in Amarillo. It could be from a picnic table in the park on a sunny day or from McDonald's.

"I'm a tele-commuter," said Daniel Silva as he sat drinking orange juice at Sisters Spudnut Shop on Foster.

If there's not a wireless connection for his laptop computer, he uses his cell phone.

Silva, 38, has started three companies since leaving Celanese about three years ago. First was Virtual Computers, a technical support company. Then he started Advanced Marketing Services, which designs Web sites and hosts them.

His newest company is an online business for buying, selling and trading almost any-

Three years ago, Silva said he went out to his garage to clean it out.

There was a lot of stuff to get rid of," he

He talked to friends and neighbors and heard the story. They all had garages packed with "stuff," and it takes a lot of time, effort and expense to hold a garage sale.

In seeing a need and filling it, Silva created a Web site on the Internet. He named it garagespot.com.

"Garagespot.com is the most exciting right now," Silva said of his companies.

He got local businesses to sponsor it, and began putting up free classified ads for people wanting to clear out their garages.



White House targets 141 programs for ax

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House Thursday sent lawmakers details of the 141 programs that President Bush wants to eliminate or significantly cut to save taxpayers almost \$15 billion.

the success he had last year in killing 89 programs costing \$6.5 billion, but most of

this year's proposaled cuts were rejected by lawmakers last year and likely will be again. Of 91 programs slated to get killed altogether, to save \$7.3 billion, only 16 are new proposals.

The programs slated for elimination are congressional favorites funded through Bush wants to build upon annual appropriations bills. Programs on the chopping block include \$3.5 billion from the Department of Education, including grants

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for safe and drug free schools, vocational education grants and arcane programs such as the "Exchanges With Historic Whaling and Trading Partners" program.

Another 50 programs are slated for large cuts but not outright elimination, for savings of \$7.4 billion. They include cuts of \$394 million from Amtrak subsidies, \$694 million from Department of Homeland Security grants and training programs and an almost 25 percent cut from construction funding for Indian Schools.

The White House said the programs on its ambitious list are those "not getting results or not fulfilling essential priorities."

TSA chief: Secure flight suspended due to problems

WASHINGTON (AP) — Security concerns have caused the government to suspend plans for an ambitious program to check every domestic airline passenger's name against government watch lists, Transportation Security Administration chief Kip Hawley said Thursday.

Hawley told the Senate Commerce Committee that he has directed that the program's information technology system 'go through a comprehensive audit."

Hawley did not say whether any security flaws or breaches had been discovered. The program called Secure Flight has been troubled from the start.

It is strongly opposed by civil libertarians who fear the program would grow into a massive domestic surveillance system in which the government tracks people whenever they travel.

Nearly four years and \$200 million after the program was put into operation, Hawley said last month that the agency hadn't yet determined precisely how the it would work.

Government auditors gave the project failing grades and rebuked its authors for secretly obtaining personal information about airline passengers.

Currently, airlines check the names of passengers against watch lists that the government gives them. Under Secure Flight the government would take over from the airlines the task of checking names against watch lists.

The Sept. 11 commission later urged the administration to expedite the task because, it said, the watch lists currently used by airlines aren't complete.

Checking names against watch lists hasn't been as easy as it sounds, partly because airlines collect only limited information about passengers.

The number of names on the watch lists increased into the tens of thousands since the Sept. 11 attacks. That problem has resulted in passengers from infants to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy being mistakenly told they couldn't fly because they have the same name as someone on the watch

The project has also drawn protests from privacy advocates and civil libertarians because its stated purpose has changed, often expanding.

Army seeks Bush's OK to execute two prisoners

FORT LEAVENWORTH, the next year after being Kan. (AP) — The military has asked President Bush to authorize execution of two of the seven prisoners on death row at Fort Leavenworth's Disciplinary Barracks.

The request to execute Ronald A. Gray and Dwight J. Loving is the first from the Army since President John F. Kennedy was in office.

Gray has been on the military prison's death row since April 1988 for convictions for rape, sodomy and multiple murders while stationed with the Army at Fort Bragg, N.C. Loving arrived

convicted of killing two taxicab drivers while he was an Army private at Fort Hood, Texas. "The president has the

discretion on when and if he wants to sign the documents," said Lt. Col. Pamela Hart, an Army spokes-woman at the Pentagon. "There's no timeline that the president has to follow. It can be carried out in this administration or it can be transferred to the next."

Fort Leavenworth has been home to the military prison, which houses inmates from all service

branches, since the 1870s. A new facility that opened in 2002 includes space for an execution chamber, but it has not been equipped.

Twenty-six prisoners have been executed at the disciplinary barracks over the years. The last was John Bennett, an Army private hanged in 1961 for raping and attempting to kill an 11-year-old Austrian girl.

Recent changes have opened the door for executions at other military prisons.

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Bush: al-Qaida 'weakened and fractured'

Bush said the U.S.-led global war on terror has "weakened and fractured" al-Qaida and allied groups, outlining as proof new details about the multinational cooperation that foiled purported terrorist plans to fly a commercial airplane into the tallest skyscraper on the West Coast.

"The terrorists are living under constant pressure and this adds to our security," Bush said. "When terrorists spend their days working to avoid death or capture, it's harder for them to plan and execute new attacks on our country. By striking the terrorists where they live, we're protecting the American homeland.'

The president said the anti-terror battle is far from over.

"The terrorists are weakened and

president said in a speech at the National Guard Memorial Building. "We cannot let the fact that America hasn't been attacked in 41/2 years since September the 11th lull us into the illusion that the threats to our nation have disappeared. They have not."

Bush has referred to the 2002 plot before. In an address last October, he said the United States and its allies had foiled at least 10 serious plots by the al-Qaida terror network in the last four years, including plans for Sept. 11-like attacks on both U.S. coasts. The White House initially would not give details of the plots but later released a fact sheet with a brief, and vague, description of each.

The president filled in details today. said that Khalid Sheik

WASHINGTON (AP) - President fractured, yet they're still lethal," the Mohammed, the alleged mastermind of the Sept. 11 attacks who was captured in 2003, had already begun planning the West Coast operation in October, just after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks. One of Mohammed's key planners was Hambali, the alleged operations chief of the al-Qaida related terrorist group Jemaah Islamiyah. Instead of recruiting Arab hijackers, Hambali found Southeast Asian men who would be less likely to arouse suspicion and who were sent to meet with Osama bin Laden, Bush said.

Under the plot, the hijackers were to use shoe bombs to blow open the cockpit door of a commercial jetliner, take control of the plane and crash it into the Library Tower in Los Angeles, since renamed the US Bank Tower, Bush

ADHD drugs under scrutiny

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal health official said today that "there's smoke" linking the deaths of 25 people to the drugs taken to treat attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.

"Does that represent a fire?" asked Dr. David Graham of the Food and Drug Administration.

To find out, an FDA advisory committee considered how best to study whether the popular drugs increased the risk of death and serious injury.

"We wouldn't be going through this exercise if we didn't think there was a real possibility of increased risk," Graham told reporters.

Further studies would examine the incidence of sudden death and serious health problems, including stroke and heart attack,

among some of the millions of children and adults treated each year with the drugs. That could lead to new warning labels.

The deaths occurred between 1999 and 2003, according to an FDA report. Nineteen of them involved children. The report also detailed 54 cases of serious cardiovascular problems, including heart attack, stroke, and hypertension.

Porter Beer Chocolate Truffles 60 Truffle Servings

Ingredients: 9 Tablespoons heavy cream

6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate pieces, chopped 6 ounces bittersweet chocolate, chopped

3 Tablespoons Porter Beer 10 ounces milk chocolate pieces, chopped

2 1/2 tsps vegetable oil 1/2 cup sweetened or

unsweetened cocoa powder Directions: In medium saucepan over medium heat, warm cream just until it steams. Remove from heat; stir in semi-sweet and bittersweet chocolate pieces, cover pan and set aside for

five minutes to allow thorough melting. Stir mixture until it is completely smooth. Pour mixture into a mixing bowl; very slowly stir in Porter Beer, until completely blended. Refrigerate mixture about 30 minutes, stirring occasionally so that it cools evenly. It should still be pliable.

Cover a sheet pan with parchment paper. Using a teaspoon, spoon truffle mixture onto sheet pan in small dollops, about the size of marbles. Refrigerate about 45 minutes, until very firm.

Make chocolate coating by placing milk chocolate pieces in the top of a double boiler over simmering, not boiling, water. Stir until completely melted and

Programs to help combat Big Brother

Are you a private person? Do you cringe at the thought of someone watching your every move? Or reading your private messages? Well, listen up! The Internet has some great resources to help you maintain your anonymity, at least in the

online world. Web Surfing

Every time you visit a based on Web site, you leave a footprint. These tracks contain a very important piece of information called an "IP Address." An IP Address is the unique ID every computer on the Internet must have in order to communicate. "IP" is short for Internet Protocol. The address is a series of four three-digit numbers, such 134.056.002.253. Your ISP has large blocks of these IP numbers assigned to them by their provider. If someone wanted to type any Web address into

Web site, they could track that IP address back to its works: Let's say you didn't owner,

your ISP. Eric Then, if ISP Spellmann your cooperates, Columnist they could link that IP

to you

the date and time you were assigned that ID. Typically, only law enforcement officials go through such painstaking steps to find a user. However, that remote possibility is enough to cause some privacy-minded citizens to seek better protection. Enter, Anonymizer.

Think of Anonymizer (http://www.anonymizer.co m) as a proxy Web-surfer. Take a look at the top-right of their home page. Simply

The IRS homepage will slowly appear. The sudden drop in speed is due to two factors: First, you have now introduced a middleman (Anonymizer) into your surfing. All Web pages will now be routed through Anonymizer first before they reach your computer. Second, Anonymizer's paying customers get priority on the service over free users.

decent for occasional usage. It's easy to know when you're using Anonymizer and when you are surfing "naked." The Anonymizer address bar will appear at the top of your screen along "Protected Anonymizer" appearing in the title of every document you view.

Anonymous Re-mailers But what if you need to send an anonymous e-mail message? And, "yes," before you ask, legitimate reasons do exist for this service. The Global Internet Liberty Campaign explains it this

Houston Chronicle on energy companies' profits:

The movie Syriana is a fictional account of global energy scheming that draws upon the recollections of a former CIA agent. In the movie, no character exhibits both innocence and virtue: not the politicians, not the Washington lawyer/lobbyists, not the CIA spies, not the Middle East princes and not the con men who turn downtrodden workers into religious fanatics and suicide bombers.

In a backhanded way, however, the film empathizes with the challenges

faced by the people who run Big Oil.

As President Bush noted in his State of the Union speech last week, Americans have a huge thirst for the oil that powers and lubricates their cars. Producing, refining and marketing all those petroleum products require large enterprises and large investments.

Providence has placed most of the world's oil reserves in the hands of cruel dictators and corrupt oligarchs. Only about 3 percent of oil reserves are held by private companies. In order to meet Americans' demand while profiting from oil produced overseas, U.S. and multinational energy companies have to deal with regimes that do not operate under the rule of law.

Exxon Mobil Corp. recently announced annual profits of more than

\$36 billion, the highest of any publicly held company in U.S. history. Because demand in 2005 sometimes exceeded supply, oil producers and refiners were able to sell their wares at record prices. Both the upstream and downstream facets of the oil business became more profitable.

There is talk of new taxes on windfall profits, but the harm they produce was proved in the 1970s. Following an embargo and global price hikes, government controls aggravated an artificial shortage of gasoline and then discouraged investment in new exploration and refining capacity.

If there is a criticism to be leveled at Big Oil, it should start with the Justice

The recipient has no way of knowing that the message came from you. Of course, because of this "stripping" action, they also have no way to reply to you. Cleaning Your **Hard Drive**

Most of you know that simply throwing a file into the recycle bin does not make it irretrievable. After all, you can always doubleclick on the trash and pull it back out. However, what if you "empty the recycle bin?" Could someone still retrieve the file? Yes, unless special steps are taken.

When your computer deletes a file, it doesn't truly erase it. It simply marks the area on the hard drive where the file exists as "available." The next time you save a file, it may (or may not) over-write that deleted file. That's how "undelete" programs work. They try to piece together file fragments that have not overwritten by new data.

However, even if that area on the hard drive has been overwritten eight times, the data still leaves a "magnetic signature." enforcement officials have devices that can decipher these "data ghosts" and rebuild the deleted files.

To truly erase all data, you need a special program. I recommend, UltraWipe (http://www.snapfiles.c om/get/ultrawipe.html). It's a free program that will find the empty areas of your hard drive, write random data over them, then erase it, then repeat the process over and over and over. It claims to meet "Department of Defense standards" for file deletion. Be careful, though. It has a "Panic Button" that will immediately erase a userselected group of folders with a mouse-click.

Some people believe that the government and corporations are slowly eroding our right to privacy. However, with the tools I've mentioned, you'll have a fighting chance against these "Big Brothers."

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


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

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Willie Nelson introduced California to "BioWillie," his brand of clean-burning fuel made from soybeans.

BioWillie went on sale Wednesday at an alternative fuel station in San Diego where the 72-year-old singer filled his tour bus from a pump emblazoned with a picture of himself strumming a guitar.

"It is the future," Nelson said. "Through biodiesel, we can reduce dependency on foreign oil and adopt an energy source that's clean, renewable and helps family farmers find new uses for their products."

Biodiesel is America's fastest growing alternative fuel, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. U.S. sales of biodiesel tripled last year to 75 million gallons, but account for less than 1 percent of the diesel fuel sold nationwide, said Jenna Higgins, a spokeswoman for the National Biodiesel Board.

Three years ago, Nelson's wife, Annie, bought a biodiesel-burning car in Hawaii, where the star has a home. The biodiesel that powered her car was made

from grease collected from restaurants.

The singer then began filling his tour buses with biodiesel. Supplier Peter Bell persuaded Nelson to go into business and use his name and image to help the fuel gain wider acceptance.

The BioWillie brand, known as B20, is a blend of 80 percent petroleum diesel and 20 percent biodiesel and is made from soybean oil.

Besides California, it is sold in Texas, South Carolina and Georgia.

Department, which has allowed a wave of energy company mergers that reduced competition and closed uncompetitive refineries rather than retool them. The Senate Judiciary Committee, chaired by Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., is investigating whether the mergers caused price hikes at the pump.

While oil companies can rightly claim they are businesses entitled to an honest profit and not charities, the record profits should cause them to temporarily retire some the industry's usual talking points:

"OPEC made me do it." remain in check.

Like the oil cartel, oil companies also benefit from charging whatever the market will bear. As long as demand is rising, they have no inducement to cut prices.

"Environmental laws need to be weakened so U.S. energy companies can compete." Uncompetitive companies do not make record profits.

"We really don't make that much return on our investment." Please. Big Oil stocks performed very well last year.

The best way for Americans to increase available energy supplies and decrease oil company profits is to conserve. Every time someone walks, bicycles or takes mass transit, sales of some brand of gasoline, and the profit from those sales, remain in check.

Man arrested in killing of wife, daughter

BOSTON (AP) — British authorities early Thursday arrested a man in the shooting deaths of his wife and infant daughter, whose bodies were found in their Massachusetts home last month, officials said.

Neil Entwistle, who returned to his native England around the time his family was killed, faces murder charges, said Middlesex District Attorney's spokeswoman Emily

"He is in police custody in England at this time," LaGrassa said Thursday

London's Metropolitan Police said Entwistle was arrested at a subway station on a provisional extradition warrant issued Wednesday evening. The British Home Office said he would be brought before a judge, but declined to say when that might

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Rachel Entwistle, 27, and 9-monthold Lillian, were found dead Jan. 22 in their home in the Boston suburb of Hopkinton.

A spokesman for her family declined to comment on the arrest Thursday but said they would release a statement later.

Police were first called to the Entwistles' home the day before the bodies were discovered but didn't see anything wrong, authorities said. District Attorney Martha Coakley has said that friends showed up for a dinner party but no one answered the door, and that Rachel Entwistle's mother called police when she couldn't reach her daughter.

After a missing person report was filed, police visited the home again. During the second search, they detected an odor and discovered the bodies in a bedroom. Coakley has said the bodies were covered by bedding and "almost not visible."

Massachusetts authorities flew to London late last month to interview Neil Entwistle at the U.S. Embassy, but officials didn't say whether he answered any questions. He had been labeled a "person of interest" at that point but not a suspect.

Neil Entwistle didn't attend his wife and daughter's funeral on Feb. 1.

The couple had met in 1999 at the University of York, where she was spending a year studying abroad. They married in 2003 and stayed in England until last year. Their daughter was born in April.

The family moved Massachusetts, Rachel Entwistle's home state, and had rented the Colonial-style home in Hopkinton about 10 days before she and her daughter were found dead.

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
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Dear Abby...







Tocchet takes leave of absence from NHL

NEW YORK (AP) - Rick Tocchet isn't welcome in the NHL as long as he's linked to a big-time gambling ring.

The former All-Star player who became Wayne Gretzky's top assistant on the Phoenix Coyotes' coaching staff was given an indefinite leave of absence Wednesday night by commissioner Gary Bettman. Tocchet's departure came a day after he was accused of financing a nationwide gambling operation that took bets from about a half-dozen current players.

Tocchet met with Bettman and requested the leave, the NHL said. Terms of the leave include Tocchet being prohibited from communicating with NHL and team personnel for the length of his departure. Also, he'll need Bettman's consent before he can return, and the commissioner can change the terms of the leave at any

"We view the charges against Mr. Tocchet in the most serious terms," Bettman said in a statement. "We have pledged our full cooperation to the New Jersey State Police and the New Jersey Attorney General's Office.

"While we are conducting our own investigation, we have made clear to the law enforcement authorities in New Jersey that we will do nothing to interfere with their ongoing investi-

The NHL hired former federal prosecutor Robert J. Cleary, who headed the Unabomber case, to investigate Tocchet.

Tocchet came to the meeting with his new attorney, Kevin Marino, who called the pending charges against his client "false and irresponsible.'

In an interview with The Associated Press on Thursday, Marino criticized State Police for speaking so extensively to the media.

"I have never been involved in a case where the prosecution has engaged in such inappropriate conduct in terms of making investigators available to the press, appearing on nationally syndicated television," Marino said. "It's improper, it's unwarranted and I will not toler-

"We are not going to try this case in the press and we're not going to let them either," he said. At his Wednesday meeting with the NHL, Tocchet wasn't prepared to respond to specific

questions about the allegations, the NHL said. New Jersey authorities told the NHL on Wednesday that nothing has come to their attention that indicates the gambling activities relate in any way to league games. None of the players were identified in the complaint.

"While there is speculation as to which other NHL personnel may have been involved in this matter, we continue to await guidance in that regard from the New Jersey law enforcement authorities," Bettman said.

State police Col. Rick Fuentes said an investigation into the New Jersey-based ring discovered the processing of more than 1,000 wagers, exceeding \$1.7 million, on professional and college sports, mostly football and basketball.

Pittsburgh's Mark Recchi, a former teammate of Tocchet's, forced a Philadelphia TV station to retract a story on its Web site that said he was connected to the ring. He and John LeClair, another Penguins player and past member of the Flyers, hired a lawyer to potentially sue the station and other media outlets.

"Mark Recchi and John LeClair categorically deny any wrongdoing and are outraged that their names have been associated with the Operation Slap Shot investigation," attorney Bob Del Greco said.

Texas regents approve coach's raise

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas football coach Mack Brown got a \$390,000 pay raise today after leading the Longhorns to their first outright national championship in 36

University system regents unanimously approved the salary bump, which gives Brown an annual salary of about \$2.55 million, keeping him among the highest-paid coaches in college football.

Brown, 54, agreed to a 10-year deal with Texas at the end of the 2004 season that boosts his salary \$100,000 every year. Texas won the 2005 national championship with its 41-38 win over Southern California

in the Rose Bowl.

The regents also unanimously approved a \$150 million expansion and renovation project that will increase Royal-Memorial Stadium seating capacity from 80,082 to more than 90,000.

Scheduled to be completed in 2008, the project focuses on the north end zone section of the stadium and would add office space and put sprinklers in some interior areas that lack such fire controls.

The \$150 million includes a \$15 million project already under way on the west side

Rockets acquire Bogans in trade with Charlotte

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Rockets acquired guard Keith Bogans from the Charlotte Bobcats on today for forward Lonny Baxter.

The 6-foot-5 Bogans is averaging 8.7 points, 2.7 rebounds, 1.2 assists and 1.0 steals in 39 games with Charlotte this season. He has started nine games and scored 10 or more points 17 times.

But Bogans has missed nine games after a right knee sprain at Milwaukee on Jan. 21.

The move reunites Bogans with his former Kentucky teammate, Chuck Hayes. Bogans played in 135 games at Kentucky between 2000-

03, averaging 14.2 points and 4.1 rebounds. He finished fourth on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,923 points.

In his pro career, Bogans has averaged 8.3 points, 3.5 rebounds and 1.5 assists in 186 games with Orlando and Charlotte.

The 6-8 Baxter averaged 3.6 points and 3.7 rebounds in 23 games with the Rockets. He signed as a free agent with Houston in September, after three NBA seasons with Chicago, Toronto, Washington and New Orleans.

Lysacek could get people talking

Lysacek didn't waste any time making himself at home.

He's already met the mascots, watched the American flag go up at the athletes village and ordered an Olympic ring with more bling than you find in an NBA locker room. His entourage of family and friends is starting to arrive, and all 29 members should be in town by Friday night.

"LOVE it," he said today. "To actually be here, I still don't realize it yet and I don't know if I actually will. You see the sign and you're like, 'Oh yeah, it's the Olympic year, that's right. Oh! We're here!'

Lysacek isn't the only one having trouble recognizing he's at the Turin Olympics. Evgeni Plushenko has been at the center of all of the pregames hype, and with good reason. He's a three-time world champion, and he won his fifth European title * * * * * * * * * last month in a rout despite a case of the flu that left him barely able to breathe. Stephane Lambiel, the defending world champion. Canada's Jeff Buttle and Brian Joubert of France have also generated chatter.

But most have written off all three of the Americans, and that could be a mistake. The men's competition begins next Tuesday with the short program.

Lysacek, 20, was the surprise bronze medalist at last year's world championships, his first at the senior level. He followed it up with silver medals at both Skate America and NHK Trophy, making him the only U.S. man to qualify for the Grand Prix final. An injury kept him out of the final.

He was favored to win his first national title last month, but failed in a most embarrassing fashion. He fell

Many advocate black history classes in schools

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) — The first book Assemblyman William Payne recalls hearing as a kindergartner in the 1940s was "The Story of Little Black Sambo." He never forgot the black stereotypes that filled the 19th century children's story.

"You grow up with these subliminal messages that everything good is white," Payne recalled, his words bubbling forth with angry urgency. "It is so hurtful that these things were sanctioned by the Board of Education."

The memory was part of what drove Payne decades later as he wrote and lobbied for a state law — the nation's first - mandating that New Jersey schools teach black history. But now, nearly four years later, compliance is spotty and the lawmaker is frustrated. Even as Black History Month briefly draws attention to African-American heritage, New Jersey's effort shows how hard it can be to move from an idea to change in the classroom.

"We won't have to do February if in fact we teach this in the regular curriculum," said Payne.

New Jersey's 2002 law created an Amistad Commission whose members write lesson plans, organize educational events and train teachers — all focused on black history. The law says each school board "shall incorporate" black history at all grade levels. Two New Jersey's 593 districts on their history." Jane T. Plenge, assistant other states, New York and Illinois, have since passed similar laws and several others are either considering them or have passed statutes that encourage, but do not require, teachers to address

black history.

New Jersey's commission gets its name from a Spanish ship that was carrying kidnapped Africans into slavery in 1839 when the captives seized the boat. They were recaptured and imprisoned, but eventually won their freedom in a U.S. Supreme Court ruling.

Even though Steven Spielberg released a movie about the incident in 1997, it's often not included in history books — along with many other key events in black history, said Karen Jackson-Weaver, who was hired last new multicultural elective called year as the Amistad Commission's first executive director.

Jackson-Weaver now is surveying compliance with the law. "Just in case you didn't know," she told districts in a letter, "we do have an Amistad law on the books and it's necessary to have African-American history in the cur-

riculum."

Some educators don't know the law exists. Among those that do, many teachers are not well-versed in black history and don't know where to find teaching materials.

With just two full-time staffers, the Amistad Commission is struggling to

The 19 volunteer commissioners are working to get lesson plans online, and will likely end up hiring an historian to write a textbook that adequately meshes black history with the rest of American history, Jackson-Weaver said.

Last week, New Jersey's education commissioner sent another reminder letter to school districts to urge educators to implement the law.

"A law that isn't enforced is like no law at all," said Jerome Carr, a parent who pressed officials in Montgomery Township schools, about 30 miles north of Trenton, for two years to comply with Amistad. School officials ignored him, Carr said, and one board member questioned the need for a black history

Last month, the board approved a "Diversity in America," but Carr reviewed the class outline and said it "continues to give short shrift to our superintendent for curriculum and instruction in Montgomery Township, said the district has been responsive to parents' concerns and is constantly updating its social studies lessons.

Interest rates may rise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Homeowners and businesses attempting to borrow disaster relief funds from the federal government to get back on their feet would have to pay more to get the money under a Bush administration proposal.

The administration is seeking an increase in the Business Small Administration's loan rate that eventually would boost the interest rates for government-subsidized loans.

Homeowners could be faced with increases of nearly 2 percentage points above the current 2.7 percent rate and business owners might have to pay an additional 0.5 percent over the 4 percent they currently pay. The new rates, which would be closer to market rates, would be tied to Treasury bill returns. The increase would cost homeowners nearly \$10,000 more over the life of a 30year, \$100,000 loan.

The higher rates wouldn't apply to loans made before October 2007, and they

wouldn't kick in until five years after loan checks are cut. Still, the proposal in the White House's spending plan for the budget year that begins in 2007 is drawing the ire of some critics.

"This is absolutely outrageous," said Rep. Nydia Velazquez, the top Democrat on the congressional panel that oversees the SBA. Velazquez, who represents part of New York City, said the White House plan would hurt people who need the most help.

"I think they've already done their part in terms of deficit reduction," she said.

SBA officials estimate that the new rates would add about \$41 million to government coffers during its first year.

Hector Barreto, the agency's chief, described the proposal, which requires congressional approval, as one of several "necessary fiscal restraints" that will enable the SBA to deal with record demands.

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Three convicted in nation's deadliest smuggling attempt

HOUSTON (AP) — Three people who played a part in transporting more immigrants in their homes than 70 immigrants inside a stifling trailer escaped possible life sentences after being convicted for participating in the nation's deadliest human smuggling attempt.

But they still face anywhere from 10 to 20 years in prison on each of the various counts of conspiracy, harboring and transporting illegal immigrants a jury convicted them Wednesday.

The defendants were convicted of conspiracy to harbor and transport illegal immigrants, which carries a possible 20 year sentence.

In addition to conspiracy, jurors found Victor Sanchez Rodriguez, 58, guilty of eight counts of harboring and nine counts of transporting illegal immigrants; his Emma Sapata Rodriguez, 59, guilty of eight counts of harboring and six counts of transporting; and her half-sister, Rosa Sarrata Gonzalez, guilty of one count of harboring.

The other counts carry punishment ranges of 10 to the government.

The defendants hid the and moved them to other stash houses, eventually helping them get to the site where they were loaded into the airtight tractor-trailer for transport to Houston. Nineteen people in the trailer died.


The defendants originally faced up to life in prison on the conspiracy count and some of the transporting counts at sentencing May 1.

But the jury believed the defendants were not responsible for the immigrants' deaths nor for putting their lives in danger.

Prosecutors and defense attorneys did not comment on the verdict because of a

gag order in the case. The jury deliberated for 13 1/2 hours over four days, at one point telling U.S. District Judge Vanessa Gilmore they were deadlocked. She sent them back to keep trying.

Jurors still have to decide whether several homes the defendants own that were used in the smuggling operation must be turned over to



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
