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Public hearing on tax rate draws no response

The first of two public hearings on Gray County's proposed tax rate drew no residents' comments this morning in the second-floor courtroom of the courthouse.

County Judge Richard Peet gave a presentation concerning the proposed rate and compared it to previous years' tax rates, the cost to taxpayers with various amounts of property value, and the amount of funds needed to finance the county's proposed fiscal year 2007 budget.

After 30 minutes, commissioners declared the public hearing closed and voted to allow Precinct 4 Commissioner James Hefley to

Peet noted that there are two write-in candidates for the November general election who are seeking to fill the unexpired term of Don Fletcher, who was elected in 2004 as Precinct 4 constable on his platform of vacating the office if elected and saving county taxpayers the cost of having that constable.

Curtis Broaddus has filed as a write-in candidate for the position vacated by Fletcher in January 2005. Fletcher has subsequently also filed as a write-in candidate for the unexpired term, Peet said.

Included in the county's 2007 budget is a raise for county employees of about \$100 per month, or three and one-half percent. Peet noted that the cost of living had increased about four percent.

Proposed raises for county employees must be voted on before the budget and tax rate can be approved. The suggested raise, to be specified as being for both employees and elected officials, will be on the county's Sept. 8 agenda, with the proposed budget and tax rate on the agenda for the Sept. 15 meeting.

The second and final public hear-

rate will be Sept. 8.

A county tax rate of .445623 per \$100 valuation is being considered. The current rate for fiscal 2006 is .488926 per \$100 valuation.

The proposed rate is higher than the effective rate, which is the amount required to generate the same amount of tax revenue as was collected the previous fiscal year. Increases in some county property values and in mineral values have resulted in an increase in the total taxable property value taxed by the county.



Bernanke bullish on productivity

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's productivity probably will keep growing solidly for some time to come, an important force in bolstering living standards, Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said today.

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Although future productivity gains can be difficult for economists to forecast, Bernanke offered a largely optimistic case that the country will continue to log good efficiency gains over the long term. He said recent figures showing a short-term slowing in productivity didn't change his view.

"A case can be made that the strong productivity growth of the post-1995 era is likely to continue for some time," he said in remarks prepared for an economic and development conference in Greenville, S.C. A copy of his remarks was made available in Washington.

Since 1995 productivity has been growing at a significantly faster rate than it had in the previous two decades, when efficiency gains had been sluggish.

Between 1995 and 2005, productivity growth was about 2 1/2 percent a year, Bernanke noted. In contrast, from the early 1970s until about 1995, productivity growth averaged about 1 1/2 percent a year be said.

averaged about 1 1/2 percent a year, he said. Big investments in computers and other

productivity-enhancing equipment has played a role in the productivity improvements. Competition, the flexibility of U.S. companies to easily add and shed workers and other factors have contributed to the improvements.

And U.S. workers — from auto mechanics and factory workers to scientists and engineers — have done their part by learning how to use new technologies that sharpen their productivity.

"Few jobs or occupations have not been affected in some way by the technological changes of recent years, a trend that will certainly continue," Bernanke said.

To make sure that good productivity gains are logged in the future, it is crucial that "we have a work force that is comfortable with and adaptable to new technologies," he said. That's why workers need to be mindful of freshening their skills and education, Bernanke added.

Productivity — the amount an employee producers for every hour on the job — is a key ingredient to the economy's long-term vitality. Efficiency gains can be a blunting force against inflation. Companies can pay workers more without boosting prices, which would eat into those wage gains.

Current taxable property values subject to county tax total \$1,377,369,900, an increase from last year's \$1,175,561,634.

The proposed county tax rate would garner \$9,348,303 for fiscal year 2007. The 2006 county budget was \$9,127,934, and the proposed 2007 budget totals \$10,078,024, reflecting increased operating costs of various county departments, said County Judge Richard Peet.

The \$729,721 difference between the proposed budg-

et and proposed tax rate collection total could be taken from the county's projected \$2.1 million which will be left over after this fiscal year ends Sept. 30, Peet said.

That would leave approximately \$1.42 million in reserve funds, enough for a three-month cushion, Peet said. The county currently requires about \$500,000 per month to meet expenses such as bills and salaries.

Under the current county tax rate, a homeowner whose home was valued at \$34,244, the average for the county, pays \$167.43 in county taxes. At the new, proposed rate, the same homeowner would pay \$152.60.

Proposed tax rates per \$100 valuation of the four taxing entities in Gray County are: Gray County, .445623; City of Pampa, .6950; Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District, .0124; and Pampa Independent School District, 1.4350. Homeowners who have a homestead exemption may deduct \$15,000 from the certified appraised value of their property when figur-

ing their PISD taxes.

Gray County's proposed tax rate is lower than that of the previous seven years. In 1998, the county's tax rate was .4276; in 1995, it was .4392.

The Christies owned and operated Guarantee Title, Inc., a property title business in Wichita Falls. Morgan was a real estate agent.



LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — In the day leading up to the crash of Comair Flight 5191, a federal investigator says the air traffic controller on duty had worked for almost 15 hours and slept for two.

gator in the crash that killed 49 people, said in her final briefing before leaving Lexington Thursday that the controller had only nine hours off between work shifts Saturday.

That was just enough to meet federal rules, which require a minimum of eight hours off between shifts, Hersman said.

"He advised our team that he got approximately two hours of sleep," Hersman

It was the latest revelation in an investigation that has raised numerous questions about human error. Hersman said earlier this week that the

plane crashed after veering down a wrong, shorter runway when the controller turned his back to handle administrative duties.

The commuter jet crashed Sunday morning, in the final hours of the controller's shift, while the pilot tried to take off from Blue Grass Airport.

The controller, a 17-year veteran whose name has not been released publicly, worked from 6:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Saturday. He came back to work at 11:30 p.m. on the same

day to begin an eight-hour overnight shift. Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman Laura Brown said the air traffic controller union approved the work schedule rules, and the FAA provides information

about how to avoid fatigue.

"If they don't believe they're fit for duty, they're supposed to tell us that," Brown said. "You won't be penalized for not reporting for work.'

The crash threw a spotlight on another practice aviation experts say goes on around the country: Small regional airports are National Transportation Safety Board sometimes manned by a single air traffic member Debbie Hersman, the lead investi- controller, even though federal rules require

Ken Spirito, director of a regional airport in Peoria, Ill., said it is common for some late-night and earlymorning shifts to be staffed with only one controller. Someone may call in sick or take a vacation, and the FAA usually decides to keep the airport open, he said.

"The mandate that is issued by FAA is only as

good as the staffing levels at that particular tower," Spirito said.

FAA spokeswoman Laura Brown said that at the time of the accident, there were only two other towers — in Duluth, Minn., and Fargo, N.D. — that were not following the policy to staff with two controllers.

"We have clarified the guidance for them," Brown said.

The lone survivor of the crash, first officer James Polehinke, remained hospitalized in critical condition.

Also Wednesday, six tour buses took the victims' families to the crash site for the first time.

TXU plans to build nuclear plants

DALLAS (AP) — Electric utility TXU Corp. said Thursday it plans to build nuclear power generators at one to three sites to meet growing electricity demand in Texas beginning late in the next decade.

The company said it expects to submit applications to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in 2008 to build and operate the plants, which would likely begin operating between 2015 and 2020.

TXU said nuclear power is currently more costly than other fuels, but it believes it can shave 30 to 40 percent off capital costs as nuclear technology improves.

By applying to the NRC before the end of 2008, TXU expects to get \$6 billion in tax credits, nuclear risk insurance and federal loan guarantees approved by Congress in last year's energy law. The company estimated it would cost \$50 million to \$150 million to prepare the applications.

Chairman and Chief Executive C. John Wilder said nuclear reactors could provide lower-priced, low-emissions sources of power that would reduce Texas' reliance on natural gas.

Just a decade ago, Texas was building gas-fired plants because they were seen as a cheaper and cleaner alternative to coal plants, which have produced mercury pollution that contaminates many of the state's lakes.

Earlier this year, TXU announced plans to build 11 coal-fired power plants that would begin operating by 2010. TXU said the plants would be cleaner than the ones they replace, but environmentalists have opposed the move, and political leaders in Dallas and other cities charged the company is trying to rush its plans past regulators without using the cleanest technology.

This month, two arbitrators dealt TXU's coal plan a setback, recommending that the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality deny a permit for a plant to be built near Waco.

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I was recently married. I have a daughter, "Courtney," from a previous relationship. Things were great before the wedding. We even included Courtney in the planning. Afterward, however, things turned sour. Courtney kept causing problems with my husband, and they both looked to me to work it out. I felt like I was being torn in two. No matter what I said to either of them, or if I just left the room to force them to work it out without me, things only got worse. I left my husband over this. I was stressed out. Everyone was telling me I should not let my daughter dictate what was going on in my life. But I'm not going to force my child to live in a home where she does not feel love and does not want to be. Did I make the right decision? I still love my husband, but I must look out for what is best for my daughter. -- SECOND THOUGHTS IN **BLUE SPRINGS, MO.**

DEAR SECOND THOUGHTS: Of course you have to look out for what is best for your child. Although you may have done the right thing in leaving, however, I think you left too soon. Courtney had never had to share her mother's love and attention with anyone before. She was fighting for total possession of her parent, which wasn't healthy for either of you. Before leaving your husband, it would have been better to try family counseling to determine if a licensed professional could improve the level of communication, tolerance and understanding between the "combatants."

DEAR ABBY: I am a 17-year-old female who lives in a large family. There are two brothers, two sisters, three cousins, one aunt, two uncles, my parents and both my grandparents living here -- so things are very open. When I was 5, one of my uncles started molesting me. It lasted for eight years. After I was 6 or 7, the other uncle began raping me almost daily, and it went

on for the next eight years. I told my parents about the molestation, and we went to the police. But because they didn't do anything about the molestation, I didn't tell them about the everyday rape. It has been three years since it stopped happening, and my uncle has told me he is sorry. I feel I need someone to talk to about this, but I don't want to tell them who did it. I really need some advice. - HURTING IN HAY-WARD, CALIF.

DEAR HURTING: Pick up the phone and call the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network (RAINN). The toll-free number is (800) 656-4673. Counselors there will guide you to specialized services that can help you. Their entire focus is on helping the victims of sexual assault. No one will "force" you to reveal anything you don't want to. However, after counseling, you may decide to tell the authorities what was done to you in order to prevent your uncle from raping and assaulting other vulnerable family members or neighbors. I'm keeping my fingers crossed that you will.

DEAR ABBY: A friend of mine is a single father with a 12-year-old daughter. The mother is no longer involved in their lives. I am concerned because the 12-year-old sleeps in the same bed as her father. Although he claims nothing is going on, I believe -- and have stated -- that it is not a good idea. What do you think? I think it would help him to hear someone else's opinion. -- JANE IN BURLINGAME, CALIF.

DEAR JANE: I agree the girl is too old to be sleeping with her dad. A 12-year-old girl is well on her way to becoming a young woman, and sharing a bed with her father could be too stimulating, for both of them. If he has further doubts about this, he should consult his daughter's pediatrician.





Tyson just another freak show on Vegas strip

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Some crowded around the ring with cell phone cameras in hand. Others sat at a bar not 20 feet away drinking beer. Still others ignored it all and smoked cigarettes and played slot machines.

Mike Tyson used to put on displays. On this day, he was just on display.

Down the street, tourists watched lions and dolphins between breaks at the slot machines. In the Aladdin hotel, they didn't need to move from their seats at the bar to see

another curiosity in a makeshift ring.

The former baddest man on the planet has been reduced to this - just another freak show on the Las

The signs said he was in training, and that was enough to lure a few hundred people to the makeshift ring set up just outside the casino's buffet restaurant. Training for what was a question better left unanswered

Tyson once made \$35 million for one fight and more than \$300 million in his career before blowing it all. Now he's a casino sideshow, trying to make a few bucks the

only way he knows how in a sport he no longer can stand.
"I truly hate fighting," Tyson said. "I've got a bad taste On this day, Tyson is contrite, seemingly embarrassed his life has been reduced to this. He says he's uncomfort-

able going out in front of people masquerading as the fighter he once was when he knows it's all really a cha-But he owes his creditors millions, needs the money

desperately and took up the casino on its offer to make

So he gets into the ring to throw a few punches at the mitts of trainer Jeff Fenech as tourists take pictures. "I'm looking to make a buck like anyone else," says

Tyson.

There's talk of a series of three-round exhibition fights

henced tradition in boxing. to earn that buck. It's a time-honored tradition in boxing, where no one gets hurt and the former champ who is down on his luck gets a small taste of the money he used to make.

Tyson is 40, but he's an old 40. Look past the bizarre tattoo that stretches across the left side of his face, and there's a weariness on his face that comes with years of

hard fighting and even harder living.

It's been 20 years since Tyson became the youngest heavyweight champion ever by knocking out Trevor

Berbick. I remember watching him that night and later seeing him walk around the Las Vegas Hilton with the WBC title belt wrapped proudly around his waist.

His world quickly became filled with riches, women

and fame in such abundance that the one-time street tough from New York had no chance of handling it all. He went to prison for rape only to come out bigger than ever, but his new life spiraled out of control almost as

He doesn't want anybody's sympathy, isn't even sure why they still care. They do, though, because they remember what he once was,

"I had a great life. I had 20 lives. No way should they be sympathetic to me," Tyson said. "Unfortunately I'm not a wealthy person.

He still manages to drive a BMW, though he's quick to say that in the day he would drive Ferraris and Bentleys. The problem was he would buy several and give them away to the hangers-on that were always around in his prime but were nowhere to be seen on this day.

He owned mansions, too, and not just one. When you're heavyweight champion of the world, you think the money will never stop flowing.

"I blank all that out of my mind," Tyson said. "If I think or dwell on that I can't be the person I want to be in

Which is?

"A simple guy."
Unfortunately, nothing will ever be simple for Tyson. He's always been tormented by demons he's been either unable or unwilling to control, and he seems as confused over his future as he was in his past.

He was embarrassed by his knockout loss to an Irish stiff named Kevin McBride the last time he got into the ring 14 months ago, and vows never to fight for real again. But here he is training next to a bank of slot machines trying to get in some kind of shape so he can make a few bucks off of his name.

It's sad, but that's the way it is. When I look at Tyson it's all I can do not to picture him ending up like Joe Louis, who worked as a casino greeter and often was brought out drooling in his wheelchair to ringside so high

rollers could say they saw the Brown Bomber.

People loved Louis. For some reason, they're still fascinated with Tyson.

"People truly believe and support me," he said. "I realized that over time. I don't know if it's for sympathetic reasons or just something that they can relate to me in life."





Lebanese PM calls on donors to help rebuild country

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP Lebanon's prime minister urged world donors today to help his country recover after Israeli bombing wiped out "15 years of postwar development" in 34 days of fighting with Hezbollah guerrillas.

About 60 governments and aid organizations were in Stockholm hoping to raise \$500 million to help Lebanon rebuild roads, bridges and homes left shattered by the war.

Lebanese Prime Minister Fuad Saniora strongly rejected suggestions the aid money would trickle down to Hezbollah and strengthen the group's position in southern Lebanon.

"This idea, that it will be siphoned in one way or another to Hezbollah is entirely, completely, a fallacy. It is not true," Saniora said at a news conference.

Earlier, in his opening speech, Saniora told delegates that the direct damage of

the conflict was in the "billions of dollars" while the indirect cost including lost tourism and industry revenue would cost billions more.

"Moreover, Lebanon's well-known achievements in 15 years of postwar development have been wiped out in a matter of days by Israel's deadly military machine," Saniora said.

He said reconstruction efforts would be "severely undermined" if Israel doesn't lift its sea, air and land blockade of Lebanon.

"It should really lift the blockade that is inhuman," Saniora said, urging all nations to support his call.

U.N. Deputy Secretary-General Mark Malloch Brown also urged Israel to immediately lift the blockade, saying it was hampering relief efforts in Lebanon.

"Aid when there is a blockade is like putting someone on life support when there is a foot on their windpipe," he said in a speech to delegates.

Israel has said it would not lift its blockade until U.N. peacekeepers take positions

along the Syrian border to block arms shipments to Hezbollah from its two main supporters, Iran and Syria.

In a report to the conference, the Lebanese government projected that early recovery efforts would cost about \$540 million.

The U.S. delegation said it would formally pledge the \$230 million that President Bush offered last week.

Conference host Jan Eliasson, Sweden's foreign minister, said aid would strengthen the Lebanese government's control of its country. "This conference aims at strengthening the central government of Lebanon and in that government Hezbollah is only a minor part," he said.

The fighting started July 12 when Hezbollah guerrillas crossed the Lebanon-Israel border at Aita al-Shaab, killed three Israeli soldiers and seized two others.

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

Texas tries to defend national title without Vince



AUSTIN (AP) - To this day, Texas coach Mack Brown insists he thought Vince Young would return for another season and a run at another national title.

"I may have been the only one in America who did," Brown said.

In Brown's defense, Young had said as much leading up his starmaking performance in the Rose

But the quarterback had a change of heart a few days later and left for the NFL. With one Sunday afternoon news conference, Texas fell from national title favorite this season into the pack of contenders.

That left Brown, who traded the label of "Coach derogatory for the exclusive February" "National Champion," trying to

repeat the title with a team loaded as a 6-foot-5, 230-pound playmaker. with talent but led by a pair of freshman quarterbacks in Colt McCoy and Jevan Snead.

And there are some who think he can't.

Until Oklahoma quarterback Rhett Bomar was kicked off the team, the Sooners were the trendy pick to beat Texas for the Big 12 South Division title.

"After Vince left, it changed our position nationally because if he had returned, people would have thought we would have had a great chance to repeat," Brown said.

"Repeating is very hard to do, but winning a national championship is very hard to do. There's been no complacency. In fact, there's been more urgency to see if they can do it again."

Doing it with a freshman quarterback will take more than willpower and hard work. Texas will need some lucky breaks and bounces - the Longhorns lost only nine of 35 fumbles last season - and someone else will have to take over Young's role

Texas hasn't started a season with a freshman quarterback since Shea Morenz in 1993.

Brown said Texas will use the same spread offense that Young ran to perfection even if McCoy and Snead don't scare defenses the way he did running the ball.

"We're going to run what we ran last year with different folks," Brown said. "We probably won't have the third-down-and-30 scrambles we had for first downs."

McCoy has the benefit of redshirting last season, and Brown said he would have played him if he had known Young would leave early. Snead graduated high school in December and joined the team for spring drills.

Brown has said he thinks both players grew up a little after a summer in the weight room.

"Colt has arms now," Brown said. "He didn't before."

Although McCoy is taking more snaps with the first team in practice, Brown says he'll play both quarter-

backs, a prospect that makes some fans nervous.

Orangebloods remember the controversy that erupted around Major Applewhite and Chris Simms in 2000-2001 when Simms got the starting nod over Applewhite, the most prolific passer in school histo-


In 2003, Young shared time with Chance Mock before taking over as the starter midway through the sea-

"People love playing two quarterbacks around here," Brown joked.

"What we are planning to do is whatever we have to in order to win. I learned a lot through the time with Chris and Major, and one of the things we did learn is that it became about them instead of the team. That was really unhealthy."

McCoy called the competition with Snead "great."

"Our teammates are doing great with the whole situation. We're just trying to be the best we can be," he




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

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Red Raiders seek 10-win season

30th anniversary of their last 10-win season, the Texas Tech Red Raiders stand poised to break through again.

They can't get much closer than they did last season, when a wobbly game-ending field goal by Alabama in the Cotton Bowl gave the Crimson Tide a 13-10 victory and left Tech at nine wins for the fourth time since 1976.

Now the Red Raiders will try to remember how important each step along the way can be, said sophomore quarterback Graham Harrell, a strong candidate to be at the controls of the nation's most prolific passing offense.

He used as an example a 24-17 late-season loss to Oklahoma State, the only Big 12 win for the lastplace Cowboys.

"I don't think we're missing anything physically," Harrell said. "I think this could be the year we get over the hump and, hopefully, stay there."

The Red Raiders have certainly shown some staying power in coach Mike Leach's six seasons. They've been to a bowl game each year, and

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - On the last season's 9-3 record was good for a No. 20 national ranking and a second-place South tie with Oklahoma.

If Tech reaches 10 wins for the sixth time in school history, it will be with the first underclassman to start at quarterback for Leach since his first season in 2000, when sophomore Kliff Kingsbury started a three-year run that made him the school's all-time leading passer.

Harrell, a sophomore from Ennis who holds the state high school record for touchdown passes in a season (67), and freshman Chris Todd of Elizabethtown, Ky., have spent fall practices in competition for the starting job.

Leach said the program is no stranger to putting a quarterback out there who hasn't had much game experience.

"We've had pretty good success overcoming a lot of that in the past," said Leach, whose offense has led the nation in passing four straight seasons. Harrell and Todd "are real good students of the game, and so I

think they'll compensate for that in a big way."

Todd and Harrell, who threw for 392 yards and three touchdowns in five games as Cody Hodges' backup last year, have similar strengths, Leach said. Both have strong, accurate and versatile arms, a good pocket presence and nimble feet, he said.

Harrell said he likes to stay in the pocket but will run if he has to.

"If there's a guy chasing you, you run as fast as you need to," he said.
At receiver, Tech lost only one strong contributor from last season,

running back Taurean Henderson.
Joel Filani (87.3 yards per game),
Robert Johnson (79.6 yards per
game) and Jarrett Hicks (77.3 yards
per game) finished in the top five in
the Big 12 for average receiving
yards. Together, they combined for
2,849 total yards and 22 touchdowns.

Leach said he needs receivers to have short memories, but that isn't confined to dropped passes.

"A guy will squander a whole series because he's all happy about some catch he had," Leach said.

He mentioned Robert Johnson, who arrived at Tech two years ago as a quarterback but was moved to receiver last year. Leach called him "explosive" but with a caveat.

"He's just got to be a more consistent guy," he said. "As far as throwing the occasional great play at you, he was pretty good at that. It's the routine one that he battled a little bit."

Long maligned as a one-dimensional team, Tech has shown recently that it can slow offenses. In three seasons, the Red Raiders improved from No. 106 to 30th nationally in total defense. Five starters return, plus three from 2004 who were injured for some or all of last season.


"We're not overly talented," defensive coordinator Lyle Setencich said. "If we play hard, stay healthy and be smart, I think we can be like we were last year."

Leach said he's excited to see what his team can do this year.





If the team can stay healthy, senior quarterback Brent Roberson will have an opportunity to improve upon his numbers from last year.


Tory Coombes - a 2005 All-District team member - could be an important cog in the Pirate machine. The junior caught 12 passes last


year, scoring on five. He also found the end zone on defense, scoring a touchdown at linebacker.


Junior Trey Skipper will join Welch at linebacker with seniors Matt Applewhite and Anthony Ruiz taking up position on the defensive line.

Coach Graves always has his team ready and they respond with journeyman-like play and a never give up spirit, though he wants them to learn how to win the big games.


Still, the Tigers are poised to improve on the .500 mark of a year ago.



Blazing Buckeyes at top of first AP poll

NEW YORK (AP) - Troy Smith, Ted Ginn Jr. and the rest of Ohio State's blazing Buckeyes provided a peek into the future at the Fiesta Bowl with a warp-speed win that left a lasting impression.

With a flurry of quick-strike scores, Ohio State took out Notre Dame 34-20 and served notice that big things could be in store for 2006.

For the first time since 1998, Ohio State is preseason No. 1 in The Associated Press Top 25.

"I think that anytime we're ranked No. 1, it puts a bull's-eye on us," center Doug Datish said after a recent practice. "But on that same note, we're Ohio State and we always have the big bull's-eye on us anyway."

The Buckeyes received 35 of a possible 65 first-place votes from a panel of media members. Notre Dame was No. 2, the best preseason showing for the Fighting Irish since they were second in 1994.

"There wasn't a clear-cut No. 1, which I guess if you're a college football fan you have to really like," said Jason Franchuk, a poll voter from the Provo Daily Herald in Utah. "I just remember watching the Fiesta Bowl and being really impressed with that (Ohio State) team."

Texas will start the defense of its national

title as the No. 3 team in the country. Auburn was fourth and West Virginia fifth.

Southern California, preseason No. 1 the past two years, was No. 6.

"It's not a problem," USC receiver Dwayne Jarrett said when he found out about the Trojans' ranking. "We're just going to take that and roll with it."

Florida, LSU, California and Oklahoma rounded out the top 10.

No. 11 Florida State and No. 12 Miami will renew their rivalry on Labor Day night in the Orange Bowl.

No. 13 was Louisville, followed by Michigan, Georgia, Iowa, Virginia Tech, Clemson, Penn State and Nebraska.

The final five were Oregon, TCU, Tennessee, Arizona State and Texas Tech.

Unlike the past two seasons, when USC started the season as an overwhelming No. 1, the Buckeyes received 54 percent of the first-place votes, and all the teams in the top six received at least three votes for No. 1. Notre Dame had 10 first-place votes, Texas eight, West Virginia six and Auburn and USC three.

Ohio State closed the 2005 season on a seven-game winning streak and was No. 4 in the final AP poll. The Buckeyes' two losses were to Texas and Penn State by a combined total of 10 points.

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
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
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
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

This Cavalier picking up where his father left off

His is something of a unique story. Enough so that it has captured the interest of a major television network.

Entering his first year as the head of the Pampa High School football program, coach Andy Cavalier has the look of a man who is comfortable and confident. His smile is infectious. His answers to media questions are quick, almost as though he has been doing this most of his life.

Why shouldn't they be?

Cavalier is certainly qualified to coach. And it is only right that his first job be at Pampa. It's not fate. It's not timing. It is destiny.

His late father, Dennis Cavalier, laid the foundation on which Pampa football now sits. Since his death in 2003, the Harvester football program has had a different head coach each season.

Coach Andy Cavalier stepped in earlier this year and wasted little time in re-establishing the tradition his father instilled.

"Tueor Purro" is the theme this season. According to Coach Cavalier

it means "Preserve" and "Surpass."

Tradition and heritage are vital elements in all Pampa sports.

Coach Andy Cavalier feels as though he has the opportunity to pick up where his father left off.

"I was lucky enough to work with my dad near the end of his career. I feel like what I am doing is taking our program where he would have."

When asked if he ever stops and asks himself what would his father do if he were here, Coach Cavalier said, "Only every single day."

Coming off a 5-6 season a year ago including a 4-1 district mark and a playoff loss to Big Spring, the 2006 Pampa Harvester varsity squad has a tough row to hoe in the season ahead. The Harvesters have only four home games this year - two of them against District 3-4A opponents.

Pampa is short on experience at the skilled positions, though Coach Cavalier likes what he has seen in the two scrimmages against Wichita Falls Hirschi and Big Spring.

Sophomore quarterback Casey

Trimble will anchor Harvester's spread offense. Trimble inherited the job after projected starter Brett Ferrell (senior) broke his arm in the Hirschi scrimmage.

When asked what he knew about his team he didn't know two months ago, Cavalier said, "Two months ago I didn't know Brett Ferrell was going to break his arm." Still, Cavalier has nothing but praise for the way Trimble has progressed and how the team has continued to grow over the past couple of weeks.

While new faces take up positions on offense, the Pampa defense should pick up where it left off last year. It grew to be a stingy bunch that allowed a big play now and then but was also capable of flexing plenty of muscle.

Pampa returns eight starters on defense, including Nick Dudley, Bradley Johnson, Dustin Forney and Marcos Campos on the line. Heavy hitters James Coffee and John Burns will take up position at linebacker.

The Harvester's secondary will be quick to say the least with Shavious Kelley and Michael Robinson.

Only four starters from last year make up the Harvester offense. Senior Chase Harris and Kelley are expected to make up Pampa's ground game along with sophomore Maddison Wilson.

Jad McGuire will most likely be moved up from the junior varsity unit to serve as Trimble's backup at quarterback.


When Pampa goes to the air, Robinson and Jerrod Bivins will be on the receiving end of most Harvester passes.



Smith will field an I offense while going with a 5-3 defense in 2006.






